Thomas Dalton Black, 63, of Robert Lee died Dec. 31, in the Audie Murphy Veterans Hospital in San Antonio.

Born Oct. 10, 1913 in Comanche County, he was a line driver for East Texas Motor Freight. He married Virginia May Elliott, June 5, 1954, in Lovington, N. M. He was a member of the Woodmen of the World and was a veteran of World War II, serving in the Army. He and his wife moved to Robert Lee in June of 1974.

MRS. THELMA ODOM AND R. J. HUNDLE


kes, who has been appointed "Officer In Charge" of the Silver Post Office.


Two aspects of the large United Methodist mission program have been designated to benefit from this year's special offering:
