CLAIM ARISES OUT OF RAILWAY BUILDING RACE IN 1866.

Plaintiff Alleges Grants Were Promised First Road Building Across Oklahoma-Set for Supreme Court.

Washington .- The claim of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway Company to \$62,000,000 damages against the government for the latter's failure to turn over alternate sections of land along its line through Oklahoma will furnish one of several important arguments this week before the supreme court.

The railway's claim arises out of the spectacular railway building race fostered by the government in 1866. In that year congress offered to grant alternate sections of land as soon as the Indian title should be extinguished, along a line of railroad to be constructed across the present state of Oklahoma to Denison, Texas, to the first railroad to build a line from the eastern terminus of the Union Pacific on the Kansas and Missouri state lines to the southern line of Oklahoma.

The race was open to three railroads-the Kansas and Neosha Valley, the Leavenworth, Lawrence and Fort Gibson and the Union Pacific: The Kansas and Neosha Valley, which has since become the Missouri, Kansas and Texas, won. The government has not made the grant, however, contending that the land in question never became a part of the public lands of the United States. The road claims \$20 an acre damage.

The court will be called on to study the title to some 90,000 acres of land, comprising the Alamedo grant, in the Rio Grande Valley, near Albuquerque, N. M., from 1710 down to the present day, in another case to be presented to the court this week. Some 500 heirs of Captain Juan Gonzales and Francisco Montes Vigil, to whom the king of Spain granted the land in 1710, assert title to the tract. So do nearly 100 persons who have squatted on the portion of the land in the valley and resided there for years. The latter claim is a narrow strip a few yards wide, running back some sixteen miles from the river.

# KATY SUES FOR \$62,000,000 MEXICAN PRISONERS AT FT. BLISS

FEDERAL GENERAL MERCADO IN COMMAND OF OWN TROOPS.

Names Main Camp Street "Huerta." More Mexicans Than Fought. Baths Are Compulsory.

El Paso, Tex.-General Salvador Mercado, who commanded the Mexican federal army which fled from Ojinaga, Mexico, Friday was placed in command of the camp of soldiers and refugees at Fort Bliss. As a token of his continued loyalty to the government at the City of Mexico, General Mercado immediately christened the main street of the camp Avenidad General Huerta. Although himself a refugee, General Mercado was selected by the United States army officials as best fitted to have personal supervision over his men.

Water pipes were laid and all Mexicans were told that they must bathe regularly. Outdoor barber shops also were provided.

The Mexican consul at El Paso called at Fort Bliss to arrange to pay some of the back salaries of Mexican soldiers. The American officers said they had no authority to negotiate for the payment of salaries to the federals. The money said to be available for the soldiers is \$70,000 which was taken from a federal paymaster at Marfa, Texas, who attempted to drive through to Ojinaga, but was stopped by the American border pa-

A second roll call of the Mexican soldiers and refugees who fled to this country from Ojinaga, Mexico, show ed that several hundred more Mexicans are dependent on the United States for food and shelter than first counts indicated.

# COTTON GINNED AVERACED 13,589,171 BALES

Consus Bureau Gives Figures for Yield Prior to Jan. 16-Linters Amounted to 396,934 Bales.

Washington .- Announcement by the census bureau Saturday that 13,589,-171 bales of cotton, exclusive of lint ers, had been ginned prior to Jan. 16, officially established that the 1913-14 cotton crop is the second in size the country has grown.

Linters obtained to Jan. 1 amounted to 396,934 bales, bringing the total cotton ginned, as far as official figures show, to 13,986,105 running bales. This amount will be increased by ginnings during the remainder of the season so that the final figure will show a crop of more than 14,000,000 bales.

Preliminary figures will not be announced until March 20, when the census bureau will make its report showing the ginnings to Feb. 28. In the past five years the quantity of cotton ginned between Jan. 16 and Feb. 28 has averaged 3.6 per cent of the entire crop. During the period between Jan. 1 and 16 the ginnings were 235,802 bales, which is greater than at any similar period during the past five

During the past seven years the ginnings prior to Jan. 16 averaged 95.5 per cent of the entire crop. Last year to Jan. 16 there had been ginned 13, 088,930 bales, or 9.7 per cent of the entire crop; in 1911 to that date 14, 515,799 bales, or 93.3 per cent, and in 1908 to that date 12,666,203 bales, or 96.8 per cent.

Included in the ginnings were 97,034 round bales, compared with 78,690 bales last year 97,654 bales in 1911. 11,079 bales in 1910 and 232,510 bales in 1908.

The number of sea island cotton bales included were 76.182, compared with 70,758 bales last year, 109,867 bales in 1912 and 92,191 bales in 1909. Texas-Ginnings. Per ct.

# Congress Asked to Prohibit Shipment

of Texas Cattle Beyond the Quarantine Area.

Washington.-The secretary of agriculture has recommended that congress repeal the provision in the law of 1884 establishing the Bureau of Animal Industry which permits the shipment of cattle from the Texas fever region by rail to market for slaughter. This law was passed before the nature of the infection and its transmission by ticks were understood. The effect of the change would be to place Texas fever on the same basis as other communicable diseases and to prohibit the interstate movement of tick-infested cattle. 



Edinburgh Birthplace of Skyscraper and Presbyterianism.

City Has Population of 350,000 People and Has Managed to Get Itself More Talked About in Literature Than Any Other.

