A STORY IN the Sunday issue of the Lubbock *Avalanche-Journal* was attempting to whet the interest of the state highway department in widening State Highway 114 between Lubbock and the New Mexico line.

A study is already underway on the possibility of widening Texas 114 all the way from Dallas to Lubbock.

We would like to point out to the state and district highway officials that if they want to use highway funds a lot more sensibly, they would do well to get on with the four-laning project on U.S. Highway 60 through Parmer County.

Highway 60 probably carries more truck traffic than any other highway in the state, four-lane or two-lane. And it's only by the grace of God that up to this point we have not had a head-on collision between a school bus and an 18-wheeler somewhere on the road.

Plenty of school buses use the antiquated two-lane facility, and not just buses from Friona, Bovina and Farwell, the three Parmer County cities on the highway.

During the school year you see numerous buses from Amarillo, going to Clovis, and to other New Mexico points. You also see the Clovis High School activity bus, as well as those from Hereford, Canyon, and virtually every other point in the Panhandle and South Plains, making their way down the highway during the course of the school term.

Personally, we'd hate to be the highway official who approved funds to even STUDY such a whimsical project as four-laning Texas 114 to the New Mexico line, if such a wreck was we've alluded to were to occur.

We're just damned lucky such a tragedy hasn't happened, with the increased truck traffic that Highway 60 has experienced in the past 15-20 years. And we may be living on borrowed time.

The *Avalanche-Journal* article admits that present traffic from Morton to the state line is as low as 200 vehicles per day--fewer than 10 per hour.

Based on an average cost of \$712,000 per mile for land acquisition and construction, building a four-lane highway from Levelland to the state line would be \$32 million.

That means that the highway department could build the four-lane highway completely through Parmer County (38 miles), at a cost of \$27 million. And this project does not depend upon "projection" for possible use. Our traffic count and need is already established.

The proponents of the Texas 114 project want New Mexico to take up the widening and build a four-lane road into Roswell, and also into Clovis. Then, Lubbock to Clovis traffic could use the proposed road and cover 114 miles instead of the 101 miles it now takes on an already four-laned Highway 84-70. Who are they trying to kid??

The distance from Lubbock to El Paso on such a road would be increased from 345 to 409 miles.

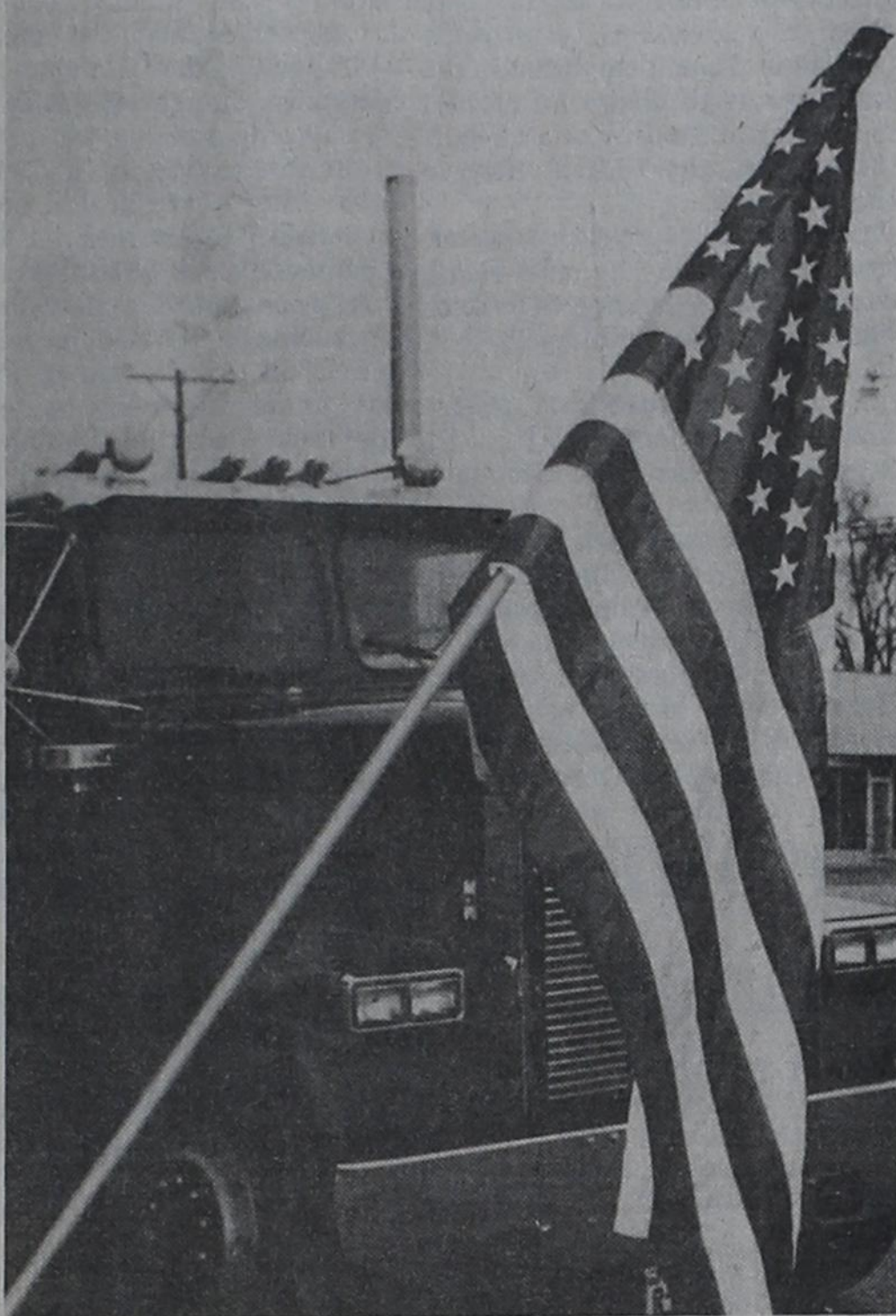
The article even moans: "Lubbock is the only major city in Texas that does not have a four-lane divided highway connecting it to Dallas/Fort Worth."

