

## Clinic being built

Construction began last Thursday on a new medical clinic on the grounds of Haskell Memorial Hospital.

The 1,962-square-foot building is being erected just south of the hospital by Tom Richardson. Cost is \$83,100. It is expected to be completed by June 30.

When completed, the clinic will have facilities for two doctors. One of them, Dr. Bill McSmith, will begin practice in Haskell in July. The hospital hopes to secure the services of another doctor.

## Cancer crusade successful

The Cancer Crusade in Haskell County raised \$3,090.81, announced Mary Kaigler, president of the board of the Haskell County unit of the American Cancer Society.

The business sector contributed \$954.50 of the sum, while the residential campaign netted \$2,136.31. The drive surpassed the goal of \$3,000.

On behalf of the board, Mrs. Kaigler thanked each of the 57 volunteers, which included 15 from Weinert, four from Rule and one from Sagerton, for their help, and expressed appreciation for each person who gave "generously and graciously" to the cause.

## Asgeir's daughter

### Icelandic girl to graduate in Haskell

Everyone just calls her "Debbie." And for a good reason: Her real name is Dagbjort Asgeirsdottir.

She's a 16-year-old Icelander who will walk across the stage Friday night and receive her diploma from Haskell High School just like the local native seniors.

But hers will be the "honorary" type since she already has received the equivalent of a high school diploma in Iceland.

She started to school here March 23 after arriving in the home of Duward and Gwen Campbell. She's the 13th exchange student (fourth foreign) the Campbells have hosted since 1978.

She likes America---and Haskell. She likes the warm weather "so I can tan." She likes the politeness of the people. And she's learning to live the food.

She also likes Haskell High School where her curriculum includes English, Spanish, U.S. history, child development, vocational ag and athletics.

Debbie started to school at age 7

and graduated last year at 15. Next fall she will go to Isafjordur for four years. After that she may elect to attend the University of Iceland.

Her school courses last year included physical education, swimming, math, Icelandic, English, Danish, world history, typing, bookkeeping and cooking.

Debbie's father is a fisherman and her mother a teacher. She has a 10-year-old brother and a 9-year-old sister, as well as an 18-year-old half-sister.

The Icelandic language, Debbie explains, is one of the old Norse languages. She says it's purer than those spoken in Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Germany since it has not been diluted by infiltration from other countries. Iceland, as an island nation, has no borders with other countries.

Debbie lives in Bolungarvik in the northwest part of the country. Only the coastlines of Iceland are populated since the rest of the country is useless because of mountains and volcanoes. Fishing is the main

industry, although there is some agriculture. Sheep and cattle are raised and a new industry is the raising of foxes.

Her name comes from her father. The first part of her last name, Asgeir, is the first name of her father. The "dottir" means daughter. Every girl's name in Iceland ends with "dottir", just as every boy's name ends with "son." Only exceptions will be in families whose roots are not imbedded in the country.

A woman's name does not change upon marriage. These customs make for a lot of different names within the same family. Her last name, for instance, is different from that of her father, her mother and her brother, all of whom have different last names. First names may be what ever the parents want.

Her first name, Dagbjort, means "Day Bright." She says all Icelanders go by their first names. "We even call our president by her first name," says Debbie---or "Dabba" as her friends back home call her.

## County bodies get \$25,171 from banks

Haskell County taxing jurisdictions received checks last week totaling \$25,171.16 as this year's first allocation of the state's franchise tax on banks.

The Haskell Independent School District received \$12,384.22, the County of Haskell \$4,916.16, the City of Haskell \$3,446.09 and the Haskell County Hospital District \$2,549.77.

All of these totals were decreases from what the jurisdictions received in the first allocation in 1986. Last year the figures were \$13,370.70 for the school, \$5,384.12 for the county, \$3,815.18 for the city and \$2,804.87 for the hospital.

The City of Rochester received \$1,567.94 and the Rochester Independent School District got \$68.20. These figures compare with last year's figures of \$1,471.33 for the city and \$1,830.64 for the school district.

Rule's receipts were \$49.40 for the city and \$225.38 for the school district. Last year's receipts were \$18.15 and \$79.56, respectively.

