TEN YEARS AGO
January 30, 1963

A series of burglaries last week in Bovina, Hub and Lazbuddie has resulted in the arrest of a 20-year-old Hub gin employee.

SIX YEARS AGO
February 1, 1967

Tuesday taxpayers living within the boundaries of Bovina Independent School District will go to the polls for the third time within the past 12 months to mark a ballot for or against a school construction program here.

Three proposals, totaling \$268,000, will be submitted to the voters and will be voted upon separately, as they were in the December election, when they were turned down. A \$600,000 bond issue was vetoed last spring.

Two boxcars and numerous office equipment items will be sold at auction Saturday morning by Panhandle Growers Labor Association.

The association was formed and operated to handle bracero labor in this area. When the bracero program was discontinued, the organization became dormant.

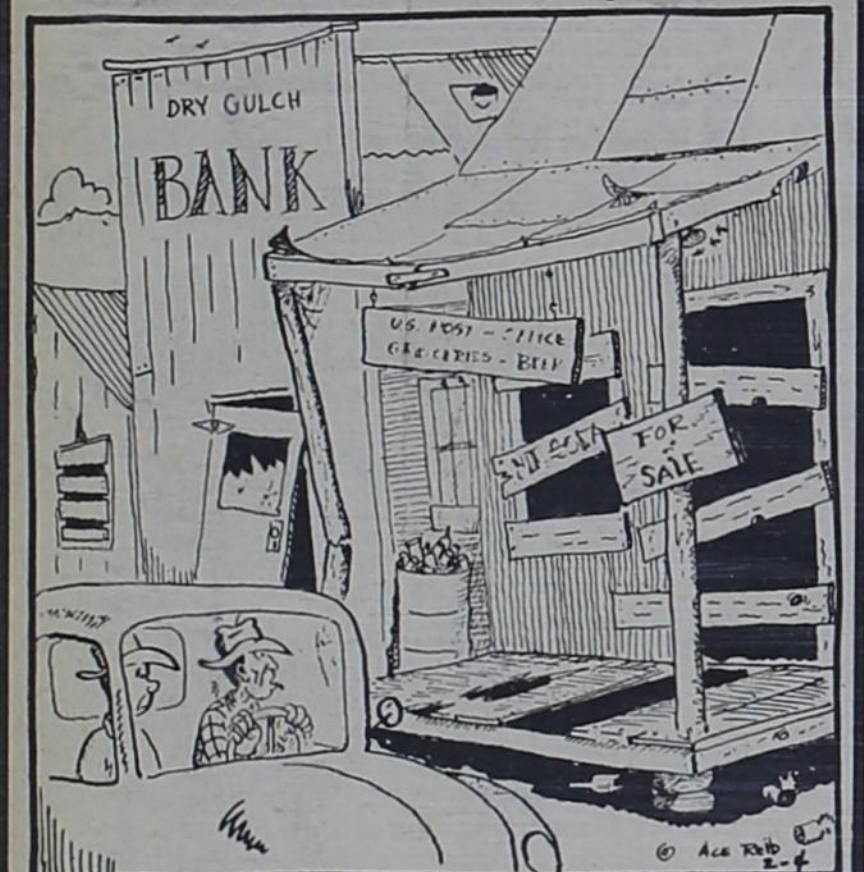

Freak Cycle Wreck Hurts Pat Ware

Pat Ware, 11, narrowly escaped serious injury about 4:30 p.m. Tuesday of last week when he ran his Honda 100 cycle into a barbed wire fence at the motorcycle track near the Dimmitt highway. He was alone at the time of the accident.

Ware was knocked unconscious for a short time. When he regained consciousness, he walked to the Eldon Thatcher residence for aid. He suffered a slight concussion and numerous cuts on his neck and under his chin.

He was hospitalized overnight for observation at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona. He was wearing a helmet which probably prevented more serious wounds.

Two Killed --

17 Accidents In December

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 17 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of December, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed and eight persons injured.

The rural traffic summary for this county during the 12 months of 1972 shows a total of 163 accidents resulting in six persons killed and 87 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region during the calendar year of 1972 shows a total of 6,573 accidents resulting in 279 persons killed and 3,545 persons injured. This was 60 more accidents, 15 more fatalities and 49 less injured than during the calendar year of 1971.

The Highway Patrol supervisor reminds that the new signs, signals, and markings on

the roads are signs of LIFE -- your life. "Drive Friendly the Texas Way," he says.

