### Gartman Is Top Conservationist

Bryan Gartman, longtime Sanco ranchman, has been named Coke County Conservationist of the year, it was revealed at an awards program last Thursday night at Angelo State University's Houston Harte Center.

Gartman and other outstanding conservationists of the area were presented certificates for their work in saving soil and water on their places.

Eph Cummins, Coke County conservationist, said Gartman has carried out an extensive program on conservation on his 800 acre ranch in the Sanco area. Included have been root plowing, range seeding, terrace construction and the building of diversion structures.

Plans for the future call for water work development and shaping of critical areas subject to erosion. Gartman will receive additional recognition for his work at a future meeting of the Robert Lee-Silver Lions Club.

### Papers Running County Audit

The annual Coke County audit is being published in this week's paper. Readers who take time to study the report by County Auditor Weldon Fikes will find that the operation of the county is a million dollar business, as there was \$1,082,511.26 available in all the county funds. However, the commissioners' court didn't spend but \$657,555.67, leaving a balance of \$424,955.59 on Dec. 31, 1976.

The audit shows that county money is carried in eight operating funds: General, Road and Bridge, Farm to Market, Lateral Road, Social Security, Law Library, Criminal Justice Planning and Coke County Revenue Sharing; plus an interest and sinking fund for retirement of the Coke County Road Bond issue of 1972.

The table being published shows for each fund the balance on Jan. 1, 1976; the receipts and transfers. during the year; the total amount available; disbursements and transfers; and the balance on Dec. 31, 1976.

The report also shows the amount of bonded and warranted indebtedness of the county which amounts to \$20,-000 in warrants and \$135,000 in bonds for a total of \$155,000.

The report being published is only a summary of the 26 pages of tabulations compiled in the auditor's office. Anyone who would like to see the complete report may go by Fikes' office. Also, copies of the audit are available for study at the office of the Bronte Enterprise and the Robert Lee Observer.



The wedding will take place June 18 in Robert Lee Baptist Church with the Rev. Roy Epperson doing the honors for the couple.


### Cities Receive Sales Tax Money

Robert Lee and Bronte have received their city sales tax rebates for the first quarter of 1977 from the office of Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Robert Lee's bank account was increased \$2,916.93 upon receipt of the tax money, while Bronte received \$2,350.02. The cities can use the money for various expenses in city government. The amounts are based on 1% of the sales and services which are taxable under the Texas law.

The comptroller's office mailed out a total of \$89.5 million to all the cities of the state which collect sales tax.

Bullock also announced a new rule for small businesses in the state which collect \$300 or less in sales tax during the year. These firms, beginning immediately, will be allowed to file their returns and remit the tax money to the state once a year instead of every three months.
