

Primary runoff Saturday

Few in Haskell County are showing any enthusiasm toward it, but there'll be an election Saturday.

It's the Democratic primary runoff election, involving a race for railroad commissioner, three places on the Texas Supreme Court and a position on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

No local races are to be decided. John Sharp and P. S. Ervin are the opponents for railroad commissioner. Interest in this race has been pretty well limited by the publicity surrounding Ervin's attempt to use the name "Sam" on the ballot, a use which has been disallowed.

In the race for place 1 on the Supreme Court, the candidates are Oscar Mauzy and Shirley Butts. Robert M. Campbell will face Jim Brady for place 2, while Jay Gibson is opposing Raul A. Gonzales for place 4.

In the Court of Criminal Appeals place 1 position race, George Martinez is opposing Rusty Duncan.

Polls in Haskell will open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m. Precinct 1 voters will cast their ballots at the Haskell National Bank Community Building, precinct 2 voters at the Haskell County Library, precinct 3 voters at the County Extension office and precinct 4 voters at the Justice of the Peace office in the courthouse.

Franchise tax on banks nets \$28,000 here

Checks totaling \$28,153 from the second year's collection of the state's franchise tax on banks were mailed out last week to eight taxing jurisdictions in Haskell County.

Haskell Independent School district received \$13,370, Haskell County got \$5,384, the city of Haskell received \$3,815 and the Haskell Hospital district got \$2,804.

The Rochester ISD received \$1,830 and the City of Rochester \$849. Rule ISD got \$79 and the City of Rule \$18.

The legislature in 1984 brought banks under the franchise tax for the first time and allocated receipts from the tax to cities, counties, school districts and other local taxing units where the banks are located.

Banks are taxed at the same rate as other Texas corporations. Previously, bank stocks were subject to local property taxes. The legislature exempted the stocks from property taxes, substituting the new bank franchise tax. Collections are prorated among local taxing units based on their tax rates.

Hundreds to greet wagon train June 4

Hundreds of people are expected to greet the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train when it arrives in Haskell between 3 and 4 p.m. Wednesday (June 4).

The caravan will be arriving from Rule on US 380. It will continue through town on the highway (North 1st Street) to Avenue B where it will turn south and go to the fairgrounds where personnel will make camp for the night.

A hamburger fry, to which everyone is invited, will begin at 5:30 p.m. at the fairgrounds. As many as 2,000 people are expected to attend the hamburger fry. The meal will consist of hamburgers, french fries, tea and Texas sugar cookies.

Members of the Kiwanis Club will cook the hamburgers. Assisting in the meal will be members of the Rotary Club, the Progressive Study Club and the Fire Department and Auxiliary. Admission to the hamburger fry is \$3 per person.

A short program will be presented, after which a "Texas Sampler" entertainment program will be presented by members of Haskell County Homemakers clubs in the Civic Center. Donations of \$2 for adults and \$1 for junior high and high school students will be accepted at the door for the "Texas Sampler." Children of elementary age and younger will be admitted free.

Participating in the "Sampler" will be the Weinert, Eager, Paint Creek and Josselet extension homemakers clubs. It will also feature gospel singing by groups from Haskell, Rochester, Rule and Weinert.

Tickets to the supper may be purchased at The Hayloft, Sears, Experienced Citizens Center, Lane-Felker, Johnson Pharmacy, County Extension Office and Haskell National Bank.

Thursday morning, Haskell Lions will feed pancakes and sausage to wagon train personnel and the public in the Civic Center. Serving begins at 5 a.m. and the meal will cost \$2 per person.

Before visiting in Haskell, the wagon train will be in the Haskell County cities of Rochester and Rule, where activities also are planned.

