



Now is the time of year when students all over the country will be graduating from high schools and colleges, making the important decisions that face them about their careers, their educations, and the lives that lie before them. As someone who left academic life after a number of years to take an active part in government and politics, I am often asked for advice or opinions on the issue of the interrelationship of public and private life, and on the importance of education as it relates to a career of public service.

There is little doubt in my mind that higher education is of tremendous value to most of those who pursue it; nonetheless, I am also convinced that some do just as well without it, spending their time learning a trade, attending vocational schools, or otherwise pursuing the course which seems best suited for them.

ed for them. I hope that some of the graduating students in the 21st District will look this year toward careers in public service. There are a number of ways in which young people can contribute to the public good, such as VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America), the Peace Corps, RSVP (Retired Senior Volunteer Program), or the Foreign Service. It is important to me, as I think it is to most people, to feel that the work I do is of some value to others. The pursuit of a public service career, while not offering the kinds of visible and tangible rewards of the private sector, offer substantial immaterial rewards and satisfactions to a personal level, and are of true benefit to society. For those who wish to continue their education in college or vocational schools. the federal government offers a number of programs of financial assistance to those who cannot make it on their own. For more information about such programs as the National Defense Student Loans, the Basic Opportunity Grants, or other financial aid programs, contact your

government that takes place in American universities has proven to be a great asset to our country. In the field of agriculture for example, individual farmers and ranchers do not have the resources or expertise to engage in serious research, but universities, aided by the federal government can. In short, those who have completed their education this year are to be commended. For those to whom this year's commencement marks just another step in a career, I offer my best wishes.





Notes From The Oil Field

Oil activity in Coke County has been on the increase during the past week with one completion and other locations staked.

Completed was Mann Rankin of Midland No. 1 Arledge in the Arledge Field three miles north of Sanco.

The new producer is 487 feet from the south and west lines of Section 261, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was reported at 200 barrels of 45 gravity oil with a trace of water. Flow was through a 10-64 inch choke with packer set on the casing and 850 pounds tubing pressure.

It is producing from perforations at 6,591-94 feet with the 4½ inch casing set on the bottom at 6,660 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,903-1.

Wes-Tex Drilling Co. of Abilene will drill No. 2 S.B. Savage in the Jameson (Strawn) Field two miles northwest of Silver.

The 6,200 foot venture, located on a 79 acre lease, was spotted 660 feet from the north and 1730 feet from the east line of B.H. Humphrey Survey. Wes-Tex Drilling Co. also spotted No. 1-C.W. I Tubb Estate in the Jameson (Strawn) Field in Coke County. The planned 7,000-foot venture is located two miles northwest of Silver on a 70-acre lease. It spots 421 feet from the north and 4,213 feet from the east lines of Sallie C. Savage Survey 10.

Mann Rankin spotted No. 3 Cargile in the Arledge (Lower Pennsylvanian Sand) Field 12 miles north of Robert

The planned 6,700foot venture is located on a 320-acre lease.

Samedan Oil Corp. of Midland will drill No. 1 Harwell as a proposed 6,500-foot wild-

Location is 10 miles southeast of Robert Lee on a 320-acre lease. It spots 660 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the east lines of Section 2, HE&WT Survey, A-1359.

USDA Announces Dates and Rules For Beef Research, Info Referendum

The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced June 6 as the beginning of a two-week registration period for the Beef Research and Information Order referendum and issued rules for the referendum.

Anyone who was a cattle producer during 1976 can register to vote, either in person or by mail, at local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices between June 6 and 17.

A list of those who register will be posted daily at ASCS offices and a final listing will be posted five days after registration closes.

Those registered can vote between July 5 and July 15 at their ASCS

office. For approval of the Beef Research and Information Order, at least 50 per cent of those registered must vote, and two-thirds of them must favor it.

The Order that producers will consider in the upcoming referendum would authorize a research and information program administered by a Beef Board of up to 68 producers. Board members would be appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture from nominations submitted by producer organizations. Each state or geographic area would be represented in proportion to its cattle production.

The Beef Board could initiate a broad spectrum of projects to

improve beef production, distribution and marketing. Such a program could include consumer education and information, and research.

During the first three years of operation, the Board could collect assessments of up to three-tenths of one per cent of the value of all cattle sold. After that, the rate of assessment could be changed but could not exceed five-tenths of one per cent--the maximum amount permitted under the Beef Research and Information Act. Producers not wishing to participate in the program could have their assessment refunded.

The rules for conducting the referendum are scheduled to be published in the May 17 Federal Register. Copies will be available from Program Operations Division, ASCS, U.S. Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013.

Body of Abilene Man Recovered At Lake Spence

The body of Joseph Roscoe Johnson, 51, of Abilene was found in Lake Spence about 8:10 p.m. Sunday. He had been missing since May 14, but all efforts to recover the body had failed due to the depth of the water and heavy brush in the lake bed.

Mr. Johnson's body was spotted from the shore some distance out from the dam on the north side of the lake, and was retrieved by Game Warden R.L. Flanagan.

Sheriff J. Lee Ensor said there was no evidence of foul play.

Funeral services for Mr. Johnson were held Wednesday in Abilene, with military graveside services at Elmwood Memorial Park. He was born Nov. 29, 1925 in Clifton and was married to Jhung Sook Lee in 1957 in Seoul, Korea. He retired from the army in 1973 after 22 years of service and moved to Abilene from Killeen in 1974.

Survivors include his wife; a son; two sisters; two brothers and a niece.



H D Agent's **News Dept.** By Fay C. Roe

Canning and freezing time is upon us and it is most important that good, reliable tested and approved methods are used to insure good quality food. This is important whether you are freezing foods or canning. In canning there is a definite danger of food poisoning if improper methods are used.

All non-acid foods such as green beans, squash, peas, greens, okra, peppers and others must be processed in a pressure canner. Jars must not have chips or cracks and lids must be from a reliable manufacturer with new sealing caps and well taken care of rings. Follow manufacturer's instructions for heating and using.

Frozen foods will continue to mature if the enzymes are not killed through heat. These foods should be heated thoroughly, cooked quickly, package in moisture proof, vapor proof containers labeled and quick frozen to maintain good quality.

We also have pickling information and many ideas for saving your onion and potato crop. Call for any needed information and we will try our best to answer all questions.
