asks for lower rate

West Texas Utilities Co. has filed a request with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to lower the amount it charges its customers for

The petition, filed March 18, asks that the fixed fuel cost factors for the months of May through October be reduced by 35 percent. The fixed factors are based on the expected cost of fuel as forecast at the time the factors are set, and specify the amount to be charged per kilowatt-hour for power plant fuel and purchased energy used to supply the customer.

Company officials listed three reasons for the request for lower factors. One is the softer market for natural gas, which is the principal fuel at eight of WTU's generating stations. Related to this is the recent renegotiation of a contract with the company's major supplier of natural gas. The third reason is the completion of the company's first coal-fired generating unit, the Oklaunion Power Station near

If the new fuel rate is approved, WTU expects the costs being charged to its customers to more clearly reflect the actual price of fuel, thereby eliminating the need for refunds during the six-month period.

Since the fixed fuel factor method was established in 1983, WTU has made five refunds to retail customers of over-collections occurring while fuel costs were declining. The most recent refund was credited to customer bills in February.

Twenty-four out-of-town fliers and 16 members of the Texas Chiefs Model Airplane Club displayed almost 100 models.





It's not simple to cut out diet fats

Many people are trying to cut back on saturated fat because of its association with elevated blood cholesterol levels and increased risk of heart disease.

What people often don't understand is that to decrease their intake of cholesterol from saturated fats, they must change their overall eating habits to reduce total fat," maintains Mary Kinney Sweeten, a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

"It's not simple to cut out saturated fats alone since fats in foods are mixtures of saturated and unsaturated fats," she explains.

In general, foods containing saturated fats are solid at room temperature, says Sweeten. They include animal products such as poultry, fish, meat, eggs and some dairy products.

There are two types of unsaturated fats.

Mono-unsaturated fats do not seem to have any effect on cholesterol levels, and polyunsaturated fats seem to lower blood cholesterol. Unsaturated fats are usually from plant sources and remain liquid at room temperature.

"But even a polyunsaturated oil, such as standard vegetable oil, will contain 40 percent polyunsaturated fat and 13 percent saturated fat," she remarks.

"Palm oil and coconut oil are also important exceptions to note," says the nutritionist. "Both these vegetable oils, which are used extensively in processed foods and commercial baked goods, are over 80 percent saturated for "

Sweeten says it would be very difficult for many people to eat only foods that are low in saturated fats.

"Most people want and need to include some foods from animal sources in their diets, because they are a major source of protein. Trimming visible fat, eating lean cuts of meat and removing the skin from poultry will help reduce saturated fats from these protein foods," she says.

The nutritionist advises building a diet lower in total fat around the recommended two servings daily of protein foods and rounding it out with fruits, vegetables, breads and cereals, and low-fat dairy products.

"Simply watching your intake of fried foods and the fats you're getting from processed foods will also help reduce both saturated and unsaturated fats in your diet," adds Sweeten.

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

Legislative leaders see different things

AUSTIN—The Superpowers of Texas government, Bill Hobby, Gib Lewis and Bob Bullock, see some things differently these days, and because of it, Texas is never going to be the


With time running out on the Legislature's efforts to balance the budget, Hobby and Lewis think lawmakers can legally roll over about a million dollars of debt into the next fiscal biennium.

Last year's decline in revenues created a \$1 billion defi-cit which the leaders of the Legislature assumed could be paid off with a tax bill passed this session.

But Comptroller Bob Bullock, much to everyone's surprise, says that concept would violate the pay-as-you-go man-date written into the Texas Constitution, and he has asked

Attorney General Jim Mattox for an official ruling. If Mattox says "no," the Legislature must erase the deficit by August 31 or Bullock won't certify the appropriations.

Hobby and Lewis contend the constitution only requires the Comptroller to certify that a budget is balanced at the beginning of a spending period, not the end.



Hobby, in fact, pointed out that Bullock himself said as much to a Senate committee last summer, and indicated Bullock was changing the rules

in the middle of the game. Bullock just wants to know where he stands. It's an interesting point. Texas has never been this down in the dumps in quite a while.

Lottery Boosted

One alternative is to raise taxes immediately, but Gov. Clements and others won't allow it. Thus, lottery may be looming.

A state lottery may not raise cash quickly enough, but last week Speaker Lewis softened his opposition to that bill.

The lottery issue fares well in the Senate, and if Lewis will stand aside in the House, it might be passed.

Supporters say a state lot-tery could be installed and marketed quickly, with tickets being sold at various stores, particularly convenience stores.

Fine Threat Lifted

As for good news, a federal judge temporarily backed off his threat to fine Texas for contempt of prison reform court orders.

The next day the Texas

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AG's office told the federal appeals court that the contempt ruling was beyond the judge's authority and asked it be overturned.

The inmates' lawyer asked the appeal court to stay out of

Proposed Court Reforms

Meanwhile, two plans to overhaul the Texas court system caught the limelight, and they don't necessarily like each other.

The most dramatic plan, backed by Gov. Bill Clements, would combine the state's two highest courts, the Supreme Court and the Court of Criminal Appeals, into one of appointed judges.

