These little houses, or nodules, grow into great hives until soon they are as large as walnuts on the roots of the plants. Their functions are peculiar and wonderfully interesting

as well as profitable. The air, as you know, is four-fifths nitrogen. Nitrogen is the most expensive fertilizer that you buy and it is positively essential to plant life. Now, these little entities suck air into the earth and acrate the soil. It is just as necessary for a plant to have air as it is for an animal to breathe it. They therefore do the splendid service of bringing the air into the soil, and in bringing it in they digest the nitrogen that is in the air and convert it into mineral nitrates that are soluble in water and immediately available for plant food. 

Capt. E. M. Jack, R. E., Suggests That Mountain in Africa is Possible Source of Legende.

London .- At a lecture before the Royal Geographical society Capt. E. M. Jack, R. E., suggests that a range of volcanic mountains in Africa, where the natives worship snakes, is the possible origin of the old legends of the sources of the Nile. These mountains are the Mufumbiro, situated where the British German and Belgian spheres meet. This great volcanic range is one of the most striking physical features in Africa. The old story of the Nile is well knovn. Its fountains were said to rise in the Mountains of the Moon and to fow into some great lakes and then to form one river. 