The last time we checked, you could take Highway 84 from Lubbock to Abilene, then I-20 east to Ft. Worth. No more than 10 miles further than their Texas 114 project, whose estimated cost from Lubbock to Dallas would be a whopping \$350 million.

The trouble with Parmer County is that (in proportion) Parmer County is almost as far from Lubbock (district highway headquarters) as this part of the state is from Austin.

For the past 25 years, district highway officials have been saying

County Depository, Car Contract OK'd

Selection of the county's bank depository for the two-year period beginning April 1, 1987, and awarding the bid for a new car for the sheriff's department highlighted the agenda at the Parmer County Commissioners' Court February 9.

After considering bids from Friona State Bank and the First State Bank of Bovina, the Friona bank's bid was accepted for the county's bank depository for the next two-year period.

A motion was passed to accept a bid of 11,283.84 with trade, from the Reeve Chevrolet-Olds, for the new car for the sheriff's department.

Boarding care bills for the county's foster children, in the amount of \$3,416, were approved. The money will be reimbursed to the county.

Annual dues to the County Judge's and Commissioners Assn. of Texas, in the amount of \$125, were approved.

A bill was approved from Ellis-

Blackwell Funeral Home of Friona, in the amount of \$200, for an indigent family's baby funeral. Payment of \$75 to Dick Pylant, investigator for the District Attorney's office, was approved. Pylant is to use the money to attend a mandatory investigator's school in Austin.

The second meeting of the court in February was moved to Friday, February 20, so as not to conflict with an annual conference on county government, to be held at College Station.

A petition was approved for the opening of a new county road, after the report by the Jury of View was favorable.

Approval of soil work on three farms in Precinct 3 was approved. The work is done by county machinery when not otherwise in demand, and costs are paid by those receiving the work.

The court approved subscribing to "Information Guide to County Government," at \$60 per year.

Chamber Makes Bid For Honor Nominees

The Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture will again this year accept nominations for Teacher of the Year, and Man and Woman of the year.

One teacher from the Bovina Schools will be selected from letters of nomination which should be written to nominate these teachers. All letters should be addressed to the Bovina Chamber of Commerce, Steve Sherrill, manager.

All letters should contain specific reasons for that person being nominated and should include any civic, area, or local organizational responsibilities those nominees possess.

Any teacher in the Bovina School system can be nominated and any person can make a nomination. All nominees for teacher of the year should be currently employed by the school system.

Nominations must be mailed by March 1.

