CONGRATULATIONS to the young showmen from the Bovina area who did well in the local and county livestock shows.

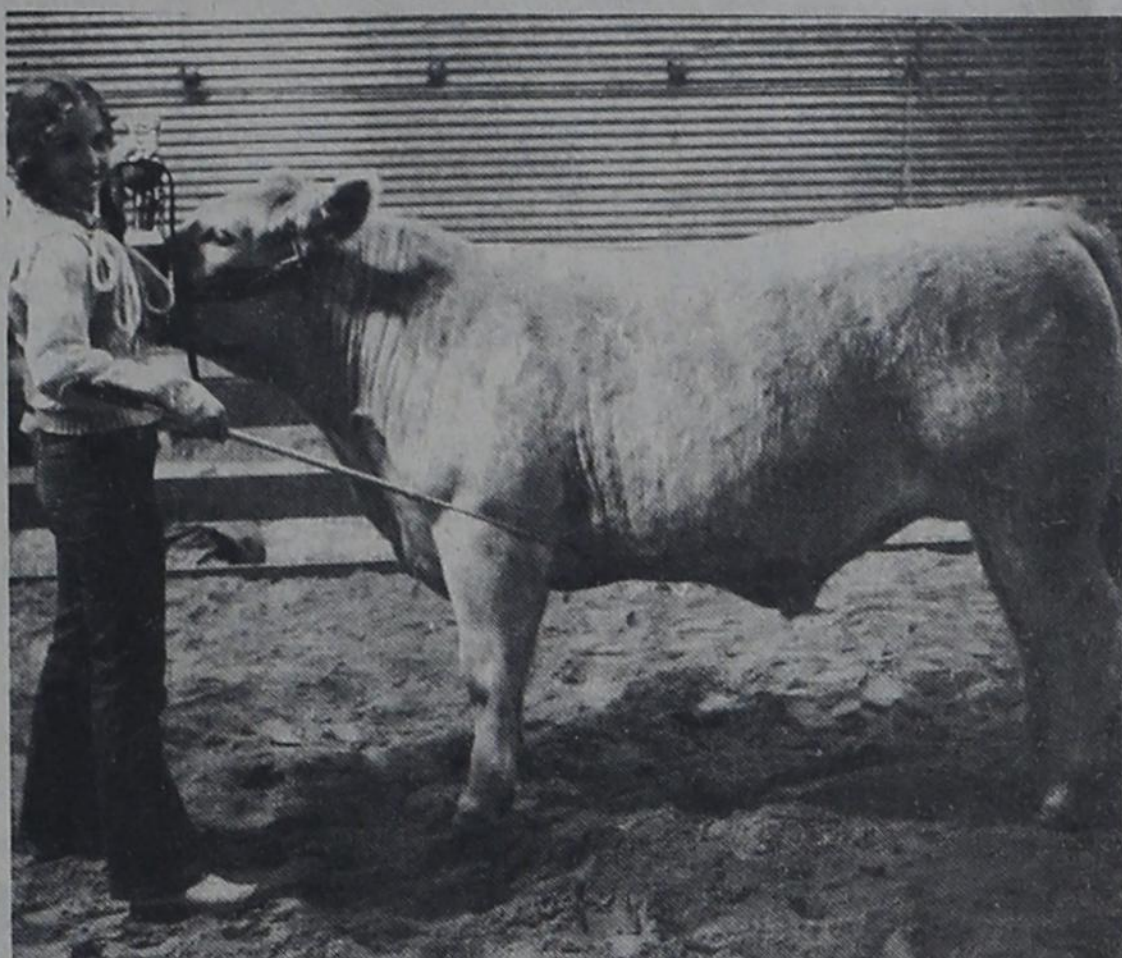

3-Inch Snowfall

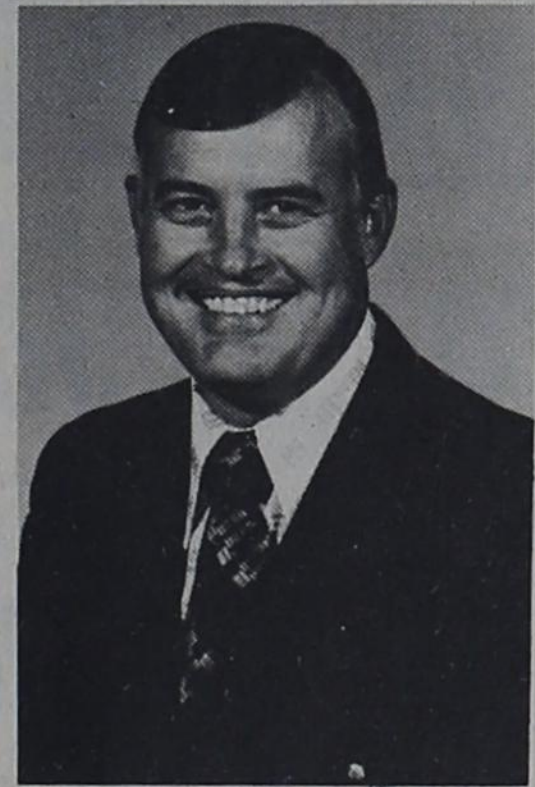
Saturday, Sunday

Bovina area residents were surprised Sunday morning when they awoke to discover a three-inch blanket of snow on the ground.

Although the snow began falling Saturday night, the bulk of the white stuff fell in the early Sunday morning hours.

A total of about 20 of moisture was received, giving farmers another small boost for their wheat crops and adding a little more seasoning to the ground.

The snow began melting early Sunday morning, however, temperatures plunged low enough Monday to halt the thaw and additional snow flurries fell for a brief time late Monday afternoon. The temperature dropped into the mid and low-twenties Monday night.

'75 License Tags To Be Sold Here

The new 1975, five-year type, license plates will be on sale in Bovina two days next week, announces Hugh Moseley, Parmer County tax assessor-collector.

Moseley will be at Bovina's city hall Monday and Tuesday of next week from 10 a.m. until noon and from 1 to 4 p.m.

Vehicle owners must bring their three-part license plate renewal forms in order to purchase the tags, says Moseley. Also, if owners plan to purchase the plates with a check, personalized checks must be used, he states.

The 1975 tags may also continue to be purchased up until deadline time by mailing the three-part renewal forms, registration fees and \$1 to cover the cost of mailing, to the county courthouse in Farwell.

