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## School budget approved

A Haskell Independent School District budget of \$2,394,185 has been approved by the School Board. Dr. James Kemp, superintendent, said it is within approximately \$10,000 of the previous year's budget.

State-mandated salary increases of \$55,000 were partially offset by a decrease in debt service. The superintendent explained that the school has funds on hand to meet its sinking fund obligation of approximately \$30,000 and will not have to depend on next year's revenue to do so.

Before setting a tax rate for next year, the school will await completion of the current special session of the state legislature. Several proposals before the legislature, if enacted, could have major effects on school finances.

## City to finalize budget

The City Council is expected to approve its 1986-87 budget and set its tax rate when it meets tonight (Thursday).

The meeting has been moved to Thursday from the regular Tuesday meeting time since three councilmen will be out of town Tuesday. The meeting begins at 7 p.m.

R. C. Couch, chairman of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, has requested a spot on the agenda.

In work sessions, the Council has been looking at a budget which calls for expenditures of \$965,400, about \$30,000 below the previous budget.

If approved, it would result in a tax rate of .2228, slightly below last year's rate of .225.

Being considered is a 10-cent increase in water rates, from \$1.85 per thousand gallons to \$1.95 (the \$8 minimum for the first 3,000 gallons is to remain in effect). Also being considered is a 50-cent increase in sewer service, from \$2.90 to \$3.40.

Another possibility is an increase in hangar rental at the airport from \$50 to \$65 per month.

These increases, along with decreased expenditures in other areas, will offset the loss of \$27,000 in revenue sharing funds and a \$15,000 increase in the cost of insurance premiums.

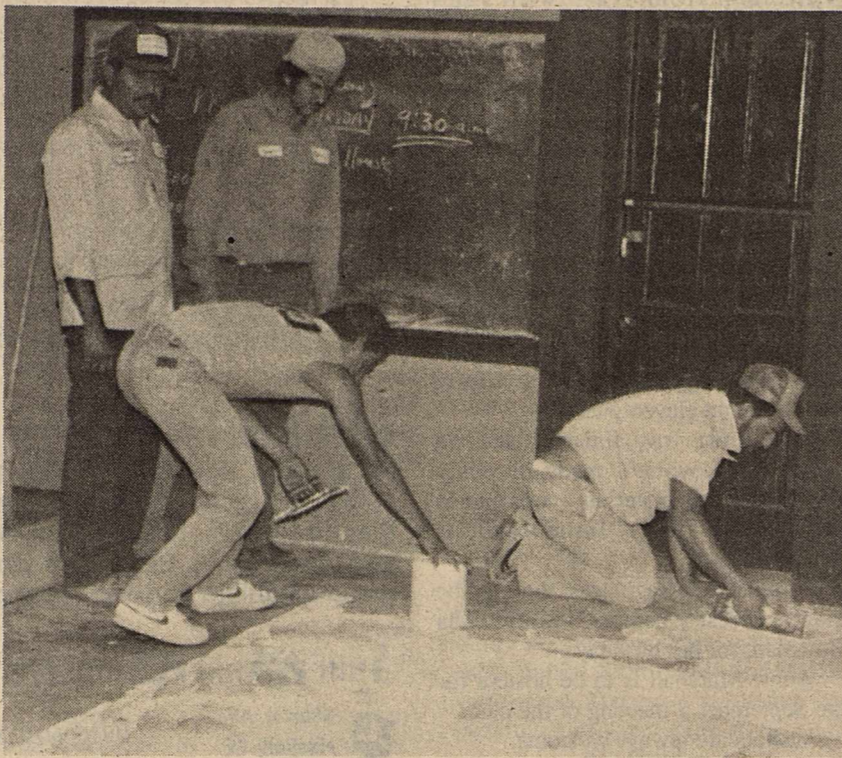

## Candidates needed for foster parents

Foster parents are needed by the Texas Department of Human Services.

Winona Curfman of Snyder, child placement worker with the TDHS, explained that the department needs the support of concerned citizens in order to protect children

who are being severely abused or neglected.

"There is a real need in this community for additional foster parents," she added.

Foster parents are reimbursed for their expenses with foster children at the rate of \$8 per day for children up to and including 9 year-year-olds and \$9 a day for children 10-17. All medical expenses of the children are paid.

and cheerleading classes will be offered, with participants divided into age groups.

