OUR AREA, as well as the rest of the nation, lost one of the most dedicated leaders it ever had with the death this past week of former Congressman George Mahon.

Mahon, who was the only congressman the Texas 19th district ever had until his retirement in 1978, was from the "old school," and believed in service and dedication to his country.

It is said that in earlier years Mahon, who grew up in the small South Plains community of Loraine, would return to his home area and pick 100 pounds of cotton, "just to remember his roots."

(Ye editor also was raised on a cotton farm, but somehow never has had the urge to put on a cotton sack when harvest time rolls around.)

Mahon grew in stature with his fellow members of the U.S. Congress until he eventually was named chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, which is recognized as one of the most powerful bodies in congress.

Mahon was first elected to congress as a young man in the Franklin D. Roosevelt administration. He served under eight presidents, up through Jimmy Carter.

Kent Hance, who replaced Mahon in congress, said "He was the ideal public servant. His is a great loss for this country. There was never a more well-liked man in Washington."

But despite the position of power that Mahon held through the Appropriations Committee, Mahon was "just plain folks," and was always happy to hear from his friends in the district about legislative matters that affected them. He gave these matters his utmost attention.

In spite of his prominent position, Mahon was not too busy to return to his district, and Parmer County, on a cold November day several years ago, to give the dedicatory address for the completion of the first dam on the Running Water Draw watershed (actually on Catfish Draw).

The weather forced the event to be moved indoors, to the Bovina Schools Auditorium. But that didn't dampen Mahon's enthusiasm, and you would have thought the county was getting a billion-dollar defense factory, the way the congressman reacted.

His colleagues loved Mahon, and this was evident in the tributes that have been spoken and written since his death.

If you will pardon a personal story, this pretty well indicates the type of person George Mahon was. After he had retired and was back home, our home telephone rang one Sunday afternoon. It was Mr. Mahon.

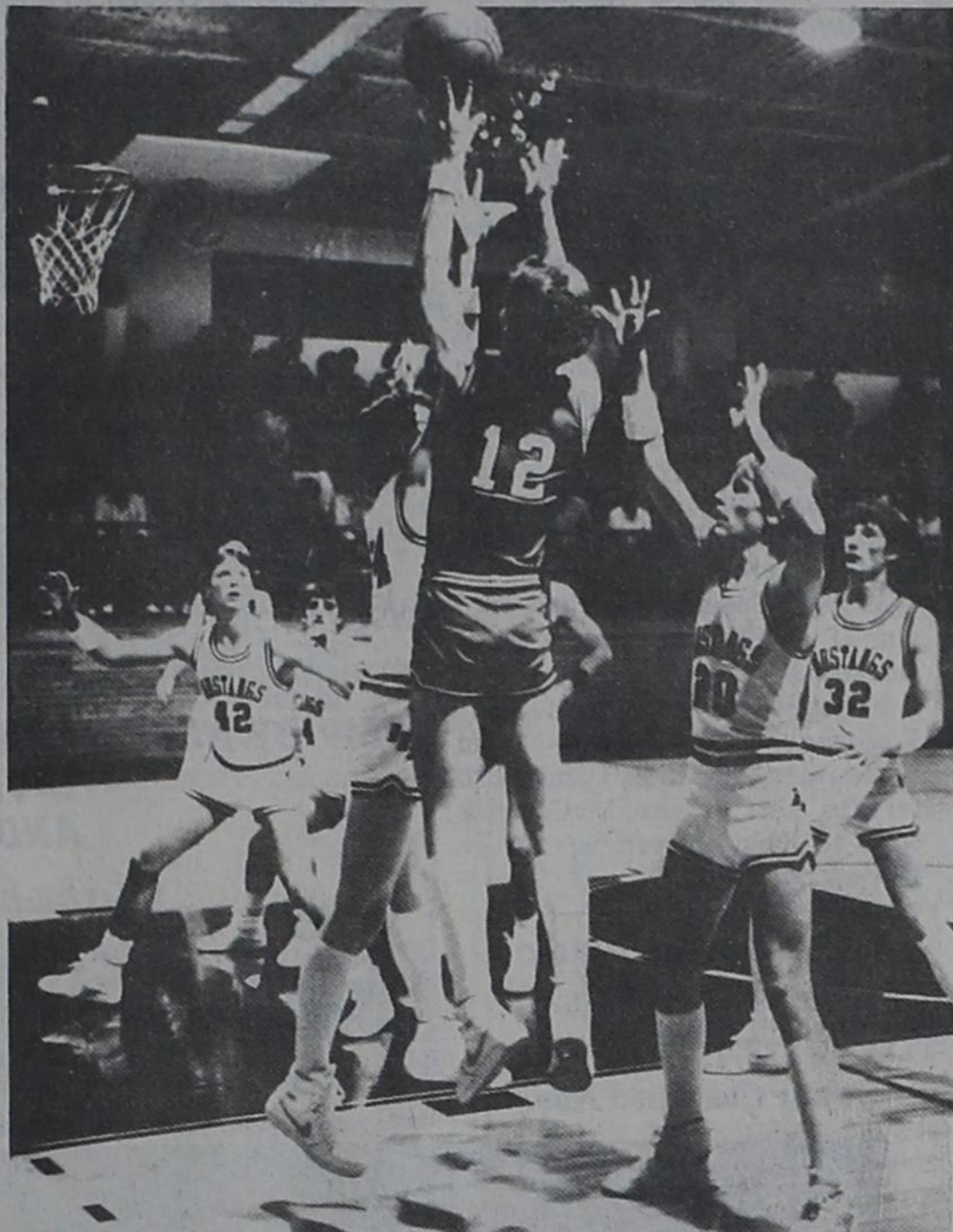
"Helen and I were just sitting around this afternoon talking about all the friends we've had, who helped us down through the years, and I just thought I'd call and say 'thank you for your friendship'," was the unexpected message. Small town editors don't get too many calls like that, even from their home folks.

