'73 Tags Sell Here Two Days

Vehicle owners in this community may purchase their 1973 license plates at Bovina city hall today (Wednesday) and tomorrow.

Hugh Moseley, Parmer County tax assessor-collector, will be at the city office from 10 a.m. until noon and from 1 to 4 p.m.

Vehicle owners must bring their license plate renewal forms in order to purchase the tags, says Moseley. Also, if owners plan to purchase the plates with a check, personalized checks must be used, he states.

Moseley said no title work would be done while he is in Bovina.

Vehicle owners may continue to purchase tags until deadline time by mailing the three-part renewal forms, registration fee and \$1 to cover the cost of mailing, to the county courthouse in Farwell. Deadline for displaying '73 tags is Sunday, April 1.

Charge Man With Assault Here Monday

The meeting will be at the Hub Community Center with all irrigation farmers in the county invited to attend.

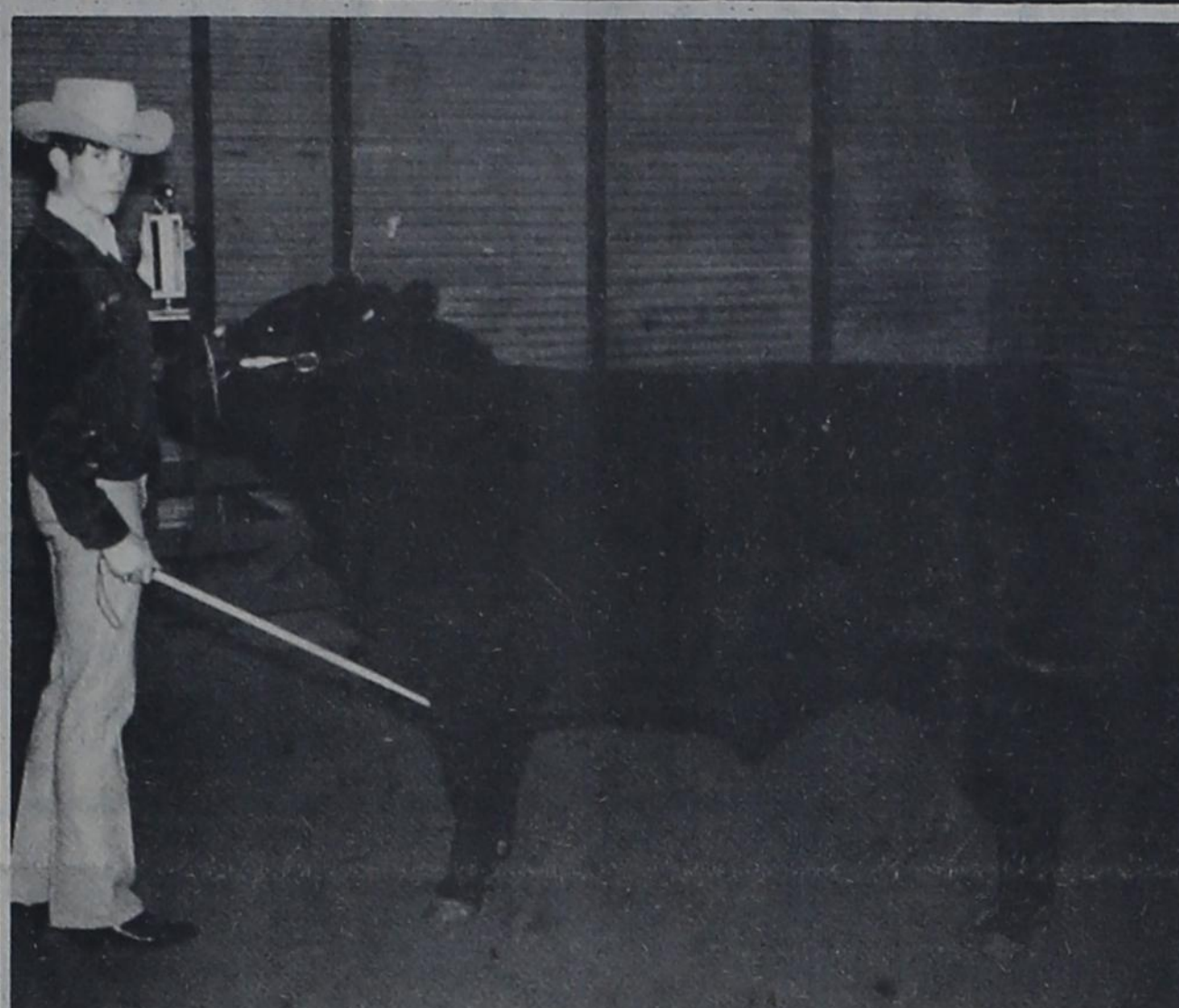
"If farmers are to obtain fuel in sufficient quantities, it is going to be essential that they band together and speak with one voice," Jesko says.