Instructor will be Dawn Fortner of Lubbock, an experienced competitive tumbling coach. She will be assisted by Debbie Hobgood of Haskell. Mrs. Hobgood, a former PE teacher in Frenship school at Wolforth, recently moved to Haskell after her husband became president of the First National Bank.

## School begins Tuesday

School bells Tuesday morning will signal the end of the summer vacation and the start of the new school year for some 650 Haskell students.

About 400 students are expected to be enrolled in elementary classes when school begins, and about 250 in junior high and high school, said Dr. James Kemp, superintendent. This would be about 20 fewer than the total number which enrolled last year, most of the drop coming at the secondary level.

Junior high and high school students will register today (Thursday), starting with seventh graders who will register between 9 and 9:15 a.m. Eighth-grade registration will be between 9:15 and 9:30, ninth grade from 9:30 to 9:45, 10th grade from 9:45 to 10, 11th grade from 10 to 10:15 and 12th grade from 10:15 to 10:30.

All elementary students (grades K-6) will register at 9:30 Friday morning in their rooms. New elementary students will register in the library. Kindergarten students, not pre-registered in May, should bring their shot records and birth certificates. Other new students will need their report cards and shot records.

Teachers began the new school this week, undergoing in-service education Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. The school year begins with one faculty vacancy. The vacancy created by the recent

resignation of teacher/coach Jim Raughton still has not been filled. Kemp said his teaching assignments are being absorbed by other teachers, although the coaching staff is working short handed.

One change in the school schedule this year will be that tutorials will be in the mornings before regular classes begin, instead of at the end of the day. Tutorials, which probably won't begin until the second six weeks, will be from 7:50 to 8:15 a.m. at the secondary schools. The exact times for elementary tutorials have not been determined.

A number of physical improvements were made in school facilities during the summer

vacation. At the football stadium, seats have been repaired, fences re-aligned, the old ticket booth and the old concession stand removed. (The Band Boosters have erected a new concession stand.)

Interior modifications have been made in the assistant principal's office, lighting replaced and new wiring installed for computers.

At the elementary school, new carpeting in the primary wings has been installed and a termite eradication project completed.

Several other improvement projects are in progress or planned. These include the replacement of curtains in both auditoriums and a remodeled photo lab at the secondary school and an irrigation system for the elementary school

## Program planned for swimming pool

A "splash day" at the Haskell swimming pool is being planned as a kickoff for a fund-raising campaign to renovate the pool.

It will be Saturday, Sept. 6.

Several events will be scheduled, including food booths. Civic organizations, as well as the public at large, are being asked to participate.

The City of Haskell has recently won approval of a grant in the amount of \$63,000 from the Texas

Parks and Wildlife Department to renovate the pool.

Another \$63,000 must be raised locally. The City had previously authorized an expenditure of \$20,000 on the swimming pool, meaning that \$43,000 must be raised elsewhere.

Contributions in the form of money, materials or labor are being sought.

More details about the "splash day" will be announced in next week's Free Press.

## St. George has new pastor

Father Jeff Malpiede, C.M., has been appointed pastor of St. Ann's Catholic Church in Stamford and St. George Catholic Church in Haskell, effective Aug. 15.

He came here from Denver, although he has worked as a priest in Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas. He is a member of the Congregation of the Mission, a community of priests, commonly called Vincentians, who are dedicated to the service of the poor.

Malpiede succeeds Father Sean Moran, M.S.C., as pastor, and will be joined on the parish staffs by Sr. Encarnacion Juste.

In his introduction at his first weekend services, Malpiede spoke of his priorities for the churches he serves: worship, education, and outreach to the wider community.

He emphasized the need for all parish members to work together in teaching the goals of the parish. He challenged the congregations to continue to develop and share their gifts with the parish, and to keep in mind the needs of the poor and abandoned.

