Farmers sign up for program

Sixty-seven Haskell County farmers had signed up for the federal program to take erodible cropland out of production by the time of Friday's deadline. The acreage total was 9,019.

Each farmer making application was required to submit a bid to the government, based on the income the land would produce.

Bids were sent to Washington and the local Soil Conservation Service office expects to hear by Thursday which of them are accepted by the government.

Jim Hudson of the SCS said that the 9,019 acres in Haskell County included tracts ranging in size from 20 to 700 acres.

Farmers accepted for the program will enter into a contract with the government to convert the land to cover. The government will share the cost of the conversion on a 50-50 basis and the farmer will be responsible for all costs of maintaining the cover, including fertilizer and weed control. The farmer will receive annual payments, based on the accepted bid figure.

Under the program, no more than 25 percent of a county's farm land can be eligible. Hudson said that means that that approximately 87,000 Haskell County acres could be eligible.

Those who would like to explore these prophetic days and celebrate Passover are encouraged to attend this Sunday's meeting study. They are urged to be on time.

The raising of turkeys was an important business in early

Haskell. In the fall of 1912, Virgil Hudson shipped out more than 2,000 turkeys. During the next three years, the industry increased greatly. In 1915, a Turkey Association was formed and it sold 4,000 turkeys that year. This was in addition to the number sold

Turkey business began to fall off after that as roaming turkeys took a toll on farm crops.



WTU applies for reduction of rates

West Texas Utilities Company's retail customers of Haskell and other areas it serves should see another decrease in their electric bills soon if the Public Utility Cosmmission of Texas approves a request filed Monday in Austin.

WTU is asking permission to refund to customers a total of \$9.3 million in retail revenues collected in excess of actual fuel costs, and to lower its fuel charge rate. The total includes \$9,146,092 in actual fuel cost savings which have accumulated since the current fuel rate for WTU was set by the PUC last August, plus \$215,837 in

This would be the second time within a year for WTU to make a refund and to lower its fuel cost factor. More than \$16 million was

refunded last August.

If a reduction in its fuel rates, technically known as the Interim Quarterly Fixed Fuel Factor, is approved, WTU officials estimate the fuel cost charges to its customers will drop by 8.2 percent during the three-month quarter beginning in May.

The due amounts on customer bills include both fuel costs and base rates. Utility companies are not allowed to make money on fuel. WTU has had no change in its base

rates since 1984. Under WTU's proposal, all existing retail customers would receive refunds through one-time credits to their bills in the billing month of May, except for seasonal



BUSINESSPERSON OR SHOPKEEPER (Which Are You?)

It seems that the operators of small businesses can be divided into two main classes, businesspeople and shopkeepers.

Businesspeople analyze, compare, budget, project, and review information to try to be the best in their business community and to make the most profit on their invested time and money.

Shopkeepers, on the other hand, open their doors at 8:00 and close at 6:00 day after day all year long. They show up at their accountant's office in April of the following year and ask, "What's left over for me?" or, "Did I make any money?"

Do you suppose that 20% of the businesses do 80% of the volume and the other 80% of the businesses get the remaining 20%? It's impossible to run a business properly without a record system designed for your specific needs. To be in the top 20%, you must have adequate financial information to make proper decisions.

Whether your business is large or small, it needs management information. If your business is large, you need management information to survive profitably, and the cost to obtain such information will be returned in higher profits.

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


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

receive their refunds in December. A typical residential customer would receive refunds of \$22.

Glen D. Churchill, WTU president and chief executive officer, said this refund, as well as the one made last year is necessary because of a softer fuel market and the fixed factor method of collecting for fuel costs.

The present method was ordered by PUC after the Public Utility Regulatory Act was amended in 1983. Previously, an automatic fuel adjustment clause matched fuel billings to fuel expense each month.

Churchill said WTU's fuel costs have declined two years in a row.

"This reflects our successful efforts to purchase natural gas at lower prices to the extent possible, and to take advantage of declining prices," he said.

"Also, we have substantial benefits from lower fuel costs associated with our system's high-voltage direct current tie with Public Service Company of Oklahoma, which now has been in operation for a full year."

Natural gas is the principal fuel for all of WTU's eight major power generating stations. In recent years, fuel costs have amounted to more than half of WTU's total operating costs, but have dropped from an all-time high of \$3.18 million BTU in 1983 to \$2.55 in

This week, Opal Adkins and Veta Furrh mark their 40th anniversary as owners of The Personality Shoppe, an exclusive women's clothing store which has earned a reputation for quality and service far beyond the confines of Haskell

The sisters will host an open house Friday and Saturday and are inviting all their customers and friends to drop by for refreshments and to register for door prizes.

