Barbara married Billy Jay Charles on August 19, 1972. Billy Jay is self-employed in construction and remodeling. They have two children, Brooke and Cameron.

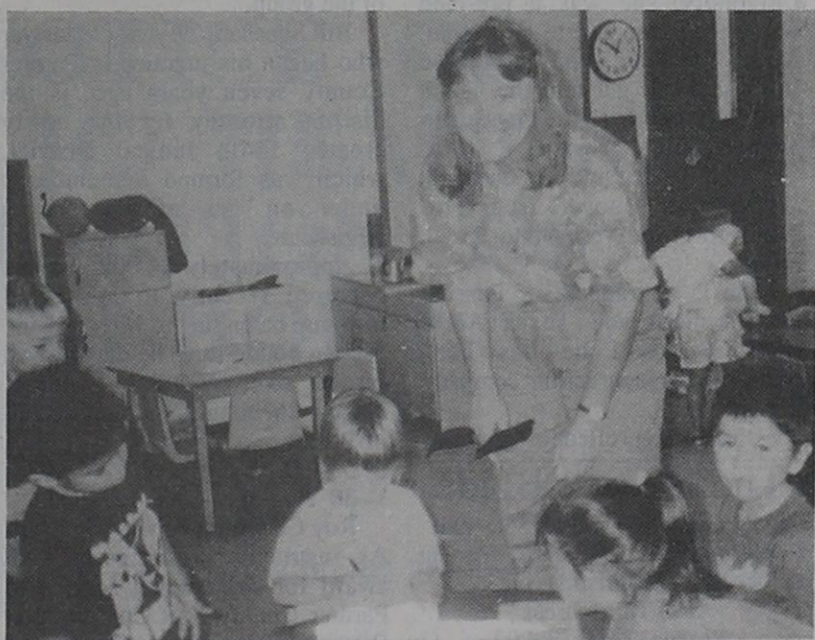
Brooke is 15 and a sophomore at Bovina High School. She is involved in cross country, basketball, golf, track, and is a cheerleader.

## Mustangs' Luck Bad In Opener

The Bovina High School Mustangs ran into a buzz-saw by the name of Josh Broaddus in their season-opening football game last Friday night at Vega.

Broaddus ran for 108 yards rushing, and scored three touchdowns in leading the Longhorns to a 39-0 win over the Mustangs.

Justin Moore got the Longhorns on the scoreboard with a 15-yard touchdown scamper. The kick failed. Still in the first quarter, Lance Sides raced 24 yards with a fumble recovery for a 12-0 lead. Broaddus got his first of three scores before the quarter ended, with Vega leading, 18-0.

Broaddus scored twice on one-yard rushes in the second half, and Luis Martinez added a TD. The 'Horns even got their PAT kicks straightened out, for the final margin of 39-0.

The Longhorn defense held Bovina to only two first downs, a net of one yard rushing and 26 yards passing (two out of three attempted).

Coach Rock Stanley pointed out that he had five sophomores and two freshmen in his starting lineup. "We made too many mistakes on offense; we kept giving Vega the ball on our end of the field. We played fair on defense at times, but just couldn't keep holding them out," Coach Stanley said.

This Friday the Mustangs will be hosting the Lorenzo Hornets of District 6-1A. The Hornets are coming off a 2-7 record in 1991, but are expected to contend for their district title.

# Dimmitt Girl Was Niece Of Resident

(Editor's note: Jennifer Harris was a niece of Cindy Feldman, a former Bovina resident)

"I don't know what I'm going to do without her."

That is the sentiment that cropped up again and again among close friends of Jennifer Catrice Harris, 16, of Dimmitt, who died suddenly Friday night, leaving her friends shocked and stunned.

Those who knew her characterized the Dimmitt High School junior as very friendly—to everyone, not just her close friends; and funny, finding humor in different things; and very smart, yet hating to seem like a "know-it-all"; and caring, always giving help or advice to her friends; a happy person who hardly ever had a bad mood.