Deadline for displaying the license plates is Tuesday, April 1.

AT MEETING

Girls' Coach Resigns; Board Calls Election

Bovina Schools board of trustees accepted the resignation of a coach and approved the hiring of two additional office personnel at a regular session of the board Monday night at Ridgelea Schools.

Miss Mary Clark, girls basketball coach and driver education instructor, had submitted her resignation earlier. The resignation was effective, Friday, Feb. 7.

The board approved the employment of Mrs. Patsy Nance as school secretary in charge of cafeteria and student activity funds, and Sheryl Moore as secretary to Superintendent L.F. Jacobs and assistant to Mrs. Zoe Clary, school district tax assessor-collector.

The board called the annual school trustee election for Saturday, April 5. Deadline for candidates to file for

two positions on the seven-member board of March 5.

Candidates may file, or petitions for candidates may be filed, at the school tax office at Ridgelea Elementary School. Absentee ballots may be cast at the tax office beginning March 17 and continuing through April 1.

The terms of C.E. Trimble and Earl Whitten expire this year.

Board members with one year remaining on present terms are Edwin Lide and Billy Smith.

With two years remaining to serve are Leon Ware, Leon Schilling and James Clayton.

The election will be held at Bovina Schools with Johnnie Horn serving as election judge. He will appoint clerks to assist him in the near future.

