A bid of \$43,500 by Karr Tuckpointing of Texarkana for repairs at Haskell's two school buildings was accepted by the School Board during its meeting last Tuesday.

The contract calls for removal and replacement of defective bricks, sealing and caulking defective joints, rebuilding some expansion joints, waterproofing, restoration of portions of foundations and replacement of tile.

The Board also accepted a bid of \$1,500 from J. C. Amburn for some interior finishing work at the elementary school. In a separate agreement, Amburn was authorized to install ventilating fans in the big gymnasium and do some wiring in the computer and typing labs.

In addition to these physical improvements, the Board authorized the superintendent to advertise for bids for re-roofing of the Home Ec Cottage.

In other action, the Board:

- Adopted a school calendar for next term, which shows school beginning on Tuesday, Sept. 1, and ending on May 31. (There will be no holiday for Labor Day.)

- Approved the request of an Old Glory student to transfer to school in Haskell.

- Approved Title I and Title II applications dealing with compensatory reading (\$60,000) and library acquisitions (approximately \$6,000).

- Approved the inter-local agreement to continue participation in the Haskell-Knox special education consortium.

- Reviewed a number of Board policies, making adjustments to comply with provisions of HB 72.

- Approved the contracts for Gerald McCoy, secondary school principal,

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Methodists to have new pastor

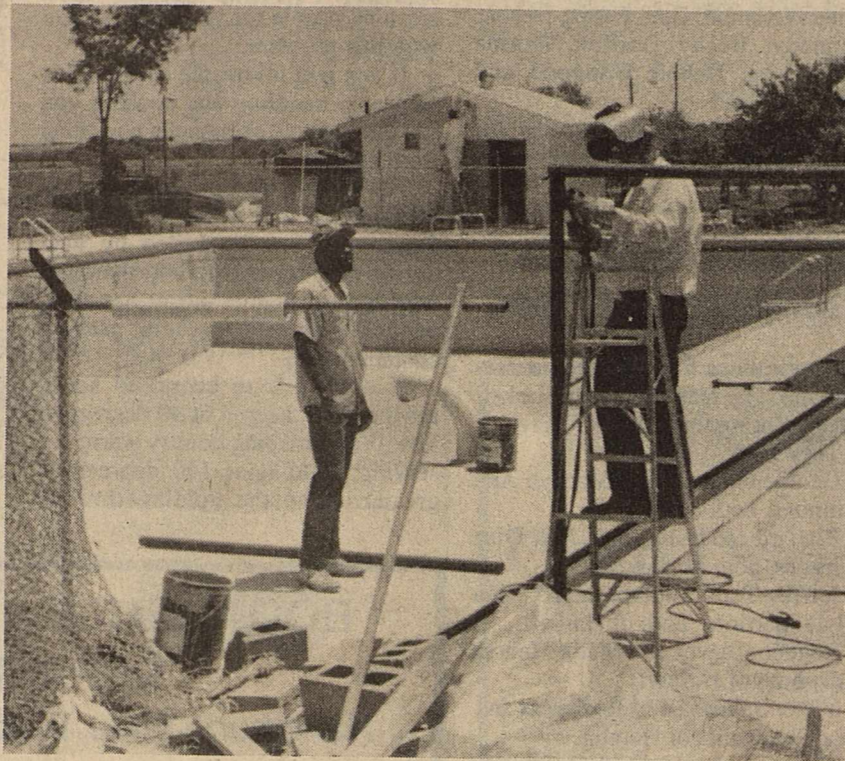
The Rev. Kenneth Kirk of Vega has been named pastor of the Methodist churches of Haskell and Paint Creek.

Nearly 400 at reunion

Old schoolmates gather

On May 30, almost 400 ex-students and teachers of country schools of Haskell County (1887-1947) met in the Civic Center for a reunion and for remembering.

The teachers had fond memories of the many children they taught, and were happy to see and talk with many of their former pupils.

As young children, the students had been accustomed to doing small chores on the farm before and after school each day. They were told by their parents that they were to be polite to the teachers, to behave in the classroom and to prepare their lessons well. Parents showed their interest in the pupils' education by seeing that they were in school, except when ill, even though they might live far from school.