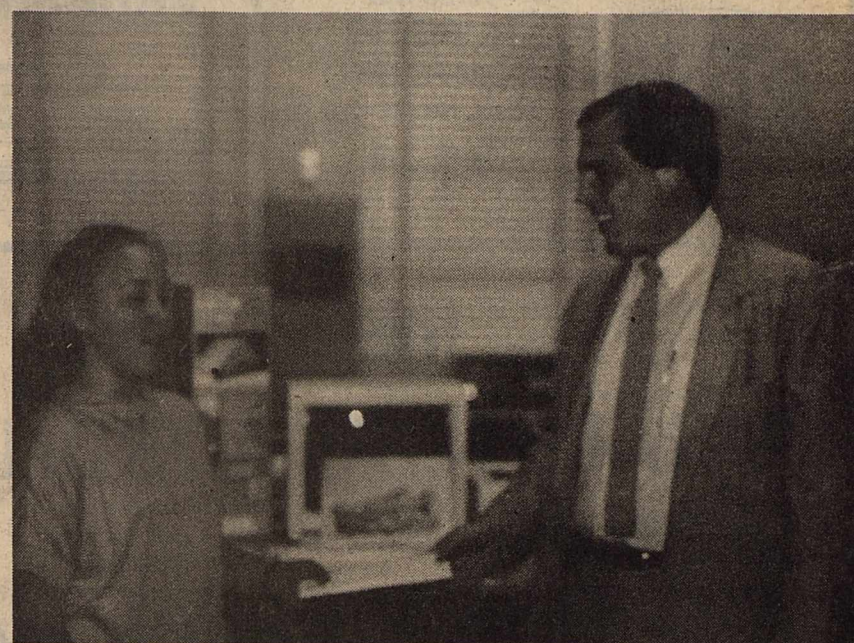

Haskell to host area trapshooters

Haskell will be host Saturday and Sunday to the 13th annual Zone III Trapshooting Championships.

Shooters are expected from throughout the 27-county third zone, as well as from other parts of Texas.

The last zone championship shoot in Haskell was in 1983 when an even 100 shooters entered in the handicap event. A similar number is expected this time.

The event will be at the Haskell Trap Club, a mile and a quarter north of the courthouse on US 277.

Haskell Trap Club was started in 1961 on the west side of the Haskell Country Club with one manual hand-loaded and pulled trap. The trap field was marked with 2x4s in front of each shooting station.

In 1965, it was moved to its present location in the back yard of Wallace Wooten. It now has three electric Winchester traps and one automatic trap, with a lighted trap

field for night shooting.

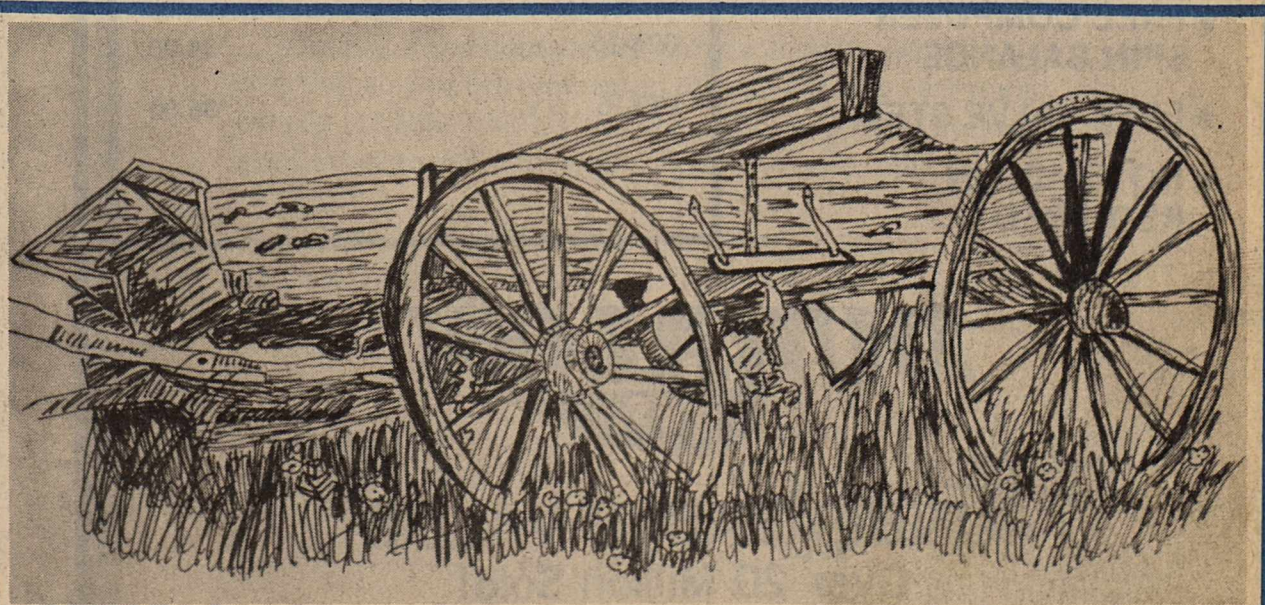

A special luncheon on June 11 will recognize 28 outstanding 4-H adult volunteer leaders from across the state who will receive special plaques from the Texas 4-H Foundation.

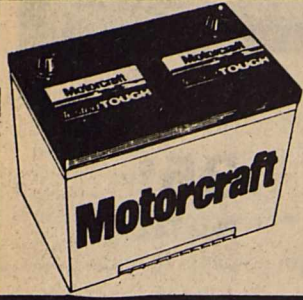

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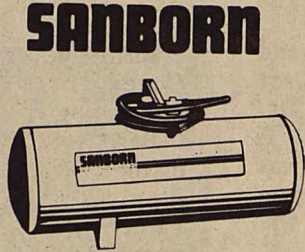
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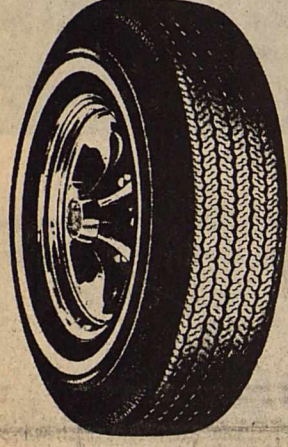