In addition to a discussion of the fuel scarcity possibility, the new farm program for 1973 will be explained by a representative from the county ASCS office.

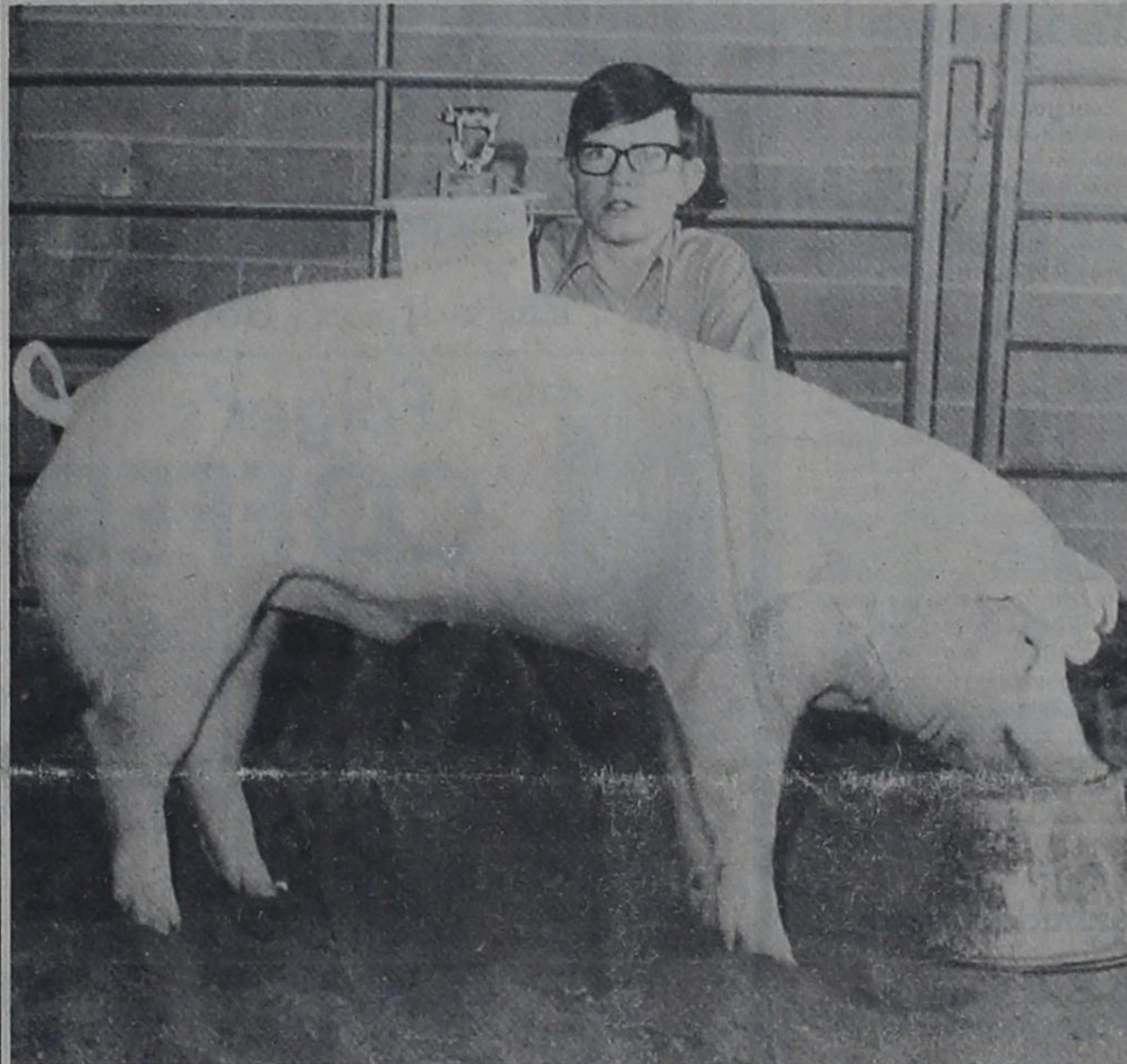
Officers of the organization, in addition to Jesko, are D.L. Carmichael, vice president, and Carl Schlenker, secretary.

