A panel of extension specialists will report on results of a study of intensified wheat-stocker operations in the Rolling Plains. Panelists v

Just call him 'Lucky'

Lucky with Jason Shaw

Blind poodle has loving home

He goes by the name of "Lucky" and no name for man or beast was ever more appropriate.

Lucky is a 6-year-old apricot miniature poodle which has become a part of the family of Randy and Lisa Shaw and their two sons, Jason, 5, and A. J., 1.

But he's not just an ordinary miniature poodle. Lucky was born blind and was ticketed for immediate annihilation when the soft-hearted Shaws rescued him from his impending fate.

Six years ago, before the children were born, Randy and Lisa were interested in obtaining a poodle since the two they owned were getting up

It was then that Lisa's brother and

his wife, Danny and Rheasa Stocks, then of Abilene, called and told them that an Abilene veterinarian had delivered a litter of poodles and one of them was blind. "He's going to put it to sleep," they said.

Without hesitating, the Shaws told the Stockses they wanted the puppy. When Danny and Rheasa came to Haskell for a football game that week, they delivered the dog to the Shaws. He's been part of the family

To someone who doesn't know the story, Lucky is just an ordinary miniature poodle. He gets around the yard and house with ease, barks at strangers and follows the kids around. Lisa said a neighbor didn't know for a year that Lucky is blind.

An early handicap was eliminated

when Randy built a ramp from the ground to the porch. Until then, Lucky would climb the three steps to the porch, but he couldn't get back down. "We would come home and find him 'trapped' on the porch," Lisa says. The ramp has solved this problem.

The dog's senses are so keen that he will follow the Shaws to the backyard fence, but when they open the gate he won't go through, obviously not knowing that there is an opening.

Although he stays outside most of the time, he is permitted in the house on occasion. His senses have memorized the locations of the various rooms, doors and walls to the point that he can roam around the house just like any other dog, Only

time he has trouble is when something is out of place, like a tricycle in the middle of the floor, Lisa said.

The two poodles the Shaws owned when they got Lucky have since died, but the Shaws believe their presence when Lucky was young did a lot to help educate him. Though he has no canine companions, Lucky has a loyal friend in "Amos", the latest in a number of cats the Shaws have had since Lucky arrived.

And he has the love of a couple of proud owners and a couple of kids who wouldn't think of trading him for

the finest thoroughbred. Just call him lucky. Make that Deena Jo Walker and Richard Lee Hacker were united in marriage at 7 p.m. Saturday, July 25, in a doublering ceremony at the First Baptist Church in Weinert.



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Commentary

Texas politics will never be the same

the Legislature should let Bob Slagle and George Strake, who respectively lead Texas Democrats and Republicans, mud-wrestle for the tax bill on the House floor.

Another said, the "good ol' boy" system (non-partisan) died in the House last week, probably never to be resurrected. Instead, the House will one day soon divide on party lines like the U.S. Congress.

In the wake of the fierce special session which produced the largest state tax hike in the nation's history, Texas government and Texas politics will never be the same again.


And the key ingredient is an angry voter backlash. Does it really exist? Will it rise across the state or just in pockets?

Cooler heads say the voters accepted new taxes long before the drawn-out legislative battle was over.

The state's tax collector, Comptroller Bob Bullock, estimated the average Texan will pay about \$63 a year more in new taxes. But local governments aren't through with their budgets and taxes will probably rise on the local level.

Texas 43rd

And while lawmakers fear a backlash from angry voters, Texas



has only risen from 48th to 43rd among states in per-capita taxation. And that's after what one legislator called "the largest tax bill in the free world, outside of Congress."

Some players tried to claim a victory, but House Speaker Gib Lewis probably summed it up best: "No one got what they wanted."

A tired, wounded Gov. Bill Clements said the GOP had won a victory by stopping growth, even though spending was not reduced.

Clements and White

In a session of bitter pills for all, his was the bitterest. For in the end, he signed the tax bill he promised to veto, doing just what he had despised his defeated nemesis, former Gov. Mark White, for doing.

On one hand, their fates were not the same. White hadn't been in office two months before he reversed himself on taxes and initiated the fight to raise them.

Clements surrendered to the Legislature only after a bitter partisan fight that lasted seven

And on the other hand, both Clements and White learned, like many a governor before them, that

under the Texas system the will of the Legislature prevails over the governor every time.

Republican Muscle

The House Republicans flexed more muscle this session than ever before, forcing the Democrats to resort to some of the trickiest maneuvering seen.