In other matters before the board, the group voted to attempt to obtain a college evaluation team to evaluate Bovina Schools, provided the evaluation can be done before the school session this term ends; Amended the grading system to include a grade of "D," which would be a grade average of 65 to 69 and considered a passing grade. The new grade will be effective for the 1974-'75 school year;

Voted to allow married students and unwed parents to attend Bovina High School, subject to regulations governing other students. The new rule goes into effect immediately;

Listened to a report on the track situation with no decision made.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 17, 1960
Baptists met in the schoolhouse Sunday. With their building in the process of being moved, First Baptist Church members were forced to conduct services in the school auditorium. Annual Easter Mail Appeal Begins Here

Easter Seal Appeal letters are being delivered this week according to Joe W. Jones, the Parmer County Easter Seal Representative of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas. The Representative serves as

contact for disabled persons needing Easter Seal rehabilitation services and also serves as Treasurer of the Easter Seal Appeal in the county.

The Easter Seal Society offers physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing programs, and special equipment loans to enable disabled persons to make the best use of their abilities to overcome handicaps. These services are financed by the annual Easter Seal Appeal and Fall Membership Drive.

The Society finances public education programs, provides scholarships for training of professional personnel to staff rehabilitation centers, and helps provide for National research into the causes and cures of crippling conditions. Jones pointed out that all these programs are important if Texas is going to continue to provide the best in rehabilitation services for its own disabled citizens.

During 1974, the Texas

Easter Seal Society provided treatment and services for 20,152 children and adults who were in need of assistance. Easter Seal services are available to any disabled person who can benefit from help provided by the Easter Seal Society, and who do not qualify for any other assistance. Self-mailing requests for assistance are available through the Representative.

The Easter Seal Campaign will continue through Easter Sunday, March 30.

11 Accidents In January

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eleven accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of January, 1975, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

The rural traffic accident

summary for this county during the first month of 1975 shows a total of eleven accidents resulting in no persons killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for January, 1975, shows a total of 451 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 241 persons injured as compared to January, 1974, with 553 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 302 persons injured. This was 102 less accidents and 61 less injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 16 traffic deaths for the month of January, 1975, occurred in the following counties: two each in Archer, Castro, Lubbock, Oldham, Randall; and one each in Briscoe, Cottle, Deaf Smith, Hale, Hartley and Wise.