As a result of their experiences they, as adults, reflect their upbringing. They are hardy, responsible, hard-working people. They have gone to war, built churches and better schools. They have educated their children and participated as good citizens in the affairs of their communities and country.

Mrs. Bobbie Alley Wood, Olive Ramsey Leonard, Velma Frierson Campbell, Neliie Sorenson, Willie Berryhill and Patsie Cox registered 347 ex-students, plus their spouses and visitors.

Folks registered from Colorado, Tennessee, Louisiana, Missouri, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona and from all over Texas. Some brought their travel trailers, and some stayed in Haskell, Rule and Stamford motels. It was remarked that our mode of travel now is much faster and more comfortable than the horse and buggy days of the first 30 years of this century.

The first country school in Haskell County was Cook Springs in 1887, located by a spring given by George Cook in the eastern part of the county. Water was even then a more precious commodity than now.

All of us were older and some were heavier and some even carried a cane, but all were happy to see old friends. There were some octogenarians like Jerry Harrell, Foster school, and Middle Norman Lees, Pinkerton, 1902. Anybody who attended Pinkerton had to be 80.

C. B. Ramsey from Tennessee, popular teacher in Roberts and Midway schools, was present to visit with former pupils and teachers, Mary Mancil Holden and Dorothy Hankins Jones.

Circus coming June 12-13

Few can remember the last time a circus was in Haskell.

The "Olde Tyme American Circus" will be here on Friday and Saturday, June 12-13, performing once on Friday, at 7:30 p.m., and twice on Saturday, at 4 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. The big tent will be located at the fairgrounds on the area west of the rodeo grounds.

The circus is being sponsored by the Haskell Chamber of Commerce, with a triple purpose: (1) to provide wholesome family entertainment, (2) to attract visitors to Haskell and increase retail trade, and (3) to raise operation funds for the Chamber to supplement membership dues.

Tickets are available at the Chamber office and from all members

of the Chamber Board of Directors and Welcoming Committee.

A considerable savings is offered through purchase of advance tickets at \$4 for adults and \$2 for children. Tickets purchased at the gate will be \$1 more.

The 90-minute entertainment event will include acrobats, aerialists, clowns, comedy car and performing animals. Camel and elephant rides at \$2 per child will be available one hour before show times.

The circus has been described as a step into the past with a flare for the future. In the past 10 years it has performed in Japan, Hong Kong, Canada, Europe and the United States, including the Prince Ranier Circus Festival in Monte Carlo.