During the past year the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture has sponsored many projects starting with the annual banquet. This is the time when awards for man, woman, and teacher of the year were presented. Youth awards will also be presented to a boy and girl.

The Chamber sponsored a bike-a-thon for Cystic Fibrosis and raised over \$750. They co-sponsored the Bovina Stock Show with the Bovina Lions Club.

Fillies' Luck Bad In Playoff

For the Bovina Fillies, Friday the 13th came a day early last week at Canyon, when the team had about as much bad luck as they have had in one game all season long.

The result was a 61-42 loss to the Happy Cowgirls, which knocked the Fillies out of further playoff contention.

Bovina was plagued by fouls and turnovers against the pressing Cowgirls. The Fillies' high-scoring tandem of Mindy Neal and Peggy Shepherd was hobbled by fouls early in the game.

In fact, Miss Shepherd, who drew four fouls in the error-filled first quarter, missed over half of the game, sitting out the entire second quarter, and then fouling out with 1:34 left in the third quarter.

Miss Neal fouled out with 4:18 left in the game. Bovina was trailing, 47-35 at that point.

Bovina had an early lead at 3-2 after a pair of free throws by Miss Shepherd with 3:50 left in the opening quarter. Happy bounced back to take a 5-3 lead.

Miss Shepherd hit a jump shot with 4:13 remaining in the quarter, was fouled and completed the three-point play to give the Fillies a 6-5 lead. That was to be their last lead of the ball game.

Marlena Cogburn hit a 12-foot jump shot with 3:51 left in the opening quarter for a 7-6 Happy lead. The Cowgirls led it, 13-10 at the end of the first quarter.

It was a rough start for Miss Shepherd, who picked up her third foul after less than four minutes of play, with 4:23 left in the first quarter. Then, the 5-11 post girl got her fourth foul with 1:34 left in the quarter.

Happy used its full-court press to perfection in the second quarter, forcing numerous turnovers. Happy's Chandy Harvey scored ten points in the quarter. Miss

Neal's four free throws were the best the Fillies could do in trailing, 33-18 at halftime.

The Cowgirls forced 20 Bovina turnovers in the first half, which resulted in 17 Happy points.

The Fillies came back out with a good third quarter. Robbie Stowers hit a pair of field goals and two from the line, and Miss Shepherd followed suit, as Bovina appeared to be making a comeback.

When Marci Dale scored for the Fillies with 12 seconds left in the third quarter, Bovina trailed by only four, 38-34.

However, Miss Shepherd had fouled out by this time, and Bovina's experience-thin bench was sorely tested by the Cowgirls.

Miss Neal fouled out with 4:18 to play, and Happy coasted from there, outscoring the Fillies, 21-8 in the final quarter.

"Foul trouble is what got us tonight. They all gave a good effort, though. I'm proud of their effort. Our seniors won 89 of 115 games in high school. They don't have anything to be ashamed of," said Fillies' coach Marks Lanham.

Lanham pointed out that turnovers was what killed the team when they lost at Happy, a loss which brought about the necessity for the special playoff game. And the 30 turnovers last Thursday was just too much to overcome.

The Fillies made 48.1 per cent of their shots from the field--a good percentage, but the team only got 27 shots (hitting 13). Their shooting from the foul line was just fair, as they hit 16 of 31.

With Misses Neal and Shepherd held to a combined 20 points--just half their averages--Robbie Stowers was the team's leading scorer with 14 points. Miss Stowers made four field goals and six of 13 from the line.

Happy hit 51.1 per cent of their field goals, 23 of 45, and 15 of 22 from the foul line.

SPS To Announce Survey Findings

Area communities will learn the results of an extensive economic development study at a second gathering of government and business leaders in an "economic summit" sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

Leaders active in economic development from throughout the four-state area served by SPS will meet February 24 in Lubbock. SPS provides electric service to a population of about one million in a 52,000-square-mile area covering much of eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas. Lubbock was chosen as a meeting site because it is in the center of the SPS service territory.

The meeting is a follow-up to a similar gathering October 14 at SPS's Tolk Station power plant near Muleshoe. About 200 mayors, chamber of commerce presidents and others attended the October meeting.

"Our meeting on February 24 will give communities the results of the target-industry study, which has been under way the past several months," said Bert Ballengee, SPS chairman of the board and chief executive officer. "In addition, they will be helped by preliminary results of a survey of existing industry designed to encourage the growth of firms already here."

