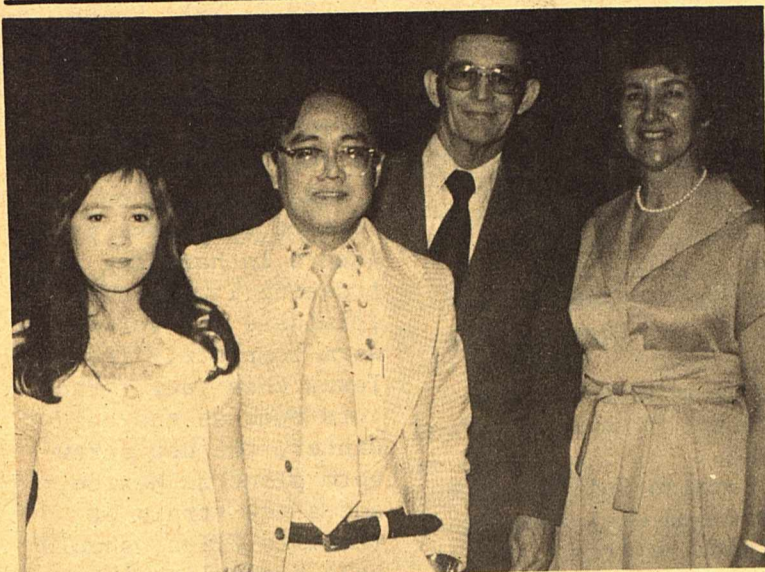

Three Elections to Be Held April 2

Qualified voters of Robert Lee and the area will have an opportunity April 2 to vote in one, two and three elections, depending upon their place of residence. City, school and hospital district elections have been called for that date.

SCHOOL BOARD

The Robert Lee Independent School District board of trustees called an election at a meeting Feb. 10. Balloting will be at the school. Trustees whose terms expire this year are Wilbern Millikan and J. C. Wallace Jr. Trustees who have either one or two more years to serve include Phil Ray, Joe Flowers, Joe Ash, John Stephens and Ben Bessent.

Mrs. Bobby Roberts will serve as election judge and clerks will be Mrs. Freeman Clark, Mrs. Teddy Pitcock and Mrs. G. C. Walker.

Candidates who wish to file for one of the positions may go by the office of Supt. Jimmy Bickley and fill out the necessary forms. Deadline for filing is 30 days before the election.

HOSPITAL DISTRICT

The board of West Coke County Hospital District met Feb. 15 and called a directors election, also for April 2. Balloting will be

in the Coke County Courthouse with Mrs. Cumbie Ivey Jr. serving as election judge. Directors whose terms expire this year are Joe Ash and W. E. Jacoby. Holdovers with another year to serve are Fern Havins, Conrad Millican and Foy Askins.

Interested candidates should file at the office of Administrator Robert Vernor at the hospital before the deadline 25 days before the election.

CITY ELECTION

Robert Lee's City Council met Feb. 1 and ordered an election, also for April 2. Voters will cast their ballots at the City Hall to elect three aldermen. Those whose terms expire are Allen Clendennen, F. W. Prentice and Lewis Heuvel. Council members who have another year to serve are Mayor S. E. Adams and Aldermen Wilson Bryan and N. J. Keith.

Prospective candidates should contact City Secretary Mrs. Edna Havins to file for the council jobs. Filing deadline is 30 days before the election.

Mrs. Havins said Tuesday that Keith has submitted his resignation as he is moving to Dallas, and some

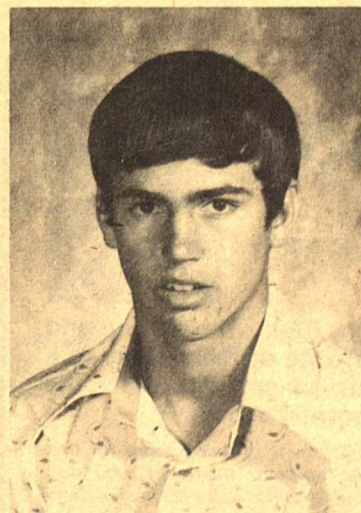

Commissioners

Have Busy Day

The Coke County Commissioners Court met Monday and voted to allocate \$2,500 for use of the Coke County Library. Complete details are contained in another story in this newspaper.

The commissioners also approved a 10 per cent increase in pay for all county officials.

In other business the commissioners:

*Rejected two bids for a new automobile for the Sheriff's Department. They will advertise for bids again for a car which will contain some police equipment not included in the original bids.

*Heard a report by Jack Parsons of the State Wildlife Commission and local Game Warden R. L. Flanagan on game laws and the special regulatory proclamation for Coke County. The report shows only minor changes from last year's regulations.