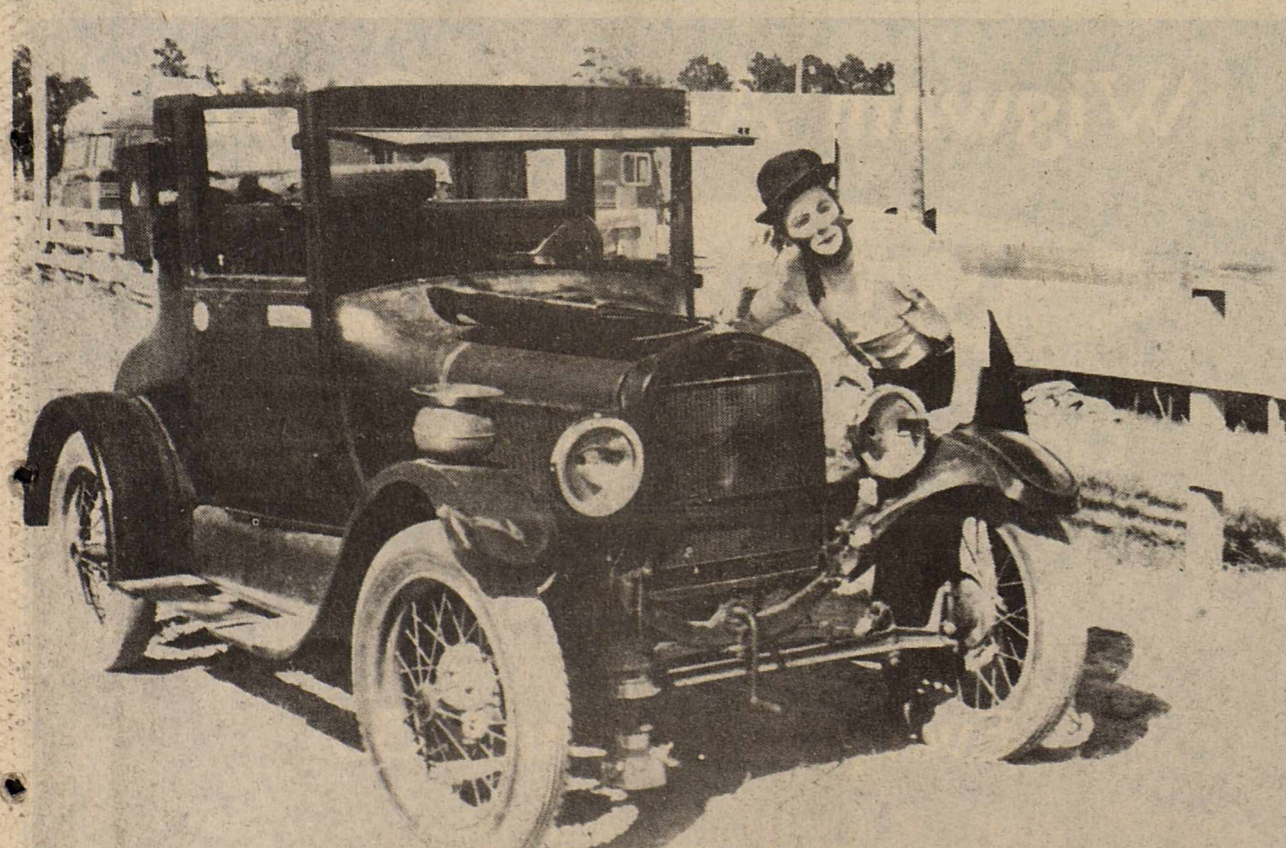
Nearer to Haskell it has performed at Canton, Wylie, Frisco, Azle,

Berryville, Eastland, Greenville and Lewisville, and is scheduled to be in Dallas the week following the Haskell appearance.

Several of these cities had the circus there last year and are repeating visits this year. The Chamber has called some of these cities and has heard such favorable comments as "we recommend it highly", "very clean", "a good show", "no problems", "good relationship" and "well attended".

Simple procedures make poultry safe

Since the release of some media features recently concerning the processing of poultry, I have received numerous negative comments about eating poultry, as well as questions concerning its safety.

I want to warn you not to be unduly alarmed by some of the information you have been hearing and reading concerning salmonella food poisoning in poultry. This problem has been with us for a long time. Reliable sources, such as the County Extension Service, have been teaching people for years how to live with this problem.

If you will follow the simple rules of proper handling and cooking you can easily avoid salmonella poisoning from poultry.

All animal food products contain bacteria of one form or another. Salmonella can be killed by heat during proper cooking and thorough washing of hands after handling uncooked meat can help prevent contamination.

If poultry is to be stored under refrigeration, keep it at 40 degrees or less. When keeping poultry warm for serving, hold it at 140 degrees or greater. Keep the holding time of

poultry between 40 and 140 degrees to an absolute minimum.

The work area for handling both raw and cooked poultry should be kept as clean as possible. Also, every effort should be made to prevent cross-contamination or re-contamination of fully cooked poultry meat with raw meat or bacteria from raw meat. Never use a cutting board, platter, knife or other utensil or container that has been previously used for raw poultry meat without completely cleaning with soap and hot water prior to using it to handle or store cooked poultry meat.

For more information on proper preparation and storage of poultry products, contact the County Extension office.

State remains without budget

AUSTIN—Texas government is budgetless, and how we get ourselves out of this predicament is the Capitol's favorite guessing game.