Bovina Entries Place, Sell At County Show

A record-breaking sale, actively supported by area businesses, climaxed the 17th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show at Friona last weekend.

Barrows and lambs were judged Friday. Steers were judged Saturday morning with the sale of all animals following Saturday afternoon.

Snow and cold weather handicapped the Saturday portion of the show. The weather Friday was windy and cold.

Lazbuddie showmen continued their years-long domination of the barrow show as Rick Seaton of that community exhibited the grand champion, Lazbuddie barrows stood in 11 of the top 12 places of the show. The only exception was Bovina's Al Kerby, who showed his middleweight Chester White to the reserve championship.

Bovina Wheat Growers, Inc., purchased Kerby's reserve champion, which weighed 213 pounds, for \$1 per pound.

The two daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Langford dominated

the steer show as they showed Herefords to the grand and reserve championships.

Annette Langford, an 11-year-old fifth grader in Farwell Schools, had the grand champion. It weighed 1150 pounds and also took first place in the heavyweight class. The steer was purchased by Friona State Bank for 95 cents per pound.

Jacquelyn Langford, a 15-year-old freshman in Farwell High, exhibited the reserve champ steer. It weighed 1067 pounds and placed first in the medium heavyweight class. The reserve champion was purchased by Worley Grain Co. of Farwell for 85 cents per pound.

Farwell entries captured 11 of the top 12 placings in the steer show. The only exception was Bovina's Galen Carson who showed his 946-pound Charolais-cross steer to third place in the medium light-weight class. Carson's steer was purchased by Bovina Wheat Growers and First State

February 16th and 17 saw the staging of the Farmer County Junior Livestock Show in Friona. 4-H members from each of the six community clubs in the county exhibited their livestock in the event. Saturday was the final day of the show with the steer show winding up the three divisions and the premium sale being staged that afternoon.

Two sisters from the same family teamed up to win the grand and reserve grand steer honors. Annette Langford, representing the Farwell 4-H Club, led her first place heavy-weight steer to the grand championship over all other breeds and crosses. She later sold her 1115 pound Hereford to the Friona State Bank for 95 cents per pound. Her older sister, Jacquelyn, won the middle heavy weight class and carried the winning tradition on further by garnering the reserve champion banner. Her 1067 pound Hereford steer was purchased by Worley Grain Company of Farwell for 85 cents per pound. The steer show is divided into four equal

weight limits with the breeds being shown together. Mark Haseloff, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Haseloff, won the light weight class with a Hereford steer weighing 920 pounds. Mark was representing the Oklahoma Lane 4-H Club.