Overall, the \$25,171.16 in receipts this year represented a 14.3-percent decline from the \$28,774.55 received in the first allocation in 1986.

The 1984 Legislature brought banks under the state franchise tax for the first time and allocated money from the tax to cities, counties, school districts and other local taxing units where the banks are located.

Banks are taxed at the same rate as other Texas corporations. Previously, bank stocks were subject to local property taxes. The Legislature exempted the stocks from property taxes, substituting the bank franchise tax. Collections are prorated among local taxing units based on their tax rates.

The next bank franchise allocation will be in August of this year.

Other features of the party will include a "womanless style show" at midnight, movies, dancing and games.

A number of businesses, including several from out of the county, have contributed cash and prizes to the project, as have individuals.

## Sagerton gets new fire truck

The Sagerton Volunteer Fire Department, in cooperation with the Texas Forest Service, has recently purchased a fire truck for the community, as well as the surrounding area for use in the Rural Fire Defense Program.

The truck is equipped with a Water Expansion Pump System (WEPS). It has a 750-gallon water capacity tank which allows the soap and air to expand the capacity to 10-to-20 times that amount, depending on the type of fire. The WEPS unit is a virtually

## Open house at pool

Haskell's renovated swimming pool will be put on public display Sunday when the City of Haskell conducts an open house at the facility.

Open house will be from 1 to 5 p.m. and the public is invited to come by and view the improvements.

The pool, which will open for the summer season Monday (June 1), has

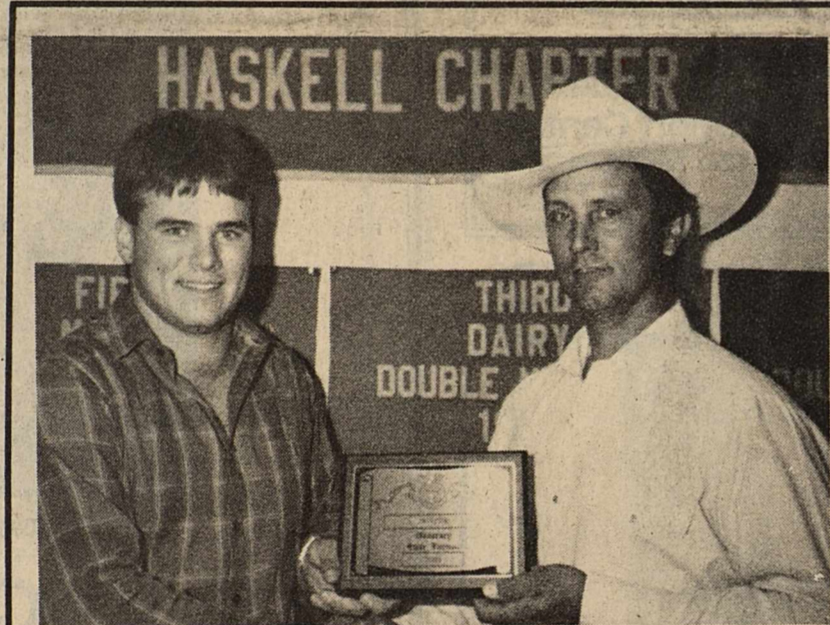
undergone extensive remodeling. A new filtration system, new bath houses and lighting facilities are just some of the improvements.

The \$126,000 project is being financed by a \$63,000 state grant and local matching funds. (Much of the local requirement is being met with labor and equipment use.)

The system is designed to extend the operating time by expanding the water supply through the use of an additive "soap skin," and compressed air. It was designed for wildland fire suppression but has been used with good results on incipient fires in small structures, vehicle fires and oil and gas fires.

A 50-50 cost share cooperative agreement with the Texas Forest Service has made it possible for the Sagerton community to obtain this fire fighting equipment.

Jim Hudson right, receives plaque from Doug Davis.