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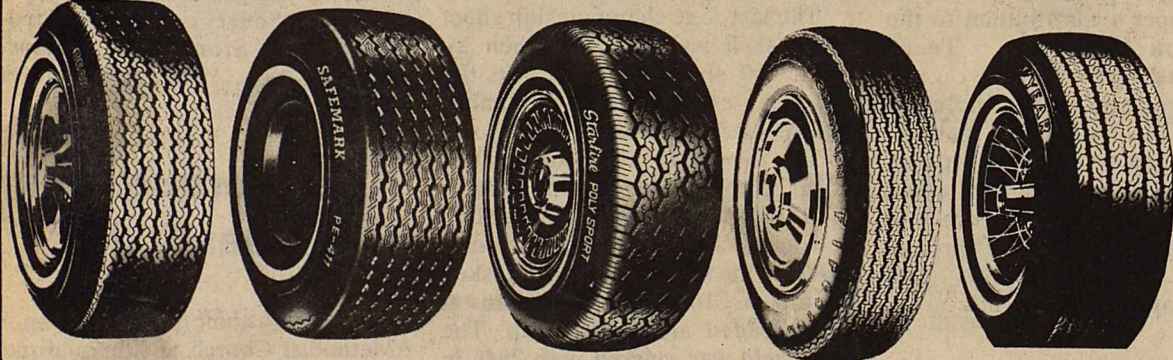
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Obituaries

Druessedow, an agriculture economics major, is a 1982 graduate of Haskell High School.

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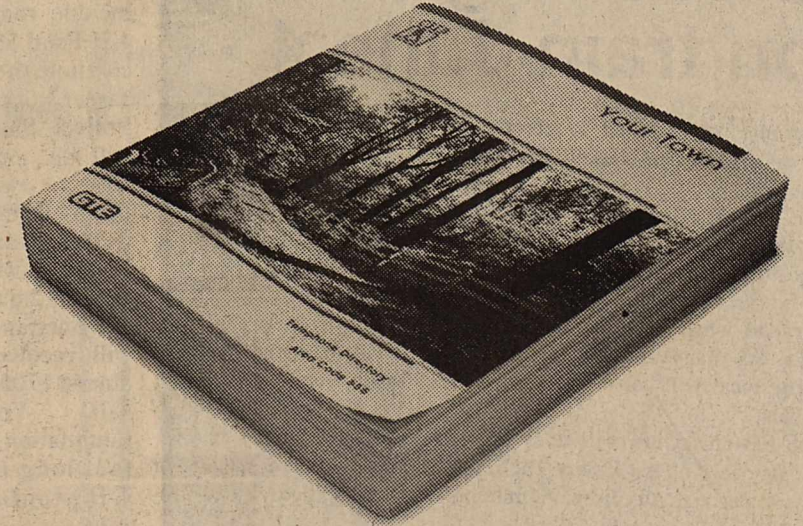

FmHA will begin assistance program

The Farmers Home Administration office in Haskell and Throckmorton counties will begin immediately to participate in "Operation Assist," Larry P. McDaniel, county supervisor, has announced.

Operation Assist is a new effort by FmHA to help farmers obtain guaranteed operating loans. County supervisors of FmHA will take completed farm credit applications to local banks or other lenders, along with the farmer wishing to apply for a guaranteed loan.

"We will hand carry the applications and personally introduce the applicants to our local lenders," said McDaniel. "We will present a complete loan package, including cash flows, financial statements and appraisals. If necessary, we will make a commitment to work with the lender to do an interest buydown. We will do everything we can to help the lender, and the borrower, by committing to guarantee the loan at our maximum 90 percent."

While direct operating loan funds are used up in some areas, there is still nearly \$800 million available for the guarantee program. County FmHA officials hope other lenders will make operating credit available under the guarantee, with most of

the paperwork done beforehand by FmHA.

Borrowers and lenders interested in an FmHA guaranteed loan should contact the FmHA county office at 316 N. 1st St. in Haskell.

Social Security numbers free for new born

Haskell County parents have been reminded that a firm operating in the Big Country area is selling a service which is provided at no charge by every Social Security office.

Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said the company obtains information from local birth records and then mails new parents an offer to get a Social Security number for their child for a \$10 fee.

This service can be obtained without charge at any Social Security office, Hammons said.

For a parent to obtain a Social Security number for a child, the parent needs evidence of the child's date of birth, citizenship and identity. The parent's identity also must be established.

Hammons said the direct mail advertisement indicates that new legislation may require that children be listed by Social Security number on the parents' tax return. There is no such legislation, Hammons said. In addition, Social Security does not provide counties with information about which children have Social Security numbers.

