Seniors' tax aid available

Haskell County senior citizens can make doing their taxes less taxing this year, thanks to a free Tax-Aide program at the Experienced Citizens Center in Haskell. It is sponsored by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP).

Kathryn Matysiak and Augusta Owens will provide free tax assistance for the elderly every week during the tax season, beginning Feb. 16. The trained volunteers will be on hand from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. each Monday.

The service is open to all senior citizens regardless of whether they're members of AARP. Each person desiring service should bring a copy of last year's tax return and all current tax materials.

The Tax-Aide program is the largest of the AARP's volunteer programs. Last year it helped more than a million older persons file their returns through a cooperative venture with the Internal Revenue Service.

Physician may move to Haskell

Agreement appeared near Wednesday on a proposal under which Dr. Shirley Barretto of Knox City would move to Haskell.

Members of the Haskell County Memorial Hospital District board of directors tentatively accepted a proposal from Dr. Barretto Tuesday night. Hospital administrator Bud Comedy was to meet with her Wednesday and work out details of a proposed contract.

Under the agreement, the hospital would furnish Dr. Barretto temporary quarters in the hospital. She also would use other hospital facilities and would be given a first-year income guarantee.

A week earlier, the hospital board had considered the use of Physicians Placement Services of Kingsville to help secure two physicians for Haskell. The Kingsville firm locates and places physicians for its clients.



Driving course next month

A defensive driving course for Haskell County Farm Bureau members has been scheduled for Feb. 12-13. Classes will begin at 6:30 p.m. each day.

The eight-topic course utilizes films and discussions to teach students to avoid accidents despite the actions of others and the surrounding conditions by recognizing the hazard, knowing what to do and acting in time.

Only Farm Bureau members are eligible to take the DDC course through the Texas Farm Bureau. There are no age requirements. Each student must have a valid Texas driver's license to qualify for the 10percent insurance discount. (A test of driving is not involved.)

The principal driver who completes the eight-topic DDC will receive a certificate to be filed with the automobile insurance company which will qualify him/her for a 10percent discount on bodily injury, property damage, medical payments and collision coverage where those coverages are afforded.

The course is free to all Farm Bureau memberrs of Haskell County. Because of enrollment limitations, registration will be taken in advance. Persons may register by calling the Farm Bureau office at 864-2647. Questions concerning the course may also be answered by calling that number.


Financial aid session is tonight

Gas tax increase is in line

Texas' temporary five-cent increase in gasoline tax on Jan. 1 puts the state on a par with the rest of the country in highway user fees, says an economist with the Federal Highway Administration.

"Fifteen cents a gallon is just getting up to the threshold of what is needed in leading states, as far as taxation of motor fuel," said Tom Cooper, an economist with FHWA in Washington. "The range is wide among the 50 states, from seven cents to more than 18 cents. At 110 cents a gallon, Texas was one of the lowest in the country.

Highest state taxes are in Michigan and Nebraska, each of which levies an 18.2 state tax. State taxes in Washington and Colorado are 18 cents.

Missouri is the lowest at 7 cents. Wyoming, New Jersey and Alaska have state taxes of 8 cents.

PRO[™] TEXAS A NEW OPTIONAL CALLING PLAN FROM AT&T

On November 13, 1986 AT&T Communications of The Southwest, Inc. ("AT&T") filed with the Public Utility Commission (PUC) of Texas to introduce a new intrastate, optional calling plan, PRO Texas. A comparable interstate plan, known as PROSM America, is currently available to Texas customers.

PRO Texas gives Texas consumers an opportunity to save money on direct dialed in-state long distance calls. Customers who choose this new AT&T plan will receive a 10% discount on all AT&T intrastate direct dialed station calls by paying a monthly charge of \$15.00.

The PRO Texas discount applies to calls placed during all rate periods and all days. The discount is in addition to the AT&T intrastate evening discount of 25% and the night/weekend discount of 40%. A one time charge of \$6.00 will be billed to initiate the service. However, this charge will be waived during the first 90 days that the offering is available.

PRO Texas will be available to all Message Telephone Service customers in Texas. AT&T estimates that it will generate revenues in the first year of almost \$8 million, which is .7% of AT&T's annual revenues for all Texas intrastate service.

The PUC has assigned Docket No. 7194 to this proposed service offering. The proposed effective date for PRO Texas is March 16, 1987. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the PUC as soon as possible. Collision course looms in Austin

AUSTIN—The day after Bill Clements was inaugurated he drew a line on no new taxes and threatened to keep the Legis-lature in special session indef-initely until a reduced budget was forged.

That very same day, Speaker Gib Lewis realigned the power-structure of the Texas House to increase the odds of an emerging tax bill.

The two-party Texas Legis-lature is on a collision course. Clements' first hardball pitch was a fastball screaming down the middle of the plate. He will not back off his campaign tax stance, even if the Comptroller has predicted a \$1 billion deficit this fiscal year, and a \$4.8 billion short fall during the 1988-89 biennium.