The 21 deaths in the 60 counties of the Lubbock DPS Region during the month of December, 1972 occurred in the following counties: Clay, three; Parmer, Parker, Wilbarger, and Knox, two each; Bailey, Hockley, Lamb, Palo Pinto, Terry, Wise, Dallam, Hutchinson, Ochiltree, and Potter, one each.

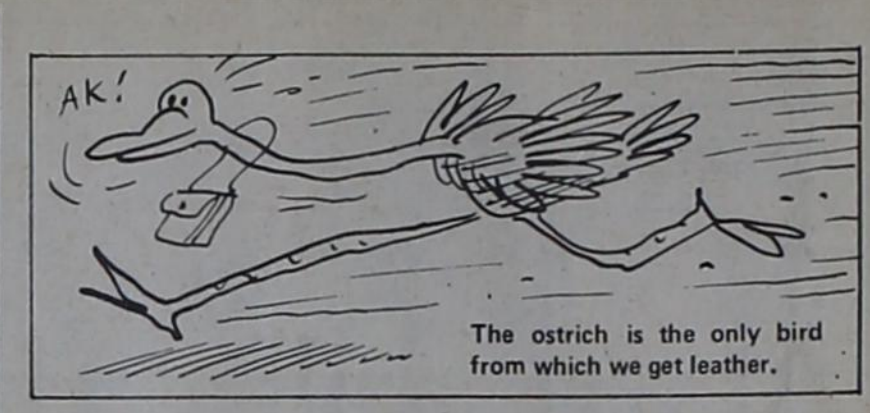

Russell Windham showed his heavyweight Duroc

barrow to first place and Reserve Champion. His middleweight Chester White stood third in its class. Mike's heavyweight Hampshire placed fourth.

The lamb show started things off on January 26, with Mike's lightweight finewool cross placing fourth and his mediumweight finewool placing eighth. Evelyn Hart's lightweight Southdown placed ninth. Karene Hart showed her heavyweight Southdown to 11th and her lightweight finewool to 12th. Russell's lightweight mediumweight placed 10th. 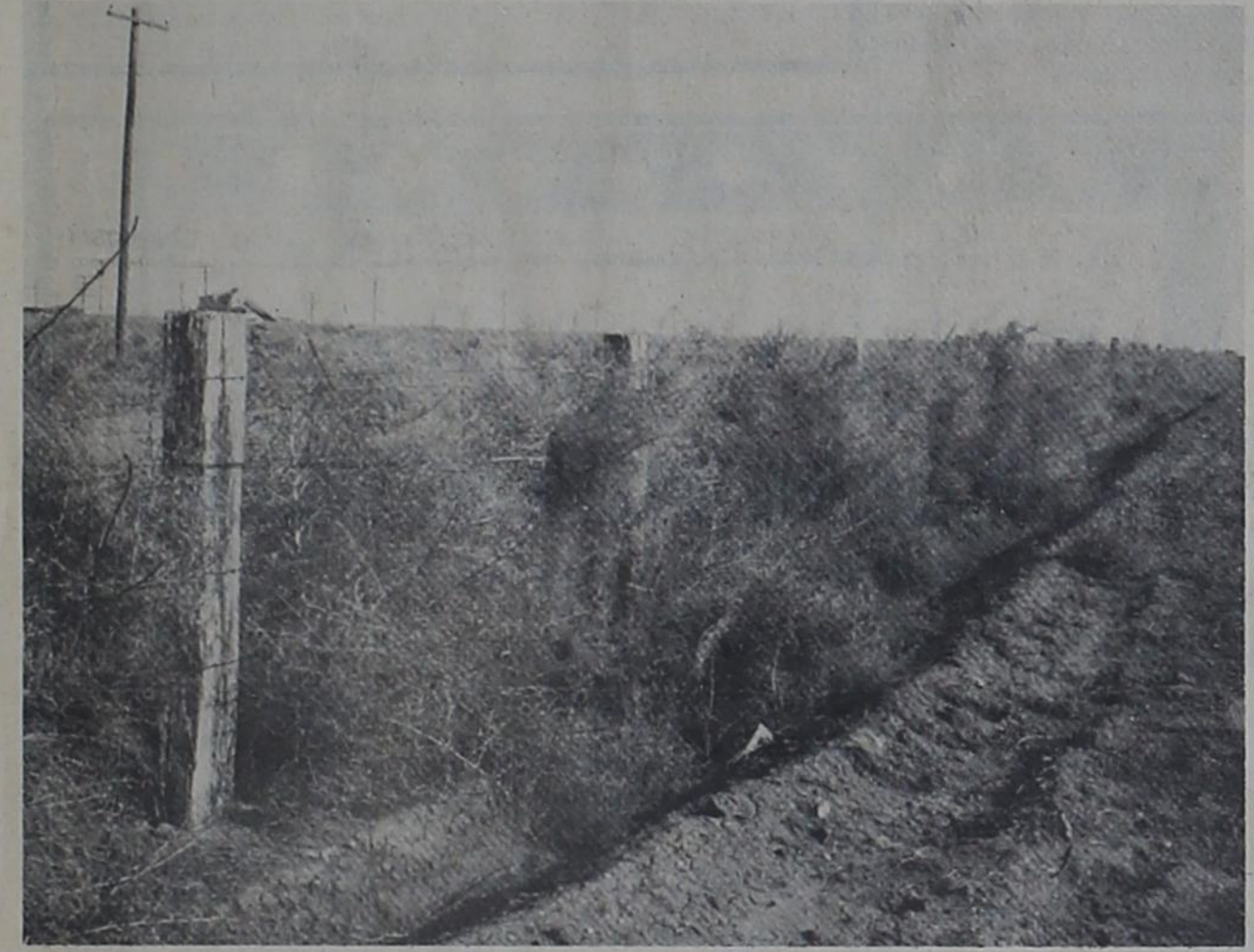