Another, sponsored by Wichita Falls Sen. Ray Farabee, would trim down the "appointment plan" to include the Supreme Court, Court of Crim-inal Appeals and 13 civil appeals courts, and not state district trial judges.

Farabee commented the gov-ernor's idea might kill the appointment plans altogether. The governor, of course, would have the appointment power.

Other Highlights

· Clements could become a defendent in a possible lawsuit against individuals by SMU officials for his role in "Ponygate," the play-for-pay football scandal. He isn't worried.

• Mattox said he will review as a matter of course the \$400 million purchase by the Hearst Corporation of the Houston Chronicle from the non-profit Houston Endowment.

• Meanwhile, a bill drafted by Clements' office would bar Mattox and subsequent attorneys general, as well as most of the consumer representa-tion, from public utility rate cases. Even the GOP sponsor, Dallas Rep. Patricia Hill, said she may have been misled by Clements staff on its contents.

• Austin banker Robert Lane quit the Texas Board of Corrections, leaving Clements with four vacancies to fill.


· One of Clements new appointees, Dallas investor Louis Beecherl to the University of Texas board of regents, ran into trouble in the Senate.

Beecherl admitted in committee testimony that he promised Clements he would oust board chairman Jess Hay, a top Democrat fundraiser.

Panel Democrats may bust Beecherl for promising something in return for office and planned to question him a second time.

Rail R&D Outlays **Hit Record Levels**

There would also be a reduction of funds available per day for foster home care services. It is the aim of DHS to dedicate the limited resources to those children most in need of protection and to avoid inappropriate intervention with families.

A motion was made by Debbie Earles and seconded by Sue Miller that election of officers be postponed. The terms of Sue Miller and Mary Martin expire, but they were asked to remain for another term. Debbie Earles reported that Shirley Sloan of Rochester has consented to serve. Linda Short of Rochester felt that she could serve no longer.

The plans for April as Child Abuse Prevention Month were discussed. Merry Harvey presented an insert for church bulletins to be given to Haskell churches. Mary Martin will contact churches in Rochester, Paint Creek, Rule, Sagerton and Weinert to use the inserts. Brian Burgess will ask County Judge B. O. Roberson to issue a proclamation. Articles will be placed in The Free Press and Twin Cities News during April. Places with public bulletin boards will also be contacted.

Pastor's message re-printed

Mrs. Ewell Lusk of Rice Springs Care Home requested that the following article by the Rev. Jack Lusk be reprinted.

It appeared March 6 in the Artesia (N. M.) Daily Press. Lusk, a Hasketl native, is pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church of Artesia. He is the nephew of Mrs. Lusk.

Have you been born again?

"Born again" is a term used by Jesus as he spoke to Nicodemus in the third chapter of the gospel of John.

"Verily, verily I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." John 3:3.

Nicodemus was a Pharisee, a religious man, and a ruler of the Jews. He had come to Jesus by night because he recognized Jesus as a teacher from God. And he came because he realized his need.

When Jesus told him he must be born again, his mind turned to physical things which he understood.

Many today do not understand God's plan of salvation and so they resort to a man-made plan that sounds reasonable.

Nicodemus asked Jesus, "can a man be born again when he is old?" "Can he enter the second time into

his mother's womb and be born?"

In verse six he explains that statement, "That which is born of the flesh is flesh; and that which is born of the Spirit is Spirit."

In verse eight Jesus compares it to the wind. We do not see the wind but we feel it and we see the effects of it.

Nicodemus asked, "How can these things be?" He still did not undersand it. Well, neither do I. I have been born again, but I do not understand all the details. I do not even understand why God would even fool with man, but he does and I accept that by faith.

The Bible tells us God loves us. I don't understand it but I believe it because He said it. He not only has said it but he has proved it over and

When one truly repents of their sins and receives Jesus as their personal savior, they will be born again. We do not need to understand it, just believe it. That's all it takes to have the new birth and the assurance of being in the kingdom of heaven.

We become as "newborn babes." 1 Peter 2:2.

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Quacksters prey on arthritis victims

The pursuit of relief from arthritis is as old as man, dating back, in fact, to his Neanderthal predecessors. In the 1850s, Americans could chose from among some 1,500 advertised curealls, most of which were nothing more than flavored water, alcohol, narcotics or toxic substances.

There is still no cure for most forms of arthritis. But, the quest for "miracle cures" is one of the most lucrative health care scams today.

For every dollar spent on legitimate arthritis research, \$25 is spent on fraudulent, misrepresented drugs, gimmickry gadgets, unproven remedies and special foods or ointments. It is estimated that quackery cheats people with arthritis out of more than \$1 billion each year.

If you have arthritis, you hurt. And because your pain is so bad and goes on, you're willing to try anything. That sets you up to be deceived. It doesn't take much to get your hopes up. And the fact is all

kinds of people are out to deceive you, to offer you false hope for a cure or relief. Many are out to make money on your misery.

Here is a list of 10 practices that are typical of quack and misrepresented remedy promotions. Even if a doctor's name makes the claims sound legitimate, you should be alert for these signs:

1. A cure for arthritis is offered. If someone claims to have an exclusive cure, beware. When a genuine cure is found, there won't be any questions about it.