The early pioneers—like the first people to eat oysters—were people of vision, adventure and guts. Haskell County owes its existence to them.

They came by horseback, by rail, by foot, and by a combination of the three modes of transportation to settle an unknown country which had only recently been purged of hostile Indians. There were few conveniences, other than what they brought with them.

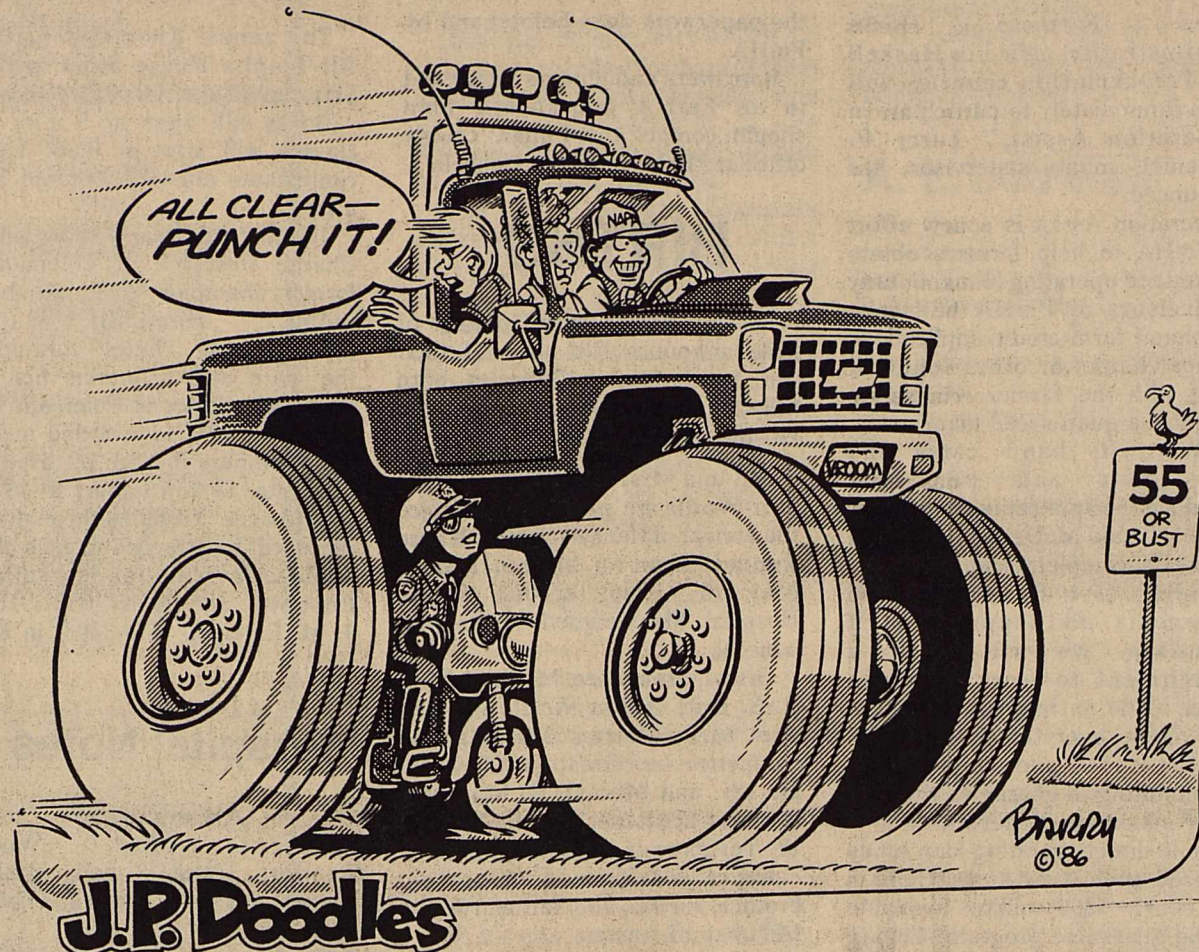
The Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train which visits Haskell Wednesday symbolizes these pioneers, their spirit and their determination. It behooves all of us in Haskell to welcome the wagon train and its participants in the spirit which they symbolize.

This spirit is especially evident in Haskell, we being a community not so far removed from pioneer days. While few living today can aptly be

described as pioneers, literally hundreds of Haskell countians are only a generation removed. The early history of Haskell County is liberally sprinkled with names which are as well known today as they were in the late 1800s.

While the wagon train was born of a desire to call attention to the history of Texas in this sesquicentennial year, it is proper that we in Haskell County use its visit and the atmosphere it creates to call attention to our own rich history and to our hearty ancestors who cleared the path of obstacles while paving the way toward the conveniences and prosperity we enjoy today.

Everyone in Haskell should be eager to participate in the activities planned in connection with the wagon train's visit. We owe Texas and Haskell County no less.