Technically, lawmakers have a little less than two months to forge a budget in special session, since Comptroller Bob Bullock must certify the new budget by August. When will the governor call it? When he feels confident his 56 Republican House members are harnessed to stay hitched to his veto wagon.

As long as they stay hitched, they will control the budget session. The other issues have gotten their attention, and now in this single-issue session, the rules of the game will change.

Clements Vows Firmness

The excitement will come from watching a 'first' in Texas history. A Republican governor is positioned against the might of a Democratic legislature accustomed to running the show. This collision will be heard across the nation.

rhetoric left at the door, one's real heart emerges.

It's tough to walk back out the door and oppose your group, no matter which side you're on. No good deed goes unpunished.

But there have always been lawmakers, a handful at a time, who dare to go against the grain. This summer, whether it's Republicans or Democrats who bolt on this issue, they will make the difference.

Constitution Squeezed

Suppose lawmakers come back into special session, burning up the days in conference committee and then hand the governor a tax bill just before August.

Clements vetoes it. The new biennium comes, and we enter in the red. Crack! The sacred altar of pay-as-you-go will be in the balance.

The Constitution of Texas will be dangling over the crevice of brinkmanship, even if we do keep issuing cash management notes, such as were approved last week by Clements and the Democrats.

Campaign Fodder

Things, of course, will work out. Our Legislature isn't going to abandon the Ship of State with no money.

But no matter the outcome of the session, the political scene here will be altered.

After the hoopla dies down, even the most casual voter in Texas will see political parties here more closely divided among conservative-liberal lines. If you're for taxes, you're a Democrat; if you're against them, you're a Republican.

Certainly this tax vote will be the fodder for next campaign season. If the economy is still depressed a year from now, the voters can decide again the age-old question: In hard times, is it best for government to spend money or tighten the belt?

Texas' overworked legislators don't have a year. They've just got a couple of months to make up their minds.