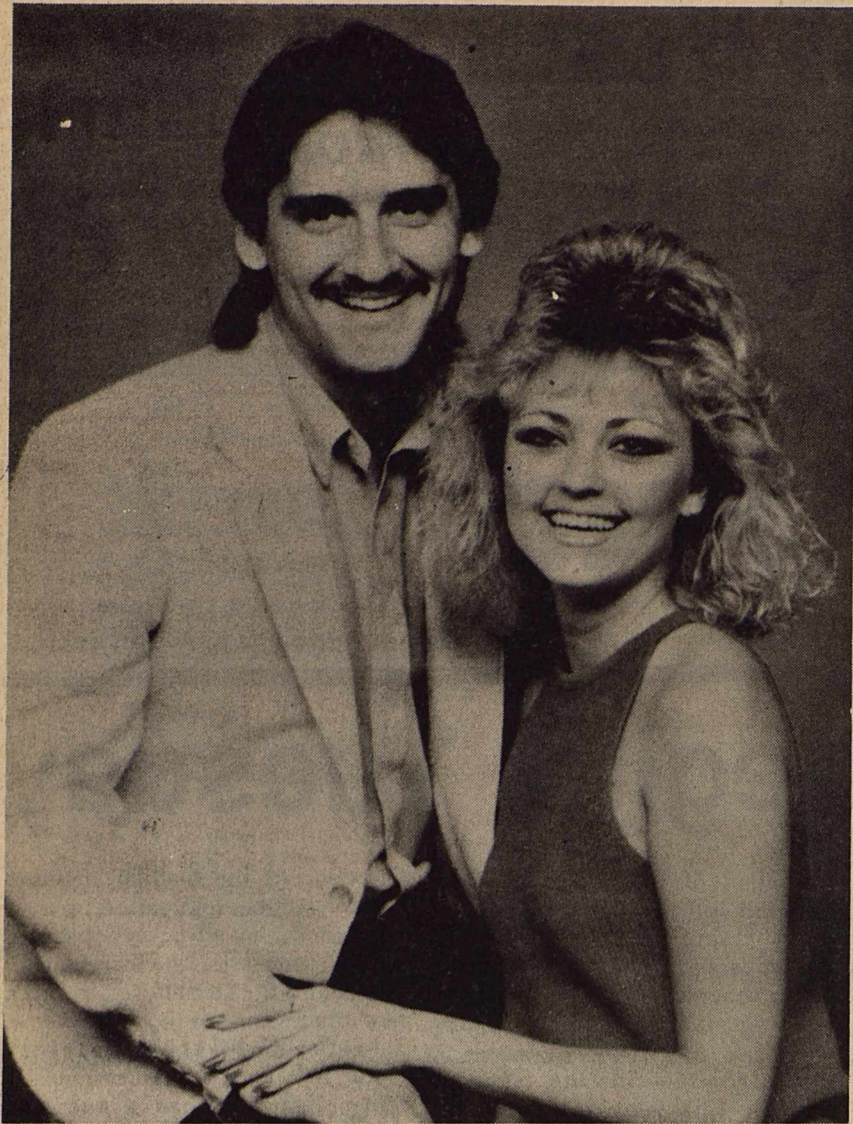

## House reluctant to raise sales tax

AUSTIN—The real "secret plan" in the Legislature these days is the Senate's strategy to force the House to raise the state sales tax.

That's because nobody knows for sure what will finally force House members to vote out a tax bill. The Texas Constitution says all tax bills must originate in the House Ways and Means Committee.

It doesn't outline how the Senate can force a reluctant House to originate such a bill and the memories of several longtime Capitol-watchers can't recall a precedent.

Last week, Gov. Mark White officially opened the agenda to include his 1 1/8 cent temporary sales tax plan, saying the budget cuts already passed by the House weren't enough.

So far, the Senate refuses to adopt the cuts until the House sends over a tax bill. And so far, House leaders have laughed at that pressure.

### Force Certification

But a new strategy unveiled last week by Sen. Ray Farabee appears to be a product of the most logical of senate minds. The bill would require the state comptroller to certify whether the 1986-87 state budget will remain balanced.

Of course, it doesn't balance by an estimated tune of between \$3.5 to \$5 billion. The House would be constitutionally bound then to balance it,

ture House speakers. Now his prowess is on display for all Texans.

He refused last week to hear the tax bill in committee.

For now, and maybe until next regular session, Schlueter keeps new taxes at bay. If and when he opens the gate, he will give the bill his conservative stamp and perhaps quietly leverage the passage of other issues as well. Some argue he holds the November success of other lawmakers in his hands.

