TAX BURDEN SHIFTED

Judge Critical Of State's Tax Policies

JUDGE PORTER ROBERTS gave us a news release this week, which hits on a problem that has been plaguing our state for at least the past ten years.

The state government has been passing more and more costs on to local entities in recent years. First it was our cities and school districts who were affected, and now the county government is feeling the pinch of this shifting of tax burdens.

Governors White, Clements and Briscoe have all made a lot of headlines by promising voters there would be "no new taxes" on the state level.

What this really meant was that while the state would not raise certain taxes, or come up with new ones, at the same time, the state government cut back on funds it previously returned to local governments, such as schools and counties.

In order to keep all of their programs operating, the local governments have been obliged to raise their taxes, to compensate for the loss of funds.

Or, as the news release from the county judge says: "The federal government is passing costs on to the state, the state is passing costs on to the counties, and they are both telling everyone that they aren't raising taxes. They're not. Local government has to do it for them."

Making matters worse from the county's standpoint is the fact that the state is attempting to impose some new requirements on the county, without providing the funds for the programs. The commissioners are urging passage of legislation (HB 2324) which would require the state to provide funds for such services mandated by the state.

Judge Roberts is urging all voters and taxpayers to contact their elected state representative, J.E. (Pete) Laney and state senator, Bill Sarpalius, and let them know your feelings in the matter of taxes.

One of the revenue sources for cities and counties during the past decade has been the "revenue sharing" program. The Federal government established the program, to (rightly) return a portion of the tax money to the local governments whose citizens send in taxes every year on the federal level.

These federal payments have been getting smaller for some government entities, and the Reagan administration proposes to eliminate revenue sharing entirely by October of 1986.

This will put these local government bodies in the position of having to come up with a method of replacing the money. Having had the money for ten years or so, most governments had become very accustomed to the revenue sharing amounts, if not downright dependent upon it for certain programs.

Most everyone is aware that Public School Bill 72, which has caused our schools to have to reorganize in many areas, was passed during a special summer session of the legislature.

Rumors are beginning to surface that Governor White may call another special session for the coming summer, and the legislators may use this one, when many of their constituents are vacationing and not paying as close attention as usual, for some other type of controversial legislation, such as a state income tax.

Texas is one of the few large states that does not have a state income tax, but at the same time our state residents are not tax exempt.

It would behoove each of our readers and taxpayers to pay closer attention to what their legislators are doing, both in Austin and in Washington, and stay in touch with them on important matters.

Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts said today that "the state has found a way to get through the legislative session in Austin without raising any state taxes, but the way they have decided to do it means that the property taxes may have to be raised at the county level or services cut."

Judge Roberts indicated that the cost of state programs such as the administration of justice, including increased local costs of the judicial system and costs of incarcerating state prisoners, and even the cost of driver education in the public schools, may be financed out of county and district court fees if pending legislation is passed.

"The way this works," Judge Roberts said, "is that the state increases its share of fees that the county collects in order to raise

revenue for state programs. This could decrease the future amount of money that the county gets to retain from the fees. The county could be forced to take up the slack by increasing property taxes just to stay even." It seems that each legislator who comes up with a bill that needs funding, states in his bill that the county will raise their fees on certain items and send this additional money to Austin.

The judge said that counties only have four sources of revenue: property tax, fines and fees, and federal revenue sharing. He said that revenue sharing "has been going down for most counties for several years, and that the administration proposes to eliminate it by October 31, 1986.

Revenue sharing averaged 16 per cent of county budgets statewide in 1977 but in 1982 it amounted to only 11 per cent. It has dropped even more since 1982 and will be gone entirely by late 1986," the judge said.

"Taxes may have to be increased even more by the county if inflation causes increased costs. And while the state is taking more

of historical county revenue, legislators are devising ways to have the county take on more and more responsibility that normally would be handled by the state. The more responsibility they give us, the more property taxpayers have to pay."

"What this means," the judge said, "is that the federal government is passing costs to the state, the state is passing costs to the counties and they are both telling everyone that they aren't raising taxes. They're not. Local government has to do it for them."

During this legislative session, for the good of everybody concerned, we need to keep a close eye on bills coming up for vote. 80 Per Cent Of Acres Signed Up Under ASC

When the 1985 farm program sign-up period ended April 1, Parmer County farmers had enrolled 375,221.6 acres, or 80 per cent of their eligible wheat, feed grains and cotton acres in the acreage reduction programs.