Included in the emerging leadership are Gerald Geistweidt of Mason, Mike Toomey and Ashley Smith of Houston, and old pros Terrell Smith of Austin, Bill Ceverha of Dallas and Tom Craddick of Midland.

Before it was over, they forced the Democrats to remove the socalled "Doomsday Amendment" which gutted anti-tax districts, and they forced the tax hike to be taken in two votes which attempted to camouflage GOP support for the tax.

GOP Plan

Thus, Texas Republicans positioned themselves to maintain their anti-tax posture, and that's how they will run come election time. And they can hardly wait.

Their stated goal is to gain 10 to 12 seats in the '88 election, which brings them in range of electing a speaker from their party.

They particularly want control by '90, when the Legislature will begin to redistrict the state.

Democratic Plan

The Democratic plan is not as clearly stated, although they certainly want to re-elect their members by claiming they maintained public education and services.

Many House Democrats are disappointed with their party leadership, which includes Lewis and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby.

Frankly, party chairman Slagle has never been very popular among House Democrats. And. just as frankly, Slagle has never lost much sleep over it.

The black caucus voted against the tax bill out of anger at Speaker Lewis, and word from the Mexican-American caucus is they're displeased, too. Such anger may just fizzle out.

Democrats who stood out include Dan Morales, Stan Schlueter Dudley Harrison, Bruce Gibson, Jim Rudd, Paul Colbert, and Eddie Cavazos.

Mattox Fundraising

A recent mail-out inviting folks to an appreciation dinner for Attorney General Jim Mattox included more than 1,000 sponsors, as impressive an array of Democratic supporters seen in a long

Not all will side with Mattox in a gubernatorial race against Hobby, but the length of the list certainly gives pause to anyone doubting Mattox's organizational strength.

Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington



Anyone who has attended the State Fair, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and the Cotton Bowl, to name just a few of our state's big events, can tell you that big crowds are nothing new to Texas. We're good at handling these hundreds of thousands of people, and I ex-

pect the same to be true when Pope John Paul II visits San Antonio this September. The Papal visit could, in fact, be the largest single gathering of people in the history of our state. But despite the best efforts of local organizers, an overdrawn federal

regulation almost made it impossible for thousands of people to participate in this event. A number of other religious and secular organizations inform me that this recently implemented regulation also threatens their transportation programs. The intent of the Urban Mass Transportation Administration regula-

tion is to protect the owners of private bus companies from unfair competition by public transit systems that receive federal funds. The effect is that if you have a private bus operator who wants to provide

service to an event-even if he only has one bus-then public transit systems cannot charter their buses for that event, What does this mean for the Pope's visit? That San Antonio's VIA

Transit Authority couldn't use its 400-plus buses or buses from other parts

I cannot believe that is the purpose of UMTA's regulations. Nor was it the intent of any federal legislation I am aware of.

And that's what I told Transportation Secretary Elizabeth Dole and UMTA officials when I asked them to grant an exemption for the Pope's

Secretary Dole called several days later to inform me that she had granted the exemption. That was good news for the Pope's visit-and her prompt action makes the organizers' task much easier. Now, with that immediate obstacle cleared, we have to rewrite these reg-

ulations. I have pointed reservations about them. If my mail is any indication, so do a number of Texans. I have heard from various denominations-Baptists, Catholics, Episco-

palians, Methodists, Presbyterians and others-who oppose the regula-

I also have heard from rural communities and public interest, non-profit organizations who fear what this dramatic change in policy means for

their transportation programs. These widespread concerns and the trouble this overregulation already has caused should be sufficient reason.


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AIDS blood tests available to all

One of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) prime responsibilities in slowing the spread of acquired immune deficiency syndrom (AIDS) in Texas is blood testing.

Any individual can find out, anonymously and inexpensively, whether he or she has been infected with HIV (human immunodeficiency virus), which causes AIDS.

According to Joe Pair, director of the Sexually Transmitted Disease Control Division, TDH conducts blood testing at 67 sites throughout Texas. Most of the facilities are public health clinics.

"A steady flow of people wanting to know whether they carry the virus have been through the testing program since testing was made available in the spring of 1985," Pair

He said that those first seeking the test were predominantly people with histories of "high risk" behavior (homosexual and bisexual men and intravenous drug users who have shared needles and syringes). The clientele now includes a broader mix of society, he added.

