Died, Mrs. Susan C. Dowdy, at her home two and one-half miles above Ingram on Johnson Creek, Sunday June 15, at 8 o'clock p. m., aged 83 years, one month and three days.

Her maiden name was Cassel. She was born May 12, 1830 in Louisiana and came to Texas in 1848 with her parents, settling in Goliad County. It was here in 1853 that she married Jas. Dowdy and they came to Kerr County Oct. 1878.

She was converted before she was grown and was a member of the Missionary Baptist Church for 45 years. She was the mother of eight children four of which were murdered on the head of Johnson Creek many years ago, the other four, Tom, Dick, George and Mary, were with her when she died. She was sick nine months and at times her suffering was intense. But when the final summons came she quietly passed away without a struggle.

We buried her at Sunset graveyard June 16 by the side of her companion who died Nov. 23, 1900. There was a large crowd at the burial. The service was conducted by Rev. J. H. Jackson of Ingram. ### The Fredericksburg Railroad

Work on the Fredericksburg railroad is progressing rapidly. At the present time seven miles of rails have been laid, and the large bridges have been completed to within one mile of the tunnel at the big hill. The tunnel is completed to the extent of 400 feet at the south end, and 190 feet at the north end. This leaves but 230 feet to be done. At the present rate of progress this remaining 320 feet should be finished within 60 days. All grading outside the tunnel will be completed by July 1st, and all needed material for track laying, bridge building and timber work will be on the ground by June 20th.

Congressman Bartholdt of Missouri has sounded the alarm: Personal liberty is in danger of being overthrown by Prohibition. Saloons which destroy the personal liberty of their victims must be upheld or "personal liberty" is doomed.
