'O+' call service available

Customers of General Telephone

Co. may now make "O+" calls. These calls allow the caller to make credit card, third-party, personto-person and collect calls without operator assistance when dialing.

To place an O+ call, a caller simply dials O plust the area code (if different), plus the number. When the operator asks, the caller informs the operator of the service wanted, such as person-to-person, third number, collect or credit card.

For multi-party customers, the operator will come on the line, after the dialing process, to acquire the dialing customer's number, and remain on line to provide assistance for specially handled calls.

For one-party customers, the operator will not require the calling, party's number as it will be recorded automatically. Operator assistance will not be required on calling card calls, except on party-line service. Commissioner says

Natural gas shortage looms

State Railroad Commissioner John Sharp expressed grave concern over the state's supply of natural gas when he made a tour stop in Haskell Friday morning.

Unless something can be done to make it profitable for independents to drill gas wells, there is going to be a crisis next winter, the commissioner warned.

Sharp stopped here for a visit with an old Texas A&M roommate, State Rep. Rick Perry, enroute to Abilene where he was to address the Rotary Club at noon.

The commissioner said that independents drill nearly 90 percent of the gas wells in Texas. Drilling has

been sharply curtailed during the current energy recession, to the point "we have less deliverability than we did when the 1983 crisis hit," said Sharp.

The commissioner said several solutions are being proposed, but there will be no real answer to the problem until the price of gas reaches the point where it can be produced profitably. "Consumers like inexpensive gas, but the only place consumption comes before production is in the dictionary," he quipped.

One proposal is one which would make it mandatory that new gas wells be hooked up to pipelines. "Right now, it's pretty 'iffy' that a producer can get hooked up and sell his gas,"

said Sharp.

Several changes in the rules governing gas production also are being considered as incentives to increase production.

Sharp was a prime backer of the recently enacted deregulation of intrastate trucking. As Railroad Commissioner, he also has responsibilities in pipeline regulation, rail safety, water quality and oil and gas rates.


Sharp, from Victoria, was elected to office last November and began his first term as Railroad Commissioner in January. Prior to that he served four years in the State Senate and four years in the State House of Representatives.







Work on budget not going well

AUSTIN-John Hill, chief justice of the Texas Supreme Court, returned from China last week to find two of his justices, publicly disciplined two weeks ago, enmeshed in turmoil.

While Hill said he wouldn't ask Justices C.L. Ray and Bill Kilgarlin to resign, State Sen. Frank Tejeda said he will push a resolution to probe charges of judicial impropriety by the pair.

Meanwhile, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Speaker Gib Lewis said they will appoint a 15-member panel to study judicial reform in general. So far, they haven't responded to House Republicans who want to consider impeachment of the two Democratic justices.

Hobby and Lewis have more important things on their minds right now. Some lawmakers have publicly criticized them, along with Gov. Bill Clements, for the Legislature's failure to adopt a state budget during the regular session.

Budget All-Important

Right now, for them and Texas, the budget is all-important.

This special session cannot fail to adopt at least a one-year budget. Too little time is left to allow the



type of political games that were played in the regular session. In fact, those who seem to know the rules say the budget decision was postponed to separate it, and save it, from the inevitable polit-

ical maneuvering.

be raised two percent.

Those attending the meeting said that several new taxes were discussed, including state income and corporate taxes. Apparently no one suggested cutting the budget to meet current revenue levels.

Burden on Lewis, House

The governor immediately responded by adding a ban on state income taxes to the special session agenda.

Thus, the special session opened last week with Clements and Hobby unchanged in their positions and poles apart.

The burden of compromise falls on the shoulders of Lewis and the House leadership, Democrats and Republicans alike, to come up with a state budget for Texas.

Bills Signed

Clements continued to sign bills into law, including a repeal of the sales tax on newspaper and magazine subscriptions.

He also signed a pro-business package which creates a state department of commerce, partially deregulates the trucking industry and rewrites civil justice laws.


• Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro last week told Congress that ships use the Gulf of Mexico daily as a garbage disposal, causing tons of refuse to wash ashore.

A high-ranking Navy official promised that the U.S. Navy fleet would not participate in such pollution.

Mauro said some 20,000 ships docked in Texas last year and only 90 turned in any garbage at port. The rest dumped their waste at sea, costing the state about \$14 million to clean up.

• Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox accused airlines of practicing "bait-and-switch" advertising and asked consumers to send in complaints. He alleged airlines are advertising discounted fares but not making an adequate number of seats available.

Airline officials strongly denied the allegation. They will meet with Mattox to discuss consumer com-



Of the volumes of "publicity" releases promoting TV programs which cross this desk weekly, the only one I ever read is the one which comes from KERA (Dallas). On July 1, for instance, the seven major Democratic candidates for president will face each other in a live debate on public TV. Republican candidates will square off on Sept. 2. But not in Haskell. It's a shame.

Sometimes words just don't come out right. Under the "Good Morning" column in Wednesday's Abilene Reporter-News was this example: "If you're around Clyde this morning, you might stop in at the Bailey Funeral Home and say hello to Frank Bailey. . ." The story went on to say that, fellow citizens were honoring Bailey with a reception in recognition of his 40 years in the funeral business in Clyde.

So far, work on the budget hasn't been going all that well. The House Appropriations Committee, unable to agree on cuts, went home last week and left chairman Jim Rudd to make about \$ 1 billion in cuts by himself over the weekend.

That act was remarkable, not only for the displayed trust in Rudd, a conservative Democrat, but for the gesture of throwing the ball back into the leadership's lap.

The committee won't necessarily rubber stamp the results, but it gives the leadership a chance to write its case.

Two Percent Hike

This version may well wind up being the form for the new budget. Lewis and the House have been caught from the start between Clements with his no new tax stance and Hobby and the Senate's pro-tax program.

Last week, Hobby met with some 50 business leaders and afterwards said all state taxes might plaints.
