Record Crowd Present for Annual Reunion of Sanco Community Folks

From eight states plus Texas and from 36 towns in Texas the people came to Sanco and overflowed the big tabernacle for a landmark homecoming, the 24th annual, last Sunday.

Forty-three former students and three teachers of the Sanco Public School of the past were recognized as a student reunion was featured. Oldest graduate of the pioneer school established in 1888, consolidated with Robert Lee in the 50's was I. A. Bird, 96, of Sanco, and Mrs. M.S. (Tennie) Berryman, 94, of Eunice, N.M., brother and sister. They are the two surviving children of

Miller and Rosa Bird, who reared six children at Sanco.

Following a custom started by the late Mrs. Maud Bird at the first homecoming and carried on by her two daughters since her death, Mrs. Mary Jo Pentecost for herself, her sister, Mrs. Evelyn McKinley and the community presented a boutonniere and corsage respectively to Mr. Bird and Mrs. Berryman as the two oldest persons present.

To Melvin Scarborough and wife of Sacramento, Calif. went the flowers for traveling the farthest to the homecoming, while to Ralph and Floy Ranson were presented the floral award for being a man and wife team who taught at Sanco and now live at Glen Cove. Following that, recognition was given to Mrs. Verna Carwile of Carlsbad, N.M., the other former teacher at Sanco present.

Present also and participating in teacher's reminiscences were Mrs. Bryan (Jessie) Yarborough of Robert Lee, Mrs. Jessie Patterson of Riverside, Calif. and Mrs. Sam (Naomi Lee) Adams Powell of San Angelo, each of whom, now retired, taught over 40 years.

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Mary Patterson To Retire June 30

Mrs. R.C. (Mary) Patterson, who has been working at various positions in Robert Lee since 1945, announced this week that she is retiring. She is presently serving as secretary/bookkeeper in the office of Supt. Jimmy Bickley.

Mrs. Patterson began her career of public service in 1945 as a bus driver and cafeteria employee at the school. She continued in that job until Dec. 6, 1948, when she went to work as a deputy in the office of the county clerk. She continued in that position until Sept. 30, 1951.

On Oct. 1, 1951, she went to work in the office of the county judge, and served as secretary and assistant ex-officio county school superintendent for almost 20 years, until Aug. 15, 1971.

Not one to miss much work time, she went to work as secretary/bookkeeper in the superintendent's office Aug. 16, 1971. Her resignation will become effective June 30.

Allied Chemical Award to Lackey

David Lackey of Robert Lee High School is the recipient of an Allied Chemical Science Award for 1978. The award, consisting of a \$100 US Savings Bond, a certificate of merit and a hand calculator, was presented during the last of school Awards Assembly at Robert Lee High School.

David was chosen by the school faculty for outstanding scholastic achievement in chemistry during the 1977-78 academic year. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Lackey of Robert Lee.

Now in its 20th year, the 1978 Science Award Program is being conducted at 139 high schools in or near 55 of Allied Chemical's plant communities in various parts of the country.

Ambulance Service Paid By County Ruled Illegal

Apparently the big bubble which has been building up the past several weeks for Coke County to provide ambulance service for residents of the county has burst. Petitions have been circulating and a large number of signatures were obtained requesting the commissioners' court to provide the service.

When the matter came up at Monday's meeting

of the court, the commissioners tabled action on it, in order to get an opinion from County Attorney Robert

Poerner Winner Over Sadler

John Poerner won a resounding victory over Jerry Sadler in his race last Saturday for railroad commissioner of Texas. Poerner won an easy victory over Sadler over the entire state, but his margin in Coke County was exactly 10-1.

In the light vote which was cast Poerner received 59 votes at Robert Lee and 81 at Bronte for a total of 140. Sadler was able to get only 8 votes at Robert Lee and 6 at Bronte for a total of 14.

The railroad commissioner race was the only one voted on in Coke County.

Of considerable interest here was the race for Democratic nominee for congressman from the 17th District which lies to the north and includes Abilene. Charles Stenholm, a Stamford farmer, beat A.L. (Dusty) Rhodes, well known Abilene attorney better than two to one. The win virtually assures Stenholm of a victory, as the district has never elected a Republican representative. He will take the seat of veteran Congressman Omar Burleson who is retiring.

County Court Has Long Docket

Coke County Court will convene at 9 a.m. Tuesday in the courthouse at Robert Lee with Judge W.W. Thetford presiding. Pre-trial hearings will be held Tuesday and those cases to be tried during this session will begin at 9 a.m. Wednesday.

About 60 cases are on the court docket and a jury panel called to hear the cases has 45 names on it.