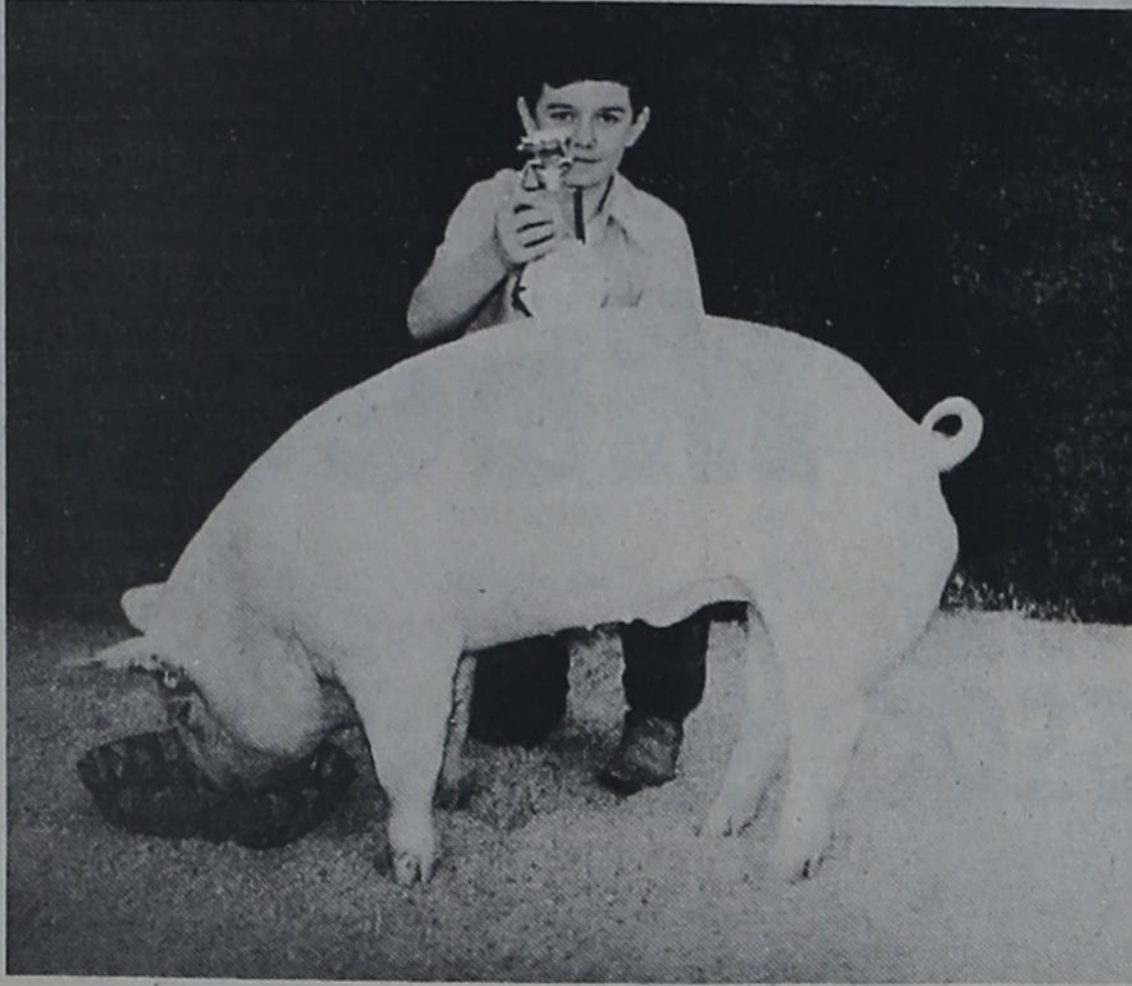

Bovina, Parmer County, Texas and most of the remainder of the nation will return to Daylight Savings Time Sunday. Clocks should be turned ahead one hour on that date.

The return to the so-called "fast time" comes two months earlier than usual because of the 1973 emergency year-round daylight savings time act.

Congress responded to the national energy crisis in 1973 by passing the emergency act that put the nation on DST between Jan. 6, 1974, and April 27 of this year.

Complaints that daylight time in the winter months caused hazards for children going to school in the pre-dawn darkness and that energy savings were minor, at the best, forced Congress to act last year to repeal part of the emergency act.