George Mahon was one of those gentlemen about whom you can truthfully say, "They broke the mold when they made old George." His life and career would make fine patterns for any of us to attempt to follow.

Mustang Cagers Whip Sudan, Friona In Openers

The Bovina High School Mustangs are off to a good start, scoring two impressive wins in their first two games of the season.

The Mustangs outscored Sudan in their opening game here last Tuesday, 66-59, and then took an impressive win over Friona on Friday, 55-48.

Bovina held the lead in their game against Friona most of the way, although the Chieftains led for about four minutes of clock time in the third quarter.

The Mustangs scored 14 unanswered points over the visiting Chiefs in the third and fourth quarters, to come from behind and take control of the game.

Scott and Blake Scaff sank Bovina's first three baskets of the game as the Mustangs broke out to a 6-0 lead before the Chieftains could dent the scoreboard. Shy Burney's jump shot got Friona into the scoring column.

Bovina was enjoying a 9-4 lead when Friona sophomore Daniel Echols drove for a pair of lay-ups. He stole the ball on one occasion. That cut the Mustang advantage to 9-8.

Mattlock Howell made a jump shot for the Ponies with 1:53 left in the opening quarter and an 11-8 lead, but Lance Gatlin's jump shot kept Friona close at 11-10.

Burney's jump shot tied the game for the first time at 14-all, 1:10 into the second quarter. Then, Blake Scaff sandwiched a pair of baskets around two free throws by Howell, and Bovina had grabbed a 20-14 lead with five minutes remaining in the quarter.

Bovina had a five-point lead at 21-16 at the 2:16 mark, but Burney and Jeff Brown sank baskets to cut into the lead. Finally, the Chieftains' Lance Gatlin made a short jump shot to tie the score, 22-all and that was the halftime score.

It looked for awhile like the Chieftains had the momentum in the game when Jeff Dickson gave the Chiefs their first lead at 24-22 early in the third quarter. Burney then connected from deep in the corner for a 26-22 Friona lead.

Scott Scaff scored for the Mustangs for a 26-24 score, but Friona countered with a pair of baskets for a 30-24 lead with 4:20 left in the third quarter. That was Friona's longest lead of the game.

Farmers in the area have received a tremendous break from the weather during recent weeks, which has been a big help in keeping the harvest operations moving.

The area was hit by an arctic cold front about a week ago, which caused temperatures to plunge, but there was no moisture associated with the system, which allowed the area's maize, cotton and sugar beet harvesters to continue at full speed.

Ovid Lawlis at Lawlis Gin said Tuesday that the cotton harvest was probably 75 to 80 per cent completed. "This week could finish up the stripping, if the weather permits," Lawlis said.

The Bovina ginner said that the 1985 cotton crop had been one of the best ones from a ginning standpoint of any for the past several years. The cotton has stripped nicely, and has been much cleaner than usual when brought to the gin.

Quality-wise, the '85 crop has also been much better than average. Lawlis said that the grade is good, and that the micronaire reading was considerably above

average for this part of the country. Yields are running up to a bale and one-half to the acre. Some dryland cotton made a half-bale, and yields have been observed all the way between these extremes.

A survey of gins in Parmer County on Tuesday revealed that a total of 24,412 bales of cotton had been ginned through Monday, November 25.

Harry Johnson at Sherley Grain Co. said the local milo harvest finished up this past Friday. "This has been a long harvest season. We started with the corn harvest in August," Johnson said.