They said she worried a lot, though—about grades, about her driving, about storms, and about

the prom. Amy Smithson, one of Jennifer's "inner circle" of friends, said that what she will remember most about Jennifer is "how we always had a good time."

The night Jennifer died, she was sitting in her car at "Roadside," the little state park south of town at the intersection of US 385 and SH 194. Her "best-best friend" Kathy Patterson was in the car with her and they were talking with another friend, Art Ortega, before taking one last drag down main and going home.

"She was talking one minute, and just fell over the next," Ortega recalled. "I was trying to find a pulse, and told Kathy to call 9-1-1 (there was a car phone available). I was scared and fighting hard not to panic. I couldn't find a pulse and she wasn't breathing."

Ortega said Jay Sears started performing cardio-pulmonary resuscitation on Jennifer, and conti-

nued until a city patrolman happened through the park about five minutes later, and he took over until the ambulance arrived.

"It seemed like an hour and a half, but I think it was about 15 minutes before it got there," Ortega said.

The autopsy report probably will not be available for a couple of weeks.

Her friends said they were aware that Jennifer had had a heart murmur since she was about 5.

Even though the funeral was held at the biggest church building in town, it was still crowded. Carrie Matthews, another close friend, noticed that where the pews usually held 11 people each, most of the rows were crammed with 15 people. She said more than 100 people sat in the fellowship hall listening to the service over the sound system. Chairs were set up in the foyer, and people stood along the back of the sanctuary.

Another classmate, Andrew Baker, read a farewell from the Junior Class. Excerpts from his eulogy:

"Today we come to remember Jennifer Harris, better known as the 'Brain Child.' Jennifer looked forward to school beginning this year, because she would be a junior, and that meant she was going to the prom. She even had already picked out her dress. She thought school was the greatest place to be, because she loved to learn.

"In the last couple of weeks, all that seemed to worry her was whether she got the calculations on Mrs. Davis' pre-cal test just right, or if she would say the Spanish alphabet just the way Mrs. Smith wanted. We, as her friends, never worried (about her grades), we just wondered whether the grade would be a 100 or a 110 at the top of the paper.

"Someone asked Jennifer's mom, 'Who is going to check my math homework now?' We knew if Jennifer could not do it or understand it, then we all surely were in trouble.

"There was more than Jennifer at school. There was Jennifer the friend. She never said anything bad about anyone. And she made sure that friends stayed friends no matter what. She helped friends with problems and was always known as one who would listen.