Some things a fellow would never know if he didn't go through his mail now and then.

Such as:

There's a new fruit and it weighs in at 80 pounds. The jakfruit, a tasty treat in Asia, is being planted in orchards all across Florida. The yellowish-green, watermelon-sized fruit is high in nutrition and moderately priced.

A single locust can eat its weight every day. And, in one day a swarm, which typically contains about 2.5 billion locusts, can consume enough food for 1.5 million people.

Be skeptical the next time you hear a story or see a movie with a gory piranha attack. The piranha's ferocious reputation is simply not accurate, according to International Wildlife magazine. Piranhas will rarely attack a large living mammal and their usual meal is made up of fruit and seeds.

A parrot can be taught to speak when someone enters a room, but the bird doesn't understand it has uttered a greeting. (But parrot owners take heart, your bird might still have a future in politics.)

Crickets, long the insomniac's enemy, have been considered fortune tellers, doctors and athletes the world over. Europeans once thought the cricket bite cured warts, the Chinese placed bets on cricket fights and Kayapa Indians in Brazil still believe the song of the cricket portends death.

Unless pollution is curbed, 25 percent of the world's usable water will be unsafe by the year 2000, says International Wildlife.

A small Asian deer named the Reeves' muntjac is threatening to replace the dog as the British man's best friend. The small irresistible deer, a native of Asia, is about the same size as a dog, has large eyes and tiny antlers, and it barks just like its rival.

A five-year experiment at Central Washington University has shown that chimps can learn American sign language from each other. One young chimp, Louie, has learned over 50 signs from Washoe, the more famous female who acquired the language 20 years ago.

Texans want to dump nuclear waste dump

AUSTIN—In the latest salvo of what promises to develop into a full-scale political struggle, Texas officials vowed to force the feds to put a proposed nuclear waste dump site somewhere besides the Panhandle.

Meanwhile, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby changed the complexion of summer political campaigning by confirming the likelihood of new and expanded state sales taxes next session.

Hobby said he would resolve a projected \$1.3 billion deficit by broadening the state sales tax base to include several professional services now exempted. Food and medicine would continue to be exempted.

When the most powerful man in the Legislature speaks, all listen. While others tend to play coy or demagogue about tax issues, Hobby's expertise and reputation for integrity lend the aura of "bottom line" to his statements.

Govs To Debate

This year Texas Republicans are using the specter of new taxes to attract support. They say they'll cut state spending rather than raise taxes.

Whether or not that's realistic, they've scared such tax advocates as Gov. Mark White, a Democrat, into silence on taxes.

Last week, White and former Gov. Bill Clements agreed to a Texas League of Women Voters debate. Their handlers are arranging a date now.

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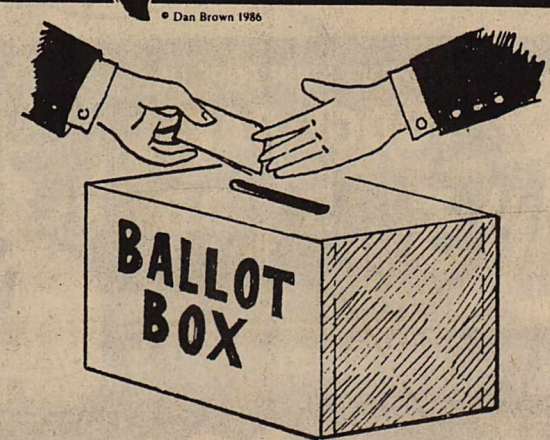

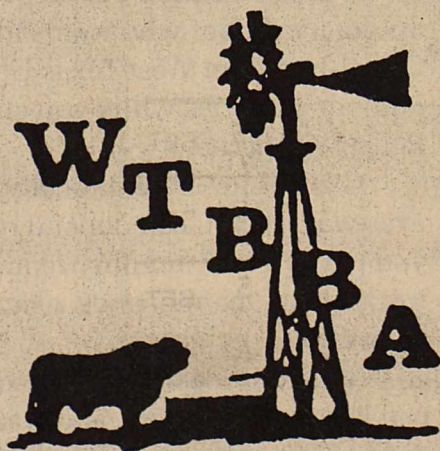

week he may seek a third term if re-elected, a move to counter rumors he has visions of the White House.

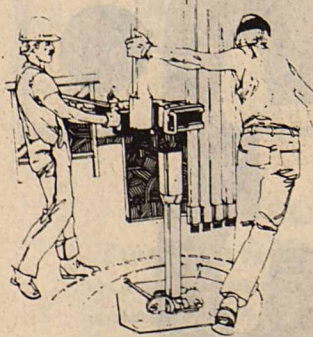

Pair-mutuel repealed in 1937 special session

[This is the second of a two-part article on pari-mutuel horse racing in Texas.]

