Few Mexican presidents have read at the formal opening sessions of congress shorter messages and few have confined themselves so entirely to one subject. The new congress showed many faces familiar during the days of Porfirio Diaz-so much so that the exiled ruler would have felt entirely at home had he stepped into the chamber. The congress is composed for the most part of a quiet lot of men, representative of the older and more conservative element, and General Huerta appeared to realize this while reading to them his message in a grim straightforward manner, such as had not been witnessed in the chamber in recent

He indulged in no elocutionary effort, but now and then used a characteristic little gesture with one hand; nor was he interrupted by applause. He was applauded only upon his arrival and departure, when the members of congress and the spectators arose to their feet and added "vivas" to the handclapping. One young deputy, more enthusiastic than the rest. called for a cheer "for the man who is maintaining the national dignity.'

General Huerta drove from the palace to the chamber through files of soldiers, most of whom were detailed from the crack Twenty-ninth Regi- H. West, \$131,000; M. C. Acknowledging the plaudits and vivas of the congressmen and spectators by a series of military salutes instead of grave bows, which characterized his old chief, Porfirio Diaz, General Huerta looked a stern figure. Like the congressmen, he was in evening clothes, the only touch of rank being the tri-color across his breast. In a half circle behind him on the platform sat his staff, resplendent in gold lace and full dress uniform, and grouped just below on the floor of the house were the members of the cabi-

The only other touch of color in the house was to be observed in the gallery reserved for the diplomats, most of whom were in uniform.

It became known that Sunday's conference was his second with the president and that on the first occasion he had a frank talk on Mexican affairs. This interchange of views is believed to have, aided in the friendly understanding between Great Britain and the United States concerning the policy toward Mexico.

Henry Lane Wilson, former ambassador to Mexico, and a critic of the administration's policy toward the southern republic, delivered a paid lecture on Mexico Sunday night at a theater a stone's throw from the White House.





Water has caused more trouble by its abundance or scarcity and has more often become a welcome or a disagreeable guest, than any other right place at the right time is one of the greatest problems that confronts the people of today.

The solution of this important problem insofar as human ingenuity has been able to solve it, will be demonstrated at the exhibits of irrigating machinery at the State Fair of Texas at Dallas, Oct. 18th to Nov. 2nd. Machinery adapted to every need and condition from pumping water into the kitchen sink to irrigating a league of land will be shown and its utility proved.

These exhibits are as interesting to the housewife as to the ranghman. Drawing water from the well is one of the most back-breaking of household duties and the shifting of this burden to machinery is one of the educational features of the Fair. There are a million homes in Texas that should be equipped with the latest modern conveniences in these labor-saving devices.

We have 5,238 farms under irrigation in the State, containing 451,000 acres. The bulk of our irrigated lands is devoted to the culture of rice, the total acreage devoted to this cereal being 287,000. Alfalfa is the second important irrigated crop and 13,780 acres are devoted to its culture while corn takes third place with 9,068 acres. The cost of construction of Texas' irrigation systems is estimated at \$13,500,000 by the Federal Census Bureau. It costs approximately an average of \$3.50 per acre to irrigate land, depending upon the character of the crop. The vield per acre of crops under irrigation approximates 45 per cent higher than that of those raised under natural mothed.