*Accepted bids of the Robert Lee State Bank and the First National Bank of Bronte to serve as depositories for county funds.

County Judge W. W. Thetford said the group had a busy day with a full agenda.

1976 Sales Tax Totals Revealed

Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Thursday that Texas cities received a total of \$302.9 million in city sales tax rebates last year, a 14 percent increase over the 1975 calendar year.

The cities received \$264.5 million in 1975, he said.

The totals are included in an analysis prepared by Bullock's office showing the total rebates received by Texas cities for the calendar years 1975 and 1976.

The City of Robert Lee received \$14,183.41 for 1976, compared to

\$11,599.38 in 1975, an increase of 22 per cent.

Receiving sales tax money was a new experience for the city fathers of Bronte, since 1976 is the first year a city sales tax has been collected. Bronte received \$9,612.48 for 1976.

City officials may place the sales tax

money into any fund where it is needed, but ordinarily it is placed in the general fund of the cities.

The City of Houston led the state in total rebates with a total of \$62.6 million in 1976. Dallas collected \$35.3 million, San Antonio \$18.9 million, Fort Worth \$12.3 million and Austin \$9.1 million.

The City of Sachse topped the list with collections up 444 percent last year. The cities of Krugerville, Roanoke and Windom all received increases in excess of 100 percent.

The one percent city sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the four percent state sales tax and is returned to the cities by the Comptroller's Office on a monthly basis.

REPORT BOND SALES

November sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Coke County were reported today by Coun-ty Bond Chairman G. C. Allen. Sales for the eleven-month period totaled \$21,726 for 48% of the 1976 sales goal of \$45,000.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$22,560,585, while sales for the first eleven months of 1976 totaled \$254,887,405 with 94% of the yearly sales goal of \$272.4 million achieved.

CAMPAIGN AIMED AT SCREWORMS

A special campaign to deal a final death blow to the tenacious screwworm is being launched. Called "Mis-sion '77: Stamp out Screwworms," the cam-paign will be kicked off at a conference called by Gov. Dolph Briscoe in Austin Feb. 24 at 9:30 a.m. at the Municipal Audi-torium. The campaign is designed to create a new vigilance on the part of livestock pro-ducers in handling and treating livestock to eliminate the screw-worm completely from Texas this year. Fac-tors such as the cold winter, the new screw-worm plant in Mexico, and a new strain of sterile flies, should help accomplish this goal, contends the director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

TEXAS ON THE WAY

Texas is making steady progress toward be-coming the leading state in agricultural income, says the di-rector of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. A special campaign, "On Our Way to No. 1," was launched by the Extension Ser-vice in 1974. The tar-get date is 1980 and the goal is \$8.436 billion. Agricultural income for 1976 is ex-pected to total \$6.618 billion, second only to 1973 and \$600 mil-lion above 1975 figures. The Lone Star State should reach the No. 1 spot by the target date assuming the normal rate of growth for the states currently lead-ing Texas.

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INSUR-MATION

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Two of our children are in the high school band and own their own instruments. One of them plays in a group. Will the instruments be covered under the normal rates in our Homeowner's policy?

The answer lies in whether an instrument is being used for professional or amateur pursuits. An amateur musician who only makes an occasional dollar would qualify for non-professional rates, which are lower. However, if the musician plays regularly for pay, even if only as a member of a group, accepting dates to play whenever they can get them, the professional rates are probably indicated to meet the requirements of the underwriters and claim adjusters. Check with your agent, explaining your exact situation, to be sure the instruments are adequately and correctly insured.

HIRSCHFELT SPEAKS TO '64 STUDY CLUB

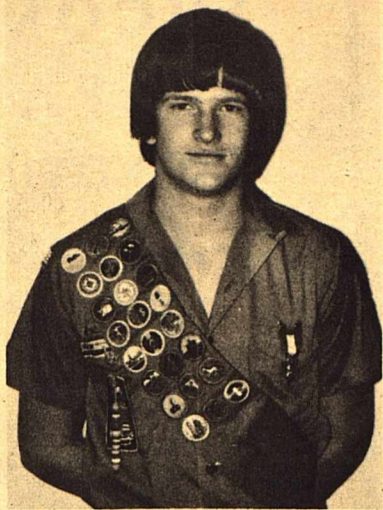

Freeze Potatoes Baked or As 'Fries'

"Potatoes can be frozen baked or stuffed or as french fries," a specialist of the Extension Service said, and told how to do it correctly.

To freeze baked and stuffed potatoes, bake and stuff as usual. Package in moisture-vapor-resistant container or bag.

To prepare, bake without thawing in a hot oven, 400 degrees F., until thoroughly heated and lightly browned. Store two to four weeks.