Martin L. Chandler said Parmer County producers enrolled 1152 farms in the programs and agreed to take out of production, at least 30 per cent of their wheat and upland cotton base acres, and 10 per cent of their feed grain. "This means that as much as 77,300 acres of cropland in Parmer County could be idled this year, depending on how many acres of program crops are planted by participants," Chandler said. The cropland taken out of production must be devoted to an acreage conservation reserve to protect it from wind and water erosion, he said.

4 Attend Convention

Four teachers from Bovina High School and Bovina Junior High School attended the 63rd Annual Meeting of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics in San Antonio, April 17-20.

"Exploring Curriculum Alternatives" was the theme of the council's 1985 convention. Ladies attending were Diane Nold, Judith Jennings, Gladys Spring and Frances Willard.

Over 500 presentations and hands-on workshops conducted by outstanding national and international mathematics educators covered topics at all levels of mathematics education. Hundreds of commercial exhibitors displayed textbooks and instructional materials and demonstrated the latest educational technology and software. Five thousand people attended the NCTM Annual Meeting, which was the highlight of Mathematics Education Week.

The National Council of Teachers of Mathematics is comprised of 60,000 members dedicated to the idea of excellence in mathematics for all students of all levels.

Free Cheese Date

The free cheese distribution program will be held in the county on Thursday, May 9. Bovina's cheese will be distributed at the Community Action Center.

Crop base acres enrolled in the 1985 farm programs include 176,332.2 acres of feed grains, 109,442.8 acres of wheat, and 89,446.6 acres of upland cotton.

Designed to control excess crop supplies and maintain a level of stocks in line with market demand, the acreage reduction programs offered incentives to farmers to reduce plantings. Program participants will be eligible for price support loans at National Rate of \$3.30 a bushel for wheat, \$2.55 for corn, \$2.08 for barley, \$1.31 for oats, \$2.42 for sorghum, and \$0.55 per pound for upland cotton. They are also eligible for target prices of \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.88 for sorghum, \$2.60 for barley, \$1.60 for oats, \$4.38 for wheat, and 81 cents per pound for upland cotton.

In addition to the above benefits, wheat and upland cotton participants will be eligible for land diversion payments. These payments compensate farmers for taking land out of production in addition to the acreage reduction requirement, the ASCS official said.

Youngsters are also encouraged to take part in the cleaning effort.