"Economic development is never an easy or quick job," Ballengee noted. "But after our meeting on February 24, many of us will be able to better focus our efforts. Obtaining this information is an important step on the road to economic diversification."

The church hopes to have a ministry of hospitality with their students and others who attend. Everyone is invited to share in their

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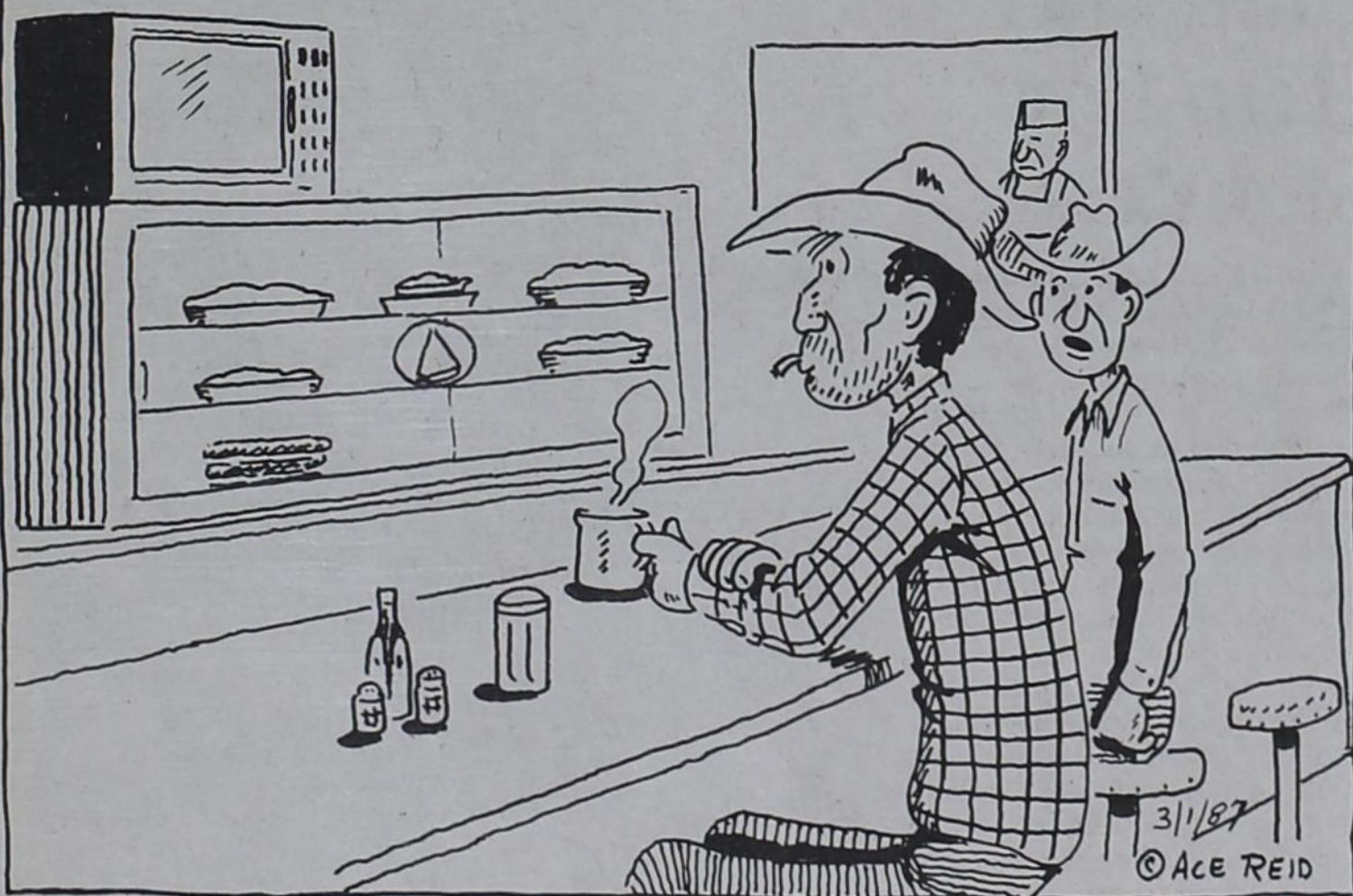
