

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Views Wanted On Conservation

"Public views on the future of the conservation, protection and enhancement of Texas' soil, water, and related natural resources will be sought at a meeting to be held in the district courtroom in Robert Lee at 7:30 p.m. on June 12, 1978," Joe Rawlings, chairman of the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District, said.

The meeting is in response to President Carter's signing of the **Resources Conservation** Act last November which requires an appraisal and evaluation of the state and nation soil and water conservation program.

"The RCA act authorizes and directs the Secretary of Agriculture to develop a national soil and water conservation program in cooperation with the public, our local soil and water conservation districts, the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, and the Soil Conservation Service," said Rawlings.

"This program will establish new direction for future soil and water conservation efforts in Texas based on current soil, water, and related resource appraisals," Rawlings continued. "One point I want to make clear is that districts in their 40 year history have always assisted landowners with voluntary conservation programs on their farms and ranches. We do not advocate any other approach since farm and ranch land is privately owned and that the interests and welfare of the owners must be served and that programs must be acceptable to them," Rawlings ughs, who was a Divide added.

The public will also have the opportunity to learn more about the RCA act and the mission, relationship, and responsibilities of the district and the SCS. "I want to emphasize that a grass roots, bottom-up approach is the key to this act. Our district and the SCS will need to identify specific resource concerns and associated problems, if any, in addition to determining the extent and severity of these problems. We urge anyone with an interest in natural resource conservation to attend and air their views," Rawlings concluded.

Former Governor, **County Native Dies in Dallas**

A Coke County native, former New Mexico Gov. John Burroughs, 71, died Sunday in a Dallas hospital of lung infection. Burroughs, who made his home in Portales, N.M., was governor in 1959-60.

The former governor was born at Robert Lee and his father, Jim Burroughs, served as Coke County sheriff from 1914-16.

Burroughs moved with his family to Lubbock about 1918. He graduated from Texas Tech in 1939 and was vocational agriculture teacher until he entered business. He built up a highly successful peanut processing and farming operation in the Portales area. Burrough defeated Edwin L. Mecham for New Mexico governor in 1958. Old timers in this area remember in his boyhood days he was known as "Johnny Bill" Burroughs. He was a nephew of the late John Burrofarmer. A picture in Sunday's Standard-Times shows Burroughs having a pleasant visit in 1975 with then Gov. Jimmy Carter of Georgia.

Sunday will be the last day to mail a letter for 13 cents. At 12:01 a.m. on May 29, the price for mailing a first class letter will be 15 cents.

The usual 9 cent post card will go up to 10 cents at the same time. Other increases include higher costs for third class matter (parcel post) and second class matter (newspapers and magazines).







Health Services Offered at Home

Clients using home he- pay the regular charge alth care services often need skilled nursing service by an LVN or an RN, but they are ineligible for home health visits because their skilled nursing needs do not meet the Medicare guidelines for "skilled care".

Seeing this special need, the MBFA Foundation, which has delivered home health care in Texas since 1969, now announces a new service to these special clients.

Now those persons who require less than skilled care under the Medicare guidelines, or those who require the skills of a licensed professional (vocational) or registered nurse, but cannot afford to

and have no insurance covering these services, are eligible through the Texas Homemaker Service, a division of MBFA Foundation.

An example of this type of service would be the client who needs a B-12 or other type of vitamin injections, as has been ordered by an attending physician, and has no Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans or private insurance of any kind and cannot afford to pay the normal charge. Now this patient can have the visits of an LVN or RN in the home at a beneficial rate based on one's individual financial status.


This service also will benefit the patient who has been on the home health service under Medicare, or some other type of insurance coverage, and has depleted this coverage, but is still in need of skilled nursing service. Now the client can pay a beneficial rate and remain on the service under this new system through MBFA's Texas Homemaker Service.

The service should not be confused with regular homemaker services. This is still skilled nursing care given by an LVN or RN, but just does not meet the Medicare guidelines. The client must be under the care of a physician who will order this service for the patient.

You may discuss this with your physician or you may call the West Central Texas Home Hea-1th Agency for more information. The phone number to call is (915) 677-2231 (collect) in Abilene. Judy White, R.N. Supervisor for the Bronte area will be able to answer any questions you or your physician may have regarding this new service. Mrs. White indicates that this new service will provide another alternative to their clients toward better and more complete medical care available in the clients' homes. 
Senior Prophecy Reveals Future



Time to Spray for Pecan Casebearer

TIME TO SPRAY

The pecan nut casebearer makes its presence known about this time each year and I receive for 3 to 6 days before numerous calls regarding the proper time to spray to control the casebearer.

The calls we have received, but the casebearer has been a little more difficult to pinpoint this year. The cool nightime temperatures we experienced earlier slowed down tree anticipate nut damage and nut development; likewise, the casebearer appears to be slight- we expect the egg lay ly later than usual. In checks made here in the county through Monday, only one egg was found and no tunneled or eater nuts were found. The adult moth had

emerged from the stems but no damage was found. Normally the female wi-11 emerge, then mature she starts laying eggs on the nutlets. Once the eggs are deposited, it takes four to six days for the eggs to hatch.

Based on what I have found, plus what the Extension agents in Runnels and Tom Green Counties have found, we to being between May 25 and May 28. Likewise, to be over a period of several days.

Our recommendations are that you check your pecan nutlets daily. Once you find damaged nuts, spray your tree

or trees. Then, five to seven days later, give your trees a second spraying. We think the proper time to start will be May 25 to May 28. The second application then would be due between May 30 and June 5.

We would recommend you use Malathion, Seven, or Zolone.

Add zinc sulfate or NZN to your spray mix. The zinc will help control rosette and strengthen your trees.

The casebearer will make another cycle in about 42 days. Usually the second generation is less damaging.

Also, be on the lookout for the walnut caterpillar. This is the insect that strips the foilage. The same chemicals listed above will control this insect.


We will continue to check for the casebearer as time allows. If our findings are different than what is being anticipated, we wi-11 update our recommendations.

Several calls have been received about "gum" or "sap" on young or green peaches. This damage is being done by the plum curculio - the same insect that bothers the fruit at or near the ripe stage.

Based on the estimated date of the present damage, we are suggesting the peaches be sprayed with Malathion between May 25 and May 27 then continue at 10 day to two week intervals until harvest. This would mean two to four more applications before harvest. The curculio, at least in certain locations, is causing considerable damage.