To freeze french fries, select mature potatoes suitable for frying. Wash, pare and cut into one-fourth-inch uniform strips. Heat in boiling water two minutes or blanch in steam three minutes. Chill in cold water three minutes. Drain and tumble dry in a towel. Fill fry kettle one-third full of fat and heat to 360 degrees F., keeping the fry basket in the fat. Raise basket and add potato strips to cover bottom of basket. Lower basket into fat and fry until strips are cooked, but not brown.

Remove basket from fat and drain potato strips before turning out on

SERVING--BROWN 'FRIES'

Before serving frozen french fries, brown them in fat or in the oven.

To brown in fat, thaw strips in package at room temperature for two-three hours. Remove strips from container, pat lightly with towels to remove condensed moisture. Be sure all strips are at room temperature before they are put into hot fat. Heat fat to 375 degrees F. with basket in fat. Lift basket and put about two layers of completely thawed potatoes in basket. Fry for about one minute, or until potatoes are golden brown. Remove from fat, drain and serve immediately.

To brown in oven, brown unthawed potato strips in 500 degree F. oven for ten minutes, turning as needed or brown in oven for five minutes, followed by three minutes in the broiler pan. Pan-fries browned in the oven or broiler are less tender and less oily than those browned in fat.

Angora Goat Numbers Are Up

It may come as a surprise, but Angora goat numbers are rising.

Sheep people have realized their low-numbers predicament and have begun to work toward reversing the trend, but statistics are still saying "sorry". Not so, apparently, with goat producers. The difference may have something to do with \$4 mohair.

Most hair raisers say their numbers improvement can be attributed to increased longevity--old goats are living longer. They're not healthier, necessarily, it's just that the value of another clip or two has raised the compassion level of their two-legged mentors.

In the world of domesticated beasts, a longer useful life often corresponds to a longer life, period. At any rate, Angora numbers, says the U. S. government, are higher now than they were a year ago, and the 1976 kid crop falls far short of praise as the determining factor.

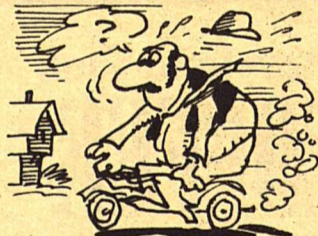

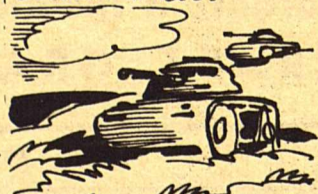

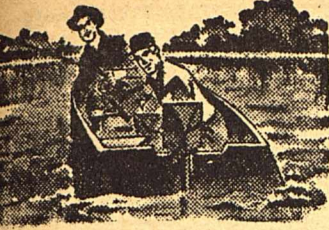

Commissioners Vote \$2500 for County Library

Coke County Commissioners Court agreed in a meeting Monday to go along with the County Library Committee's request for \$2,500 in tax money as half of a \$5,000 library budget for this year.

The library committee was particularly interested in having the money available in order to fulfill requirements to be eligible for a \$15,000 grant from the state, which is available only this year, and applications have to be filed by April 1.

Money from the state would come as an establishment grant from funds which have been set aside especially for the establishment of new libraries in small towns of Texas. Without the \$2,500 from the county, the library would not be eligible to apply for the state money and would lose the \$15,000, it was pointed out.

Meeting with the commissioners were some 24 Coke County backers of the library. Also attending and explaining the library program were Alice Speck and Jack Hastings of the State Library Commission.

The visitors told the commissioners that the \$15,000 grant was a "one time deal" and was available only to help new libraries get started.

Another requirement to receive the grant is that the library be open to the public at least 20 hours per week. The commissioners estimated that the \$2,500 in county money should be sufficient to pay a librarian's salary for four hours a day, five days a week, and also pay the utilities bills.

County Judge W. W. Thetford said the county grant was approved and the money will be made available only if the grant from the state is approved.

Mrs. Ben Bessent, a backer of the library, told the Observer Tuesday that the local group now has to raise the additional \$2,500 needed to make up the \$5,000 budget which is required. "We will be relying on the interest and generosity of the people of Coke County to raise the money," she said.

PRODUCERS ARE KEY TO PEST CONTROL

Texas cattlemen hold the key in controlling an old nemesis--the screwworm--and a relatively new but equally destructive pest--the Gulf Coast ear tick. Ear ticks cause wounds that lead to increased screwworm cases. Now insecticide-treated ear tags are available for long-term ear tick control. Use of these ear tags along with a change in breeding programs so that cows will calve in winter and early spring will be two steps in reducing screwworm cases, says an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The raw navels of calves born during the peak screwworm season are prime targets for the flesh-eating pests.
