Bank Deposits Reach New High

Deposits at the Robert Lee State Bank on March 31 reached a new high on the day of a call for a report of condition. The total on that day was \$7,632,029.52.

Bank President Gerald C. Allen said the deposits were even higher by approximately \$200,000 on a few days before the call. However, some heavy withdrawals by depositors made the total less than it had been for some time.

The \$7,632,029.52 on deposit March 31, 1978, was \$1,105,779.10 above the \$6,526,250.42 on deposit March 31, 1977.

Loans were also up by more than half a million dollars. Total on loans March 31, 1978, was \$2,932,527.36, compared to \$2,321,397.45 on March 31, 1977, an increase of \$611,129.91.

Capital accounts also were on the increase bringing the banks tot-

al assets on March 31, 1978, to \$8,503,862.62, compared to \$7,267,384.92 a year ago, for an increase of \$1,236,477.70.

Allen said he and other bank officers are well pleased with the growth of the institution during the past year. "Our growth has been steady," he said, "and it has enabled us to keep up with the kind of service our customers want and need."

210 Are Fed At Fish Fry

A total of 210 persons ate fish at the fish fry held last Saturday as a benefit for the Coke County Library. No set price was charged for the meal, but \$1,340 was donated to the library.

Hank Baker and a number of other Robert Lee fishermen donated fish for the big feed.

Persons connected with the activity and with the library said everyone was extremely grateful for the help and generous donations given.

Scott Beefmaster Pair Sell High

Horace and Mary Scott, Robert Lee Beefmaster breeders, had the third highest selling pair at the Lone Star Beefmaster Breeders Association sale April 1 at Waxahachie. The five year old cow with a heifer calf at her side sold for \$3,000 to Lick Skillet Beefmasters of Fort Worth.

The Scotts also had a bred heifer that sold for \$900. The heifer is bred to Jimbo, a bull the Scotts sold last September in Jackson, Miss. Jimbo is also sire of the calf mentioned above.

Lee Roy Jordon, former Dallas Cowboy linebacker is president of the Beefmasters Association and Chuck Howley, another former Cowboy is a member.

