
Tuesday night the Haskell team lost 9-7 to Stamford to fall into the loser's bracket. Haskell was to play Twin Cities again Wednesday night.





Crops reporting deadline Tuesday

Haskell County farmers have until Tuesday (July 15) to report their 1986 planted acreages to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Glenn Brzozowski, county executive director of ASCS, says all producers need to report their crops whether they participate in the acreage reduction programs or not. The information will be used to insure future benefits and to protect crop acreage bases.

To be certain of planted acres. farmers may request that their crops be measured. For a fee, ASCS will measure planted crops before farmers report acreages.

Brzozowski says before program participants can receive price supports, deficiency payments and other program benefits, the entire farm must be certified correctly.

Producers who have not reported are urged to do so before the July 15 deadline.





One of these days Merriam Webster is going to have to come out with a dictionary in three or four volumes, each about the size of a metropolitan telephone directory.

It's getting to the point that just about any noun can be turned into a verb or an adjective by adding or changing a letter or two.

"The resort area is being condoed," I read in an article the other day. I re-read it three or four times, thinking it was a typograpical error before I realized that the writer had "verbalized" the word "condo."

People go to great lengths to make their form letters appear to be personal.

In the avalanche of mail which crossed this desk last week was a letter from Wilfred L. Ebel, acting director of the Selective Service System. Produced on a word processor, it had the appearance of a personal letter. Even the salutation with the Haskell address was in the same type as that of the body of the letter, leaving the impression that this letter was written specifically for The Haskell Free Press.


But there was one dead give-away: It was addressed to the 'Metro Editor'' of the Free Press.

Political activity gets top billing

AUSTIN—A jam-packed week of political activity and campaign jostling has set the pace for the remainder of the election season. In a nutshell, some of the more significant happenings were:

-Texas lawmakers learned from Comptroller Bob Bullock that the anticipated deficit is worse than expected by one billion dollars, or \$2.3 billion total. The news sparked a confusing chain of events in other circles.

-The next day Governor Mark White reversed himself and said he would call a special session to balance the state budget, probably in August. Tax plans resurfaced.

-White accused his opponent, Bill Clements, of deceiving voters with claims of a "secret plan" to balance the budget.

-Former Gov. Clements softened his "no tax hike" stance in the face of the huge deficit, and he denied ever claiming to have a "secret plan.'

-Later in the week, some House leaders said a special session would probably be disastrous because no one had a plan that could survive a session three months before the election.

Party Conventions

Texas Republicans and Texas Democrats held their state conventions in Dallas and Austin, respectively.

Republican House members reportedly angered ally Speaker Gib Lewis or at least made themselves suspect in his eyes, with an informal convention caucus to determine which of their number could best become the new speaker. Some of Gib's close friends confided he wasn't pleased at all.

At the Democratic Party convention, Gov. White, who earlier had called teachers "whiners and complainers" for objecting to competency testing, made a point of apologizing to them in his keynote speech.

Two days later, after the press reported he apologized for making teachers take the test, White clarified he had only apologized for the "stress" teachers had endured over the

In '82, Clements had to call a special session just before the election to raise employer taxes and keep it solvent. He lost his reelection bid.

Ironically, the recession and rising unemployment could force White to include the same issue in his special session just before the election.

Other Highlights

-Inmates complained of mistreatment at a hearing on whether the prison system ignored court-ordered reform deadlines.

-A South Texas Nuclear Project audit sought by the Public Utilities Commission determined that of the \$5.5 billion cost, more than \$1 billion was wasted by bad man-agement of Houston Lighting and Power Company.

Auditors think it may be cheaper to quit building the plant than complete it. HL&P officials said the audit was inconclusive. —Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox advised 250 Texas mortgage lenders that inten-tional delay to manipulate higher interest rates is a violation of the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act.

Ted Nuce, the bull riding champion who was detained in Haskell following an automobile accident the other day, says the best move the Professional Cowboys Rodeo Association ever made was when it moved the National Rodeo Finals to Las Vegas from Oklahoma City.

"The money's a lot better there," said the young Californian who won \$53,000 at the Las Vegas event last December.


Motorcycle accidents are common

A recently completed study by the Texas Department of Health shows motorcyclists, especially those who do not wear safety helmets, are at high risk of disabling or fatal injuries.

The study also reveals that accident victims without helmets have more serious head injuries, spend more time in the hospital, and cost the taxpayers more money for treatment and care than those who wear helmets.






Western Texas College in Snyder will host the second of three Summer Success Seminars for incoming freshmen July 17.




Ask VA

Q. I was married to a World War II veteran for 40 years. After his death I learned he had been married before and had never divorced his first wife. Will this bar me from a widow's pension?

A. No. If you had no knowledge of the legal impediment, the VA may deem the marriage to be valid. This type of case requires special consideration and may delay a final decision.

Q. My son was killed while on active duty and I am receiving dependency and indemnity compensation benefits from the VA. Am I entitled to the CHAMPVA medical benefits program for dependents and survivors?

A. No. Dependent parents are not entitled to CHAMPVA.



DON'T BANK ON THE IRS

Never, never use the Internal Revenue Service as a banker unless, of course, you have their permission to do so beforehand. This should be the last place that you go for an unauthorized extension of credit.

When the cash flow is tight, many small business operators choose to pay their suppliers first and the employee withholding tax to the IRS last. Before the manager knows it, another month has passed and another set of payroll taxes has gone unpaid.

The Internal Revenue Service will take steps to minimize this liability as quickly as possible. They take a dim view of your owning several thousand dollars in payroll taxes but even a dimmer view of that liability growing to several more thousand dollars.

For those of you who may already be in the unenviable position of owing back payroll taxes, we have this advice. Pay the IRS. If this is truly impossible to do, contact your local district IRS office before it's necessary for them to contact you. This will be a positive indication to them that you will cooperate to solve the problem.

Most collection officers will try to work with you as long as you're willing to cooperate with them.

Corporate officers, beware. The IRS can hold corporate officers liable for unpaid taxes of the corporation (actually, it is a penalty equal to the corporate liability). In a recent court decision an employee who was not a corporate officer was also held liable even though he was told by his boss to pay other bills and not the IRS. The court said he had the option of quitting instead of doing as he was told. As unfair as that may sound, it is an indication of how serious a problem unpaid payroll taxes can be.



education and unemployment. Interests such as taxes, crime and illegal aliens came further down the list of subjects that worry Texans.

When asked what they like most about Texas and what they like least, the answer was the same-the weather.

Other things people like about Texas are the friendly people, landscape, unlimited opportunity and a peaceful lifestyle. Things they like least include Yankees, bugs, animals, immigration, narrow-minded people and high taxes.

The poll also showed that Texans are about evenly divided as to whether the state's 150th birthday is more important than the 100th birthday of the Statue of Liberty, with native-born Texans favoring the former.

Texans, overwhelmingly, prefer the capitalist form of government to either socialism or communism with nearly 73 percent of those polled opting for capitalism. Most of the others did not answer this question. Surprisingly, 30 percent of those in the 18-25 age group said they preferred socialism.