'We see average people with healthy concerns about possible exposures," Pair said. "Many had blood transfusions before blood banks began screening donations for HIV (in 1985). Some may be those who have had sex with someone who could have carried the virus, or others in lower risk groups who want confirmation that they are not infected."

Proportionately fewer of the increasing numbers of persons now being tested are found to test positive for the HIV antibody. Of 14,393 tests performed at public health clinics in the first five months of 1987, only 1,295 tested positive. That compares with 12,223 tests performed in all of

1986, with 2,115 proving positive. Individuals often choose to go to their private physicians to have blood samples drawn and tested, rather than to a public health clinic. "At TDH, we are confident that private tests are competently performed," Pair said, "but we know that prices and the

quality of counseling in the private sector vary. At our testing sites, we ensure that the cost (usually \$10) is affordable, that strict anonymity is maintained throughout, and that clients receive counseling to avoid contracting or spreading the virus."

Pair described the typical testing procedures in Austin as an example:

First, the client makes an appointment by telephone. He or she does not have to give a real name, but is given a fictitious first name and a number. Those are the only identifications involved. At the appointment, the client is provided pretest counseling and a nurse or technician draws a small amount of blood to be sent to the TDH laboratories in Austin or Houston.

In about two weeks, the client returns to the clinic to learn the test results and be counseled. Results are not given out by telephone. Counseling is necessary for people who test either positive or negative and provides a good opportunity for the client to ask questions about protection during sex and other AIDS preventive precautions, Pair explained.

"The great majority of clients test negative and go home relieved of their worry about being infected. They also take home a better understanding of how to avoid infection," he added.

A small number of initial tests are false positives, and must be repeated. Both the first and second tests are conducted by what is called the ELISA process. If, after two tests, the client still tests positive, a third, more sophisticated test, called the Western-Blot method, is available to further support a positive result.

Pair said Western Blot testing is more accurate than ELISA testing, but it is too expensive for the state to conduct on a large scale and is usually unnecessary.

"I can't stress too strongly how much importance we place on anonymity in our testing program," Pair said.

Cities eligible for grants

The Department of Housing and Urban Development has earmarked \$54 million for Community Development Block Grants to small cities in Texas, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has announced.

The senator said the decision will provide funding for a breoad range of projects for cities and towns which choose to participate in the program.

Grants made under the small cities program may be used, for instance, for housing rehabilitation, improvements to water and sewer facilities, street paving and lighting and construction of community

Cities and towns with a population of 50,000 or less are eligible. Each participating city designs a program tailored to meet local needs.

"I am pleased that some of the tax dollars sent by Texans to Washington are being returned to benefit area citizens by financing improvements to the areas where we work and live every day," Gramm said in making the announcement.

"My strong commitment is to assure a fair return to Texas taxpayers on the money we pay in federal taxes," the senator said.

Cities should make application for funding to the Texas Department of Community Affairs in Austin, which will administer the program in Texas.

The Community Development Block Grant program, one of HUD's largest, is designed to assist communities in carrying out a wide range of development activities aimed at neighborhood revitalization, economic development and improved community facilities and services.

Prison space still big state problem

The chances are good that there is at least one roadway---whether it's a highway or city street---in your community that is just too small.

You are probably reminded of its inadequacies every day as you rush to work in the morning or perhaps to the store at night.

The situation is not only troublesome; it can be downright

We have a worse situation in our Texas prisons.

Both systems---highway and prison---were planned to accommodate a set number of cars and inmates respectively.

The growing number of cars on our roadways and the increasing crime rate have coupled to cause chaos in both systems.

Let me give you a startling statistic: My office has calculated that our prison population will exceed 54,500 inmates within four years. Without new construction, by 1991 we will only have the capability of housing 36,214 prisoners.

Our current capacity already is routinely exceeded. Texas prisons have been forced to close 14 times as of mid-July to prevent housing more inmates in existing facilities than has been allowed by a federal court.

If you scrape away the political rhetoric, we have two basic choices. We could, of course, move the criminals through the prison system at a faster pace to make room for new arrivals. That would mean that prisoners would serve much less time in prison than a judge or jury has recommended.

Or, we can build more prisons. I favor the second approach, and I have presented the Texas Legislature with a comprehensive, 48-page plan to meet our needs into the 1990s.

The plan has a \$408 million price tag, and will add 19,346 spaces to the prison system. Approval will ensure that convicted felons will serve their sentences behind bars---not in your neighborhood.

It is imperative that this proposal

be approved because the ramifications of prison overcrowding on our state are incredible.