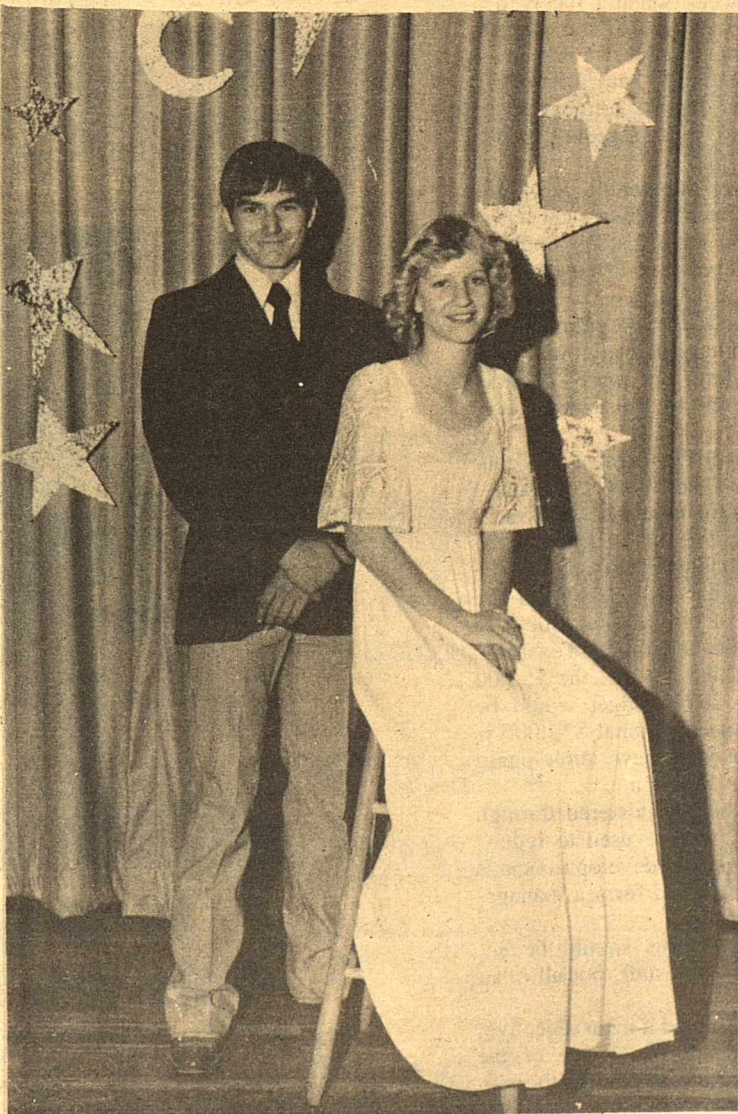
Pageant Assn. Incorporating

KRUEGER OF TEXAS

WASHINGTON—Nowadays, particularly since President Carter proposed revision of the Civil Service structure, bureaucratic ineptitude is on everyone's mind.

Often it seems as if one person, or even a group of people, can't get anything accomplished through a federal agency without many long weeks, or even months of filling out forms and battling red tape.

But I have always thought differently. I have always believed that one, hard-working person can make a difference; that is one of the main reasons I decided to run for public office.

My theory has proven true many times since I became the U.S. representative for the 21st District of Texas. It was proven true again last week when I received a letter from Cecil B. Andrus, Secretary of the Department of the Interior, replying to a request I had made concerning the Texas Animal Damage Control Program.

Last December, I learned that the Department of the Interior had decided to cut back on its funding for the program for fiscal year 1979.

The decision was made after apparently very little consultation with the people it would affect—the farmers and ranchers of Texas who have lost hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of livestock to coyotes and other predators.

If they had been asked about the program by the Interior Department, they could have painted a very convincing story for not less funding, but more, in order to research and carry out a program to deal with the very serious predator problem.

When I learned that the Interior Department was considering curtailing its support of the TADC program, I immediately called on Sec. Andrus to review the issue.

I wrote two letters to him, one in December, the other in January, in which I attempted not just to take issue with the funds cutback, but also to inform the department about the severity of the problem not only in my own 21st District, but other sections of Texas.

This week, Sec. Andrus notified me that the \$5,000 scheduled to be cut from the 1979 budget would be restored. He also told me that an additional \$30,000 is going to be allocated this year for a new, three-phase program to deal with the current situation.

That additional \$30,000, to be administered through the ADCP San Antonio office, will be used to reduce current wildlife predation of livestock, develop toxicants to alleviate problems with coyotes and form a management plan for Golden Eagles.

The prompt action of Sec. Andrus should be encouraging to not only myself and my staff, but all other citizens as well.

We recognized a problem, presented it in an objective, factual matter, and received results from one of the government bureaucracies which are so frequently condemned.

Sec. Andrus took on the issue, studied it, and within 60 days reversed an earlier decision. We commend him for taking an active interest in one of his department's matters that might otherwise have gone ignored.

He has set an example for all government bureaucracies on how to respond to and deal with the concerns and inputs of interested citizens and their representatives.

Changes Made In Tax Reports

Franklin H. Upp, manager, San Angelo Social Security Office, stated today that several changes in wage and tax reporting beginning in 1978 should be brought to the attention of employers. Employers who have in past years filed Form 941 should note that beginning January 1, 1978, the Schedule A of the Form 941 will no longer be required.

Form 941 will still be sent quarterly to the Internal Revenue Service. However, Schedule A, or continuation sheet, will no longer be used to report the social security wages for an employee.

Instead, the W-2 form, submitted at the end of 1978, will be used by both the Social Security Administration to credit the employee's social security wages, and by the Internal Revenue Service for income tax purposes.

Beginning with 1978, all W-2 forms should be mailed to the Social Security Administration. These changes are explained in the 1977 Circular E Supplement, Employer's Tax Guide, issued by the Internal Revenue Service.

Farm Program To Be Discussed

Several changes have been made in the 1977 Farm Program that will be in effect during the 1978 crop year. A meeting to discuss the changes, to illustrate the benefits that may be derived from the program, will be held by the Coke County ASCS Committee and J.E. Quisenberry, county office director for Coke and Sterling Counties.

Several rulings and/or changes have been made since the program was initiated. Changes in cover on set aside acres, crops classified

as grain sorghums, emergency grazing and set aside acres with compensation.