Despite the economic benefits, many Texans remained opposed to pari-mutuel. Religious groups fought against betting, and a number of legislators resented the tactics used to legalize it in the first place.

Foremost among pari-mutuel opponents was Texas Governor Jimmy Allred, who on taking office in 1935 pledged to repeal the pari-mutuel. Attempts to repeal the law failed in the regular sessions of 1935 and 1937, but a special session in the latter year finally repealed pari-mutuel.

And there the matter has rested. Despite dozens of pari-mutuel bills filed in the legislature over the past 47 years and spirited lobbying by supporters, the legislature has refused to give track betting another try in Texas.

The 1985 legislature saw the most recent attempt to legalize pari-mutuel in Texas. The major pari-mutuel horse racing bill in that

session would have established a Texas Horse Racing Commission made up of six gubernatorial appointees, the comptroller and the head of the Department of Public Safety.

As envisioned, the Racing Commission would have licensed race tracks and certain racetrack personnel, including jockeys, trainers, owners, agents, grooms and placing judges. The commission would have regulated and supervised all pari-mutuel races and would have administered the horse racing statute.

The comptroller's office also would have had significant duties under the bill. The comptroller would have collected the state's pari-mutuel taxes after each race and would have audited the books at each track.

Estimates made in the legislative session indicated that the bill—House Bill 440—as originally written would have raised \$3.8 million for the state in its first year. That figure would have jumped to almost \$59 million annually in five

years. This estimate was based on an effective three percent tax rate on all betting—slightly smaller than the 1984 national average state tax rate of 3.7 percent.

A committee substitute for House Bill 440 introduced midway through the session would have raised the state's share to five percent of bets wagered. The comptroller estimated this substitute could have produced \$98.2 million annually for the state after five years.

But the experiences of other racing states suggest that pari-mutuel tax revenues may be partially offset by increased law enforcement costs.

In the last legislative session, the Department of Public Safety estimated that pari-mutuel horse racing would increase the department's costs by \$1.7 million in the first year and \$1.3 million annually thereafter. This money would be spent primarily to perform background checks on the hundreds of licensed professionals who would work at Texas tracks.

Pari-mutuel supporters claim

that the economic benefits of a revitalized Texas horse industry would greatly exceed the direct tax revenue produced.

The Texas Agriculture Department last year estimated that pari-mutuel horse racing could create more than 9,000 new jobs and generate direct economic activity of \$230 million in the state's farm economy by the year 2000, with a total economic effect of \$713 million for state agriculture. These benefits would be shared by horse breeders and owners, farmers growing animal feed, farm and stable workers, veterinarians and retailers.

In a study conducted last year for the Texas Horse Racing Association, Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Company estimated that in its first two years, pari-mutuel horse racing would directly create 11,000 new jobs along with 8,000 additional jobs from building and improving tracks.

The company estimated that the first two years would bring direct

economic contributions of \$415 million a year and real estate, construction and improvement spending of \$562.8 million a year. Peat, Marwick pegged the total boost to the Texas economy at more than \$1.2 billion a year.



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

Throckmorton plans train celebration

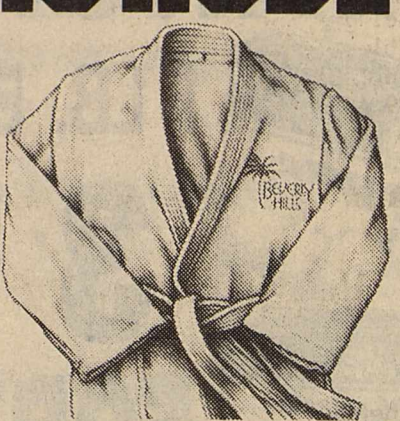
The Throckmorton County Sesquicentennial Commission has extended an invitation to Haskell County residents to join them in the celebration of the arrival of the wagon train June 11.

Utility bill help available to some

Some low-income households may be eligible for help in paying their cooling bills this summer through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Services Commissioner Marlin Johnston.

Johnston said the one-time payment is available to many low income households. Households which received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income will be mailed applications automatically. Other low-income households may request an application from DHS during the enrollment period of June 16 through July 18.

Eligibility is limited by gross income. For instance, aid is available for a one-person household having less than a \$547.49 gross income per month. The gross income limit is \$733.49

for a two-person household, \$919.49 for three, \$1,105.49 for four, \$1,291.49 for five and \$1,477.49 for six.

Eligible households must be subject to energy cost increases—because of bills or rent being higher due to rising energy costs.

Households in privately owned or rented housing are eligible if the cost for cooling is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs.

Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy company for the benefit of the eligible person.

Households receiving one of these energy assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy company business office with the regular energy bill.