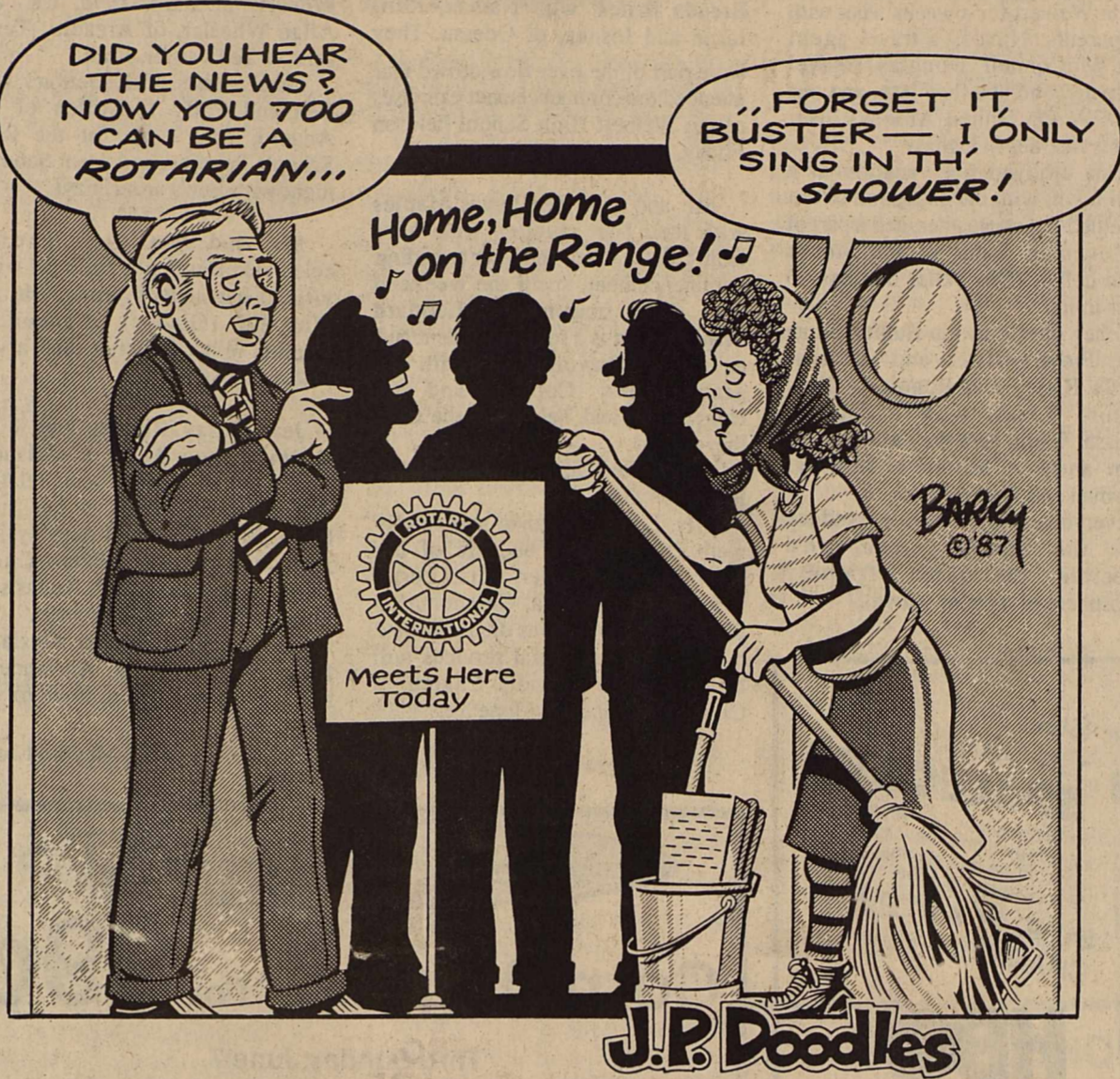

Sam Herren, weather recorder, said the May rains brought the 1987 total to date to 13.01 inches, well above the 8.82 normal.

Temperatures during the month ranged from a low of 51 degrees on May 4 to a high of 94 degrees on May 2.

From the Files of The Haskell Free Press

(Free Press, May 31, 1962)

A tornado, followed by high winds and a severe hail and rainstorm which struck Haskell Saturday night, caused property damage estimated at more than \$3 million and which may run as high as \$5 million. Miraculously, there was no loss of life and no serious injuries despite the fact that several business buildings and numerous residences were completely demolished and debris scattered over an area extending as far as 10 miles east.

It was the worst storm to hit this town of 4,500 since June 1909, old time residents declared, when five lives were lost and widespread devastation caused.

The storm struck at 8:55 p.m. Transmission lines of West Texas Utilities Co. were levelled just north of town, and both electrical and telephone service was disrupted when the storm hit. Electric service was partially restored in the business section within a few hours, and telephone service to outside points was restored about 11:30 a.m. Sunday.

The fact that there was no loss of life nor serious injuries was credited to warning given through cooperation of members of the Highway Patrol, Sheriff's Department, City Police and members of the volunteer fire department who kept watch on threatening clouds.

When the tornado was spotted moving toward Haskell, firemen raced through all sections of town in cars equipped with mobile warning devices, alerting residents to the tornado danger.

Observers described the tornado as three-pronged. One funnel dipped down in the southwest part of town, another west, and another northwest, they said. Some watchers thought they saw a fourth funnel dip to the ground.

Tormadic winds, hail and heavy rains accompanied the twisters, with winds estimated at 80 to 100 miles per hour.

Rainfall during the storm was estimated at two inches or more, with many gauges in downtown Haskell reported broken, making accurate measuring impossible.

Government weather observer Sam Herren said, "My gauge measured 1.26 inch, but the wind was so high I don't know how much I really got."

Heaviest single loss was on the elementary school building where the south and north wings of the block-long structure were demolished. These sections contained some 14 to 16 classrooms, Principal H. T. Wilkinson said. Portions of the modern building left standing likely sustained structural damage. Replacement cost on the school plant may run as high as \$300,000, Supt. R. R. King estimated.

Moving east from the school area, the storm levelled the building housing H-C Machine Shop two blocks south of the square, and caused heavy damage to expensive equipment.