Pipeline Design Still Available

"Although the Rural Environmental Assistance Program (REAP) has been terminated in recent federal budget cutbacks, farmers in Parmer County should know that engineering design assistance is still available," says Herb Evans, soil conservationist of Parmer County.

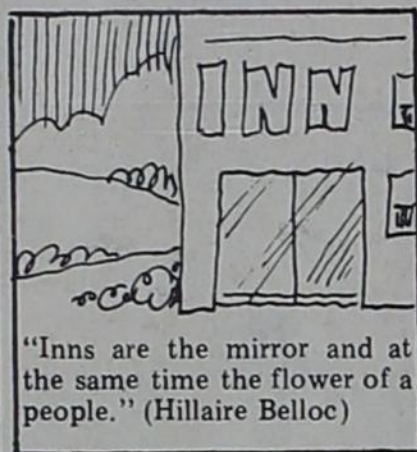
Properly designed irrigation pipeline is essential to prac-

tical and efficient operation, Evans points out.

"If a pipeline is installed undersize or without proper air and pressure relief valves in an effort to save on costs, it causes problems from now on," Evans says.

The Soil Conservation Service engineering and technical assistance is available at no cost to all district cooperators in the county.

"I suggest that farmers interested in obtaining assistance contact the SCS office in Friona," says Evans. "We would like to help design pipelines or check on existing design," Evans concludes.

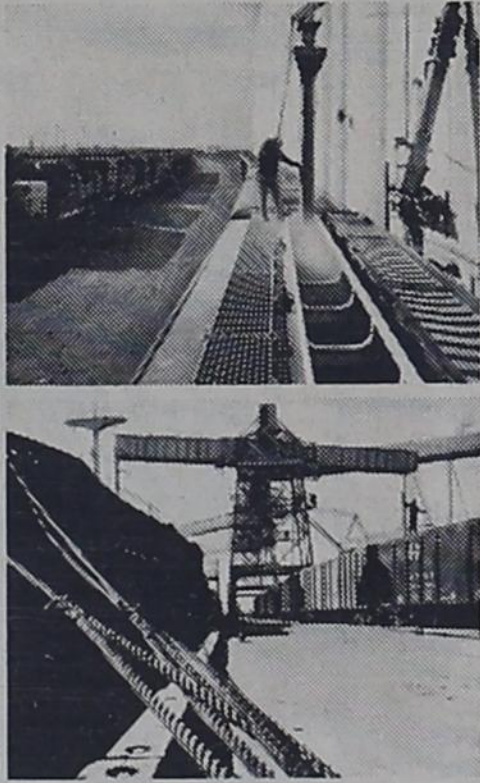
America's wheat is making a historic turnaround



1,000 additional, 100-ton covered hoppers are now being completed to give Santa Fe 11,000 of these giant cars to help move export wheat to Russia

