### Grain sign-up to begin

Singup for the 1986 wheat and feed-grain programs will be March 3 through April 11, reports Glenn Brzozowski, of the Haskell County

Other farm program provisions announced include:

Producers may request 100 percent of their diversion payments and 40 percent of their projected deficiency payments when they

Payment rates for the 21/2 percent paid land diversion for wheat and feed-grain producers have been established (per bushel) at \$.57 for barley, \$.73 for corn, \$.36 for oats, \$.65 for sorghum and \$1.10 for wheat.

The payment rate for the additional paid diversion option for winter-wheat producers is \$2 per bushel in accordance with the Food Security Act of 1985.

Estimated per bushel deficiency payment rates are: barley, \$.95; corn, \$1.03; oats, \$.45; sorghum, \$.98; and wheat, \$1.83.

Seventy-five percent of the advance deficiency payments will be paid in cash during signup, and the remaining 25 percent will be paid as payment-in-kind beginning May 1. Producers will have from May 1 through Sept. 30 to request the PIK portion of their advance deficiency and/or diversion payments.

Producers who have price support loans-regular, special or farmer-owned reserve-on any commodity on the date the advance payment is requested must make that loan collateral available to satisfy their PIK. The quantity of the loan collateral that must be redeemed for PIK purposes will depend on the value, as determined the Commodity Credit Corporation, of the commodity under loan at the time PIK is received.

Producers who do not have commodities under loan or producers who commodities under loan are insufficient to meet their PIK entitlements, will be issued Continued on page 10



### Malfunction blamed for phone outage

Telephone customers in Haskell and some 18 area GTE communities may have experienced difficulty in placing or receiving long distance calls between 3:20 and 6:30 p.m. last Friday when an equipment malfunction occurred in the Southwestern Bell long distance switching center in Wichita Falls.

Ray Krueger, local manager for GET in Olney, said, "At 3:20 p.m. our central office long distance carrier alarm systems indicated a major telephone outage occurred. After completing several equipment testing procedures, it was determined the source of the problem was in the Wichita Falls switching center."

Krueger added, "We made contact with Southwestern Bell officials who were aware of the problem. We remained in constant touch with them until the intergrated circuit card equipment failure was located and replaced."

### County highway to get re-surfacing

State Highway 6 from Rule to the Knox County line, will undergo a surfacing treatment this spring. The 15.4-mile stretch of highway is part of 51 miles in Haskell, Shackelford and Taylor counties to be surfaced as a result of additional highway funding approved by the 1984 legislature.

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission has approved a contract with Cox Paving Co. of Blanco, which was awarded the project at a low bid of \$988,890.02.

Work involveds 'seal coating' the highways to protect and improve the roadway surfaces. A seal coat consists of spreading a layer of liquid asphalt on the roadway, followed by a coating of fine rock chips which sink into the asphalt, making the layer thicker and helping it adhere better.

The process seals the highway surface to retard the formation of potholes, and provides smoother, safer travel lanes for motorist.

Ray Green, the highway department's public affairs officer in Abilene, said that Joe Higgins of Hamlin will be the agency's engineer in charge of supervising

The project also includes 16.8 miles of SH 351 in Shackelford County, from US 180 to the Jones County line.

### Too good to be true

"Congratulations! You have your choice of one of the following of our promotional items:

"TV set, Refrigerator, AM/FM Stereo, Motor Boat.

"We must give you your choice. However, you must pay insurance, frieght and processing fees. These costs are minimal—always under \$125, and if you are not 100 percent satisfied with your item, you may exchange it for may one of the other

How can you turn down an offer like that? Many people don't and each year those who just can't let a good deal that's too good to be true slip through their fingers are bilked out of millions of dollars.

The offer mentioned above is an excerpt from one of the most recent mail fraud schemes aimed at small-business customers. Postal inspectors in Los Angeles have initiated an investigation of a company operating out of the Los Angeles area which is sending small-business customers a card to complete with their choice of one of the above promotional items. The company then sends an envelope with a \$124 COD charge to the customer. The envelope is supposed to contain a certificate for the promotional item.

If the customer decides not to pay the COD fee, the company sends letters stating the original card signed was a binding legal contract to pay the fees, and if they are not paid, they will be charged an

additional \$124, the matter will be turned over to the collections department and the incident could result in legal proceedings and seriously affect the customer's credit rating.

According to Inspector In Charge D.C. Strader in Fort Worth, postal customers in Texas and Oklahoma, worried about having their credit rating ruined, have contacted his office to find out if they have to accept these COD items. They are advised that if they want to refuse the item, they can do so prior to paying the Postal Service for the package or letter. Once the customer pays the Postal Service for the article and opens it, no refund can be made. He added that customers should not feel intimidated into paying for items they do not want.