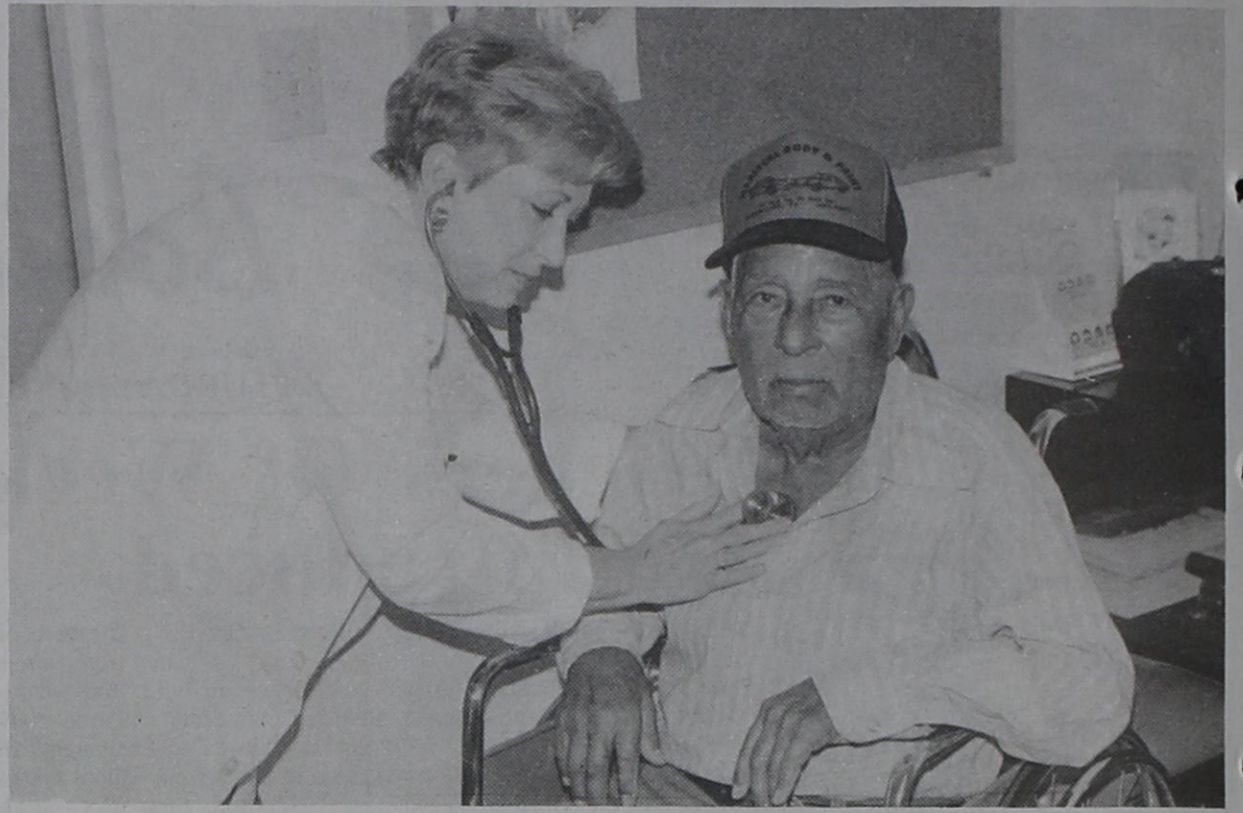
"She knew how to have fun—as in the time she and Kodie (Bagley) decided to sneak out. But she always knew when enough was enough.

"More than anything, though, Jennifer always wondered whether she was popular. Well, I sure wish she could see what I see now.

"We will always remember you for who and what you were, and how you always would lend a

helping hand to whoever was in need of it. And YES you were popular.

"Thank you for who you were. See you later, Jen."

## Ingredients To Being An Effective Family Unit

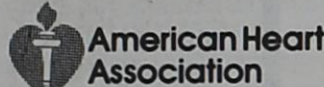

### WHERE'S MY SHOTGUN?

The eye-hand coordination required to chase down the speedy mourning dove requires practice. You can either practice at the skeet range or in front of your buddies during that first hunt.

Most gun clubs will permit non-members to use their facilities for a slightly higher use-fee. Gun clubs are great fun, but don't be surprised if you suddenly decide to join one. The members enjoy all kinds of hunting, and they are a great source of information on the availability of some great hunting leases.

Just returned from Fort Worth, where my father and I attended the 1992 edition of Hunter's Extravaganza. The entire Will Rogers Coliseum was packed with the newest and best hunting products.

Hit of the show was a new camouflage pattern called Diamondback. Most commercial camouflage is patterned after plants but the best camouflage is worn by nature's creatures. This unique scale design was developed by Ben Johnson of Rowlett, Texas. Diamondback is good looking and is the perfect gift for any hunter, because Ben maintains excellent quality at reasonable prices. Rifles were involved in 32 of the accidents, shotguns in 42 accidents, and handguns in seven incidents, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife figures. Terry Erwin, recreation programs director, recommends that "everyone take hunter education, regardless of age." A course is required for all hunters born after

September 2, 1971. For more information on hunter education courses, call 1-800-792-1112, ext. 4999.