2. The cure or remedy is described as a "secret" formula or device, as "exclusive" or "special." Honest scientists don't keep their discoveries secret or exclusive.

3. Testimonials and case histories of people claiming to have been helped by the remedy are offered as "proof" of its effectiveness. Remember no two people are just alike in the way they react to a remedy.

4. The remedy or treatment is written up in sensationalized articles in supermarket tabloids and special

health interest publications or advertised in magazines and mail order promotions.

5. Quick, simple relief of pain is promised or implied.6. The treatment is promoted as

6. The treatment is promoted as "cleansing" the body of poisons or "toxins" to allow the body's "natural" curative powers to clear up arthritis.

7. Drugs and surgery are condemned as damaging, dangerous and unnecessary. The arthritis victim is advised to try a non-drug treatment method.

8. No reliable evidence or scientific proof is offered to back up claims that the advertised remedy is safe and effective. The promoter has not had his method properly tested in clinical trials.

9. A special diet or nutrition treatment program is promoted as the answer to arthritis. Research scientists have not found any foods or nutrients that cause arthritis or make it better or worse (except in gout, a form of arthritis).

10. The "medical establishment" is accused of conspiracy to thwart progress by refusing to "recognize" or "approve" the remedy being promoted. Particular targets include the Arthritis Foundation, the American Medical Association and the Food and Drug Administration.

Managing arthritis isn't simple, and good results don't come overnight. You've got to work at it, day in and day out. A successful arthritis treatment plan prescribed by a legitimate doctor works to the extent you work at it.



If "tort reform" were adopted, drunk drivers' financial responsibility for the damage they cause would be limited by the law. Now is not the time to

retreat from holding drunk drivers totally responsible for their actions.

If "tort reform" won't reduce insurance premiums, will limit compensation for those who are most seriously injured, and will protect drunk drivers, why do we need it?

We don't. Before it's too late, stop "tort reform."

Who Really Wants Tort Reform?

Insurance companies began the "tort reform movement" two years ago to reduce their losses. But they now admit that in other states, including Florida, the changes in tort law have not reduced insurance company losses — or caused them to lower rates.

The insurance industry has backed off of "tort reform." The New York Times (Feb. 9, 1987) quoted insurance spokesmen as saying the "liability insurance crisis" or "lawsuit crisis" has ended. The liability insurance industry made record, after-tax net profits

of \$11.5 billion in 1986 (Insurance Information Institute, January).

Now, the proposal is supported by a group of Austin lobbyists, some of the state's biggest polluters and businessmen who have been sold the line that "tort reform" will lower their insurance premiums.

The Florida experience proves that "tort reform" will not reduce liability insurance premiums.

Before it's too late, stop "tort reform."

Railroad Employment Continues To Decline

2. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION. The Section 8 Existing Program enables PHAs to offer opportunities for rental assistance to lower-income families by utilizing existing housing units. It is designed to meet the individual needs of families by offering them a choice in finding in the local market a unit suitable to their needs. The unit selected by the family must be determined by the PHA to meet the Housing Quality Standards prescribed for the program and the rental rate must be within the applicable Fair Market Rent limitations. If the unit and rental rate are acceptable, the PHA enters into a Housing Assistance Payments Contract with the owner of the unit to make up the difference between what the family can afford to pay and the total Contract Rent. It is possible that eligible families may receive assistance in units which they currently occupy.

3. APPLICANTS AND OCCUPANTS OF OTHER ASSISTED HOUSING. Occupants of and applicants to public housing, and other assisted housing must specifically apply for the Section 8 Existing Housing Program if they wish to participate in the program. Such applicants will not lose their place on the public housing waiting list.

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

Budget cutters eye 4-H program

Currently a target of proposed budget cuts in the Texas Legislature, the 4-H program remains one of the top youth organizations in the state and nation for turning out leaders--the future of America.

"Some officials have pointed the finger at 4-H as costing the state too much, yet we spend only about \$8 cf state general revenue per 4-H member each year," points out Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which administers the 4-H program. Four-H enrollment in Texas stands at about 305,000 members.

"That investment goes to programs and activities that help boys and girls gain leadership and coping skills which will make them more productive citizens," said Carpenter.

"Regardless of the types of projects 4-H members are involved in, whether they deal with beef or swine, safety or electricity, foods and nutrition or any of the more than 60 other project areas, the ultimate goal is still leadership and citizenship development," Carpenter emphasized.

"And I think we have done a good job in this. Studies have shown that 4-H members do well when they enter the mainstream of life. They are the community leaders, the ones who take charge to make life better for all converend. Many go into agriculture and related industries and provide this state and nation with needed strength

"A county judge recently told me that he's never had a 4-H member come before his court for disciplinary action. I'm sure that's the case in many of our counties, and it shows that 4-H is having a positive influence on the lives of young people. You just can't put a price tag on that kind of achievement."

A recent nationwide poll showed that 4-H had a positive impact on lifeskills needed by adults to become self-directing, productive members of society. Study results showed that former 4-H members were more






