

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Deadline to Sign For Medicare Set For March 31

People who didn't sign up for Medicare medical insurance when they first became eligible or who have cancelled the protection once can enroll now through March 31 at any social security office, according to Franklin Upp, social security district manager in San Angelo, Texas.

Medicare medical insurance is offered automatically to people who reach 65 and are eligible for social security benefits -- and to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to monthly social security disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more. Nine out of 10 people eligible are enrolled in the program, according to Upp.

"But some people decline the protection when they're first eligible," he said. "And some sign up once and cancel later. They can enroll in the first 3 months of any year." Medical insurance helps "Farmer's Tax Guide," pay doctor bills and other medical expenses and is the voluntary part of Medicare, funded by individual premiums and Federal general revenues. The basic premium is \$7.20 a month through June 1977. It will be \$7.70 a month for the 12-month period starting in July 1977.

"People who decline Medicare medical insurance and delay signing up for more than a year pay a higher premium," Upp noted. "People who sign up and cancel later can re-enroll only once."

Medical insurance supplements Medicare hospital insurance, which is funded by social security contributions from workers, employers, and self-employed

people. "People 65 and over who are not eligible for social security or railroad retirement benefits can apply at any social security office and get Medicare hospital insurance by paying a premium," Upp said. "The basic premium is \$45 a month through June 1977. It will be \$54 a month for the 12-month period starting in July 1977. People who buy hospital insurance must also sign up for the medical insurance." he said.

Medicare is administered by the Social Security Administration, an agency of the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. The San Angelo social security office is at 2214 Sherwood Way. The phone number is 949-4608.

Tax Form Due From Farmers

Farmers who have not filed their 1976 declaration of estimated Federal income tax must file and pay that tax by Monday, January 17. The sole exception to this rule is if they file their income tax return and pay the total tax due by March 1, the Internal Revenue Service said today.

Farmers are defined as those persons who earned at least two-thirds of their 1976 gross income from farming.

IRS Publications 225, and 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," provide additional information and are available free at local IRS offices.

Mystery Disease Halts Swine Flu **Vaccine Program**

Public health officials investigating the relationship between swine flu inoculation and a fairly rare disease face problems because no one knows much about the disease itself, the Texas Medical Association says.

The biggest mystery is the cause of Guillain-Barre syndrome, a paralytic disease. This syndrome, which seldom is fatal, has occurred after people have had colds, flu, measles and about 40 other diseases, one report shows. Yet the same 1966 study says about one third of the cases analyzed had not been sick before they got the syndrome. Ever since scientists first described the disease more than 115 years ago, people have been trying to pinpoint the cause. Fairly popular ideas blame viruses or certain allergies but these are just a few of the theories. The disease strikes all ages and both sexes indiscreminately and may be increasing, a 1963 Ohio study shows.

Symptoms vary but generally there is a tingling in the hands or feet, or both. There may be weakness, muscle pain, paralysis of some body parts, breathing problems, difficulty in swallowing and other symptoms. Hospitalization often is needed during the worst part of the disease but most victims recover. Doctors can give supportive treatment but there is no known cure for the disease itself. Recovery generally ranges from three weeks to two months. A small number die (2-5 percent) or (about 10 percent). Only isolated statis-

tics have been kept but one researcher estimates that there are 10-20 cases per million people. This would mean 120-240 cases every year in Te-

A. Bird, was finaled July 30, 1975 to pump 22 barrels of 40.1 gravity oil, plus two barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 182-1, through perforations at 5,231-239 feet. It topped the Saddle Creek at 4,043 feet; Odom, 6,492 feet; and Ellenburger, 6,805 feet on ground elevation of 2,068 feet.



GROW YOUR OWN POISETTIA PLANT

With some tender loving care, that poinsetta plant you received for Christmas can be brought into flower again next Christmas season. Once the plant loses its color, reduce watering and store it in a cool place. Cut the stems back about mid-April, repot the plant, water it thoroughly, and place it in a sunny window. As new growth begins, fertilize the plant every two weeks. When danger of frost is past, move the plant outdoors and pinch back new shoots as they develop. Move the plant back indoors before frost in the fall and put it in a sunny location. Starting the first week in October and continuing through Thanksgiving, keep the plant in complete darkness from 5 p.m. to 8 a.m. In the daytime, keep it near a sunny window.


