"I yelled at Jean to swim for it, that I was coming, I yanked off my shirt as I ran down the hill, and went into the water with my pants still on. I'm not a very good swimmer, but I swam out there and dove all the way to the bottom, but it was too black down there and I couldn't find them.

Richards then told, haltingly, how he had yelled and yelled for help after he got back to the bank, and a woman finally drove a pickup around the lake to where he was.

Commissioner White reminded farmers and ranchers that hormone-type herbicides are excellent for weed control but they can be dangerous to surrounding. broadleaf plants. The chemical spray can be carried long distances by wind, damaging and sometimes destroying cotton and other crops in the vicinity.

The recent ban on herbicides in an area of the Coastal Bend was the first time such action had been necessary there in five years. "We have had so few cases of mis-handling of the chemicals that people are apt to forget how potent they really are on susceptable crops", said White.