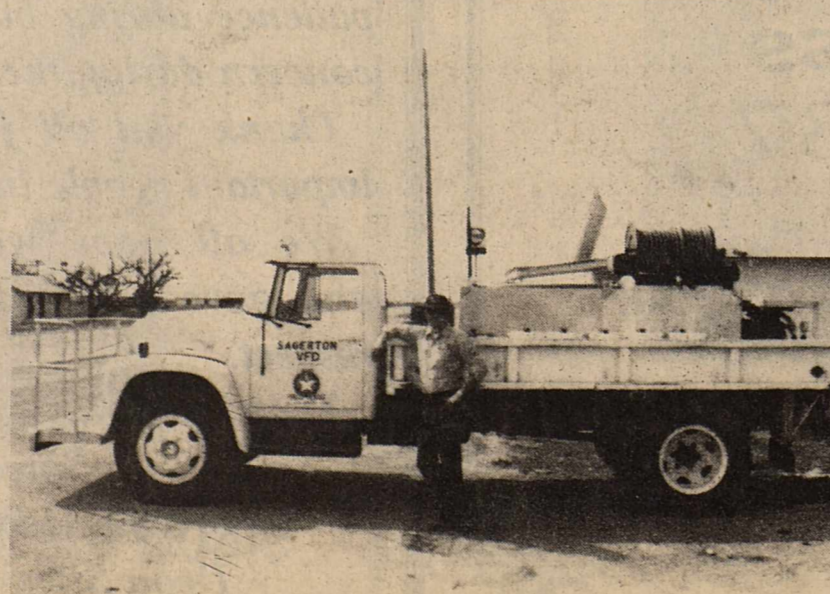
## Future Farmers honor Hudson

## Clements, Hobby waging battle

AUSTIN—Eyeball to eyeball over tax and budget issues, Gov. Bill Clements and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby represent the power politics now being waged in the Legislature that will determine the state's economic and political future.

As the House Ways and Means Committee opened hearings on alternative tax bills, Hobby's Democrats are closing the circle around Clements and his band of House Republicans who oppose new taxes.


Last week Clements placed the blame squarely on Hobby's shoulders, saying, "the problem is in the Senate, and the problem is Mister Hobby. He is immovable."

The governor has passed a critical date and can now pocket veto any bill. He also indicated he has enough House votes to make his veto stick, and issued a Clint Eastwood-type challenge: "Make my day."

Quite likely, this budget-tax war will produce only one winner between Clements and Hobby, and Texas will never be the same.

Without a tax bill of some kind, the Legislature will not be able to adopt a budget and will force a special session, either this summer or even immediately upon adjournment.

But for now, lawmakers are working to clear other issues from the agenda, much like loading women and children first in the lifeboats.

#### Tort Reform

One such issue is tort reform which the House approved on a voice vote with some changes in the Senate version.

The House package includes a proposed constitutional amendment which pro-reform members added to prevent some Texas Supreme Court justices from moving to declare it unconstitutional.

#### The House

In other action, the House advanced legislation to:

- Lower the amount of good time credit awarded to prison inmates and approved other Sunset Committee recommendations.

- Allow school districts to use state funds to buy school buses with seat belts, instead of mandating local funds for them.

- Allow damage lawsuits (no less than \$10,000 per violation) against athletic boosters who get their colleges in trouble with the NCAA.

- Permit Southwestern Bell and other telephone companies to set

rates on competitive services without Public Utility Commission approval.

- Selected Rep. Curtis Seidlits, D-Sherman, as freshman of the year and Rep. Richard Waterfield, R-Canadian, as runner-up.

#### The Senate

Among the legislation advanced by the Senate last week were bills:

- Providing for doubling tuition for graduate students and allowing Mexicans who attend colleges near the Texas border to pay the same tuition as Texas residents.

- Renaming the College Coordinating Board the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and giving it power to oversee all state colleges and universities.

- Limiting the appointive power of a sitting governor who is not re-elected.

#### Other Highlights

- The U.S. Senate acted to undermine a bill passed by the Texas Legislature two weeks ago which approved \$500 million in bonds to induce the federal government to build the supercollider here.

Apparently Senators from small states "ganged up" to prohibit cost-sharing by states as a factor for selecting a site, said Texas Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

- The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals upheld the practice of postponing court cases involving a lawyer-legislator and ordered Rep. Debra Danburg, D-Houston, be reinstated in an attempted murder trial. She had been removed by the district judge set to hear the case.

