NEW RAILROAD INFORMATION

Kerrville Committee Met Monday and Appointed a Committee to Meet Promoters in San Antonio.

The proposed railroad from Kerrville to San Angelo by the way of Junction and Fort McKavitt, which would be practically an extension of the SAP road and put Kerrville on the main line to San Angelo, Kansas City and other business centers, as well as into San Antonio and the Gulf, is receiving the favorable consideration of the people of this section. The committee again met Monday afternoon, Captain Charles Schreiner, chairman, presiding, together with Mayor H. Remschel, Judge J. R. Burnett and J. M. Lowry, who had been requested by Capt. Schreiner to act with the committee. It was resolved to canvass the matter and to send a committee to San Antonio when Messrs. Robinson and Whittlesey, the railroad representatives shall meet the business men of San Antonio to discuss the road and learn what substantial aid they will render.

The proposition is for Kerrville to raise \$100,000 and to provide depot grounds and the right of way to the Kerr county line. If this includes Kerr county and the territory south of us on the present road, it will no doubt be accepted, but for the city of Kerrville itself to raise this bonus appears rather too much. An effort will be made to have the railroad shops at Kerrville. Capt. Schreiner, who is by far the largest property owner at Kerrville and owns large bodies of land on and near the line of the proposed road, said that he would subscribe liberally towards the fund necessary to get the road.

This road would be nearer from San Antonio to San Angelo than by the way of Fredericksburg, and would also have the great advantage of being on a main line, and would open up an immense agricultural and live stock territory. On the "Divide" in Kerr and Kimble counties and at Junction and between there and San Angelo a splendid territory would be developed by this road, and it would benefit all towns and sections on the present line between Kerrville and San Antonio, and Center Point, Comfort, Waring and Boerne would no doubt extend Kerrville a helping hand. It is believed San Antonio, which has recently shown great public spirit and enterprise, will give this road liberal support. It already has through railroad rates north, south and west to El Paso and San Cisco, and all it needs to complete the circle is a line through the great northwest to its old stage line terminus, Fort Concho, now the thriving city of San Angelo.

Kerrville will heartily welcome the new road and do its part to make its construction a sure and speedy certainty.

Medina Reservoir Over Half Full

The reservoir at the Medina dam is more than half full. On Monday the water at the dam stood 124 feet deep. Calculations showed that the immense storage basin contained 127,400 acres-feet of water. This means that the water impounded would cover 127,400 acres of land to a depth of one foot. The total capacity of the reservoir is 254,000 acre feet and the height of the dam is 166 feet. Thus it will be seen for every foot rise at the dam must be an immense amount of water impounded.

Three motor boats are to be placed on the lake by the Medina Company. These boats are to be used as a cost route to the dam. The length of the boats is 37 feet in length. They were necessitated for transportation purposes. The body of water stretches up the river valley for miles and it has become difficult to get around without boats.

Wilson's Innovations

Our president has set aside some things since coming to the presidency for which he deserves a nation's gratitude. The first was the inaugural ball. It has been the custom for a long time to have this ball. At it could be seen much gold lace, fine dresses and costly jewels. The president understood it all. Like blooded cattle at a country fair, men and women met to show themselves. Of course that class objected but no one else did.

The next innovation was his reading his message to Congress. It is said that Washington and John Adams did this, but Jefferson discarded it because he was a poor reader and poor speaker. Every president since Jefferson has sent his message to Congress and it has been read by another. Often little attention was given the reading of it. No president before Wilson has tried to change the custom. Often, no doubt, important matters mentioned by the president were little heeded, at least at the reading. New interest was awakened by the president dressed as a common man and read his message as a man speaking to men.

Now comes the discarding of the new year's reception, which like the inaugural ball, was a brilliant occasion for a favored few. Perhaps it will not cause such a protest from them because they have learned by this time that President Wilson does as he pleases. The country at large admires the president's common sense.

In a police raid in a small Texas city last week the local paper recites that fourteen men were caught in the act of gambling and all promptly arrested and made to pay the penalty of the law. Of the number caught there were three whites, two Mexicans, one Greek and eight negroes. This is probably not an unusual occurrence but it denotes a thing or two worthy of comment. Gambling is among the lowest of all crimes. It is so considered by our law makers, our court officials and all advocates of good society. The depth of demoralization to which gambling will bring a man is forcibly pictured by the scene related above when white men will gamble with the lowest down negroes and others whom they consider their inferiors. Society and the youth of our country need to be protected from its baneful influences and the sooner our officers fall in line with the better public sentiment and stamp out this evil the better. It needs to be done in Kerrville. The law plainly defines what constitutes gambling and it ought to be enforced to the letter.

The people of Kerrville are generous to sick strangers that come into their midst. Among those who

come are, as we might expect, a few unappreciative and unworthy ones, but these are comparatively few. Would it not be better, however, if we had some kind of a charity organization, through which the charitably inclined may contribute and be assured that it would be discriminated and wisely administered, instead of the indiscriminate and hap-hazard way we now have.

Notwithstanding the fact that Texas was flooded last week from El Paso to Texarkana and from Dalhart to Brownsville, it appears from a close perusal of both of the live papers of Junction that not a drop of rain fell in that section. The only item in either paper that could be found bearing in any way upon the subject of water was to the effect that the Chamber of Commerce had met to make some arrangements to have the streets sprinkled. Perhaps our enterprising neighbors were too busy discussing the new railroad proposition to even discover that it rained.

It is all too true that the possession of wealth covers a multitude of faults. The rich can sometimes be guilty of the grossest improprieties and maintain their standing, while, for a similar offense the little fellow would be kicked out of society.