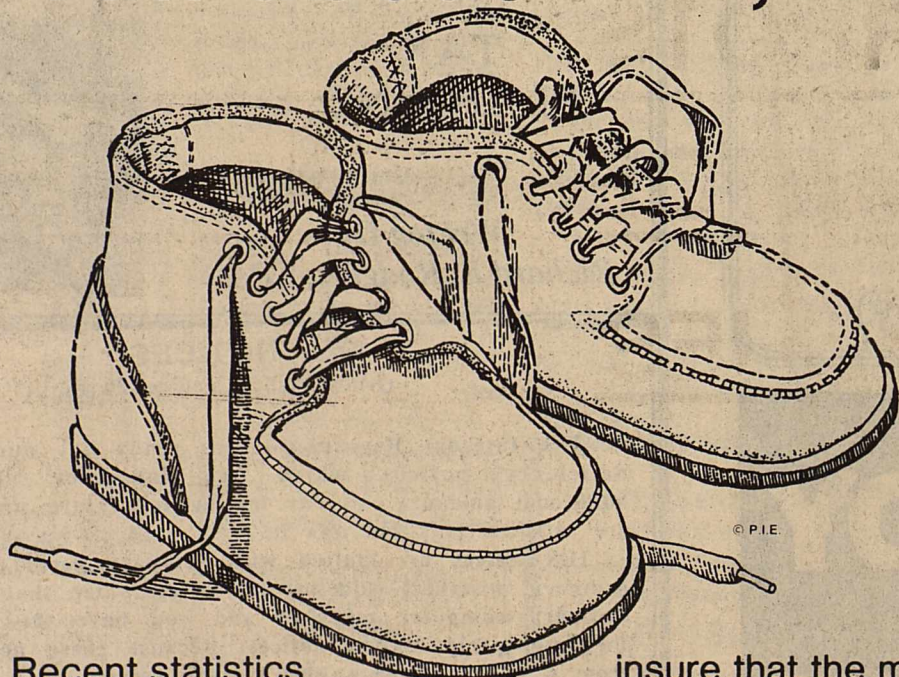

"Farmers in these two counties, serving on the committee, can play an important role by assisting in the process of loan applications and reviews," McDaniel said.

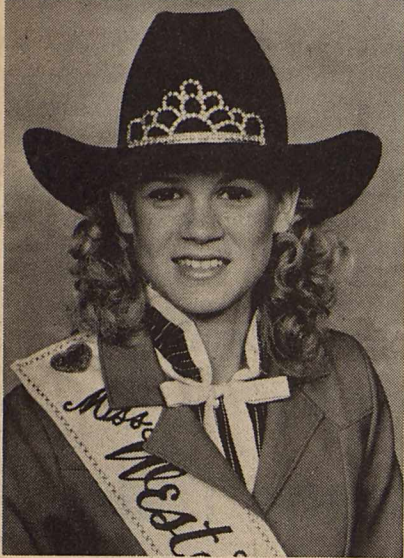

IRS NOTICES (Know What You're Paying)

The Internal Revenue Service sends out numerous tax deficiency notices which are incorrect. Don't pay additional amounts on your income tax return unless you are satisfied that you owe it.

IRS offices are staffed with ordinary people that make ordinary mistakes. Add to that a computer that can make ordinary computer mistakes and you have the ingredients for improperly mailed notices. Because these notices come from a Federal agency, the average person gives them more credibility than they may deserve.

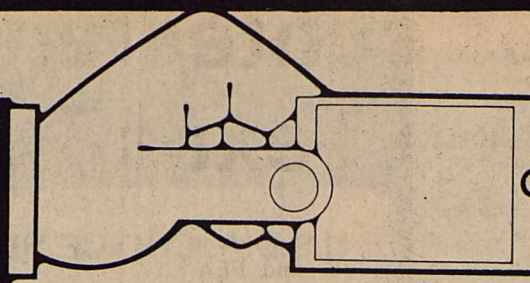
The Internal Revenue Service is attempting to match certain documents to your social security number and your tax return. If you receive interest, dividends, rents, royalties, or any number of other types of income, you will probably be issued a "1099" information slip identifying the earnings. If the IRS can't readily locate that information on your tax return, they may send you a deficiency notice even though that income may be included somewhere in your tax return.

Don't assume that you owe additional taxes to the IRS just because they send you a statement. Because of the possibilities of both mechanical and human error, it's worth checking to make sure you owe the amount requested.

If you have paid someone to prepare your tax return, give them a copy of "all" correspondence you receive from the Internal Revenue Service, even those which do not request additional taxes. Your tax return preparer needs a full track record of all aspects of your tax return if he's to do an adequate job of representing you. Most IRS notices require a response within a specified number of days; therefore, all correspondence should be given to your accountant as soon as possible.

HASKELL -- YESTERDAY

The earliest Indian fight we know about in Haskell County happened around 1857 about five miles southeast of town. Many were killed. W.R. Standefer found the burial ground while he was hunting for his mules in 1881. He built a little poke shack\hut, the first pretense of a house in this area. In December 1882, J. L. Jones was sent to buy a herd of sheep and found that Mr. Standefer and his son were living in the shack. In 1883, John Lebriere built a frame house. It still stands in the park area.

