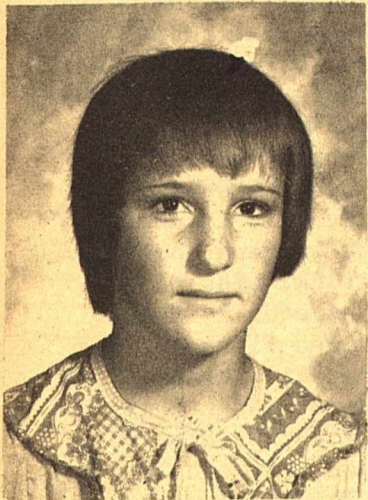

Abilene Man Is Believed Drowned

Work was continuing late Wednesday at Lake Spence in the search for the body of an Abilene man who is believed to have drowned at the lake. Joseph R. Johnson, 51, of Abilene has been missing since Saturday afternoon when his boat was found overturned in 40-80 feet of water.

Information received from the office of Sheriff J. Lee Ensor Wednesday said that work is continuing in the search. A host of persons have been involved in trying to find Johnson's body, including local and state law officers, personnel from the Parks and Wildlife De-

Anthony Percifull presented the 1976-77 cheerleaders and then introduced the girls who will be leading the cheering section for next school year's Steer activities.

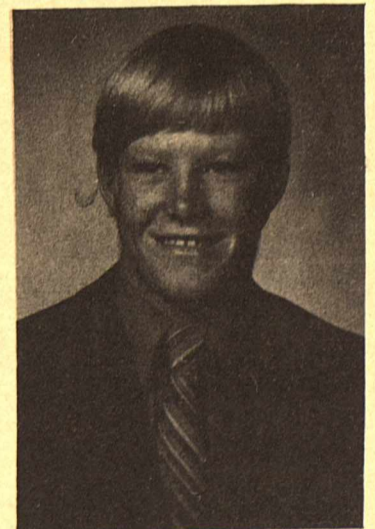
Vicki Gartman announced that Anthony Percifull was selected as Pep Squad Hero for the year and presented him with a gift.

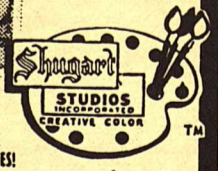

Robert Lee's Logo — The Story of It

"Robert Lee - Yesterday, Today, Tomorrow" was the city's Bicentennial Theme, its past, present and future symbolized by the sun's rays which form the upper part of a circular background.

A Jackrabbit represents the nickname, given in jest to early pioneers in Coke County, - "Coke County Rabbit Twisters." According to legend, they learned to twist rabbits out of burrows with a stick or wire, thus providing meat for their tables. The name has come to imply creativity, independence and good humor which Coke County Rabbit Twisters employ today with pride.

Agriculture, backbone of Coke County economy, since early days, is symbolized by the Steer which is also the Robert Lee School mascot.

"Black Gold" was discovered in the area in 1942, benefiting all citizens directly or indirectly. An oil derrick symbolizes the industry which stabilizes the industry which stabilized the economy of Coke County.

Robert Lee was created in 1891; 1976 was the glorious year of our Nation's Bicentennial Celebration.

"Playground of West Texas" became the slogan of Robert Lee before the two installations, Spence Lake and Mountain Creek Golf Course, were created with some citizens feeling the caption was a comical untruth. However, both have influenced growth of population and economy, and the slogan now is highly appropriate.

The Logo's circular background symbolizes Continuity,--building upon the foundation of Forefathers' "Yesterdays" to make "TODAYS" and "TOMORROWS" better. As Robert Lee forges ahead into the nation's third century, the Present is irrevocably linked with the Past and the Future.

Robert Lee's Logo was designed by Lucile Bryan. Her first plan included only one recreational facility, Spence Lake. Robert Vaughan suggested the slogan, "Playground of West Texas," be used because "everybody knows Robert Lee by that." (Vaughan suggested the slogan when he served as Mayor several years ago, and the

BCD erected the signs which now stand on each of the three highways leading into town.)

