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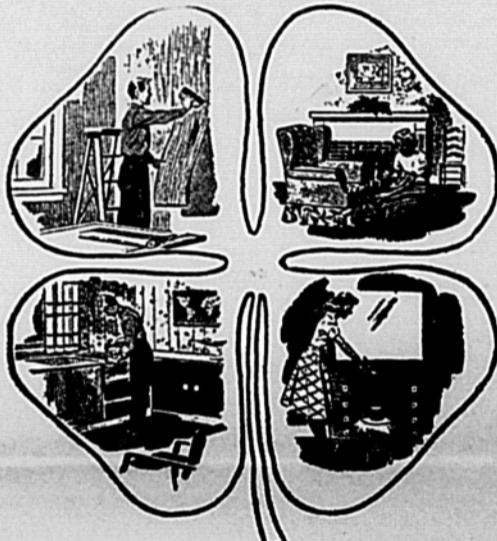
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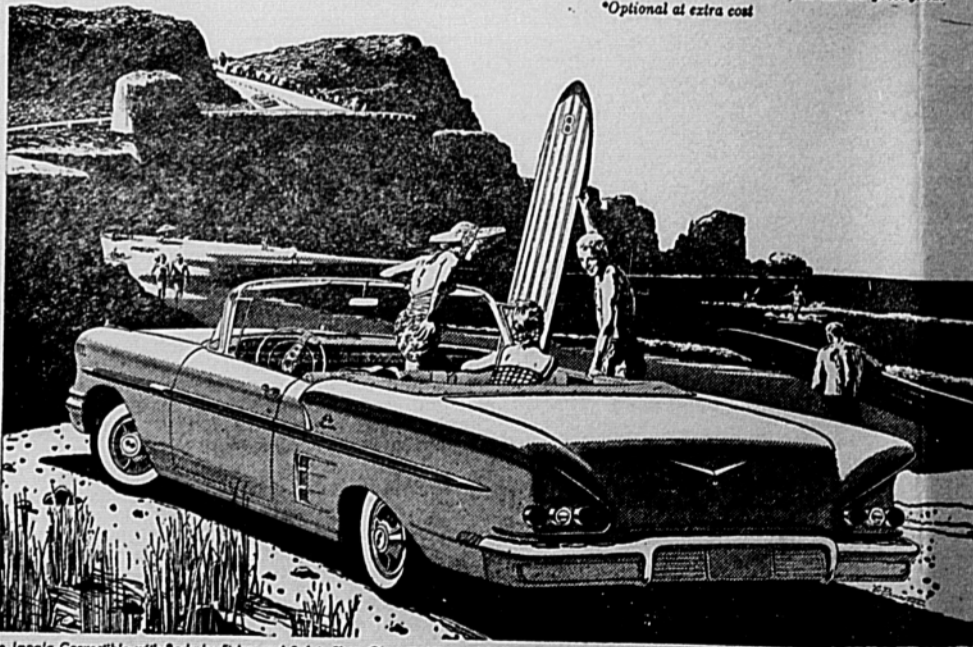

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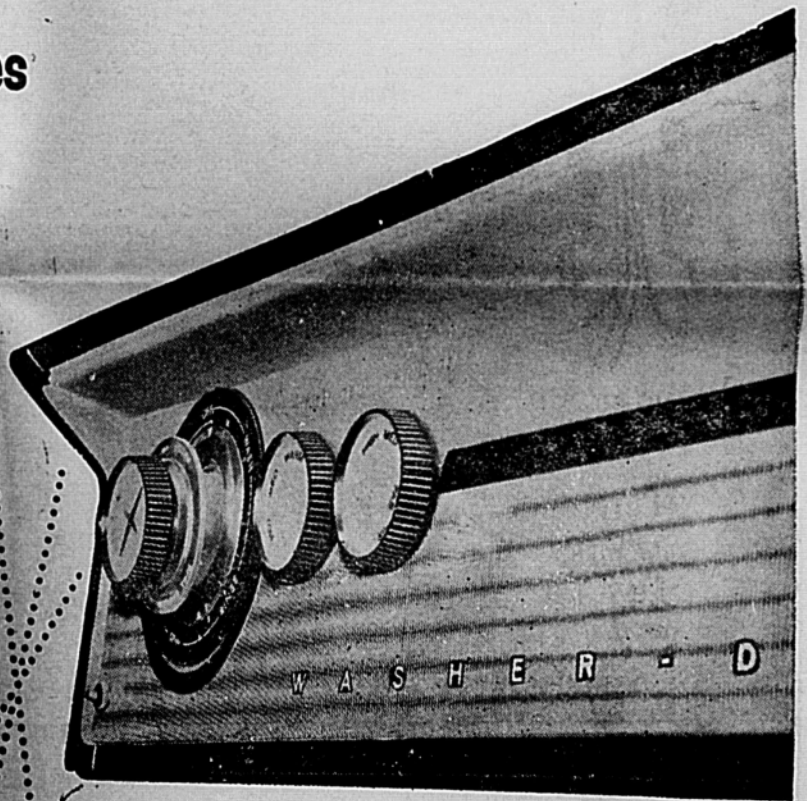