- The widow of former Texas Supreme Court Justice John Garwood last week told a Congressional panel investigating the Iran-contra affair details of her \$2 million contribution to help the Nicaraguan rebels.

- Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox filed a lawsuit against the author of a "how to" book describing ways to make a profit by finding heirs. Mattox said the book is a "rip-off."

- State Treasurer Ann Richards said the state made over \$210,000 from a recent public auction of contents from abandoned safe deposit boxes.

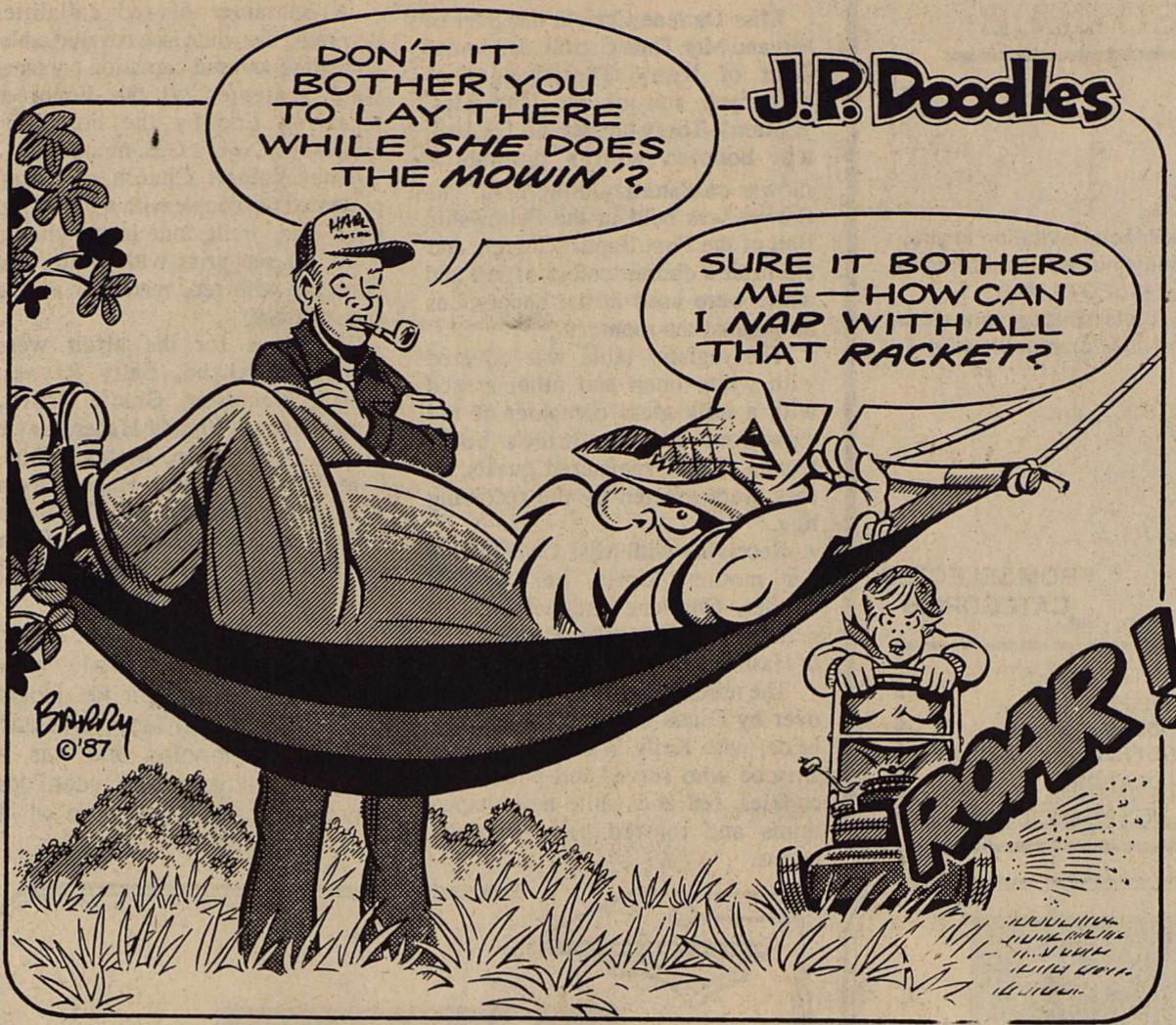
Q: My husband died owing the Veterans Administration \$3,000. My only source of income is Social Security. Am I responsible for his debt?