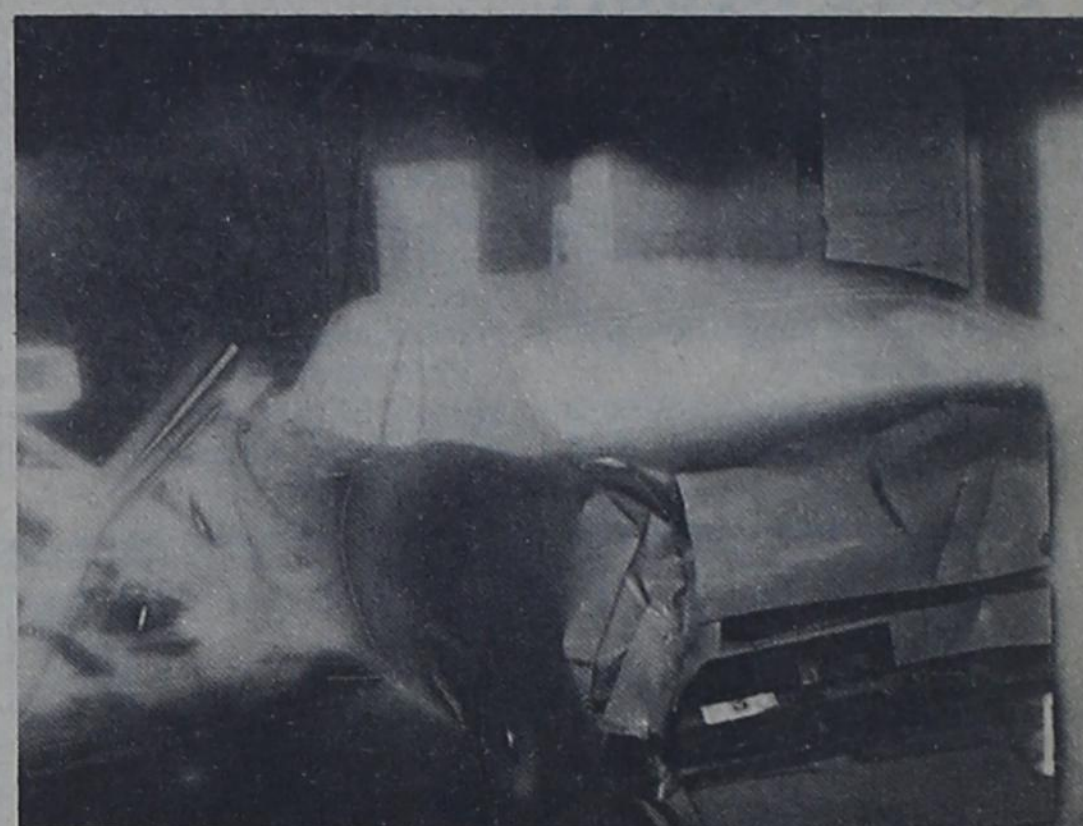
Banquet Is Set May 18

The car was knocked into the wall of a bedroom and a portion of the wall fell across a bed where Johnny's niece, Diane Lucero and her two-year-old twin sons, Adam and Anthony of Clovis, were sleeping.

Viernes then shifted the pickup into drive and raced back across the street, narrowly missing the corner of the residence belonging to Pete Rocha, but the pickup struck the Rochas' high wooden fence. The fence was broken and

Viernes' pickup came to rest in the Rochas' back yard.

Tito Viernes was cited for driving while intoxicated and arrested for reckless driving. He is out on bail and his license has been suspended for ninety days.

Martinez' car, a 1971 Ford, was totaled in the accident, and was valued at \$1,600. Damages to the items in the bedroom were estimated to be \$1,000. The items destroyed were a bicycle, chest of drawers, digital radio and a television set. Damage to the fence belonging to Pete Rocha was estimated to be \$1,000. At press time, the damage loss to the Martinez home had not been determined.

Mrs. Lucero and her twin sons were uninjured, but the twins were taken to the hospital, examined and released.

Third prize will consist of a Datatrim talking computer scale to "Let you know if your diet is working."

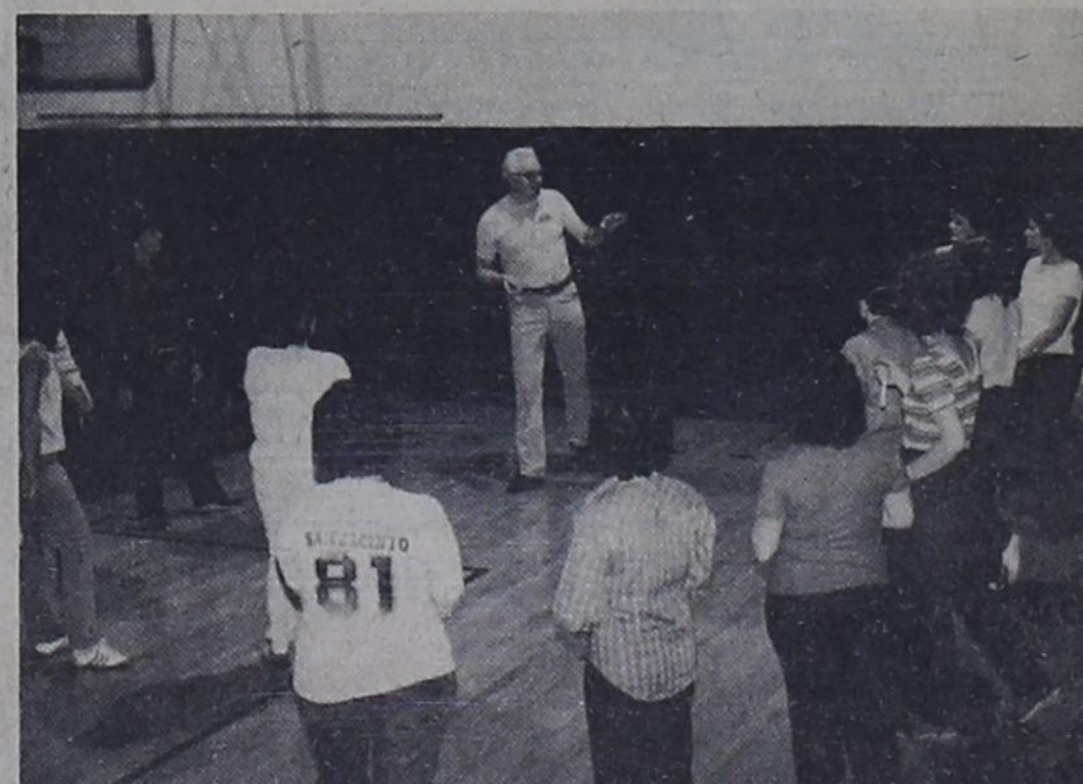