Farmer County 4-H members won three out of the four steer classes in this show. Other 4-H members placing steers in the show included Bruce Kaltwasser, fifth place heavy weight; Michael Mimms, sixth place heavy weight; Mark Gammon, seventh place heavy weight; Mat Moten, 10th place heavy weight; Joe Haseloff, second place middle heavy weight; Bruce Kaltwasser, fifth place medium weight; Joe Haseloff, sixth place medium weight; Robert Johnson, eighth place medium weight; Glen Schueler, ninth place medium weight; Craig Kaltwasser, second place light weight; Robert Johnson, seventh place light weight; and Mac Langford, ninth place light weight. 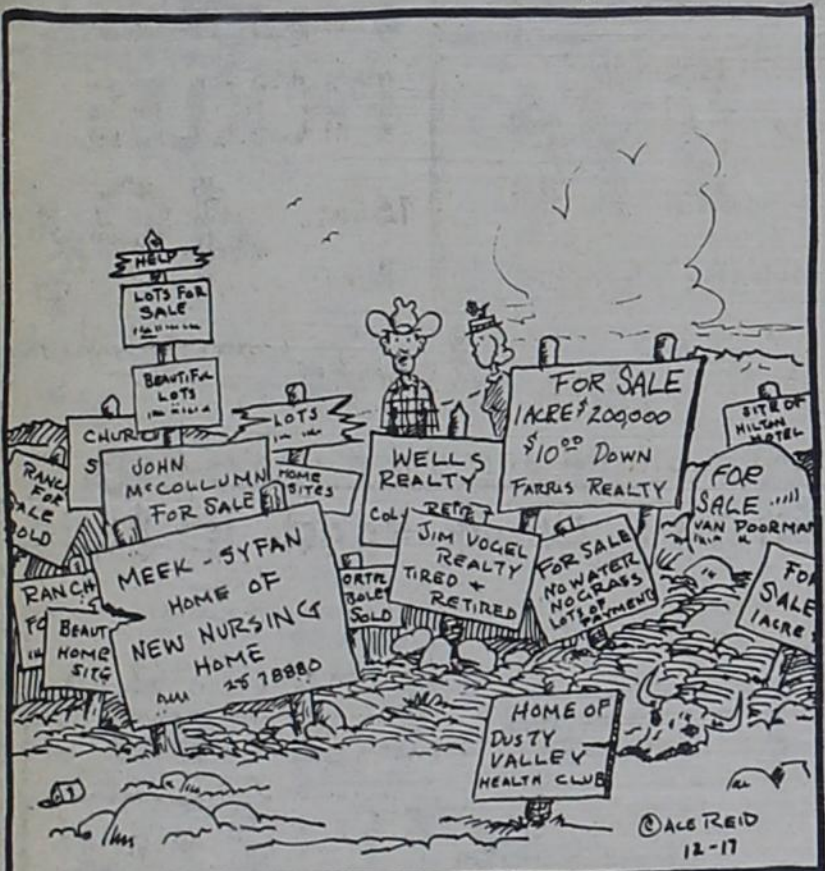

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America's farmers feed not only cattle, hogs, and poultry, but everything else that flies, swims, runs, or crawls on farm and ranchlands -- an estimated 80 per cent of the nation's wildlife, according to Herb Evans, Soil Conservationist at the Soil Conservation Service office. The Soil Conservation Service figures show that farmer encouragement of wildlife is on the increase. Farmers, ranchers and other landowners have improved more than seven and one-half million acres of land and water areas for the benefit of wildlife -- a 28 per cent increase over last year, says Evans. Further, SCS reports, more than half a million acres of other rural land was converted from crop or rangeland into wildlife and recreation areas during 1972. SCS helps landowners improve food, water, and cover for wildlife. Improved habitat increases wildlife populations even faster than stocking. The seven and one-half million acres of habitat improvement is only a small part of the American farmer's aid to wildlife. Widespread farm and ranch conservation practices as strip-cropping (alternating banks of crops and grass), building ponds, protecting woodland areas, planting windbreaks and improving rangeland also attract many wild creatures. These and many other conservation practices indicate that American farmers and ranchers continue to be the "host with the most" for wildlife.

Mrs. Bartlett left for Red River Friday afternoon but was stopped by a storm at Las Vegas. She returned with Rocky Saturday afternoon.

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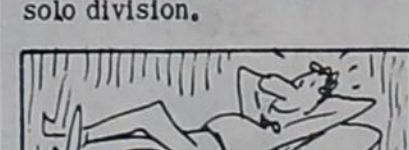
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Three Enter Band Contest At Lubbock

A LECTURE ON PRAYER

(Editor's Note: This lecture was given by a 12 year old who is a member of the church. It shows that we still have many God fearing youth.)

