INFANT MORTALITY IS LOWER

Five Years Have Brought Down Death List in Cities.

What the American cities are do ing and can do toward preventing infant mortality and the high death by the children's bureau of the department of labor. It is the purpose of the bureau to issue a similar bulletin annually and in time to make it a complete manual for municipal and philanthropic activities in the direction of child welfare. Summer campaigns for babies' lives have been the bureau important to enlist the ous cities.

The efforts of city health officials have resulted in the last ten years in reducing the general death rate in cities, below that of the rural districts and villages. This reduction in the general death rate is an encouraging indication of what is possible of accomplishment in efforts to reduce the infant death rate. Babies die of diseases which to a large extent are preventable, and thus when welfare work is directed toward saving their lives the response is immediate and decided.

KERRVILLE

Is the county seat of Kerr County, has a population of about 2500, is sitated 70 miles northwesterly from San Antonio, and is the terminus of the Kerrville branch of the S. A. & A. P. railroad. It has two daily trains to and from San Antonio, and daily mail routes, carrying passengers in hacks, to Ingram, Junction, Rock Springs Harper and other places north and west of Kerrville, and also a daily line to Fredericksburg. From Kerrville to Fredericksburg is 25 miles; to Bandera and Medina City, 25 miles; to Junction 60 miles; Rocksprings 80 miles, Harper 21 miles.

Kerrville has electric lights and a splendid system of water works. The sum of \$20,000 is being spent on the streets and \$40,000 has been voted for road improvements in this precinct.

The elevation at Kerrville is 1750 feet. The Guallalupe river, which heads 30 miles north of Kerrville, runs through the city. On the east side where the city is located, there are high cluff's on the river, and on the west side is a fertile and beautiful valley, and mountains surround the city on the east and west. The Guadalupe valley is occupied by thrifty farmers A. B. and ranchmen, and the mountain re-Lula gions, among which there is considerable vailey, creek and arable land, Prayer Services every Tuesday there are large ranches of cattle. horses, sheep and goats, all of which do well in the Kerrville country. The land generally is well wooded, principally with live oak, Spanish oak and cedar, and the range is good, and water excellent.

Our farmers grow wheat, oats and all other small grain, cane and alfalfa, cotton and corn, and fruit and vegetables do well. Kerrville is one of the largest wool markets in the state, and large quantities of wool, mohair. cotton, oats, cattle, etc., are shipped from this point.

The climate of the Kerrville country is unsurpassed. The winters are short and generally mild and invigorating owing to the dryness of the climate and the prevalence of sunshine The summers are cool and delightful, and the mountain air is pure and bracing. Game abounds in the Kerrville country, and fishing in the Guadalupe, especially north of Kerrville, is good Kerrville and the adjoining towns ar popular resorts for health and recrea

HIGHWAYS FROM ONE STATE TO ANOTHER

Members Declare That Improvement Would Affect Farming Country Just as Much as It Will Cities-Railroads Now Favor Idea.

By GEORGE CLINTON. Washington.-Now that the lower house is certain to have a good roads committee with a large membership. all kinds of plans are being suggested by which to improve the highways of the country. There are evidences already that good roads to a consider-

able extent are to be what General

Hancock called the tariff, "A local is-

Members say that of course it is to be the main plan of the good roads propaganda to secure the building of highways from state to state, continuous roadways which can be used in interstate commerce and thereby "clinch their constitutionality." Some senators and representatives say that the intimation that a good roads appropriation bill will be a "pork barrel bill' as the public buildings bill for years has been called, is a mistake. They add that good roads will affect farming country and small outlying communities just as much as they will the cities and country adjacent to the city, and that therefore the "general distribution of the favors" will prevent great opposition from any quarter to good road building, provided it does not cost so much as to make

the benefits of less value than the money expended.

Movement Becomes Popular. The good roads movement in congress has taken on a more rapid gait recently than it ever strode at before. Once on a time there was a strong feeling among the members of both ouses that good roads legislation was unconstitutional unless it could be clearly proved that the benefits were to be nation-wide and to be of large service to interstate commerce. Some years ago a southern senator introduced a bill appropriating \$500,000 for start at good roads construction. He maintained that if the highways

constructed ran from one state to another, and were used for purposes of trade between states, all question of the constitutionality of the meas-This argument was combated by the strict constructionists, who de-

clared that it was only another way of "beating the devil around the It is said that next to the biological survey the office of good roads became the most popular bureau of the agricultural department. Letters by the thousands were written from all over the United States to senators and representatives asking that the appropriation for the office of good roads be increased in order that the work of the specialists could be ex-

START IN POULTRY BUSINESS

Initial Step Should Be to Determine on Breed of Fowls Adapted to One's Locality.

The first thing to do in taking up poultry as a business is to find some breed adapted to the locality, then stock up with that breed and study it, says the Poultry Journal. Personality enters into the success of the poultry industry to a large extent. A man must be good-natured, for one thing, and willing to give his time and patience to detail work. For these reasons a man who takes up this business for pleasure often succeeds much better than the man who goes into while a cenator represents only a state | it for purely the money it brings him-Success in this business comes slow-

ly. It must be built up. It requires: patience, but when success does come everything after that is easy and the profits are good.

To the man who wishes to enter the poultry business at a small expense, would advise stocking with a dozen hens of some good breed. It is not well to try to do too much until the beginner has learned how to make a small flock pay. I have had very good success in getting eggs from my hens all the year round. I hatch the chicks as early as possible in the spring. The best time to market chicks is when they weigh about two pounds and fowls just before molting. I find it profitable to market eggs. where they must be guaranteed fresh, working up a good trade for the produce at a fair price
