

COTTON CROP MOST VALUABLE PRODUCED

BUREAU PLACES 1913 FIGURE AT 14,767,151 BALES, SECOND LARG-EST YIELD ON RECORD.

3,943,133 BALES GROWN IN TEXAS

Crop Weighed 7,383,557,500 Pounds and is Valued at \$1,000,000,000, Including Seed-Texas Leads Them All.

Washington .- The 1913 cotton crop was the most valuable ever grown, and second largest in point of quantity Statistics announced by the bureau of census Saturday indicated it amounted to 7,383,557,500 pounds, or 14,767,151 bales of lint and linter cotton. The total value of the crop, including the value of cotton seed, is unofficially estimated round at more than \$1,000, 000,000, compared with \$920,000,000 last year and \$936,000,000 for the pre vious most valuable crop, that of 1910 These figures compare with 13,73,

421 equivalent 500-pound bales of lint and 609,594 bales of linters last year, and 15,692,701 bales of lint and 557,575 bales of linters in 1911.

The department of agriculture's es timate, announced Dec. 12, placed the 1913 crop at 13,677,000 equivalent 500pound bales.

With this report the bureau of cenaus departed from its previous method of reporting the cotton crop by not including the quantity of linters in the total production. Director William J. Harris announced this was done because with the installation of modern machinery closer delinting of seed had largely increased the quantity of linters and at the same time lowered the average quality of the fiber, so that now only a small part, if any, was used as a substitute for lint cotton

Elverjel, where the main body of his brigade rests, is five miles north of Gomez Palacio, or nine miles distant from the Plaza Principal of Torreon

General Aguirre Eugenio Benrad'es and General Maclovio Herrera have been out of communication most of the day, but were reported to be advancing on Matamorras, an important railroad point on the Torreon Tianual lilo line, fifteen miles from Torreon, giving them complete control of the railroad situation eastward from Tor-

General Rosalie Hernandez and Gen eral Trinidad Rodriguez have moved southwest from Noe, forming junction with General Tomas Urbina's brigade preparatory to a concentrated attack on Lerdo, the shoe factory suburb of Torreon, which is said to be strongly fortified.

Constitutionalist Headquarters, Yermo, Durango -- General Villa and his army of 12,000 rebels Saturday invested the federal stronghold of Tor-The khaki clad members occupied the environs of the city with out opposition and the day was spent in wheeling and dragging field pieces into position to shell the federal trenches, dug at every point where the federal commander, General Refugio Velasco, expects attack.

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

INTERNATIONAL (By E. O. SELLERS, Director of Evening Department, The Moody Bible Institute Chicago.)

LESSON FOR MARCH 29 JESUS THE GREAT TEACHER. (Review.)

READING LESSON—Matt. 7:21-29.
GOLDEN TEXT—"He bath showed thee, O man, what is good; and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God."—Micah 6:8.

There is no chronological order to the lessons for the past quarter, though they have all been selected from the period of the Perean ministry of our Lord. The thought of the Golden Text, rather than the reading lesson, will serve to give us a connected

The lessons have chiefly concerned lesus as the great Teacher, thus we notice the inclusive note of the first clause of the Golden Text, "He hath showed thee, O man, what is good." As an exposition of that note we have presented God's plan of action, outward, "to do justly, ald to love mercy," and inwardly "to walk humbly with thy God." With this thought in mind let us divide lessons of the quarters into two sections: (1) The first seven lessons which have to do with man's relation to the kingdom in its outward manifestation, and (2) the remaining ive that have to do with "walking humbly with thy God."

As Children.

1. The first section. In order to keep this two-fold thought before us, we must observe carefully the several golden texts. In the first lesson we have set before us the manner whereby we are to enter into this new kingdom. We must enter as children and the Golden Text, "Likewise, ye younger, be subject unto the . for God resisteth the elder proud, but giveth grace to the humple," illustrates the humility of children and the necessity of our right relationship to them. The second lesson deals with the possibility of cooperation with him in service, as when the 70 went before his face. Great privileges, however, when abused, bring condemnation and degradation. "It is not you that speak, but the Spirit of your Father that speaketh in you." The third lesson-'The Good Samaritan"-is another expression of the outward walk of life. that of loving mercy. True love never asks who it may, but rather who it can, serve. It always manifests itself in sacrifice and in service-"Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." The story of service actually rendered to our Lord in the days of his flesh is the subject of the fourth lesson. All other interests and ties must be secondary to our allegiance and obedience to him-"Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of these, my brethren, even these least, ye did it unto-me." The fifth lesson concerns prayer. The parable of the unfriendly neighbor and the effect of prayer to bring about just relations is revealed in the Golden Text which is the heart of that lesson. "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you." The sixth lesson still continues to treat this outward aspect and reveals to us the fact that great as Satan is, our Lord Jesus has far greater power. Must Walk Humbly.

II. The second section. We now come to a group of lessons that seem to emphasize the second part of God's requirements, as expressed in the Golden Text for today, viz., "and to walk humbly with thy God." This is the inward, personal, relation with God, as against our outward, righteous relations with men. These remaining lessons deal with the abiding principles of discipleship which Jesus gave to his followers. The eighth lesson reveals the principle of a true confession of Christ to be that of the faith which makes fear impossible. We are to fear God alone. In the ninth lesson we see that the true fulfillment of life is that of having the heart set upon the true treasure, which is spiritual, rather than upon the false treasure which is material. for, "Where your treasure is, there will be your heart also." In lesson ten we have set before us the principle of faithful service which is that of watchfulness for the returning King, and which expresses itself in perpetual service in his interest and on behalf of his household. "Blessed are those servants whom the Lord, when he cometh, shall find watching, The principle of the religion of Christ is that of compassion (lesson 11), and the true sanction of the Sabbath is fulfilled in such pervice as makes the Sabbath possible to those who are in need. It is, therefore, lawful to

do good on the Sabbath. Lesson 12 deals with the vital issue of this second section, viz., that it is of far more importance that we be in the kingdom than any other issue. We must put forth strennous efforts that we may enter the narrow door. The Lord! "Not everyone that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the
