

Small Turnout for Republican Voting

A small turnout showed up for the Republican Primary Election which was held for the entire county at the school in Robert Lee.

Incumbent U.S. Sen. John Tower led the ticket with 36 votes.

In a four way race for nominee for U.S. Congressman Tom Loeffler was easily the top man in Coke County, as well as over the entire 21st District. He received 30 votes; Bobby Locke 2; Wallace Larson 1; Neil Calnan 0.

Bill Clements, candidate for governor, carried Coke County as well as the state, receiving 27 votes. Ray Hutchison had 6; Clarence G. Thompson 1. Running unopposed, Gaylord had 32 for lie-

utenant governor; Jim Baker 32 for attorney general; James W. Lacy 32 for railroad commissioner.

Lynn Phillips received 22 writein votes for county Republican chairman.

Republican voters had three propositions on their ballots on which they were asked to express an opinion. Two carried in Coke County and one was defeated, as shown below:

Legalizing pari-mutuel wagering: For 11; Against 21. Election of party delegates: For 17; Against 12.

Limiting amount of taxes which can be levied: For 25; Against 7.

Sims Defeats Thetford for Judge; **Parker Keeps Commissioner Position**

D.W. (Dub) Sims took a narrow 36 vote victory over incumbent County Judge W.W. (Bud) Thetford in Saturday's Democratic Primary. Sims received 553 votes while Thetford received 517. It was the closest political race and the most highly contested vote in Coke County for many years.

The vote by boxes was: Sims Thetford Prec. 115 173 1 104 122 2 85 3 83 11 46 4 138 64 5 27 32 9 Absentee 22 48 517 553 Total

The only other contested county race was for commissioner of Precinct 4 where the incumbent Jerry Parker was successful in his bid for a second term. Parker received 213 votes, while his challenger, N.P. (Dick) Cooper, got 58.

Probably the race for governor was of most interest among the statewide contests. Coke County did not go along with the rest of Texas in giving challenger John Hill a majority over present Gov. Dolph Briscoe. Briscoe got 610 votes to Hill's 363, while former Gov. Preston Smith polled 72.

Robert (Bob) Krueger, present congressman from the 21st District, was successful in his statewide race for Democratic nominee for U. S. Senate, and he had little trouble with support in Coke County. Krueger received 843 votes while his opponent, Joe Christie, got

172. Krueger will face Republican Sen. John Tower in the November General Election.

In the race for congressman, Nelson Wolff carried Coke County rather handily, taking 556 votes. His nearest opponent, Woodrow Glasscock, received 231; Joe Sullivan got 110; Paul Dahlgren had 21 and Steve Clark 56. Wolff, in a conversation Monday, said he was grateful to the people of Coke County "for their wonderful support". Wolff managed to outdistance his four opponents without a runoff, but his margin over the entire district was not as great as in Coke County. In other races: Lt. 


