lot of different people. The truth of the matter is that this operation is under a microscope. The Red Cross has an on-site presence, and watches what goes on very closely. The media is not telling

you the whole truth about what's going on over there. Fact is that these scum bags are not only being treated humanely, but they are probably better off healthwise and medically than they've ever been in their lives. They are fed well, able to take showers and receive state of the art medical care, and have their own Moslem chaplain.

I saw several of them in a field hospital ward where they were being treated in a state of the art medical facility. Now let's talk about the way they treat our people. First of all,




by the mayor. The council passed a motion to rezone Lot 11 Block 1 of the Ridgelea Addition from single family to business for a CPA office.

Wilkins. The council discussed and passed a resolution as an amendment to the city code whereby all public dances and gatherings within the city limits of Bovina where alcohol may be consumed are required to be guarded and secured by at least one licensed police officer or security guard per 100 attendees. The city manager gave fund balance, police and municipal court reports. For August the city collected \$4,556 in revenue in the municipal court.

The next meeting of the city council is scheduled for October 8 at 7 p.m.



Now fast forward to today and the reason I was looking for the story in the first place. Pena was charged with intent to commit capital murder. Ramon Ramirez, then 24, was charged with the shooting of Mr. Diaz but has never been apprehended.

Pena was convicted at trial and sentenced to 15years in state prison and fined \$7,000.

While he was out on a \$50,000 bond in 1989, awaiting an appeal trial, he disappeared and had been missing ever since.

Until a few weeks ago. Current Parmer County Sheriff Randy Geries reports that Francisco Pena, now 47, was apprehended at the Mexican border in Presidio while trying to re-enter the

country. Geries surmised that Pena fled to Mexico before the 1989 appeal trial and has been there since, possibly crossing back into the country a few times in the intervening years.

With new technology, and the tightening of border security after 9-11, Pena's luck ran out. The warrant was discovered and local authorities notified.

Parmer County Chief Deputy Wayne Gruben drove to Presidio and brought Pena back a couple of weeks ago.

This time there will be no trial. Mr. Pena is in line for the big house where he will serve at least half of the 15year sentence in state prison. Probably more, since he fled the scene.

HJR 2 would amend the constitution to allow the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable dormant if that office has been vacant for at least seven consecutive years. The records of a constable office that is declared dormant will be transferred to the county clerk. If the office is declared dormant, the previous office-

holder does not continue to hold the office. The office may not be filled by election or

appointment unless the commissioners court votes to reinstate the office or a majority

of votes cast in an election held on the issue favor reinstatement. The reinstatement

election may be held if the commissioners court on its own motion orders such an election, or the reinstâtement election must be held if the commissioners court receives a