### Senate Highlights

While it waits for the House to thaw, the Senate works on other issues. Last week, senators:

- Amended a House school discipline bill to allow immediate expulsion of students involved in assaults, drugs and possession of weapons.

- Passed two controversial banking bills designed to save failing Texas banks. The Senate vote was 26-2. If the House passes the bills by a two-thirds majority, and voters approve the constitution amendments in November, Texas will finally allow branch banking and out-of-state banks.

- Gave committee approval and sent to the floor a bill to legalize betting on horse and dog racing. Senators are betting that Gov. Mark White, who opposes the bills, will be forced to add such revenue-raising measures to the special agenda.

- Tentatively confirmed White's controversial nomination of Jo Campbell to the Public Utility Commission. The nominations panel wanted her to explain her side of a pending lawsuit regarding allegations she had illegally discussed and taped rate cases with her staff. The panel went so far as to summon Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox to a rare secret session to help members determine whether she had violated the law. After the vote, she won praise for toughness.

- Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby offered a new twist on public education by suggesting that school districts should be fined if their graduates are so poorly trained they must take remedial courses in college. "There is no reason for the taxpayer to pay twice," Hobby said.

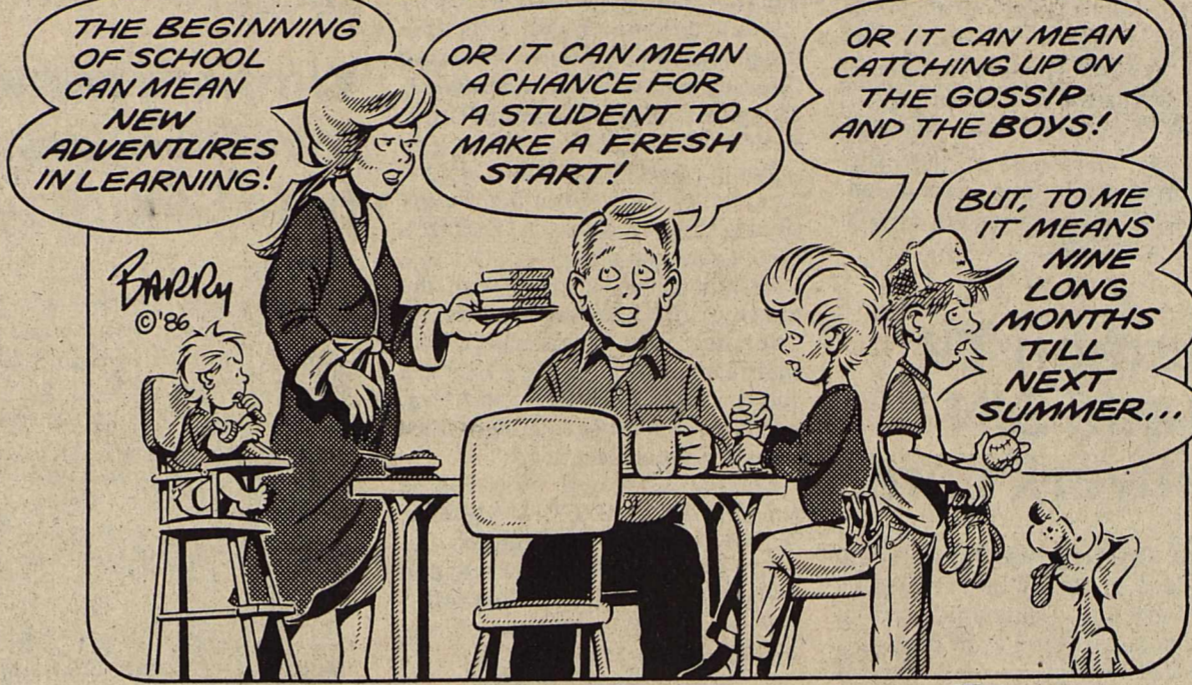
The negotiations for a televised debate between White and former Gov. Bill Clements broke off after Texas Democratic Party chairman Bob Slagle tried to link Clements with business ties to Libya. Clements' staff walked out of a meeting in protest, calling it low-blow, dirty politics.

Clements reportedly sold \$32 million in shares of Schlumberger, Inc. stock recently, but still owns some 816,800 shares. Slagle accused Clements of indirectly aiding Libya, because the drilling company, the world's largest, operates in Libya, as well as 98 other countries.