By 1884, the town was jumping with activity and newcomers. In 1886, it looked like everything on earth was against the cattlemen of the area. Storms, blizzards, drought, no grass, no water. Yet the progress of the town continued despite the odds.

The Haskell Free Press printed its first issue on January 1, 1886 and has published its papers regularly ever since. It is the oldest established business still in existence.

In February, in a two story wooden building, a saloon was opened on the south side of the square called "The Road to Ruin". Of the four men killed in town in the next fourteen years, three were killed in the saloon and the other while drinking next to it.

By 1889 the town had four drug stores and four grocery stores, one hardware store, one notions store, one hotel, one restaurant, one blacksmith shop, two livery stables, one saloon, one newspaper, one school, and one cotton gin. There were four doctors, eight lawyers, three land agents, and twenty-three carpenters.

In 1890, the First National Bank and Haskell National Bank opened their doors.

The old court house was torn down in 1891 and new rock structure erected. The Baptists, Christians, Methodists and Presbyterians had all built churches.

The phone line was completed in June 1899 with thirty-five patrons. In 1903 school tax was raised from 15¢ to 20¢.

In 1906 the Wichita Valley and Orient Railroads entered the community with a through train to Stamford.

On March 20, 1907 a fire destroyed seven buildings on the south side of the square. This prompted the organization of a Fire Company and the purchase of a chemical fire engine.

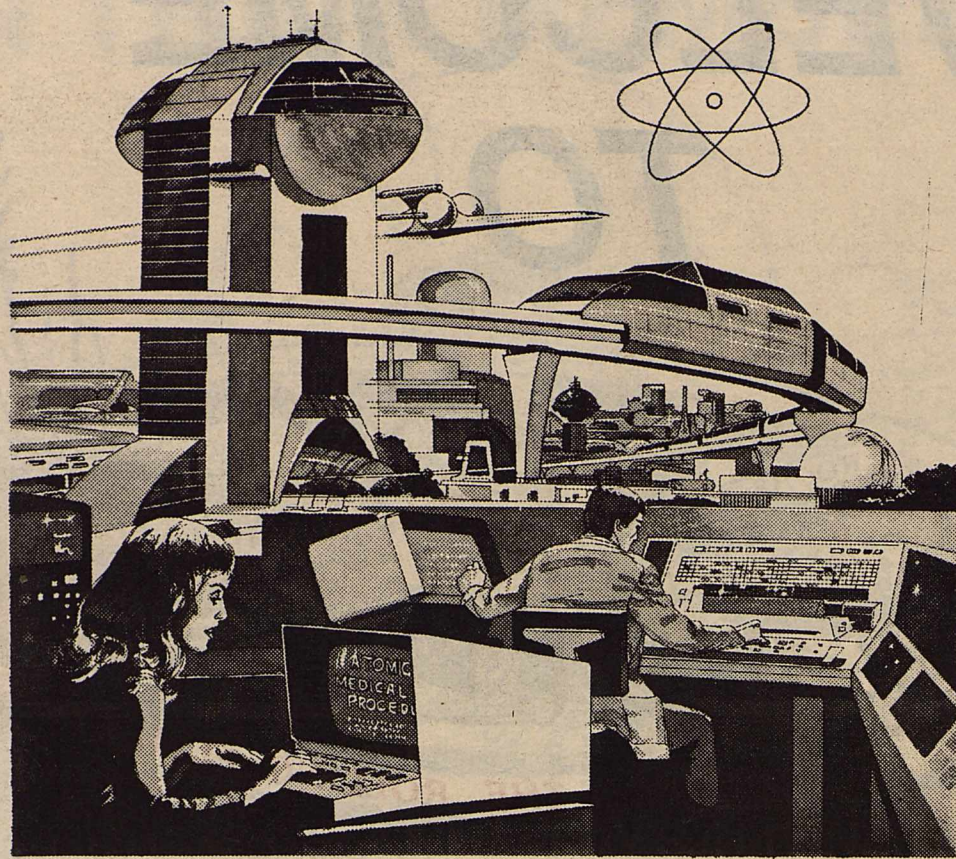
The town was incorporated in 1907, and a new jail erected in 1908.

In 1914 a joint revival, held in a large tabernacle, was attended by over two thousand people and there were five hundred and three conversions.

In January 1922 a turkey would sell for more than two sheep and six hens brought as much as a cow.

1929 marked the beginning of the depression. Cotton sold for 9¢. On January 18 of that year, the temperature dropped to three degrees below zero. On June 13 a flood came, after eleven inches of rain.

Haskell, like the nation, saw its sons leave for war--again and again and again and still again. Through good times and bad times, the citizenry has pulled together, forming an alliance of note, with a spirit seldom equalled by any community.