## Insect scouting planned

Farmers interested in participating in the cotton insect scouting program may pick up a contract at the county agent's office.

Acres are now being signed up by the Haskell/Stonewall County Pest Management steering committee.

Cotton will be checked by field scouts who will be trained and supervised by Paula Verden, extension agent entomologist for this area.

Dryland cotton will be scouted once each week for \$2.75 per planted acre. Irrigated cotton will be checked twice each week for \$4.25 per planted acre. A scout report form will be issued to the producer after each field is checked for that week.

Cutoff date for signing up is June 10. Payments must be made in full before scouts will be allowed to start checking fields.

Sallie Sanders' home suffered damage last week when fire broke out from her stove. She managed to



## Stop salmonella in the kitchen

Texas Department of Health Salmonellosis is one of the most common food-borne diseases, causing nausea, diarrhea, fever, and in rare cases, death. Infants and small children under 5 seem to contract the disease more often than others, followed closely by the elderly.

In Texas last year, of the 2,445 persons stricken with the illness, 604 were less than a year old, 458 were 1 to 4 years old, and 515 were 55 or older. The number of deaths attributed to the disease in 1986 is not yet known, but in 1985 there were five in the state.

can be prevented almost entirely by cooks in the kitchens.

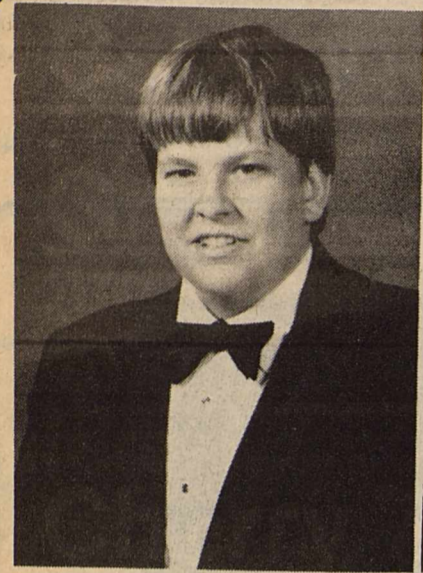
Deborah Martin, acting director, Infectious Diseases Division of the TDH Bureau of Epidemiology, said, "No one should overlook the need for strict regulation of meat processing, but the fact is that most infections from salmonella are the result of inadequate knowledge in the kitchen. If meat is properly cooked and stored at proper temperatures and if the cook keeps hands, utensils and work surfaces properly cleaned, salmonella should not survive to cause infection."

The presence of salmonella in any

raw meat, whether poultry, pork or beef, should not surprise anyone, Martin explained, since the bacteria are common in most domestic animals and even wild game.

"Almost any barnyard animal can carry the bacteria and be unaffected by it," she said. "It is only when the bacteria are transmitted from undercooked meat to humans that there is any threat of salmonellosis."

"The way to avoid the disease is to observe strict cleanliness in the kitchen, washing with soap and water everything that touches the raw meat.



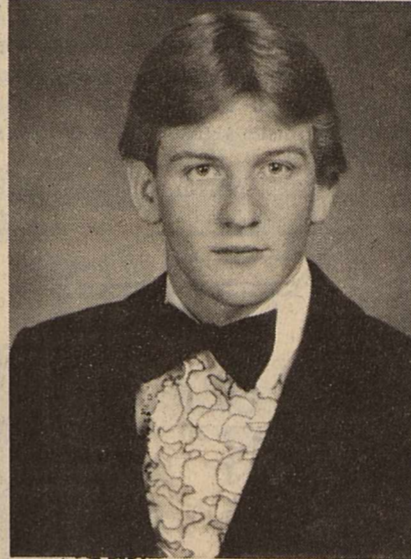
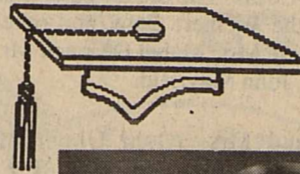

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## Texas women heed breast screening call

More than 100,000 Texas women, a national record, called special American Cancer Society (ACS) hot lines in recent weeks to participate in the Society's Texas Breast Screening Project. Texas participation was more than three times greater than the previous best response to a similar program in California.