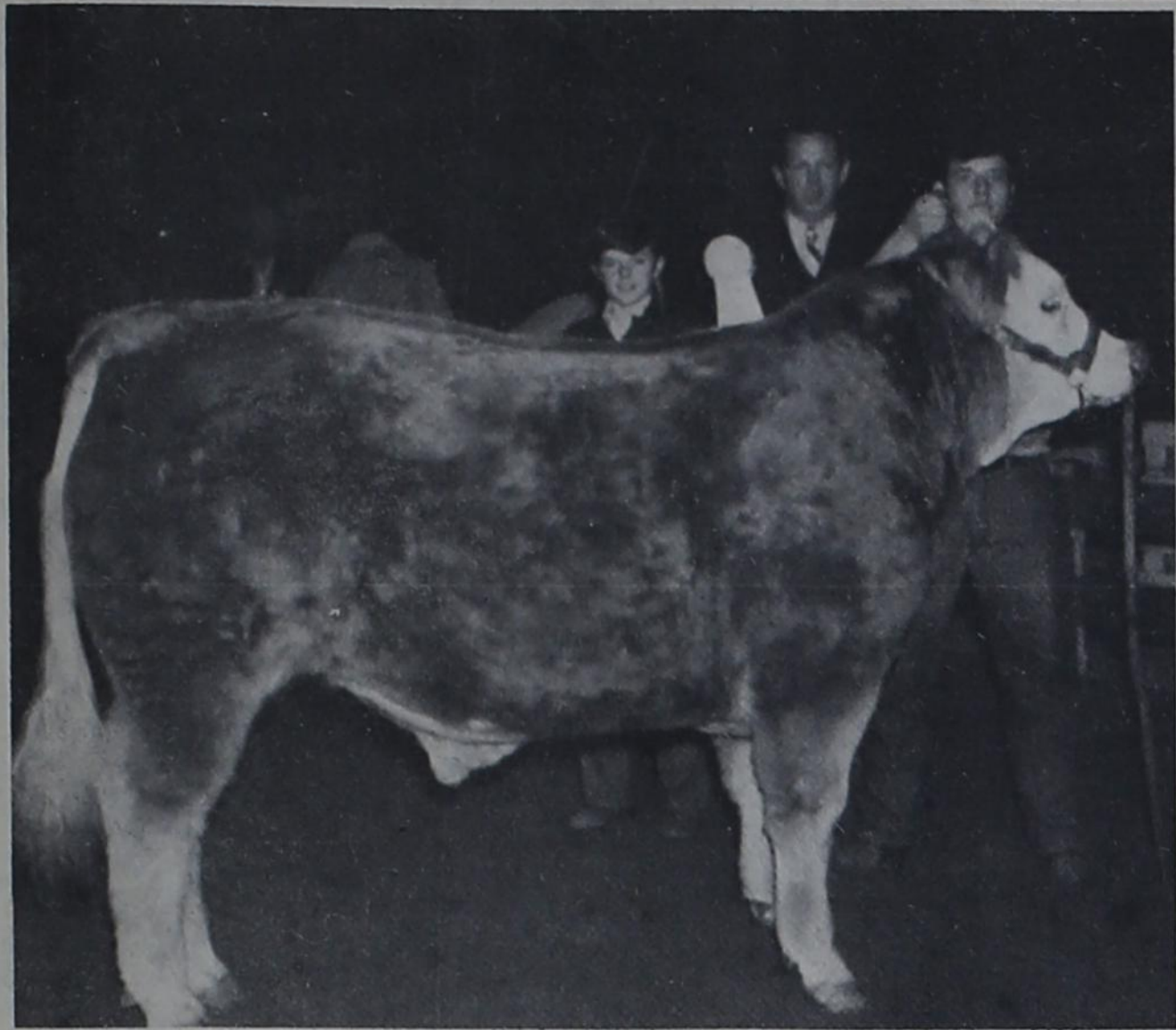

Next meeting of the Booster Club was set for 8 p.m. on May 1 when members will elect officers for the coming year.

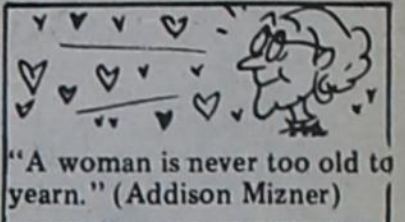