They are felt on the state level, of course, for many reasons. Prison inmates know their time in prison is limited, so they are less inclined to participate in rehabilitation programs.

Our parole system often becomes an escape valve, and not an incentive for good behavior. Probation is restricted to a warning, virtually without any leverage.

And, when the doors to the prison are closed at the state level, the pressure is merely transferred to the county level.

In a nutshell, my prison plan calls for the construction of five minimum-security trustee camps, four regional "reintegration centers," four shock probation centers and an expansion of the Texas Department of Corrections Hospital and the Gatesville prison facility. It also calls for contracting with private companies to house about 2,000 inmates.

Already the plan has been embraced by important state officials, ranging from top legislative leaders to prison administrators.

They all recognize that the public demands protection and that the cost,

like it or not, won't be cheap. But neither is the cost of crime.

Brown Ranch now in fourth generation

When Robert H. Brown of Fort Worth, a livestock commission company owner, bought land in Throckmorton County in 1900, he not only established a ranch on the land, but he also established a ranching family that is now seeing its fourth generation enter the ranks.

Today the R. A. Brown Ranch, originally referred to as R. H. Brown and Son, operates four ranches, totaling 150,000 acres. Headquartered near Throckmorton, the ranch runs registered Simmental and Simbrah cattle, including modern innovations such as artificial breeding to superior sires, embryo transfers and total performance testing and data. The quarterhorse operation is also located at the headquarters.

The ranch operates additional property in eastern Colorado on leased land; Crooked River Ranch in Throckmorton, Haskell and Shackleford counties and R. A. Brown Box T Ranch near Colorado Springs, Colo.

R. A. Brown Ranch cattle are branded with a "V", while the horses wear the "Y" brand, a family brand since the 1800s.

R. H. Brown's son, R. A. Brown, originated the family's tradition of breeding cow sense and athletic ability into its horses. R. A. Brown, for whom the ranch is named, was a founder of the American Quarterhorse Association, and served as an officer and director of the organization until his death in 1965.

Today R. H.'s grandson, Rob Brown, and his wife, Peggy Donnell Brown, both third-generation West Texas ranchers, carry on the 87-yearold livestock breeding tradition.

Perhaps more than brands and land are passed down from one generation to the next in the Brown family. If cow sense can be bred in horses, ranch sense must be inherited in the Brown children. All four of Rob and Peggy Brown's children, as well as their son-in-law and daughter-in-law, are actively involved on one of the

Another family has worked side by side with the Browns for more than 50 years. Carrying on this tradition today are George Self, the Simmental and quarterhorse foreman, and Joe Self, Simbrah foreman. Both are sons of Truett Self and nephews of Pete and Carl Self, all long-time ranch employees. In addition, George Calvin Self, George's son, brings another generation of Selfs to the ranch by working the daily operations.





Are you a battered spouse?

(The following article was submitted by Betsy Nanny, outreach coordinator for the Noah project which is establishing a branch in Haskell.

Long ago, Susan had been content in her new relationship. It had been established quickly, but she knew she was deeply in love with Jim. Occasionally over the two months she had known him, she had been distrubed by his flashes of temper that seemed so unreasonable, but that just reminded her of her father. After all. she reasoned, men are like that. Sometimes she was just too

Then it happened. One night she was getting ready to go to dinner with Jim and his parents when he came into the bedroom to tell her what dress to wear. She wanted to wear a different one. He became angry and told her to put on the blue dress he liked and she became angry and said

Even years later she re-plays the first incident vividly in her mind. It always goes in slow motion. Jim's face becomes distorted with fury. His hand pulls back. Then in a slow arc, his hand comes around full force to slap her. The slap was so hard, it knocked her down halfway across the

Susan was so stunned that all she could do right then was cry. Later she thought about leaving, but Jim was so apologetic--he seemed so sorry about what he had done and promised never to hurt her again. Susan stayed.

But the violence did not stop. Over the years it became worse. She learned not to talk back, but often if she looked at him the wrong way, or even used the wrong tone of voice, she would be hit.

Over the next few years, Jim hit her, kicked her, sexually assaulted her

when he was drunk, and even kicked her in the stomach when she was pregnant. Susan, like her mother before her, never left. She was a

Domestic violence, the battering of both women and men by those closest to them, is one of the most widespread problems in this country. Estimates of the occurrence of violence in the family range from 17 percent to as high as 60 percent of all households in this country. In one study, 10 percent of the people surveyed admitted that they regularly engaged in extreme physical abuse of

The following survey is Jesigned to help you decide if you are an abused woman or man or if you are at risk of being abused. Answer each of the questions yes or no. Directions for scoring follow.