Quisenberry stated that the changes could be very helpful to many Coke County producers.

The meeting will be held in the County Courthouse next Thursday night, April 20, at 7:30 p.m. All county producers are encouraged to attend the meeting and present questions on the 1978 Farm Program.

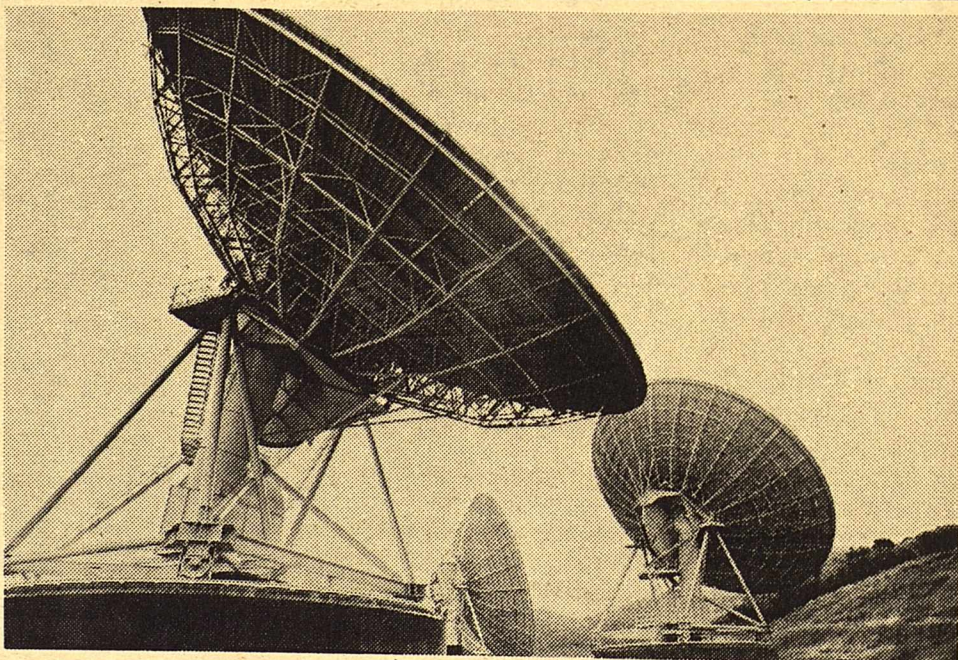

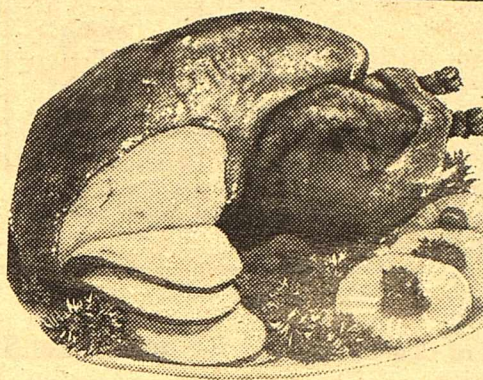

New Rangeland Management Offers More Profit and Other Benefits

More net profit per acre, rapid grassland improvement, and reduced labor needs are some of the benefits of a new method of rangeland management being used in Texas, a local conservationist said today. Eph Cummins, district conservationist for the U.S. Department of Agr-

WHERE I STAND

The problem of predator control is one that is near to the pocketbooks of the ranchers of Texas. The people who make their living by raising the various types of livestock which ultimately become the meat on the tables of America, are not a blood-thirsty group flying around shooting eagles for fun. They do not want the extinction of the Golden Eagle.

Ranchers are businessmen, just as the corner service station or grocery store owner is a businessman. Just like any other businessman, ranchers only want to keep losses at a tolerable level.

Trapping and transporting the birds to another area as suggested by one candidate for congress in this district, is no answer. They are migratory birds. Nor is paying the rancher for losses a practical solution. This would only create another bureaucracy and would be so costly as to be prohibitive. In fact, I believe this suggested way of controlling the eagle would be costly to the taxpayer and repay the rancher at an unfair cost to the consumers.

