



Let us take this opportunity to thank you for your patronage of the Coke County Library.

If you have not visited the Library recently you might be interested to know we are overflowing with books. some 8,000 in fact. If, out of this 8,000 volumes, there happens to be one we don't have, we are a member of the Texas Inter-Library Loan System from which you can request and receive almost any book.

Circulation has reached 450 volumes per month. This is far and above the average circulation for a library of our size.

So far the Library has been staffed and maintained through Federal Manpower funding, volunteer donations (remember the fish fry), and county funds.

In order to continue as a member of the Texas Library System, by March of 1977, we must have a budget of \$5,000, one-half of which must be county funded. As a member of the Texas Library System we will be eligible for state


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Persons on a low-fat. low-cholesterol or lowcalorie diet may have difficulty selecting foods from menus when eating away from home. First, try to eat in

a restaurant, cafeteria or sandwich shop where a variety of foods are served. Inquire how certain foods are prepared if you are not sure. Ask to substitute margarine for butter, if margarine is not available, eat your bread or potato plain. Ask that your meat be baked or broiled without butter.

When your food is served, trim the fat from meat and remove the skin from poultry. Remove breading and eat as little sauce and gravy as possible.

Try to select fruit compote, fruit juice, onion or vegetable soup or sonsomme as an appetizer. Good entree selections include broiled or baked fish, chicken, beef, turkey, veal, ham or pork. Also, London broil, boiled or broiled crab, lobster and oysters are good choices.

Salad choices might include tossed salad with Italian dressing, cole slaw, carrot and raisin, Cribbs of Olney. Waldorf or fruit salad. All vegetable except those fried in batter or cooked in butter are acceptable.

Good choices for bread include sliced bread, hard rolls, breadsticks,

saltines, English muffins and French bread. And for dessert, select from fruit, fruit ice, sherbet, gelatin or unfrosted angel food cake. LABEL ON RETURNS SPEEDS UP REFUND

Taxpayers can receive their refunds faster by using the preaddressed peel-off label on their Held in Honolulu returns, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The label, which appears on the cover of the tax package mailed to taxpayers, lists name, address and social security number. The IRS emphasized that if any information on the label is incorrect, the taxpayer

should make corrections right on the label. Married taxpayers filing a joint return should check to see that two social security numbers appear on the label. If only one social security number is shown, the other spouse's number should



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

The broad based campaign utilized the main theme "Ford and Texans Go Together", and the signature line, "Ford and Texans -- We Go Back a Long Way".

The campaign, according to Morris, recalls Ford's long association with Texans, with advertising featuring 1931 Model A pickup "still on the job" in partnership with a new F-100, and a nostalgic look back at the famous 1940 Ford V-8's, compared to the 1977 LTD and LTD. II.

"Ford and Texans really do go together" Morris said. "Ford sells more trucks here in Texas than anywhere in the country, for example. We're reinforcing the feeling we Texans have for our history, our heritage. Ford truly is a Texas tradition"