Across the street, Bill Wilson Motor Co. was partially unroofed. The plate glass front of the large building was shattered permitting driving rain and hail to flood the salesrooms and other sections of the building with consequent damage to new and used cars inside the structure.

Further south, the dome of the Assembly of God Church was blown off and the structure partially unroofed.

The First Christian Church, one and one-half blocks west and north of the courthouse square, was partially unroofed and parts of the brick walls were blown down, weakening the roof and entire structure to a dangerous extent.

One-half block nearer the square, the east roof of Bailey Toliver Chevrolet Co. collapsed, damaging a number of new cars. Other sections of the roof were ripped and shattered.

Four cotton and grain warehouses of sheet metal construction, located in southeast and northeast sections of town were demolished with the twisted and battered metal sheets being scattered over a wide area.

In the downtown business section, the glass fronts of Frazier Radio & Appliance and the adjoining Perry Bros. Store were blown out.

On the third floor of the courthouse west wing, all windows were shattered and the west end of the ceiling was blown upward for several inches by the force of the wind.

All windows on the second floor of the Neely Building on the northeast corner of the square were shattered, and wind-driven rain caused extensive damage to merchandise stored there by the Neely Department Store downstairs.

Also, several windows in the second floor of the City Hall were shattered by hail, with resultant damage to the living quarters of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Lusk.

The high wind also blew down a section of the west wall of the Pierson Building on the northwest corner of the square, which had been left standing after the Ben Franklin Store burned several weeks ago.

A tile building being built to house an automatic dry cleaning plant and laundry several blocks west of the square, complete except for the roof, was flattened by the tornado, and the Pittman Grocery nearby was partially unroofed.

Roof of the Haskell County Hospital was heavily damaged, and the basement was flooded with about a foot of water, Administrator Hallie Chapman said, and there was damage to walls and windows of the building.

Also in that area, windows in the west side of the State Highway Department warehouse were shattered.

One of the heaviest losers in the storm was Kennedy Lumber Co. in east Haskell, where several buildings were unroofed or demolished.

All windows in the west side of the Wichita Valley depot were broken by hail, and the roof of the building damaged.

Awning at the Brazelton Lumber Co. a block east of the square was

ripped away and several lumber sheds partially unroofed.

A plate glass window in C&B Department Store on the east side of the square was shattered, with heavy water damage resulting.

Considerable damage from water also resulted at Lane Felker's after the roof of the store had been ripped by the storm.

A sheet metal warehouse belonging to Jones Cox & Co. southwest of the square was partially demolished and the entire structure heavily damaged.

A plate glass front in the building occupied by Ark Allred Radiator Shop was blown out, apparently the result of vacuum created by the tornado.

Eagle Courts on the north outskirts of town were completely demolished, although nearby residence quarters escaped heavy damage. The motel was unoccupied.

Heaviest residential damage was to homes in the north and northwest parts of town where between 15 and 20 homes were completely demolished and hundreds of others heavily damaged.

However, damage was extensive on homes in all sections of the city, with garages and other small buildings being levelled.

It is estimated that virtually every residence in town received some damage from the storm.

Television antennas throughout the city were broken and twisted.

Aside from building damage, heavy loss was suffered by homeowners in the destruction of shade trees throughout the city. Limbs were broken and twisted and large trees uprooted on almost every block in the residential sections. In some instances, streets and highways were completely blocked by fallen trees. Long time residents declared they had never seen such widespread destruction of trees and shrubbery.

Greenhouse of the Haskell Florists was completely demolished, and at Conner Nursery and Floral, glass was shattered in all their buildings.

Haskell residents had several uneasy hours Monday when a severe weather warning was issued for this area. A hard shower brought .30 inch of rain, but no storm conditions developed.

More than a score of insurance adjusters began streaming into Haskell Sunday and Monday and have been working almost continuously since on the tedious job of settling claims.

It is estimated that possibly 90 percent of the business and residential structures in Haskell received some damage from the storm. In the business section, particularly, virtually every building had roof damage to some extent.