Lewis Heuval asked why Mountain Creek Golf Course was not pictured, "because that's very important to the town!" Lucile revised her plan to include both, and the Bicentennial Committee adopted it for the year of 1976.

Mac Adkins painted the design, and from the finished product were made commemorative coins, necklaces, key rings and decals. Sale of the items covered expenses. Profits were used for projects benefiting the entire community.

Wanda Smith, at Committee request, prepared kits including the logo painted on canvas, thread, and directions for needle-pointing, which many women have enjoyed.

All Logos with two dates are Collectors' items. They will never be made again. The City's Logo for the future will bear only the date 1891, the year of the City's birthday. The first use of the new design is the patch appearing on Robert Lee School Band's new uniforms worn for Spring Concert on May 17, 1977. Bicentennial Committee funds paid for the patches.

In its regular meeting on May 3, 1977, Robert Lee's city council members voted to adopt the Logo with the one date, 1891, and the slogan, "Welcome to Robert Lee, Playground of West Texas" as the city's legal Logo and Slogan.

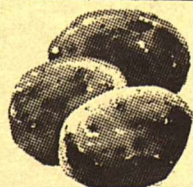

Mike Ezzell's Report

Several major pieces of anti-crime legislation were approved by House members recently in our efforts to curb the increasing rate of crime:

---SB 156 proposes to authorize search warrants for items "tending to show" that a particular person committed a crime, rather than existing law which requires that search warrants be issued only for specified items.

---SB 52 will allow trial courts to deny bond during appeal procedures where punishment does not exceed 15 years.

---SB 152 would deny probation for persons convicted of certain violent crimes or who used a firearm in the commission of a second degree felony. The measure would also provide for mandatory supervision of certain released felons.

---Senate Joint Resolution 3 proposes a constitutional amendment to permit denial of bail to persons accused of a felony while free on bail for allegedly committing another crime.

---SJR 18 proposes another constitutional amendment to enlarge the Court of Criminal Appeals from five to nine judges and would permit them to sit in panels of three to speed the handling of cases.

In regard to our public school teachers, the House approved an increased teacher pay raise measure totaling some \$369 million and two measures to increase teacher retirement benefits which will put some \$213 million into the Teacher Retirement System.

The teacher pay bill establishes a minimum salary level for beginning teachers on ten-month contracts at \$9024 for 1977-78 and \$9385 for the 1978-79 school year. The bill will also increase the salaries of more ex-

perienced teachers by creating three additional pay steps above the current maximum pay level.

HB 979 provides \$104 million in retirement benefits for already retired teachers, with those who have been retired the longest receiving the largest pension increases.

HB 612 proposes \$109 million in benefits for teachers who will retire in the future and will increase the benefits by about 14 per cent.

House Bills 927 and 928, granting additional authority to the boards of the two Coke County Hospital Districts, have been approved by the Senate. The two measures, which I sponsored, have already received House approval and now need only the Governor's signature to become law.

SB 700, the updated Mentally Retarded Persons Act, which I proposed, has received House approval. The bill must now return to the Senate for approval of House amendments to the measure before going to the Governor's desk.

4-H Soil Judges High in Contest

The Coke County 4-H Club Junior and Senior Soil Judging Teams placed first in the District 7 contests held last week. The senior team will represent District 7 in the state contest to be held at College Station on June 8.

Senior team members were Bill Grant Jr., Lynn Guley, Carolyn Simpson and William Simpson. Carolyn was top scorer in the contest and William was second high scorer.

Junior team members were Donnie Grant, Dennis Koenig, Wayne Sprenkle and Bud Johnson. Bud Johnson was top scorer among the juniors and Dennis Koenig was second high individual.

HIGHWAY 158 TO GET 13 MILES SEALCOAT

Bids for the application of asphaltic seal coat surface on some 190 miles of highways throughout the 13-county San Angelo district are expected to be received at the May 18-19 letting of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Present roadway surfaces on these highways have deteriorated as a result of age, use, and weather damage. Completion of the project will provide a smoother, safer, more skid-resistant surface.