However, I do believe there are solutions to the problem of predators which will help both the rancher and the ultimate purchaser of meat products. But the answers lie, not on a national level, but on a local level. The answer is not in the U.S. Congress and should not be handled there. The problem should be handled on a local level.

The state of Texas has an excellent agency which could handle the problem better than any meddling by the federal government ever can. That agency is the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The P&W Department has the training and personal knowledge as well as availability to every area involved. However, the handling of the problem through a state agency would require amending the federal law protecting Golden Eagles. As your Congressman, I will vigorously pursue these changes.

I sincerely believe ranchers, and I am one myself, are most interested in and close to the ways of nature. That is one of the attractions of rural life. No rancher I know wants to eradicate any species of animal. They do, however, want to make a fair return on their dollar investment and stop losses due to predators and meddling by the federal government.

iculture Soil Conservation Service at Robert Lee, said the technique, called Short Duration Grazing, is now being used successfully by more than 400 livestock producers in Texas.

Cummins also said that SCS has published a new booklet explaining the system in detail. Single copies can be obtained free from SCS offices.

"Short duration grazing is producing some excellent results in Texas," Cummins said. "The major benefit is rapid grassland improvement, which leads to more net profit per acre.

Livestock that are normally run in several pastures are put into one herd in a single pasture. The other pastures are left vacant. When the forage is grazed to the desired degree, livestock are moved to the next pasture in the rotation. That way, all pastures are deferred from grazing for several months before being grazed again for a few weeks.

Under continuous grazing, livestock repeat-

edly use those plants they like best. As a result, these preferred plants are often over used, become weakened, and may not reproduce. At the same time, other plants are used to a lesser degree, maintaining more vigor than preferred plants.

Short duration grazing breaks this competitive edge gained by unpalatable plants. After a pasture is grazed briefly, it receives a rest five to ten times as long as the grazing period. If soil moisture and growing conditions are favorable, choice forage plants make rapid growth due to the high vigor developed during the rest periods. This improved vigor allows the better plants to reproduce and gradually crowd out the less palatable ones.

But short duration grazing systems require careful planning and close supervision. Livestock must be moved when the desired degree of forage has been used. Some systems require more cross-fencing and a few producers have found that they need more livestock watering facilities.

Most ranchers who have tried these systems agree that the system

offers much potential for range improvement. The problem is to plan each system carefully so it can be made to work.