"We're overwhelmed--and ecstatic--at the response," said George N. Peters, MD, a surgeon at Baylor University Medical Center in Dallas and volunteer chairman of the project. "Although Texas was not the first state to launch this type of screening project, we've certainly done it on a much larger and more comprehensive scale," he said.

During the project, more than 5,000 volunteers staffed phone banks in 32 Texas cities to determine the callers' eligibility for the project. Eligible callers, those women 35 or older who had no breast cancer symptoms, received a coupon entitling them to a \$50 mammogram from local participating facilities. That is about half the regular cost of a mammogram which is a lose-dose x-ray of the breast.

"Previously, the most calls received was during Los Angeles'

project last spring which prompted 30,000 calls. We received more than 30,000 calls in Dallas alone," Peters said.

"Our goal has been to make screening mammography the Pap test of the 80s," Peters said. "We want all women to be aware of the importance of this early detection technique. It may save your life, and your breast," he said.

### Sales tax biggest source of revenue

Sales taxes represent the biggest source of tax revenue in Texas, and by a big margin.

In the first six months of the current fiscal year, the state collected \$2.15 billion in sales taxes.

Next biggest was motor fuel taxes, which produced \$517.7 million.

Sales taxes accounted for more than half of the state's \$4.26 billion tax income.

# Children's snacks can be nutritious

Children always seem hungry and ready for a snack. When their hunger strikes, don't panic. Snacks are a perfect way to give them a little extra nutrition.

"Fresh fruits, celery, carrot sticks and cheese are just a few ideas for some good nutritious snacks," says Marilyn Haggard, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M Extension Service. "They don't take much more time to prepare than other types of snacks and they're much better for children."

Other good ideas for nutritious snacks are popcorn, dairy products, small sandwiches and any of the variety of crackers, muffins and

bread. Since as much as one-fourth of their day's calories come from snacks, it's important to watch what children eat.

"Children will eat whatever food is around. The best way to keep them from eating junk foods is to keep more nutritious snacks in the house," the specialist says.

"A bit of dip on vegetables and fruits may make them more attractive. Just be careful not to give the child too much because dips often are high in fat and salt content," says Haggard.

When feeding small children, be

careful about the size of the portion served. The specialist says they need snacks made to a size they can handle, and shouldn't be given round, hard or slippery pieces of food that they can choke on. Peanut butter may also be a little too difficult for small children to eat.

"Snack times may be hard to enforce, especially if a parent isn't around, but they can be a good idea.

Appointing a certain time as snack time may keep children from eating too close to meal time," she says.

Haggard adds, "It's important to set good eating habits early on. If children are encouraged to eat nutritious snacks they will learn to like those tastes and are more likely to continue to enjoy those foods throughout their lives.

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

# Bill relaxes needs for poison sprayers

State Rep. Rick Perry (D-Haskell) joined State Sen. Buster Brown of Lake Jackson in passing SB 11216 which allows herbicide and pesticide applicators an alternative to hard-to-get liability insurance.

The bill is now on its way to the Governor for his signature.

"Throughout our state the herbicide and pesticide applicators are being driven out of business," said Perry. "The inavailability of insurance as required by statute has forced many of these small businessmen to close their doors. This legislation gives them other alternatives to addressing financial responsibility."

The new bill provides applicators with alternatives to insurance, such as letters of credit or certificates of deposit without limiting their civil or criminal liability.

The Texas Herbicide and Pesticide Laws require commercial applicators to carry financial security for drift damage and injuries to individuals. The Texas Department of Agriculture may not issue a license to an

applicator who does not show proof of financial security through an insurance policy or a bond.

Some time back, insurance companies began withdrawing from the market. Financial security bonds are not available.

"We have worked out a way to keep the applicators in business and have them remain financially responsible," said Perry.

## Lessens pain

Here's a whip that actually may lessen pain--sea whip.

