It was th second time since July 31, 1986, that the Senate has voted against this tax. House members-who stopped our repeal provision dead in its track
last year-included no such provision in their version of the trade bill this
year,
When the House-Senate conference committee meets to iron out differ ences in the bills, I will be Chairman of the Senate conferees and will do I can to send the President a trade bill that includes repeal of the windfall
profit tax.
We will again face formidable opposition, but I am hopeful we will prevail. am encouraged by the progress we have made so far in demonstratin the dangers of depending too much on other nations for the energy tha
keeps our nation going. Recent events in the Persian Gulf underscore thes dangers.
It also is appropriate that this provision is part of the trade bill. At a time when our trade deficit has reached unprecedented levels, this tax adds to the problem by encouraging dependence on imported oil
By adopting incentives for energy exploration and production in this
country, we can increase our energy self-sufficiency. Repeal of this tax cat make a difference, though this action in no way constitutes a nationa energy policy.
In addition
In addition to discouraging dependency on foreign oil, repeal of this tax of the burdensome red tape involved in collecting it. Total administrativ costs associated with the tax are estimated at more than $\$ 100$ million a
year.

## Liability crisis

Editor: Even though both the regular and special sessions of the Texas Legislature are over, the fact that in certain parts of the state
Texans are finding it increasingly Texans are inding it increasingly
difficult to get the medical care they need proves the medical liability need proves the
crisis is not over.

In a recent informal survey, the Texas Medical Association found th some hospitals and physicians in 18 TMA county medical societies have limited obstetrical care because of the rising cost of professional liability premiums or fear of a lawsuit. In addition, some hospitals and physicians in 11 county medical
societies totally have eliminated this scieties totally have eliminated
service due to similar reasons. Through the efforts of TMA others, the legislature took the firs step toward alleviating the crisis and stablishing a more fair and stable ort liability system. Also in the egular session, the legislatur mposed sanctions against frivolous exposure for physicians who contract with the Texas Department of Health or who provide volunteer work for non-profit corporations. Sadly, the net effect on the cost of medical liability insurance is likely to be
minimal. TMA helped to pass legislation that strengthens the disciplinary hand of the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners. Mandatory reporting of substantive disciplinary actions and immunity from retaliatory lawsuits to deal effectively with negligent or incompetent physicians.

But the legislature failed to act on a proposed constitutional amendment to validate the medical liability limits originally enacted in 1977. In addition, we believe that the Texas Supreme Court would find ways to preempt the purpose of the amendment even if Tex approved it in November. It is clear that the Texas Supreme writing our tort laws. While we recognized going into the 70 th session of the legislature that the courts had been broadening and inventing theories of recovery, we believed that the legislature was the proper place to write and pass
legislation. But when it comes to tort legislation. But when it comes to tort
laws, this apparently is not the case. Physicians want persons who are harmed to be fully compensated. Upholding the medical liability laws passed in 1977, which places a cap on liability awards, excluding the cost of medical care, does this. Under this law, persons still can be compensated for items which cannot be quantified,
such as pain and suffering. But a such as pain and suffering. But a
reasonable limit would apply so that the legal system, which is designed to redress wrongs, can continue to serve Texans that need it. The Texas Supreme Court's systematic liability laws threatens this system,

## TO THE CITIZENS OF HASKELL:

The Haskell City Council held a meeting on August 4, 1987, to discuss a property tax rate increase. Approximately 25 citizens were present at this meeting and participated in the discussions. As a result of this meeting, it was decided to hold a Public Hearing on the tax increase at City Hall at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, August 20, 1987. State law requires the notice next to this one. Although a 61 percent tax increase does appear to be high, it actually means a $\$ .1363$ raise. On a $\$ 40,000$ house, this amounts to a $\$ 54.52$ yearly increase.

An alternative to a tax rate was also discussed. There could possibly be added to the basic water bill about $\$ 4$ monthly. This would bring in approximately the same revenue as the proposed tax increase.

If this additional money becomes available, the City will designate $\mathbf{\$ 5 0 , 0 0 0}$ annually to the Street Department and $\$ 23,500$ for employee raises.