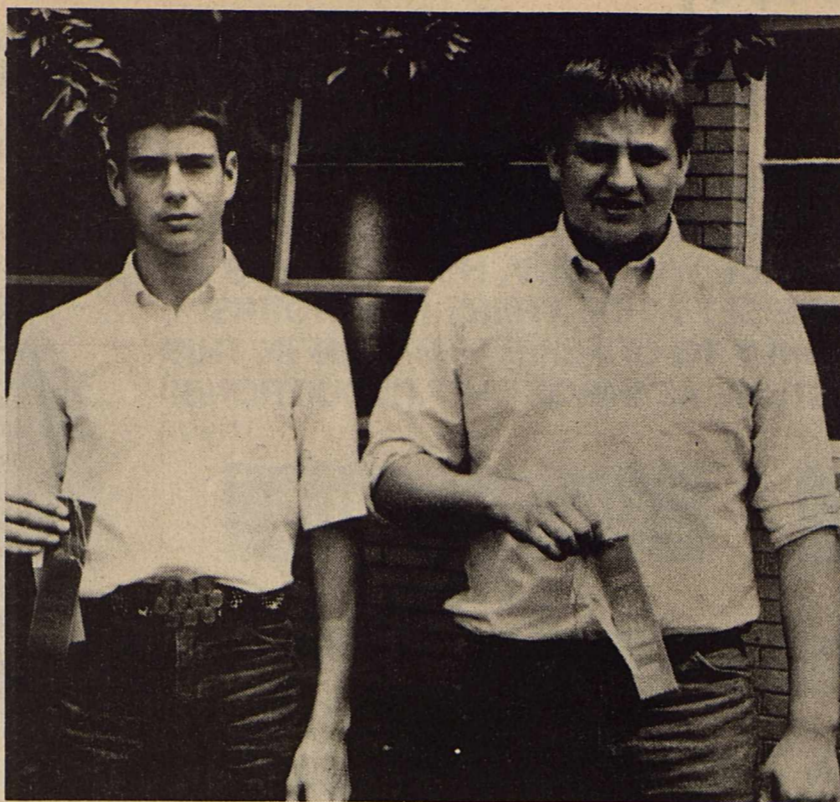
Roundup activities will begin with

TAX PLANNING

REPORTING REAL ESTATE TRANSACTIONS

The new tax law requires that certain real estate transactions be reported to the Internal Revenue Service. The temporary regulations issued by the Internal Revenue Service specify the following:

- * The regulations shall apply to transactions closing after December 31, 1986. However, no penalty will be imposed with respect to transactions with dates of closing before May 4, 1987.
- * Reporting is required only on a sale or exchange of one-to-four-family real estate.
- * The reporting requirements do not apply to corporate and government transferees (sellers).
- * If a Uniform Settlement Statement is used for the closing, the person listed as the settlement agent on that statement is considered the "broker" under IRS regulations and is, therefore, responsible for reporting the transaction. If such uniform statement is not used, then the "broker" can be any of several parties connected with the transaction. The regulations specify the succession of responsibility.
- * The temporary regulations provide that the participants in a transaction may designate a person as the real estate "broker" if such person is a party to the transaction.
- * If a broker reports 250 transactions or more for a calendar year, the filing with the IRS must be done on magnetic media (500 for 1987 with special waiver). The IRS filing is due by February 28 of the following year.

The IRS anticipates that additional regulations will be published governing the reporting of transactions for other than residential property.

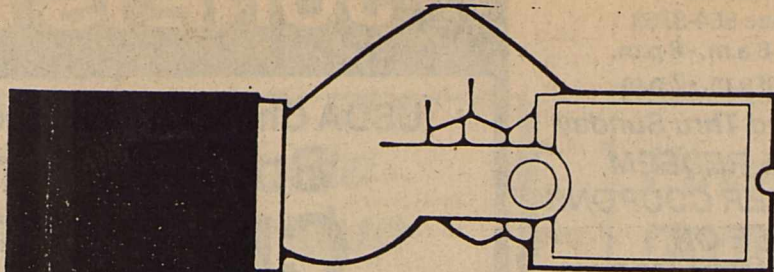