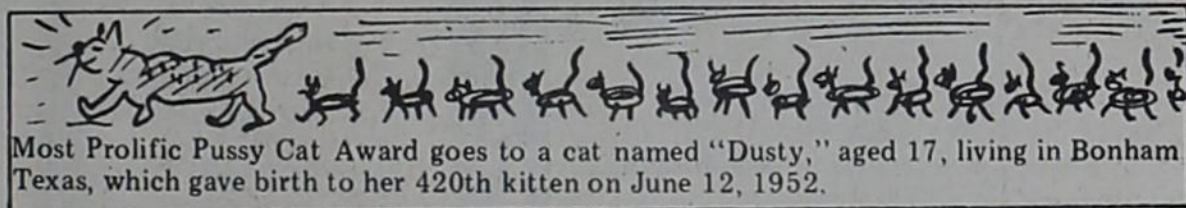

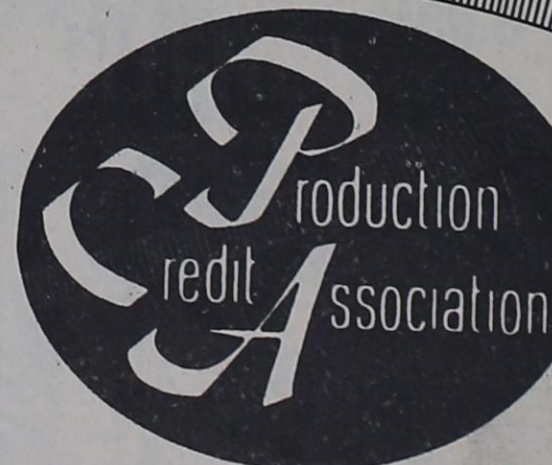

The Friona musician's composition was performed during the

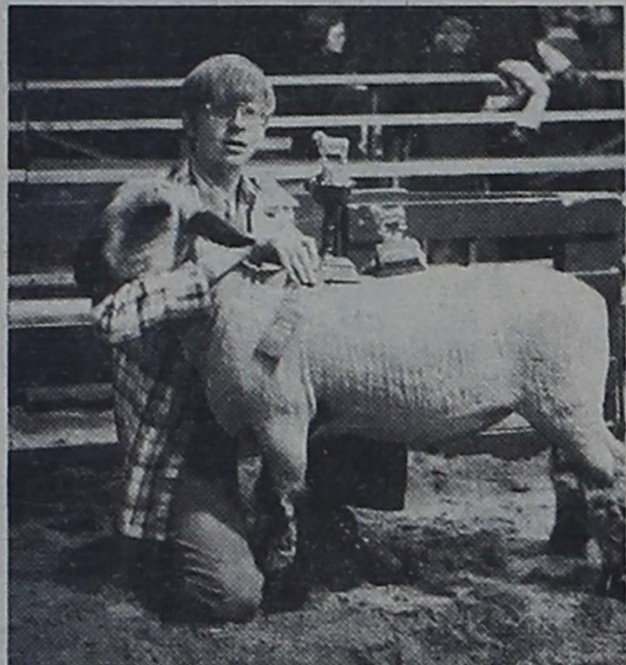
concert by the Arizona State University band. Members of the association voted by secret ballot at the close of the concert to choose the prize-winning piece.