Included on the docket are 25 cases of DWI and 18 appeals on speeding violations. Persons have been charged with other offenses in lesser numbers and include: theft by check 6; possession of a prohibited weapon 2; driving with license suspended 2; criminal non-support 1; possession of marijuana 2; obtaining property unlawfully 1; evading arrest 1; theft 1; assault 1; making alcohol

Fine Rains Fall Over Past Weekend

More fine rains have fallen in the Coke County area during the last several days, raising hopes of farmers and ranchmen for good growth in pastures and cultivated acreage. From most reports received Coke County is in pretty good shape, but is in need of more rain to provide water for tanks and lakes.

According to J.E. Quisenberry's rain gauge at the courthouse, Robert Lee received .38 inch Friday and .41 inch Tuesday for a total

of .79 inch.

Rainfall in Bronte was heavier than any other place reported to this newspaper. A hard, blowing rain Friday at noon dropped 1.4 inches, another .5 fell Saturday and .3 fell Tuesday for a total of 2.2 inches.

Most places have had close to an inch or more during the past week.

Weather forecasts Wednesday indicated that chances for continued thunderstorms and rainfall were good.

Owen on the legality of the county's financing the service.

Owen researched the Texas Constitution and the statutes creating the West and East Coke County Hospital Districts and reached a definite conclusion that the county cannot legally finance the service. Owen said he could get an opinion from the office of the attorney general (in three to four months) but he felt confident his opinion would be upheld.

County Judge W.W. Thetford said Wednesday that he was in agreement with Owen's opinion. In fact, the judge said, "I have said all along that the county could not finance ambulance service because of the wording of the statutes. I had thought perhaps something could be worked out with an inter-governmental agreement, but I don't even think that's possible now."

Owen's opinion was based partially on Article IX, Section 9 of the constitution which deals with hospital districts and reads in part: ".....providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitantsproviding that after its creation no

other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district...."

Owen cited two sections of the statute creating West Coke County Hospital District as further proof that action by the county would be illegal.

Section 2 deals with purposes of the district and reads in part: "...Such District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants...."

Section 19 of the statute concerns indebtedness and taxation and reads: "After creation of West Coke County Hospital District neither Coke County or no other municipality or political subdivision shall thereafter issue bonds or other evidences of indebtedness or levy taxes for hospital purposes for medical treatment of indigent persons within said District and the said West Coke County Hospital District shall assume full responsibility for the operation of all hospital facilities for the furnishing of medical and hospital care of indigent persons."

The wording of the statute creating East Coke County Hospital District says virtually the same thing and charges the district with providing medical care for residents of the district.

Owen's opinion was concluded with a summary which said in part: "Coke County may not levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations of indebtedness for the purpose of providing hospital service or medical care within either or both of the

districts." In a telephone conversation Wednesday morning Owen said all the research he had done clearly indicated that his official opinion delivered to Judge Thetford Tuesday remains correct. He said as he interprets the constitution and the statutes creating the districts, the two districts are the only political entities that can use tax money to provide ambulance service.

The bill, which is awaiting Congressional action, would limit OSHA to giving only warnings to businesses with 25 or less employees instead of costly fines for first-time safety violations.

Your Rights and How To Use Them:

Ordering merchandise by mail can be great or it can be a real headache. The Federal Trade Commission says you have the right to know when you can expect your merchandise to be shipped. If no date is stated by the seller you have the right to have your merchandise shipped to you within 30 days. If it is not shipped within 30 days you may cancel your order, and get all your money back. The seller must notify you of a delay and give you a free means to reply (postage paid post card).

You have the right to get all your money back if you cancel. The seller must mail your refund to you within seven business days after cancel.

If you wish to have your name removed from mailing lists in order to stop "junk mail" write to:

Coke Oil Production Continues to Be A Big Boost to Economy of County

Coke County, which has had recorded production since 1942, last year produced 2,309,013 barrels of crude oil at the rate of 6,326 barrels per day. Production in 1977 boosted Coke County's production total through the end of the year to 180,310,640 barrels.

In 1977, 26 counties produced more than 10-million barrels of crude oil, a decrease of one county from 1976 and four from 1975.

The following chart shows 1977 production figures for the state's five top producing counties, all with production in excess of 48-million barrels. Yoakum replaced Scurry as the state's top producing county, while Ector, Gaines, and Hockley retained the Nos. 3, 4, and 5 ranks they held in 1975 and 1976.

5. Hockley 48,992,268

Gregg County, the first Texas county to produce more than two-billion barrels of crude oil in the history of recorded production, remains the all-time leader with a cumulative total through 1977 of 2,596,793,663 barrels. Ector County, through the end of last year, had produced 2,135,900,495 barrels.

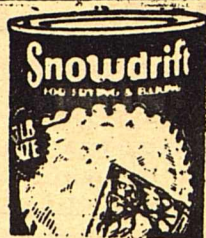

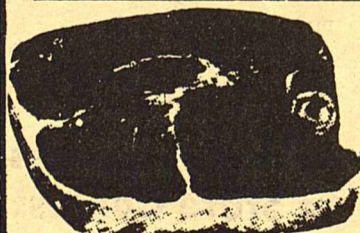