The elevator spokesman said that the 1985 crop, corn and milo both, was probably one of the better yielding crops the area has seen, and attributed that to the much better than average rainfall that the area received during the year.

"The corn crop was better than I expected, and the milo has been equally as good," Johnson said.

Concerning the price, Johnson said that area farmers need to be thankful for the feedyards, which serve as customers for their grain, since there is little or no grain being exported at the present time. Johnson quoted a publication he receives as noting that for the past week, there were absolutely no boats loaded with grain by the state's eight export elevators.

Holly Sugar Corp. spokesman Cal Jones says that the sugar beet harvest is about 75 per cent complete. Jones said the sugar content in this year's beets is down somewhat due to the late rain the crop received, but that the tonnage on the crop is better than average.

"We could finish the beet harvest within two weeks, if we have no other weather delays," the Holly spokesman said.

Bovina's lead became 26 points at 30-4 when Miss Neal hit a jump shot to open the second quarter. Friona then settled down somewhat in the second quarter and outscored the Fillies, 8-5 the rest of the way, but Bovina still enjoyed a comfortable lead at the half, 35-12.

Lacye Osborn came into the game for Friona and scored a pair of baskets to give her team a little hope. The Squaws outscored the

Fillies, 10-2 in the opening minutes of the third quarter to cut Bovina's lead to 15 points, 37-22.

But Marie Pesch broke Bovina's cold spell with a pair of baskets for a 41-22 lead. Glenda Ellis came into the game for Friona and sank a pair of long set shots in the last minute of the quarter to make the score 45-29.

The two teams pretty well swapped baskets in a low-scoring fourth quarter. Miss Osborn canned a couple of jump shots for Friona to again cut the lead to 14 points, 47-33 with 2:45 left in the game.

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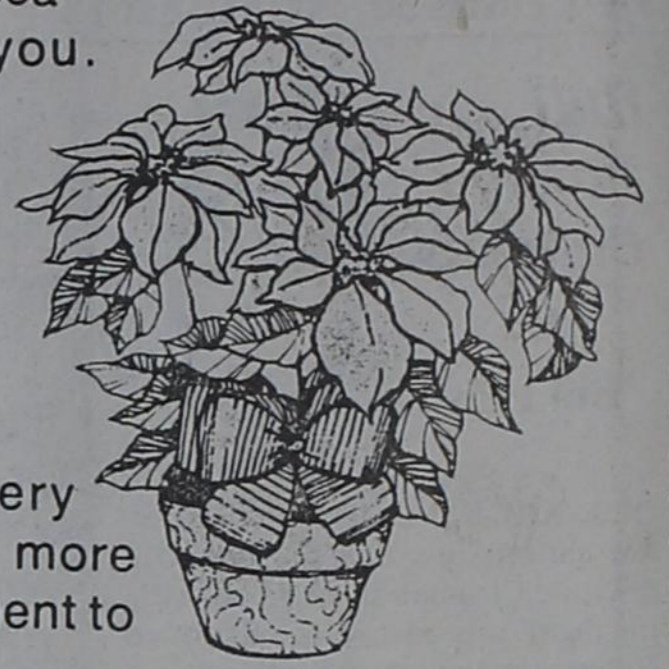

Court Has Mostly Routine Business

Parmer County Commissioners handled mostly routine business in their regular meeting November 8.

In voting for a member of the board of directors of the Parmer County Tax Appraisal District, the court voted to cast the county's allotted 1,026 votes for Larry Jesko of Lazbuddie.

Boarding care bills for county foster children, in the amount of \$2,225 were approved. The money will be reimbursed to the county by the state.

Motion was passed to pay the county's dues to the Texas Assn. of Counties in the amount of \$820.

At the suggestion of the County Treasurer, the court voted to renew a general fund certificate of deposit in the amount of \$100,000. The C.D. had been maturing November 22, and was extended to

May 30, 1986. The court heard requests from citizens asking for assistance in paying for medicine and surgery costs they were unable to pay.

One request was approved for medicine amounting to a limit of \$65, plus the doctor's fees, and another request resulted in the court agreeing to pay \$264 toward the cost of a person's surgical expenses.

Ballots from the county's constitutional election were canvassed and approved.

Motion was passed to purchase a typewriter for the Adult Probation Department, in the amount of \$399.00.

Another motion was passed to advertise for bids for a front-end loader and backhoe for use in Precinct 1, with two machines to be traded.

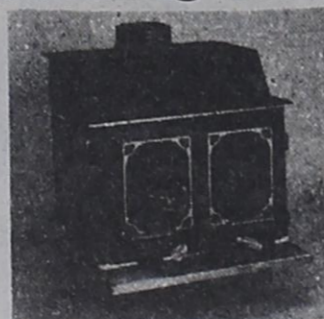