It is expected that the project will be completed in 75 working days, with work being accomplished during the months of June, July, August and September.

James R. Evans of San Angelo will be the department's engineer in charge of the work, while San Angelo District Engineer D. R. Watson will provide overall project supervision.

Included in the seal coat project is about 13½ miles on Highway 158, to run east from the Sterling-Coke County line.

CATTLE LOOK BETTER

Cattle prices should show some improvement this spring and summer, says a livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Price rises for fed and feeder cattle should continue to be rather healthy through the second quarter of the year and into the early part of the third quarter. However, there will be some weakening of prices into fall and winter. Fed cattle prices should top out in July but should generally remain strong throughout the summer months. The improved outlook for cattle prices is a result of lower beef production, some decrease in pork output, and further increases in population and disposable income.

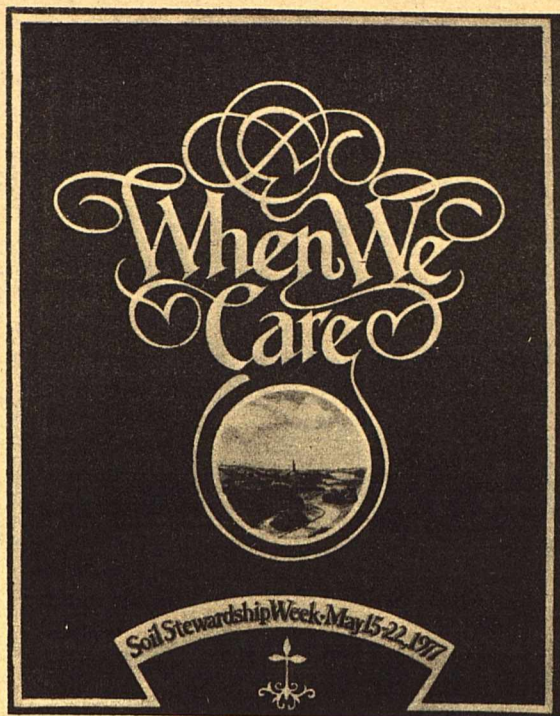

Cities Receive Sales Tax Funds

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday his office has mailed monthly city sales tax rebate checks totaling \$22 million to Texas cities and towns that assess the one per cent tax.

Robert Lee is receiving a check for \$966.68, down slightly from the \$1,086.75 received for the same period of last year. The city's 1977 payments to date amount to \$4,386.18, compared to \$4,313.08 for 1976 payments to date, an increase of one per cent.

Bronte's check for this payment period was \$835.69, up some \$45 for the same period of last year. Bronte's total in 1977 to date amounted to \$3,191.71, compared to \$2,673.73 for the same period of 1976, an increase of 19 per cent.

The May checks bring to \$253.3 million the total rebates for the eight months of the current fiscal year, a \$44 million increase over the same period for fiscal 1976, Bullock said.

But he cautioned that the 23 per cent increase is somewhat misleading.

"The May rebate check actually covers collections for a five week period instead of the usual four weeks, so the June checks obviously will be smaller," he said.

Bullock said that procedural changes have resulted in a substantial increase in early filings by sales tax permit holders, also inflating the year-to-date total.

Even so, Bullock said state and local sales tax collections are growing at a rate well ahead of the national average, reflecting the muscles of Texas' economy.

"We are confident that trend will continue," he added.

As usual, Texas' largest city, Houston, gets the biggest rebate check--- \$4.8 million. Dallas will receive a check for \$2.3 million, San Antonio will get \$1.7 million and Fort Worth, \$924,257.