"We're not planning a big sale, or anything like that," said Mrs. Furrh, "although there will be a few things on sale. It's more an appreciation event to let the our friends know how much we have appreciated their business.'

The oldest dress shop in Haskell, Mrs. Adkins and Mrs. Furth have owned the Personality Shoppe since Jan. 6, 1946. The business was founded in the late 1930s by Mrs. Elma Guest.

Mrs. Adkins had worked for Mrs. Guest before she and her husband purchased a tailor shop which they operated for several years.

After selling the tailor shop, Mrs. Adkins asked her sister if she would like to go into business with her.

Mrs. Furrh, a first-grade teacher who had been teaching 17 years, liked the idea when her sister suggested that they buy out Mrs. Guest.

They signed a contract to buy the the following Jan. 6, the new owners opened their doors in the building where the Hayloft is now located. Three years later, as their business grew, they moved to their present location. They have expanded several times since.

But the business grew. A steady clientele was built from Haskell County and outlying areas. Before long, the Personality Shoppe was serving customers from a wide

Mrs. Adkins and Mrs. Furrh have kept their store modern and up-to-date. They maintain an excellent inventory of the latest in women's fashions.

The women attend market in Dallas five times a year. Mrs. Furth says she has not missed a market in 40 years and her sister has missed only three, each time when she was recuperating from surgery.



White's sidestep means the Republican debate will get some millions of dollars in free television time while the Democrats get none. And don't kid yourself, the word all over the

Capitol is that White is duck-

Excuses, Excuses

Only two weeks ago, White was confronted by challenger Andy Briscoe, who had to show up at one of White's own press conferences to get an answer out of him. White said he would debate March 20.

But as of last week, those arrangements couldn't be worked out with PBS, and the League, with time drawing short, announced it was giving up.

Could it be the old political dodge of just stalling for time on White's part?

Voters Cheated

White's advisors are publicly saying he is trying to arrange a date, but the schedule just isn't flexible enough.

At least that's a little more response than his initial response, when one advisor wrote the League that White would be too busy to debate. Maybe that first letter said it all, and the rest is wasted time.

Certainly it's a waste to the

voters, the Democratic Party and to Andy Briscoe and Don Crowder, who are close to a runoff competition with the elusive Governor.

Briscoe is a conservative party loyalist. Crowder's style is daring and combative. Both are concerned with changing the direction of the Texas Democratic Party.

Most small towns desperately need some kind of industry to keep them alive. You don't have to drive too many miles in any direction to find deserted downtown areas, full of abandoned, decaying buildings and busted dreams.

The roots of these towns are still there, represented by the senior citizens and the older generations. But the fruit, represented by the young adults, is flocking to the larger cities which offer the young livelihood and a future. So the young, nourished and educated at forced to use their talents to make some bigger town a better town.

Statistics are striking!

Where are those 38 today? Well, 29 of them are NOT in

That means there are 29 young people out there somewhere who still call Haskell their home, but for the lack of opportunity they are denied the right to live where their

Multiply that 29 (or what ever the average may be) by the number of Haskell graduating classes over the years, add spouses, offspring and the number of immigrants those numbers would have brought about, and the aggregate is astounding. Of course, not all would have remained, even under the most ideal circumstances, but a few job openings here and there would have certainly increased the retention rate. And some of those who went on to get college degrees would have had chances to practice their professions in the community which nourished them.

Such facts underscore the importance of local jobs, and the need to turn every stone in the pursuit of industrial development. man and the young woman a The pursuit must continue without discouragement. 

White. He said White picked it out himself.

That same commissioner, Ray Santos, was also the giftgiver who killed the alligator and gave the skin to the Governor.

The rifle came from a Texas Employment Commissioner who was appointed by White. Several other expensive gifts from White's appointees were also listed.

By contrast, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby reported a clock; Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox reported a jogging treadmill; House Speaker Gib Lewis, a shotgun and rifle among 11 gifts.

Other Highlights

-Comptroller Bob Bullock said oil market instability made it impractical to forecast the state revenue at this time, but said the \$1.3 billion shortfall estimate "has already dropped a lot."

-Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro reports his agency has already made \$6.4 million in new state revenues from diversifying management of state lands. Mauro said, "We've already made a profit for the Legislature and the fiscal year is only half over."

-State Treasurer Ann Richards reported the state Treasury set a single-day record last week for processing 192,-971 checks and warrants. Previous record was 163,970 in 1984. Last week's total cash flow was \$146.3 million income and \$185.8 million expenses.

-The State Board of Education learned Texas education faces a \$46.5 million loss in federal aid under the Gramm-Rudman act.

-Corpus Christi state Sen. Carlos Truan was honored as governor-for-a-day and said the Texas coast would bring millions more in tourist dollars into the state, properly managed.