Other state officials are set on a tax hike, but the new governor liked what he saw when he reviewed his budget force's list of about \$4 billion in possible cuts. That budget group is made up of the new "in" Republicans.

Democratic Power House

Speaker Lewis' response was to alter his grip, shift his stance and wait for the next pitch. He realigned his committee strength by dethroning three GOP chairmen and re-ducing the Republicans on the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee from seven to three.



committee. The three Republicans who chairmans Craddick of Midland, Buzz Robnett of Lubbock and Fred Agnich of Dallas, all one-time Lewis team members.

look, and Lewis put Republicans in control of the powerful calendars committees. Clements' budget man Toomey is off Appropriations, but chairs the Judiciary panel.

Some other winners of promotions include Dudley Harri-son of Sanderson, chairman of Agriculture and Livestock; Mark Stiles of Beaumont, County Affairs; Terral Smith of Austin, Natural Resources; and Alan Hightower of Huntsville, Corrections.

Prison Bailout

At week's end, Clements pre-dicted the Legislature will give him the authority to transfer some \$82 million to the state prison system to avert daily fines by a federal judge.

The state has until April 1 to meet court-ordered reforms or it will suffer several million in daily contempt of court fines, but Clements said the Legislature may be able to address the matter within a ten day period.

Overdue Taxes

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said 3,100 Texans owe the state a total of \$37 million and he will turn the list over to Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox for collection.

Most of the sum is from overdue sales tax accounts.



• The overcrowded prison system released more than 250 inmates last week so new in-mates could be legally incarcerated.







Medical enrollment period now open

The general enrollment period for the medical insurance part of Medicare began this month and runs through the end of March, Glyn Hammons, district Social Security manager, has announced.

During these three months, people who passed up the chance for this protection may enroll. Those who had it and dropped out can enroll again.

Protection for people who sign up during the general enrollment period period will start next July 1.

The Federal government pays about three-fourths of the premium costs from Federal general revenues. Enrollees pay the rest.

Medical insurance complements the hospital insurance part of Medicare. Hospital insurance helps pay for medically necessary inpatient hospital care and certain followup care in a skilled nursing facility or at home.

Medical insurance helps pay for doctor's services no matter where they are received in the U.S., including surgical services, diagnostic tests and X-rays that are part of the treatment, medical supplies furnished in the doctor's office, services of the office nurse, and drugs that are given as part of the treatment and which cannot be self-administered.

Medical insurance also covers outpatient hospital services received for diagnosis and treatment and other services received for diagnosis and treatment and other services and supplies not covered by hospital insurance.

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Medical insurance pays for 80 percent of the approved costs or charges for covered services and supplies after the patient has met the \$75 annual deductible.



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The Soil Conservation Service has been informed that signup for CRP (Conservation Reserve Program) will be from Feb. 9-27. At present, the program has no changes from 1986. Producers can sign up for 1987 and 1988.

Under CRP, highly erodible cropland is taken out of crop production and planted to grass through a 10-year contract. Throughout the 10-year period, the grass must be well maintained. The grass cannot be grazed, cut for hay or seed harvest. Brush control is required.

Grass which is adapted to the area and soil can be planted in the CRP.

To be eligible, again land must be highly erodible cropland. The soil loss must be three times T for cropland that is Class II - V. The "T" value is the soil loss tolerance of a

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soil. Some soil has a tolerance as low as 1 and other soils have a tolerance as high as 5. The higher the tolerance of a soil, the higher the soil loss must be to qualify for CRP, Cropland that is Class VI - VIII is

automatically eligible.

Land must have been planted in a crop two out of the last five years, 1981-1985. If one purchased land after Dec. 31, 1984, they must wait three years before being eligible.





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

Don't waste money on chain letters

Have you ever been asked to participate in a chain letter which is guaranteed to earn you lots of money with one small investment?

Don't waste your money. Chain letters are a form of lottery and may violate federal mail fraud laws, warns the U.S. Postal Service.

The same three elements that apply to lotteries (payment, prize and chance) also make chain letter schemes illegal.

The payment may be money or any other itme of value. The prize is the large amount of money you are led to believe you will receive in the end if you participate. The chance is that the chain will break, and it must, because the chance that all participants in a chain letter will receive mail is mathematically impossible.

For example, a typical lchain letter may require participants to mail letters containing money to six new

participants, each of whom must mail six letters to six more individuals and so on. By the 11th level of mailing, the entire population of the United States (almost 300 million) would be exhausted. By the 13th level, the population of the world (over 4 billion) would be exhausted. And remember, even if the chain letter itself is not mailed, as long as the payment or prize is sent through the mail, the entire scheme is illegal.

Some chain letters masquerade as Multi-Level Marketing Plans. These require an original promoter to sell a product and enlist several other people to become sellers, who in turn recruit others. Most MLM plans are schemes to sell the plan rather than the product, and the fact that selling a product is involved, instead of winning money, or statements saying the plan does not violate federal law, does not ensure legality, the Postal

Service says.

