LAND PRICES RISING

Rural land values continue to increase over the United States although the rise hasn't been as fast in Texas as in the Midwest. For the year ending Nov. 1, farm real estate values the entire nation but only about 7 per cent in Texas, notes an economist with the Extension Service. The sharp increase raised the U. S. average price per acre for rural land from \$380 to \$445. The increase in rural land values stems mainly from a strong farm income

as a result of increased demand for agricultural products, especially from foreign countries.


Guidelines also have been set up and must be met by those who qualify as Day Mothers, making them eligible to keep children.

Prices Raised

Subscriptions to the Robert Lee Observer will be increased, efféctive

Yearly subscription in Coke County will be raised to \$5.00 per year of \$4.00.

Subscriptions in Texas outside the county will be \$6.00 per year increased from the present price of \$5.00.

The paper outside the state will be \$7.50 per year, increased of \$6.00.

Steadily increasing prices of production and handling necessitate the raise in price. At the same time single copy prices will be 15 cents, which will be five cents more than the present price of 10 cents. The new 15 cent price will include the sales tax.

"We are sorry to have to make this increase," said the publisher, Ben Oglesby, "but it is essential if we are to continue operations." This will be the first increase in subscription prices since 1973.

NEW VARIETIES OF WHEAT DEVELOPED

Several people have commented about a field of wheat near San Angelo that remained green and making some vegetative growth while other small grain fields in the area have been completely stopped by the winters' cold weather.

The variety name of the wheat in question is sage. This is a variety developed in Kansas. Another variety you may be hearing about is osage. This variety was developed in Oklahoma from sage parent stock.

The Chillicothe Experiment Station tests last year indicate sage and osage will produce well in Texas. Sage was the top grain producer and osage was second in the station tests last year. Similar results were recorded in field tests near Merkel in Taylor County. We do not have any forage test results on the two varieties, but they appear to be able to withstand severe cold weather better than some other varieties.

CONTROL OF GARDEN INSECTS IMPORTANT

Although things may be looking good for your spring vegetable garden as far as the eye can see, there may be a hidden problem in the form of soil insects.

Checking a soil sample can reveal some of these

Insects such as wireworms and false wireworms are the biggest damagers to plant seed and roots of young plants.

The white grub or grubworm is also a common soil pest, and the cut worm and its cousins can cause large losses in the garden during the night hours.

Other pests that do severe damage to vegetable crops underground include soil maggots, rootworms and more crickets.

These soil insects along with damaging nematodes may be controlled with Diazinon. For an area of 1,000 square feet, use threefourths cup of a 25 per cent emulsion concentrate in two and one-half to three gallons of water or a half cup of 50 per cent wettable powder in the same amount of water.

Treat the soil just before seeds are planted. Apply the insecticide to the soil surface and then till the soil to a depth of four to six inches.

Small Business as counties have been Administration is making Emergency Energy Shortage Loans to small businesses which have stantial economic harm because of shortages of energy or energyrelated materials. According to Krueger, the loans are available to firms throughout the country and can be used Ronald and Joe Clay and for working capital to had there not been an energy shortage. In addition, the funds may be used to refinance short-term, and some long-term, debts and to convert a small business to alternative fuel usage. Krueger said the SBA

informed him that the direct, immediate participation, or bank guarantee loans may be made for a period of up to thirty years. Direct loans and SBA'S share of an immediate participation loan may not exceed \$500,000, except in cases of extreme hardship, and bear an interest rate of 6-5/8% per annum. Bank guarantee loans and a bank's share of an immediate participation loan have no dollar limitation. Interest rates on bank guarantee loans and a bank's share of an immediate participation bank, Krueger said.

"These loans are in addition to loans that regular physical disaster loan program to business of all sizes in states and areas major disaster areas by the President, or disaster areas declared by the Administrator of SBA," Krueger said.

Teachers to Have Legislative Meet

Teachers and school officials in 18 West Texinvited to attend a "Legislative Update Session" of the Texas State Teachers Association at 6 p.m. Thursday, March 3, at the John Glenn Junior High School Cafeteria, 2201 University.

This briefing on TSTAproposed bills and other education legislation now pending in the 65th Texas Legislature will be presented by John Hill of Austin, director of the TSTA membership and member services division.

.TSTA District XV leaders expected to assist include Billy Harwell, district president, and Jeanette Boster, legislative chairperson, both of San Angelo.

TSTA Executive Secretary Callie W. Smith of Austin said, "We invite and urge all educators in the district to attend this legislative update session to learn what the Legislature is doing about public education in general, and the six bills of TSTA."

One of the bills sponsored by the 140,000 member teachers association which has already been passed and sent to Governor Dolph Briscoe is Senate Bill 188, by Sen. Lindon Williams of Houston.

This bill calls for a change in present teacher certification to allow persons with high school certificates to teach in grade 6 as well as in grades 7 through 12.

A TSTA-sponsored sick leave bill (Senate Bill 313 by Sen. H. Tati Santiesteban of El Paso) has been voted out of the Senate Education Committee with a recommendation that it be passed. This bill would change the present teacher sick leave law to provide all Texas public school employees at least one day sick leave for each month they work.

Other TSTA-backed bills which were awaiting action in Senate and House committees in mid-February are a school finance bill, teacher retirement bill, professional consultation bill, and a teacher contract bill. Current status of each of these will be discussed at the legislative brief-