White refused comment, denying any involvement.

## 43 may die this weekend, says DPS

Officials of the Texas Department of Public Safety estimate that 43 persons could be killed in traffic accidents across the state during the Labor Day period.

The 78-hour holiday period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, Aug. 29, and ends at midnight Monday, Sept. 1.

The department will have additional troopers on duty during the period. DPS officers will be taking enforcement action against as many violators as they can to increase the safety factor for law-abiding motorists.

The final fatality count for the 1985 Labor Day period was 52.

Twenty-one of the deaths resulted from traffic accidents in which speed or DWI was a contributing factor. Officers will be concentrating on these violations during this year's Labor Day weekend.

## Brown bread not always 'whole wheat'

Some consumers mistakenly think that all brown bread is whole-wheat, when it's not, says a Texas A&M nutritionist.

Dr. Alice Hunt explains that by law, bread that is labeled "whole wheat" must be made from 100 percent whole-wheat flour. "Wheat bread," however, may be made from varying proportions of enriched white flour and whole-wheat flour. The type of flour present in the largest amount is listed first on the bread label, she says.

Sometimes the dark color in bread is achieved with caramel coloring, which would also be listed

## Many families face questions about aging

Does grandma have to go to a nursing home? Can dad manage in that big house all alone? How do you cope with the demands of raising teenagers and mother's illness at the same time?

These are the kinds of questions faced by many families with aging members.

"Between 80 and 90 percent of the care needed by elderly persons is provided from within the family," says gerontologist Dr. Judith Warren.

"Sometimes these situations become unsatisfactory, either because the elder is not receiving necessary support, or because one member of the family has been burdened with almost all of the caregiving duties," she adds.

Family members may also feel the situation can't be changed, when in fact there are resources they can use to discover alternative approaches to their caregiving responsibilities, says Warren, a specialist with the Texas A&M Extension Service home economics program.

The gerontologist points out that family members can learn something about coping with their situation by attending courses on caregiving offered through county extension offices, community colleges, health care or other organizations.

Books and publications on subjects such as coping with senility, the aging process or dealing with an Alzheimer's patient are available from the same sources. County extension offices have a letter series on "Adult Children—Aging Parents" with information for families.

"Family members can also talk to someone with special knowledge, such as the aging parent's doctor, a geriatric specialist, family counselor or social worker who can help them identify possible solutions to caregiving problems," Warren remarks.

Local sources for families include the nearest area office on aging. Staff members at this office will have information on adult day-care services, home care and visiting nurse services as well as nursing homes.

Once you have located available options for caregiving in your community, it's important to have a family conference which includes all family members, not just those who are doing most of the care, Warren emphasizes.

"The elder should be involved, if possible, to express his or her needs and wants," Warren says.

In a family conference, members can discuss and decide on ways to provide needed care and how to share caregiving tasks, along with

the financial and emotional demands of caring for an elderly parent.

"This type of meeting may not be easy, and will probably have to be repeated as the aging parent's situation changes," Warren observes. "But it can result in improved care for the elder and better relations among family members who care for and about that person."

### Stenholm to be hearing witness

Congressman Charles Stenholm will be the opening witness next month for hearings on reforming the Davis-Bacon Act, the 55-year-old federal law that sets wages for public construction projects.

The Texas Democrat, a leader of the Davis-Bacon reform movement since coming to Congress, agreed to begin testimony for the Sept. 10 hearings of the Subcommittee on Labor Standards.

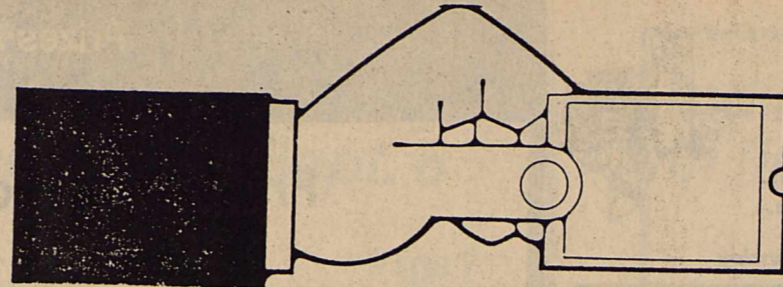