1. Have you ever been assaulted by your mate in a current or past relationship? This includes such things as being hit, kicked, slapped, stabbed, shot, beaten, burned, sexually assaulted, any kind of physical assault.

2. Have you ever been verbally assaulted by your mate? This refers to constant yelling, cursing, blaming, threats, or accusations outside the range of normal argument.

3. Has your mate ever threatened to hurt you?

4. Does your mate come from a violent family? Was he or she abused as a child or was either of his or her parents abused?

5. Do you come from a violent family? Were you abused as a child or were either of your parents abused?

6. Does your mate abuse your

7. Does your mate keep you cut off from friends and family? For instance, are you not allowed to use the phone or to go out in the car, or to work outside the home?

8. When you and your mate argue,

do the arguments seem to go around in circles and not really come to any conclusions? Does it seem like nothing is ever settled?

9. Is your mate a very controlling person? That is, does he or she want to make all the decisions, even yours? Is he/she rigid and authoritarian?

10. Do you jack self confidence? Do you see yourself as helpless or even stupid?

11. Do you feel taken advantage of? Do you tolerate rude, obnoxious. verbally abusive behavior from others, especially your mate?

12. Do you let other people assume responsibility for major ar eas of your life, such as where you should work, who your friends are, if and to whom you should talk to on the telephone, or the kinds of things you do for enjoyment?

Questions 1 and 2. If you answered yes to either one of these questions, vou are an abused man or woman. Any kind of physical violence is dangerous and can be deadly. Onefourth of the murders in the United States occur within the family and of these, over one-half involve spouses. These situations are so dangerous and emotionally charged that 23 percent of police deaths and 40 percent of severe police injuries occur during responses to domestic violence calls.

While yelling, blaming and accusations are not physically dangerous, such constant occurrences involve emotional abuse. Many women and men after years of hearing these things begin to believe them and feel that they are less than human. We can see and attend to the physical scars. The emotional scars are less obvious and harder to heal.

Questions 3 through 12: If you answered yes to at least three of these questions, you are at risk of being a battered woman or man. Of course, the more questions you are able to answer yes to, the higher your risk is.

Let's look at each of these questions individually.

3. Often the threat of physical harm is as effective as an actual assault. This is especially true if there has been violence in the past. For example, many women who have been hit in the past react quickly if their spouse pulls back a fist, or even tenses up his arm in a certain way. The threat is obvious. Others know that when a spouse says "if you don't * do this, I'll beat the _ out of you", they are dangerously close to being hurt. The same is true of a woman who hears, "If you try to leave me I'll track you down somehow and kill you." There are families and relationships in which these are not simply idle threats, but are deadly serious.

4 and 5. Family violence is cyclical in nature. That is, it tends to be passed on from one generation to the next. If a person has grown up in a violent family he is likely to see the violence as a normal reaction to stress and is more likely to accept it without question or even to be violent himself.

6. A 1975 study of 2,000 families found that the rate of child abuse is 129 percent higher in families where there is also spouse abuse.

7. Violent families tend to be cut off from friends, family or organizations such as churches. It is not unusual for husbands in these families to insist that the wife not find a job, that she not go out without him, even that she not use the phone unless he can monitor it. These families find themselves more and more isolated and more and more distrustful of those outside the

8. The communication patterns in these families are often distorted. The couple, while arguing, may hop from one topic to another without coming to any conclusions, making any decisions, or really settling anything. This builds increasing tension in the relationship and often leads to a violent episode.

9, The controlling patterns in these relationships are often the first things that signal possible abuse. Such people generally insist they are right, that people who disagree with them are completely wrong, and that they should make all the decisions, not only for themselves but for their spouses. They are rigid in their expectations of others and will not tolerate being questioned.

10, 11, and 12. Victims of abuse are often very dependent persons. That is, it is difficult for them to see themselves as being a separate person from their mate. They may have heard so much criticism that they have come to believe they are really helpless or stupid. They often just give up and let other persons take responsibility for their lives. They may tolerate abusive behavior because they feel they can do nothing about it, or that nobody else can help them. Some even think they deserve it. Even after years of abuse, some people cling to the false hope that their mate will change or that they, through their love and patience, will be able to change their mate. Violence in the home is too often a frightening and deadly reality.

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
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