Over the years, the Postal Inspection Service has conducted extensive media campaigns to expose mail fraud and to alert people to its dangers; however, as consumers become more aware, fraudulent companies disguise their schemes to fit the more informed customer. Inspector Strader says the best defense is to learn to say no. He added, "If there is any question in your mind about a solicitation that sounds fraudulent, then check it out. It's an old saying, but the truth is, that if it sounds too good to be true, then it probably



### TAX **PLANNING**

#### DON'T OVERLOOK DEDUCTIONS

Your accountant needs to know as much about you and your financial life as possible. Accountants operate under a strict code of ethics and will keep all information about you confidential. Therefore, at tax filing time do a complete review of the past year with your accountant. In addition to finding more tax breaks for you, your accountant will probably spot other areas where some professional assistance or recommendations could make or save you money.

To begin with, discuss all sources of revenue. Everyone knows that wages are taxable income, but not everyone realizes that such sources of revenue as gifts, inheritances, life insurance proceeds, and some law suit awards are not taxable income. Money from retirement plan distributions, the sale of your residence, and the sale of personal or business assets may qualify for tax-favored treatment.

Then discuss activities and expenses during the year that might result in tax deductions and credits. For example, suppose you didn't change jobs during the year, but you did spend money looking for another job. You made a number of long distance phone calls, paid a secreterial service to prepare resumes, and traveled to several interviews. Unless you discuss these events with your accountant, your deduction for these expenses may get overlooked.

Most accounting firms use some form of checklist to insure that all possible deductions are spotted. Take the time to review the checklist carefully. Also take some time to review your records - cancelled checks, activity calendars, etc. - to see what you did during the year that may have resulted in deductible expenditures. The more your accountant knows about your financial affairs, the more help he can







### **Farabee lists** contributions for half year

State Sen. Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, who represents Haskell County in the State Senate, collected \$2,126 in political donations in the last half of 1985.

Year-end campaign finance records filed with the secretary of state showed Farabee reported spending \$12,126 during the sixmonth period.

Contributions to Farabee included \$1,500 from a Fort Worth-based cattlemen's group and \$125 each in transportation from Dan Wright and A. B. Wharton III of Vernon.

Farabee's expenditures included \$4,858 for computer equipment, \$2,227 for tickets and contributions. \$1,094 for political meetings, \$912 for travel and \$276 for photography.

# PIK provisions described

Details of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's advance deficiency and diversion "generic PIK" provisions, under which producers may receive certificates for commodities in lieu of cash payments for program participation under the Food Security Act of 1985 have been announced.

USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation will issue payment-inkind certificates that are generic, meaning that the certificate will not be commodity specific. The certificates will be redeemable by producers for any regular, special or farmer-owned reserve loan commodity, and by commercial certificate holders for any CCCowned commodity.

PIK certificates will be issued in

the monetary amount due the producer and will be available for issuance by the Haskell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office beginning May 1. Each producer will have until Sept. 30, 1986, or until the maturity date of his loan, whichever is earlier, to request issuance of his certificate and to market the certificate.

Producers holding commodities pledged as loan collateral at signup must redeem that loan collateral (except peanuts and tobacco) to staisfy their PIKs. Producers may elect to use any commodity they hold under loan as a payment-inkind. The quantity of the loan collateral that must be redeemed for PIK purposes will be determined using the per-unit value as announced by the CCC on the day the certificate is presented for redemption.

Producers who do not hold commodities under loan or whose commodities under loan are insufficient to satisy their PIK entitlement may sell their certificates to: a commercial entity who may in turn redeem them only for CCC-owned commodities; another producer who may use the certificate to redeem his commodity loans; or producers who are co-op members who may designate an approved co-op to market their PIKs.

Commercial holders of PIK certificates may redeem them at any time but before Dec. 31, 1986. Commercial holders may redeem PIK certificates with the Kansas City Commodity Office (KCCO), 8930 Ward Parkway, Kansas City,

KCCO will make available a listing of locations of CCC-owned commodities for in-store delivery and the applicable redemption prices. Lot selection will be on a first-come, first-served basis as established throught the Western Union Easylink system.

Commercial certificate holders who have CCC-owned inventory may request redemption of certificates for commodities at their own storing locations even though the commodity may not have been

listed as being available by KCCO. CCC reserves the right to require warehousemen who have CCC commodities to take delivery at their own warehouses when redeeming certificates.







CCC-owned commodities. The certificates may be used to purchase commodities in CCC inventory at a value determined by

A producer who accepts an advance payment, but who later does not comply with program provisions, must refund the amount of the advance payment with interest.

It is the USDA's intention to require cross compliance for 1986 crops of wheat feed grains, cotton and rice. However, the administration will accept a technical amendment to the 1985 act dealing only with cross compliance. If cross compliance is made discretionary for all 1986 crops, it will not be required for that crop year.

Bases and yields are being determined in accordance with the provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985. Producers who believe that the bases and yields for their farms are incorrectly established may file an appeal with their local county ASC committees through the end of the signup period.

Contracts signed by program participants will be considered binding and will provide for liquidated damages for failure to comply with program require-

Farmers may sign up for the 1986 farm programs at their local Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service office.