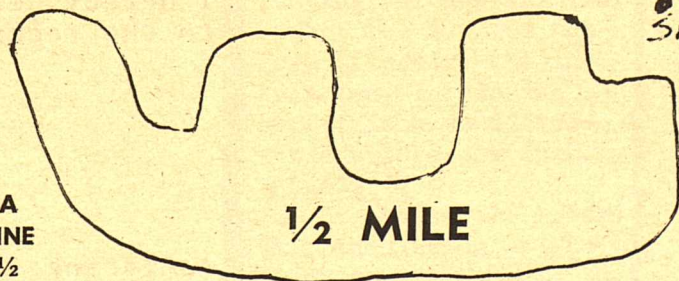

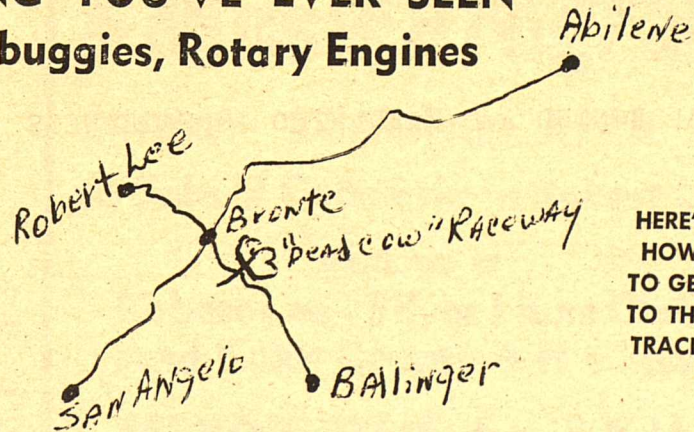

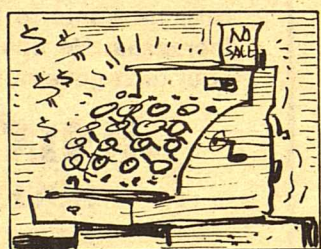
Lewis Funeral Held at Angelo

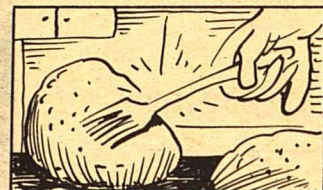

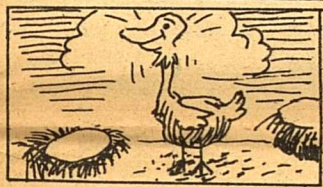

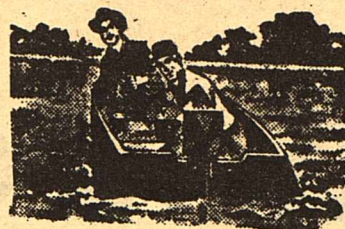
NOTICE:

The City of Robert Lee, being unable to meet the requirements of the Safe Drinking Water Act of less than 1 NTU due to the filters needing repair, asked the state for a variance of 5 NTU in October, 1977. The variance was granted for 90 days to give the city time to repair the filters. Due to the fact that the city was unable to get a contractor to do these repairs and the fact that we did not ask for a continuation or extension of this variance, the City of Robert Lee is required by the state to notify our customers that for the month of February was 2.6 NTU.

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of the persons drinking the water.

We are continually monitoring the water plant and system, taking three times more bacteriological samples than required by the state. We have been maintaining a higher chlorine residual than is required by the state and all our samples have shown no contamination.

June 7 Set for CRMWD Hearing

June 7 has been set by the Texas Water Commission as the date for hearing the application of Colorado River Municipal Water District to impound a lake on the Colorado River about 20 miles southeast of Bal-linger.

O.H. Ivie, Big Spring, general manager of CRMWD, expressed disappointment at the continuance until June because of "our urgent need to obtain this water supply for our area."

Opponents of the application, including the Lower Colorado River Authority headquartered in Austin, said more time will be needed to examine CRMWD records and engineering files under the disclosure section of the Texas Administrative Procedures Act. CRMWD was willing to settle for an April 25, date which was suggested when the docket on the case was called March 28. The application was filed last Oct. 11, hence there was no element of surprise in the matter CRMWD attorneys argued, and that efforts to discover information only at this time constitute delay tactics.

"The Stacy site on the Colorado River is the last available surface supply available for the upper river basin and the Permian Basin of West Texas," said Ivie. "Without Stacy, there will be a water deficit in the area around 20,000 acre feet by 1990. This will double by the year 2000 and reach 100,000 acre feet by 2030. These projections are based on the low estimated of per capita use and population growth, so they are very conservative. Obviously, there is an urgent need to be developing this water supply to prevent a serious restriction upon economic growth and development of this vital area of Texas."

LCRA attorneys indicated at a pre-hearing conference Wednesday in Austin that they want to make a meticulous search of files related to the proposed project. For instance, they had a list of items which covered six legal-sized pages which they wanted from Freese & Nichols, Inc., Fort Worth, consulting engineers for CRMWD. They wanted all this information also from CRMWD, plus items which covered almost another page. Depositions will be taken by

attorneys, but the Commission will send Lee Matthews, chief examiner assigned to hear the case with the commission, to expedite this phase of the data-gathering process.

LCRA attorneys also petitioned Dorsey B. Hardeman, one of the three members of the commission, to remove himself from the case because he once was said to have represented a client in a water right hearing on the river. Hardeman said he intended to hear the application and reach a decision based on the evidence.

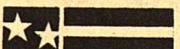

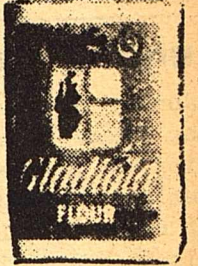

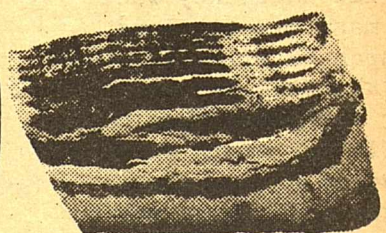