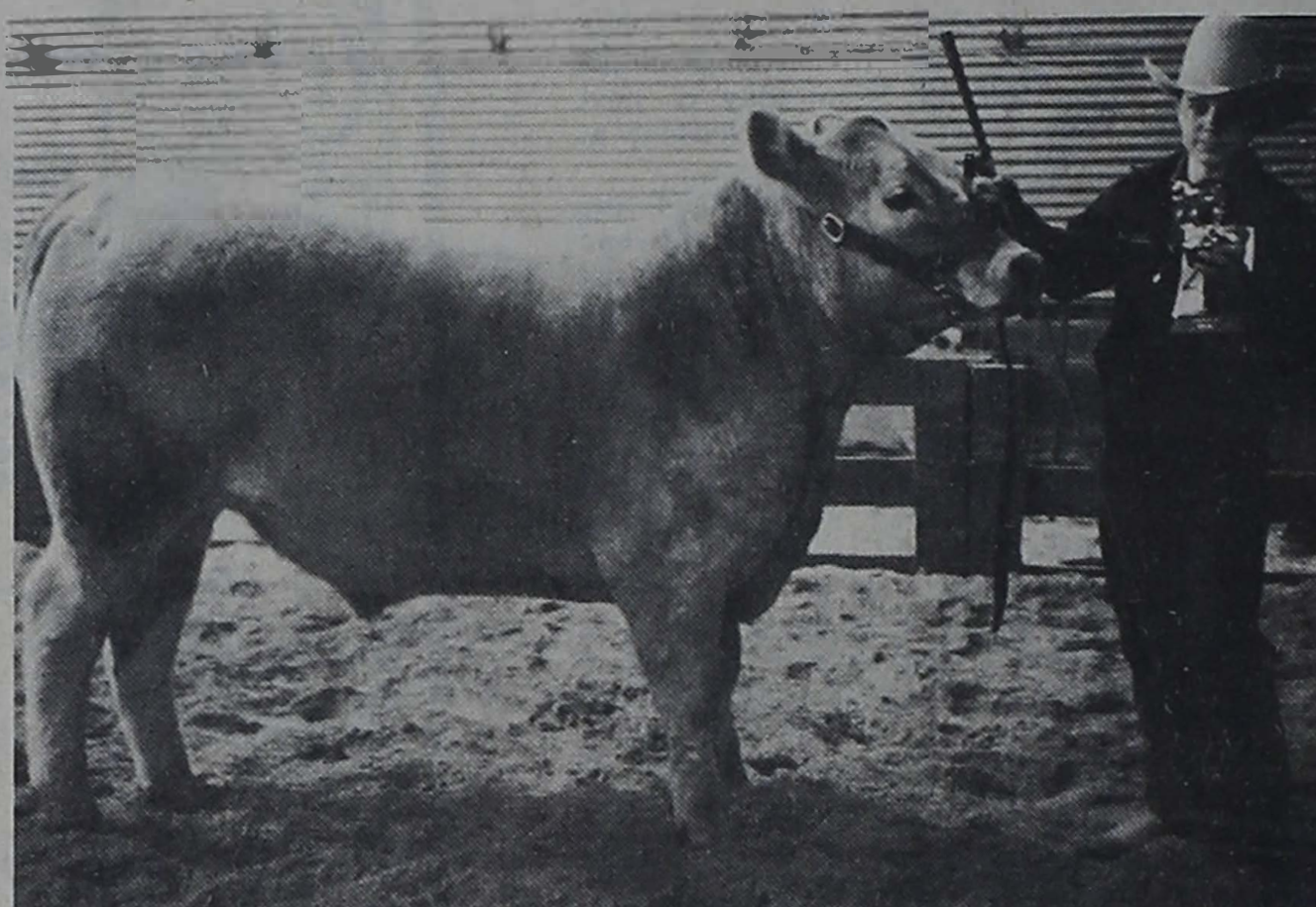

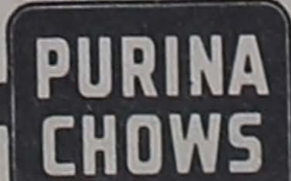

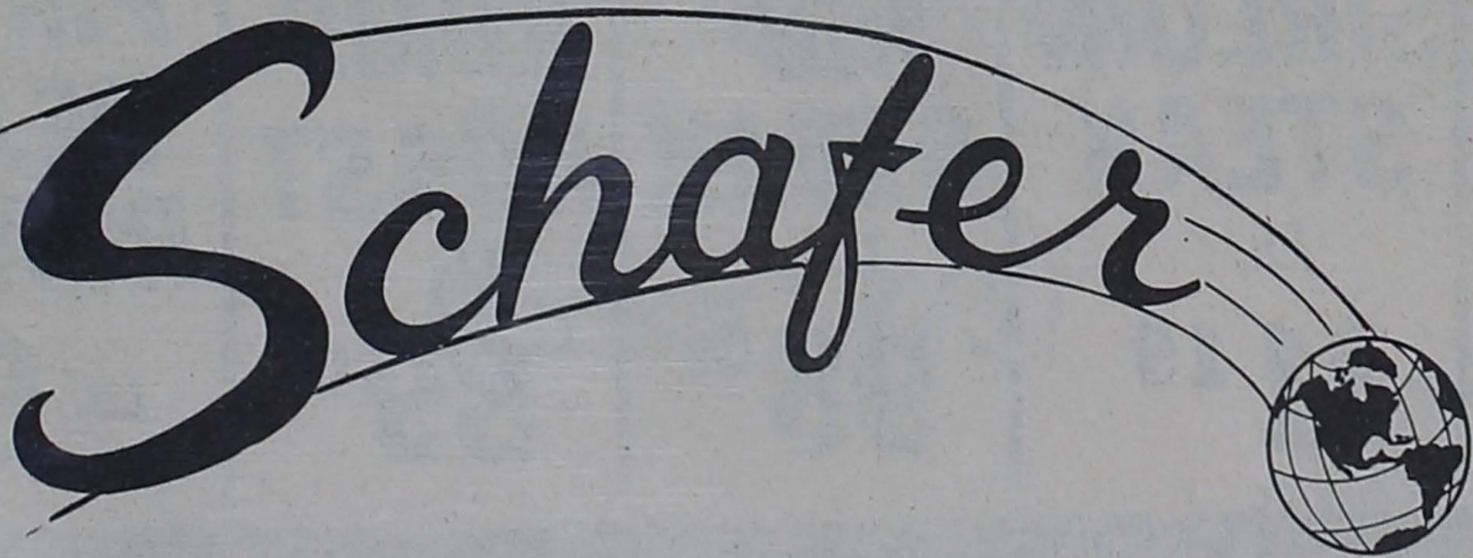