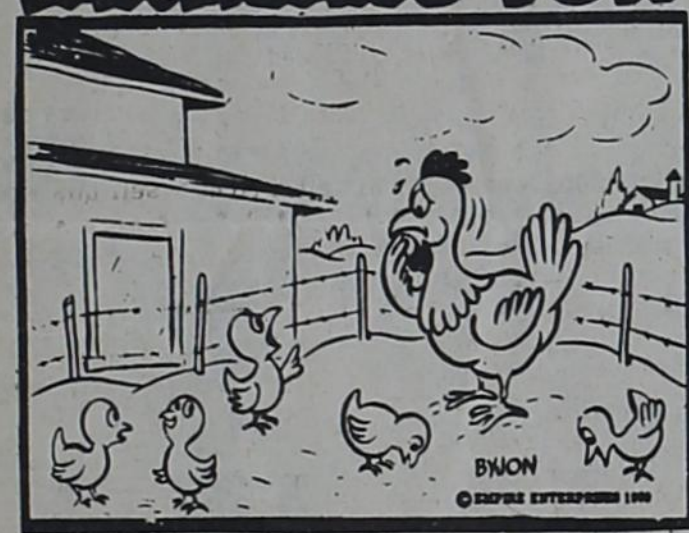

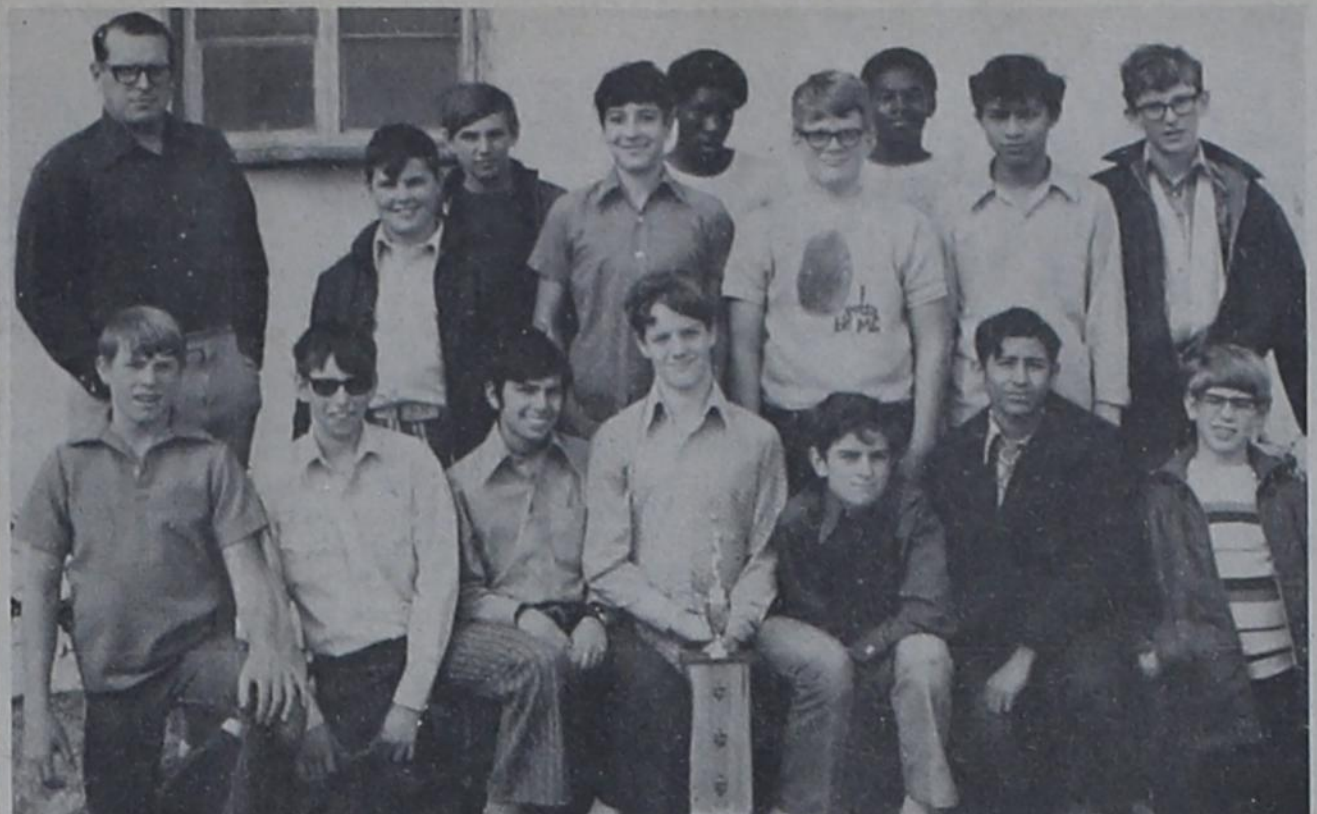