Do not confuse regular chain letters of MLM plan chains with prayer chains that promise good luck but require no investment. These are not illegal---they're just a nuisance. You should not be intimidated by implied threats of bad luck, personal injury or disaster for breaking the chain. Feel free to throw the chain letter away

Remember, you are under no obligation to participate if you receive a chain letter, and to do so may be a violation of federal law. Turn the letter in to the local post office or send it to the Postal Inspector in Charge, P.O. Box 162929, Fort Worth, TX 76161-2929.

And the populace of Rochester evidently liked that brand of salesmanship because in the couple of years Uncle Luke was an agent the circulation increased 30 percent.

Every morning he delivered 40 papers and then went to bed. When the afternoon mail arrived he would hitch up Karo, his donkey, and make his afternoon route on which he delivered about 85 papers.

Uncle Luke also had a "Honey Wagon," pulled by Karo. He cleaned outdoor toilets.

Uncle Luke came to Rochester before 1919 and he had two daughters and one son. He lived about where

to mark his grave. Uncle Luke did a lot for the people or Rochester and the City of Rochester has offered to start a fund to buy his marker. If you would like to contribute, you may do so by calling Rochester City Hall or Dick Burleson, 997-2817.

Sagerton woman sees airplane again

A Sagerton woman who helped welcome Charles A. Lindbergh and his Spirit of St. Louis to Abilene in 1927 has taken another look at the world's most famous airplane.

John L. Summers Brooks recently visited the Air and Space Center in Washington, D.C., where the plane is now on display.

It brought back memories of that day 60 years ago when she represented Rochester as the "Spirit of Rochester" in welcoming Lindbergh and his plane to the Big Country.

She had been selected by Mayor Roy Arledge and the Chamber of Commerce to represent the town on this stop of a nationwide tour by the famous aviator. She recalls being dressed in red, white and blue attire when she shook hands with Col. Lindbergh, who was wearing the same leather jacket he wore on his historic transatlantic flight. (She also remembers being presented a dozen red roses by the Rochester Chamber of Commerce.)

Lindbergh's flight from New York to Paris was made May 20-21, 1927. It covered 3,610 miles and took 33 hours and 30 minutes. A fuel tank obstructed his forward view and Lindbergh could not see ahead without using a periscope or by turning the plane. He had no radio or no parachute and his food supply consisted only of sandwiches.

Mrs. Brooks visited the Air and Space Center while visiting her son and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Tabor, in Belcamp, Md. Her granddaughter, Vanessa Griffin of Little Elm, accompanied her. They saw other sights in Washington, Baltimore and in Pennsylvania.

Opposes belt law

Editor: I do not believe the people who think the Seat Belt Law is a good idea have taken the time to think it through. Wearing a seat belt is a good idea, just like having regular medical check-ups, daily walks, smoke detectors in your home, dead bolt locks on your doors, not smoking and on and on. But is it the government's responsibility to place a fine on us if we do not. I say it is not.

There is no question the cost of medical care is on the backs of all of us either through insurance premiums or taxes. So if you support the Seat Belt Law for these reasons, then the rationale follows that you want laws requiring medical check-ups, daily walks, no smoking and all other known practices that might lengthen our years and make us healthier. The cost of us not adopting these practices are also passed on to us through increased insurance premiums or taxes. But who should make us adopt such practices? The government?

A law requiring the wearing of seat belts is not different in principle from a law requiring annual medical check-ups. If we can pass the one law---on the grounds that a particular practices is good for us---on what grounds could we spurn the other

It is presumed by our government that we have too little sense to consider our own self interest and buckle up. So the government says let us accordingly, force them to do what we know is best for them. Let us do their thinking for them.

Let me tell you how the Seat Belt Law came about. By no means was it an outcry from our citizens to protect them from hurting themselves, but instead an outcry from the automobile manufacturers' lobby. The reason the auto lobby was concerned is because the federal government a few years ago said unless two thirds of the 50 states passed laws mandating seat belt use by 1989, it would order Detroit to equip all cars with expensive air bags. Not a single person in my district or the state of Texas asked me to pass a bill requiring them to wear a seat belt.


Many people are wearing seat belts not just because of the law, but because of the national publicity pointing out the facts in case of an accident. Just as more people are having medical check-ups, more people are installing dead bolts on their doors, more are exercising and fewer people are smoking. They are doing it for their own health and safety and not because the government is saying do it or we will impose a fine. For every good cause, there is not necessarily a good law waiting to be passed.

Our chances for repeal would be better if the law were strictly enforced or if automobiles were manufactured so they would not start until the seat belt was buckled. Then you would hear an outcry from the people all the way to the State Capitol that would overcome the special interest groups that passed the law.

So in the meantime, obey the law and wear your seat belt. But do not be surprised if this new session of the legislature comes up with more good ideas and passes more laws to take away some more of our human liberties. As Pogo said long ago: "We have discovered the enemy, and it is us."

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