Scientists have extracted a new class of painkilling and anti-inflammatory drugs from this Caribbean soft coral. According to International Wildlife magazine, the new substances are more potent than commonly prescribed anti-inflammatory drugs. They also relieve pain at least as well as morphine but without its narcotic and addictive side effects. The drugs may one day be used to treat such diseases as arthritis.

Also, changing or cleaning filters once a month will help the system cool more efficiently, thus saving additional energy.

# Dairy products contain riboflavin

Everyone knows that dairy products are important because they supply calcium. But fewer people realize that we also depend on dairy products for more than 36 percent of our riboflavin. Meats and grain products are the next largest supplier of this essential nutrient.

Getting riboflavin in foods and keeping it there are two different matters. The nutrient is heat stable, but is sensitive to light. So, for example, riboflavin is lost from milk when it is exposed to ultraviolet light. The greater the light source, the longer the milk is exposed to light, the higher the temperature of milk during storage and the lower the fat content, the greater the loss of riboflavin from milk.

Also, some people may need more riboflavin than others. Diseases such as thyroid disorders, diabetes, heart disease and chronic alcoholism can lead to a deficiency. Recent studies also show that an increase in physical activity raises the requirement for riboflavin in young women--especially those who are overweight and trying to reduce.

# Women have unique nutritional needs

Women have unique health and nutrition requirements which warrant special attention.

An American Dietetic Task Force responded to this demand with 14 nutrition recommendations for women. "Good nutrition for women of all ages is extremely important, and its need is becoming increasingly evident," says Mary Kinney Sweeten, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M Extension Service.

"These recommendations incorporate a healthy woman's special needs and can also help improve how she eats now and in the future," said Sweeten.

The task force formulated the recommendations by encompassing and building upon the 1985 Dietary

Guidelines for Americans developed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

- Eat a daily variety of foods from all major food groups.
- Maintain healthy body weight.
- Exercise regularly.
- Reduce total fat to no more than one-third of daily calories.
- Include at least one-half of daily calories from carbohydrates.
- Eat three to four daily servings of calcium-rich foods.
- Eat plenty of iron-rich foods.
- Reduce intake of salt and sodium-containing foods.
- Eat foods for necessary nutrients, using vitamin and mineral supplements only under specific circumstances.
- If you drink, limit alcohol intake to one to two drinks daily.
- Avoid smoking.
- Change diet, exercises, and other health promotional behaviors to correspond with an individual's own identified risk factors.
- If you have questions about the adequacy of your diet, consult a registered dietitian or contact your county extension agent.

Sweeten adds: "A woman's knowledge of nutrition is extremely important to her growing family and herself, now and in the future. These recommendations will help her meet nutrient needs during every period of her life."

# Sunbathing: Fry now, pay later

Haskell, Texas, May 28, 1987

The fast approach of summer is bringing sunbathers out in droves in search of the "golden tan." What these people may not know is that they may pay dearly for their now bronze skin when they get older.

Texas A&M health education specialist Dr. Mary Ann Heussner says, "Frequent exposure to the sun's ultraviolet rays may lead to skin cancer. The earlier you are exposed to the sun and the more often you are in it, the greater your chances are of getting skin cancer."

Certain people are more predisposed to skin cancer, says Heussner. Those with fair skin and those who freckle easily are more likely to get the disease than those who have more pigment in their skin. The more pigment in the skin, the more natural blockage from the sun's rays the skin contains.

"Early detection is very important with any type of cancer," the specialist warns. "Lesions on the skin can be removed fairly easily if they are caught in their early stages. Look for any change of coloration or texture of your skin, or any raised surfaces. These may be the beginning of skin cancer and should be treated immediately."

According to the American Cancer Society, 90 percent of all skin cancers happen on body parts that usually aren't covered by clothing. Common places for skin cancer to occur are on the forearms, ears, face and hands.

"The best cure for skin cancer is prevention," she says. "Stay out of the sun when its rays are the hottest, usually from about 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. If you must be outside during that time, wear enough clothing to protect your skin. Any exposed areas should be covered with sunblock, with more sensitive skinned people and children using the highest degree of sunblock possible."

Heussner adds, "People in the Sun Belt are especially susceptible to skin cancer because they are exposed to the sun so many months of the year."