Chicago.-Edinburgh, the capital of Scotland, is situated in a cold north wind, on the south side of the Firth of Forth. It has about 350,000 people, and has managed to get itself more talked about in literature than almost any other city of this size, George Fitch says in an exchange.

Edinburgh rambles over three great hills, and has been built with great care and good taste. Even the ranroads in Edinburgh are aesthetic. They have made a valley into a great park and managed to make the city handsomer by passing through it. All American railroad presidents should be compelled by law to go to Edinburgh with a two-quart notebook.

Edinburgh's origin is lost in the Scotch mists of antiquity. It contains some very ancient features, including the castle, the tenements in the old town, and a number of prehistoric cab horses. The tenements of Edinburgh are the earliest known sky scrapers. They are from six to nine stories high, built of brick and propped up with timbers, broom handles and chair legs. Now and then one of these "lands," as they are called, falls down, but few other improvements in them have been made for a generation.

Edinburgh is so strengly impregnated with history that there are few old buildings in which some person of eminence did not die with his boots on, during some persecution or other. Presbyterianism was invented in Edinburgh by John Knox, and for many years was more unhealthy than cholera for those who caught it. Mary

# INTERNATIONAL SUNDAYSCHOOL **LESSON**

# LESSON FOR FEBRUARY 1

THE UNFRIENDLY NEIGHBOR.

LESSON TEXT-Luke 11:1-13.
GOLDEN TEXT-"Ask and it shall be tiven unto you; seek, and ye shall find; snock and it shall be opened unto you."—Luke 11:9. The only record we have of this par-

able is in this gospel. This portion of Scripture is usually thought of as being a great teaching on prayer. It is that, and it is more than that. It is a great illustration of the sound principles of pedagogy employed by that wonderful Bible teacher, our Lord and

1. Teaching by example (v. 1). There was that in the prayer life of Jesus that was different than that of the formalistic religionists of his day, something that inspired the request, "Lord teach us to pray." . His prayer life was different, it was effectual. Notice, in passing, the respect of the disciples "when he had ceased." If there is one lesson the oncoming generation needs to learn it is that of reverence. His prayers were too sacred to permit of any intrusion. His praying also awoke in their memory the prayer life of John the Baptiser. There is deep paychology here. Observation, memory, perception, concept, all in their logical order

Most Wonderful Prayer. II. Teaching by formula (vv. 24). The

human mind is weak and needs that assistance which is to be found in a clear statement of truth. Not always can we have the benefit of a strong personality. Hence Jesus gives us a formula, or prayer, often called the 'Lord's Prayer," but more correctly termed "the disciples' prayer." - This is in some respects the world's most wonderful prayer, certainly the most familiar. Lacking in personal pronouns, it begins with that matchless conception of God, "our Father," it descends step by step from a consideration of his hallowed name, his kingdom, and his will (Luke 22:42) in heaven and upon earth, down to the question of our need of daily food. It then sweeps backward through the relations of mankind to each other, to temptation, to the power of sin, back (Matt. 6:13) to God once more, back to the Alpha and Omega. In it is invocation, supplication and adoration. It sweeps the whole gamut of man's need, physical, mental and spiritual. It begins in heaven, it encircles the earth, it rebounds to those realms of glery from which the Son came, and to which he returned. A study of the prayers of the saints, living and dead, ought to be more emphasized. This agdom here mentioned is yet to be fully established. A kingdom demands a king (Rev. 22:20); its beginning, though, is in the hearts of men; it implies entire submission to God's will (Luke 22:42); it delights in doing that will (John 6:38, Eph. 6:6); it demands an entire sanctification of our lives, and a desire that his will shall rule in the earth (1 Thess., 4:3). The fifth petition is not the prayer of the unsayed sinner (John 9:31). Fellowship with God depends upon our willinguess to forgive others (Matt. 6:14, New York -Three women were | 15; Mark 11:25); but that is not the ground of God's forgiveness (Eph. 1:7: 4:32). God does not tempt men (Jas. 1:13); he does permit temptation to assall us such as modern economic conditions (Mark 1:12, 13), but God never allows us to be tempted above what we can bear (1 Cor. 10:13). Volumes have been written about this prayer and yet its fulness has not even been suggested. The teacher who really prays cannot be a failure, for he has the power of God behind his labor. He must, however, not limit himself to his prayer only (Phil. 4:6; Jas. 5:13, 14). The Christian's prayer must be in the name of Christ, which is not named here, for he was not yet cruci-

> The Holy Spirit. III. Teaching by parable (vv. 6-10) "A"

parable is an earthly story with a heavenly meaning." Only the teacher who can translate truth into terms of "it is like" has really begun to teach. Let us beware, however, of a wrong comparison and of to vivid details. This is not a picture of God, only by way of contrast is he suggested. There are three friends here: (1) The needy one in his journey; (2) the needy one who was host, and (3) the needy one who was a selfish neighbor. The pau perism of the second was inexcusable (Phil. 4:19); the wandering of the first at night time cannot go unchallenged (Matt. 28:20). As for the third, it was a most unseasonable hour and his friend's insistence was unreasonable, yet, his insistence emphasized the urgency of the request and the confidence of a friend.

IV. Teaching by contrast (vv. 11-13). Pedagogically considered this is the application. Notice it is introduced by the word "for" and the summary is the sum and substance of all good, the Holy Spirit. Announcement was made by Buf falo and Pittsburg officials that 17 trainmen had been discharged from their service for the same reason.