NEW GROWER WHEAT ALLOTMENTS - A farmer may file an application for a 1959 new grower wheat allotment provided

1. No wheat was grown on the farm in 1956, 1957, or 1958.

2. Must not have any interest in another farm for which a wheat allotment is established.

3. Must be dependent on income from the farm for at least 50% of his livelihood, and

4. Application must be filed by not later than July 1, 1958.

1959 WHEAT MARKETING QUOTA - Referendum - - - Wheat growers will decide in a referendum on June 20 whether marketing quotas will be used for their 1959 wheat crop. The polls will open at 8:00 a.m., and close at 7:00 p.m.

In the event marketing quotas are approved, a farmer who exceeds his wheat allotment will be subject to a penalty on his excess wheat. (Any farmer may harvest 15.0 acres of wheat without penalty). Price support for growers who comply with their allotments will be available at a national average of not less than \$1.81 per bushel.

Provided growers do not approve wheat quotas, there will be no marketing quotas or penalties for the 1959 crop. If a farmer overplants his allotment, he will not be eligible for price support. If a farmer plants within his allotment, he may receive price support at about \$1.20 per bushel (50% of estimated parity).

EXCESS ACREAGE - It is the responsibility of the farmer to notify this office when excess wheat or soil bank base crops in excess of the permitted acreage for harvest have been destroyed. Please do so at once.

WHEAT MARKETING CARDS 1958 wheat marketing cards have been mailed to all eligible producers. Cards not mailed and being retained in this office include: those for farmers who exceeded their allotment or 15.0 acres; those interested in another overplanted wheat farm; or those who have not signed Form CSS-578, Report of Performance.

RECENT CHANGES IN THE WHEAT LAW - Wheat farmers having excess wheat acreage will receive history credit for the farm base acreage. This means that excess wheat acreage can not be considered in establishing future allotments for the farm.

In 1959 and future years, farms remaining overplanted will receive history credit only for the allotment. This means that for farms remaining overplanted on wheat, a reduction in the allotment can be expected.

FARMS IN THE SOIL BANK

PROGRAM - By discussing the provisions of the Soil Bank Regulations with various farmers, it has come to the attention of this office that some misunderstanding prevails as to what the permitted acreage for harvest and the soil bank base means in regard to the farm. If you do not understand their meaning or how they apply to your farm, please contact this office at once.

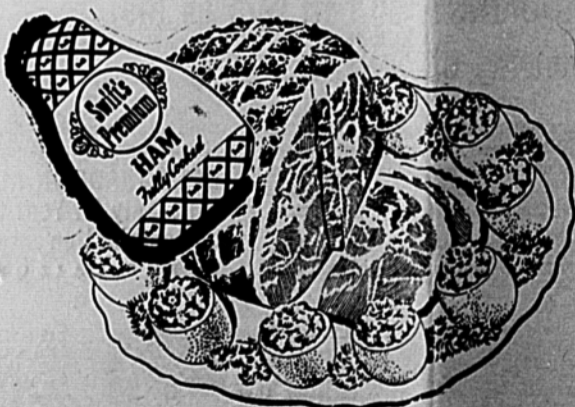

Caution Urged in Use Of Weed Killers

Extreme caution in the use of chemical weed killers on the farm or ranch was urged today by Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Some 4,000 acres of cotton were recently damaged severely in the Coastal Bend where 2,4-D and 2,4,5-T were used to kill weeds in nearby rice fields. The incident resulted in the banning of the chemicals in that area until crops were harvested.

Commissioner White reminded farmers and ranchers that hormone-type herbicides are excellent for weed control but they can be dangerous to surrounding broadleaf plants. The chemical spray can be carried long distances by wind, damaging and sometimes destroying cotton and other crops in the vicinity.

The recent ban on herbicides in an area of the Coastal Bend was the first time such action had been necessary there in five years. "We have had so few cases of mis-handling of the chemicals that people are apt to forget how potent they really are on susceptible crops," said White.

Even a small leak in spraying equipment being towed down the highway has been known to damage crops for miles down both sides of the road. The chemicals of hormone type spur the plant to such rapid growth that they literally "grow themselves to death" in a few days time.

White pointed out that many Texas counties are regulated by the state Herbicide Law which requires permits if more than ten acres of land are sprayed during any one year. Those applying herbicides commercially must be bonded in addition to having a permit.

Some 161,000 acres were sprayed in the state last year, with a total of 196 licenses issued to dealers. Proper use of the chemicals can achieve excellent results in weed control, said White. However, anyone who has not had previous experience with weed killers is advised to hire a reliable commercial firm to treat the land.