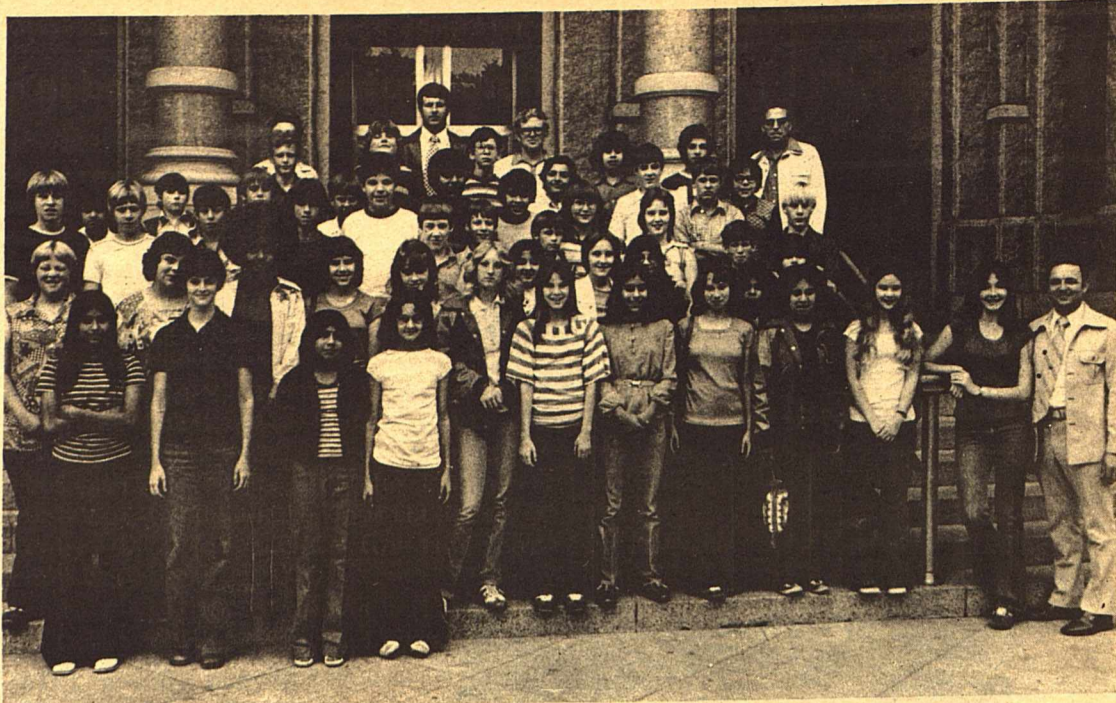

Clay Allen was low scorer for the Robert Lee team with 163, which gave him the number seven spot in the state. Other Robert Lee players and their scores were:

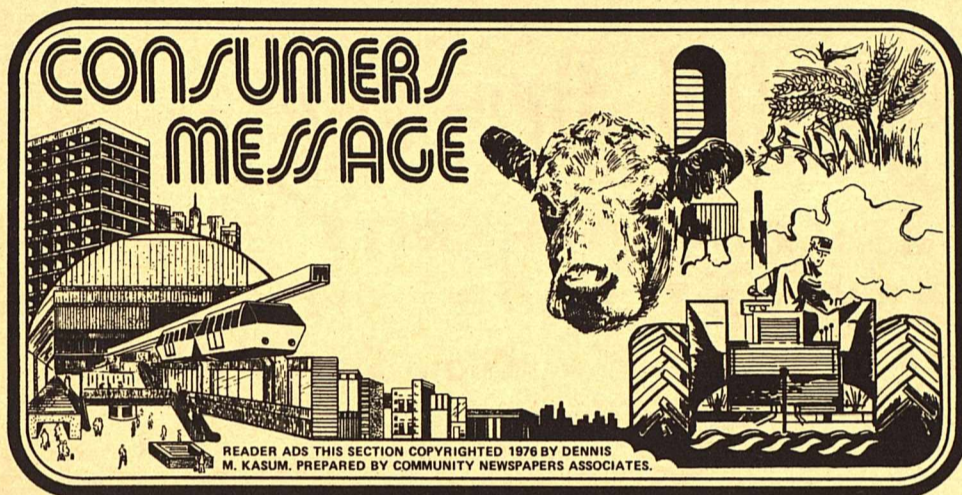
