WE TEND TO FORGET, sometimes, how fortunate we are to live in a state whose highway system is practically second to none other.

So, it helps to get out at times, check out some of the facilities in our neighboring states, and find out "how the other half lives."

For example, we have been somewhat critical of the length of time it is taking the construction crew to widen and re-pave the six-mile stretch of Highway 214 from the Bailey-Parmer counties line into Muleshoe. Maybe it is taking a while to accomplish, but when it's finished, we'll at least have a highway.

This week, we want to tell you about another six-mile stretch of road in Lincoln County, New Mexico. It is designated "State Highway 105."

The Ellises and Tuckers were exploring the area around Ruidoso, N.M. on Easter Sunday, when the opportunity to become acquainted with this "highway" came about.

Having started our day by visiting Capitan (the "birthplace of Smokey the Bear" and Lincoln (Billy the Kid's old stomping grounds), we then decided to check out Nogal Lake. We had never been to this particular lake, and it sounded like a good place to have a picnic.

In the mountain areas, you probably are aware that their road system isn't a simple pattern of parallel roads like we enjoy, where you can get from one place to another with relative ease.

According to the map, we found that you practically had to go all the way back to Ruidoso, and come back up to Nogal Lake, (some 20 or 30 miles) despite the fact that at Capitan, you're almost spitting distance from the lake.

That was when we discovered N.M. State Highway 105 on our map. According to the map, this road would lead to Nogal Lake, and save around 20 or 25 miles. Why not?

State 105 didn't have a big sign where it "intersected" with the main road. Just a small highway sign pointing the direction to the lake.

Despite some protests from the back seat, we proceeded down the five or six miles. It turned out to be a dirt (and rocky) road for its entire stretch, and there were times you'd swear that the road was going to end at a fenced pasture, but it would keep going past a cattle guard.

If you've explored Eastern New Mexico, this type of road isn't unfamiliar to you. It really wasn't a hard road to negotiate. Just the fact that it was termed a state highway got the best of those in our group.

The highway is marked, by the way, by single stakes, one at each end of the six-mile stretch, with a small metal plate attached, which simply has the numbers "105." Nothing fancy...just like the road.

After that trip down New Mexico 105, we decided that we Texans have become spoiled by our highway system. We have come to expect four-lane highways, or at least a wide road with paved shoulders for state highways--and that's what we have in most cases.

One final word of warning, based on our experience of Easter weekend: I don't know if they have "Farm to Market" roads in New Mexico or not--but based on what we found this state road to be, I would urge you to approach any road in that state which might be designated as a Farm Road with extreme caution.

The National High School Athletics Coaches Association Executive Director, Carey E. McDonald, has announced that Coach Bill Richards of Reserve High School, Reserve, New Mexico, was nominated by fellow coaches in his state for "National High School Coach-of-the-Year."

Outstanding coaches were nominated from other states in the NHSACA District but Coach Richards was judged by the National Awards Committee as one of the eight NHSACA District Nominees for the 1984 National honor. The evaluative criteria included head coaching tenure, won-lost record, championship years, service to the profession, community and to high school athletics, and coaching honors.

Coach Richards will be honored with a beautiful plaque at the 19th annual NHSACA National Awards

Banquet on June 29 in Rupp Arena in Lexington, Kentucky. National awards will be announced and handsome award rings presented to the National A.D. and High School Coaches of the Year in person at the National Awards Banquet which is co-hosted by the NFL.

Richards is a Bovina High School graduate and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cash Richards.

In the news release received by the Blade, it stated that 45-48 states will attend the National Convention on June 23-29, in Lexington, Kentucky. "The citizens and sports fans of the community of Reserve and New Mexico are very proud of the great job that Coach Richards has done with its youth through athletics," commented McDonald, "for this achievement is a compliment to the school system, student body, faculty, coaching staff, and the family." Court Asks Fee From Bravo Co.

The Parmer County Commissioners held further discussion this week regarding the Bravo Pipeline Co., which had requested an easement to cross county roads. The court had asked a fee of \$500 each for crossing the nine roads proposed on the project.

A representative of the company had contacted Judge Roberts indicating that Parmer County was the only one requiring a crossing charge. Judge Roberts said this was not the case, and the court passed a motion to stick to their original requirement.

Vicki Jacobs of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission met with the court to explain the service the PRPC provides in connection with the Agricultural Development Act of 1983. This act provides for bonds to be issued and sold to finance the processing or marketing of farm products.

Several Panhandle Commissioners' Courts have elected to band together

to form a board of directors for the issuance of the bonds. A motion was passed for the county to join this PRPC group, and appointing Jerry Hinkle of Friona as the county's representative on the board.

Payment of \$35 in travel costs, to transport an indigent citizen from Parmer County Community Hospital to the Veteran's Hospital in Amarillo was approved.

Boarding care bills for the county's foster children, in the amount of \$2,129.00 were approved. The amount will be re-imbursed the county.

A special absentee voting booth and dates for the primary election was approved for April 19, 25 and 26 in Friona at the Credit Union.

A motion was passed to advertise for the purchase of a new pickup for Precinct 2. Bids for the vehicle are to be opened on April 23.

Soil work requests were approved for five county farmers, subject to availability of machinery.

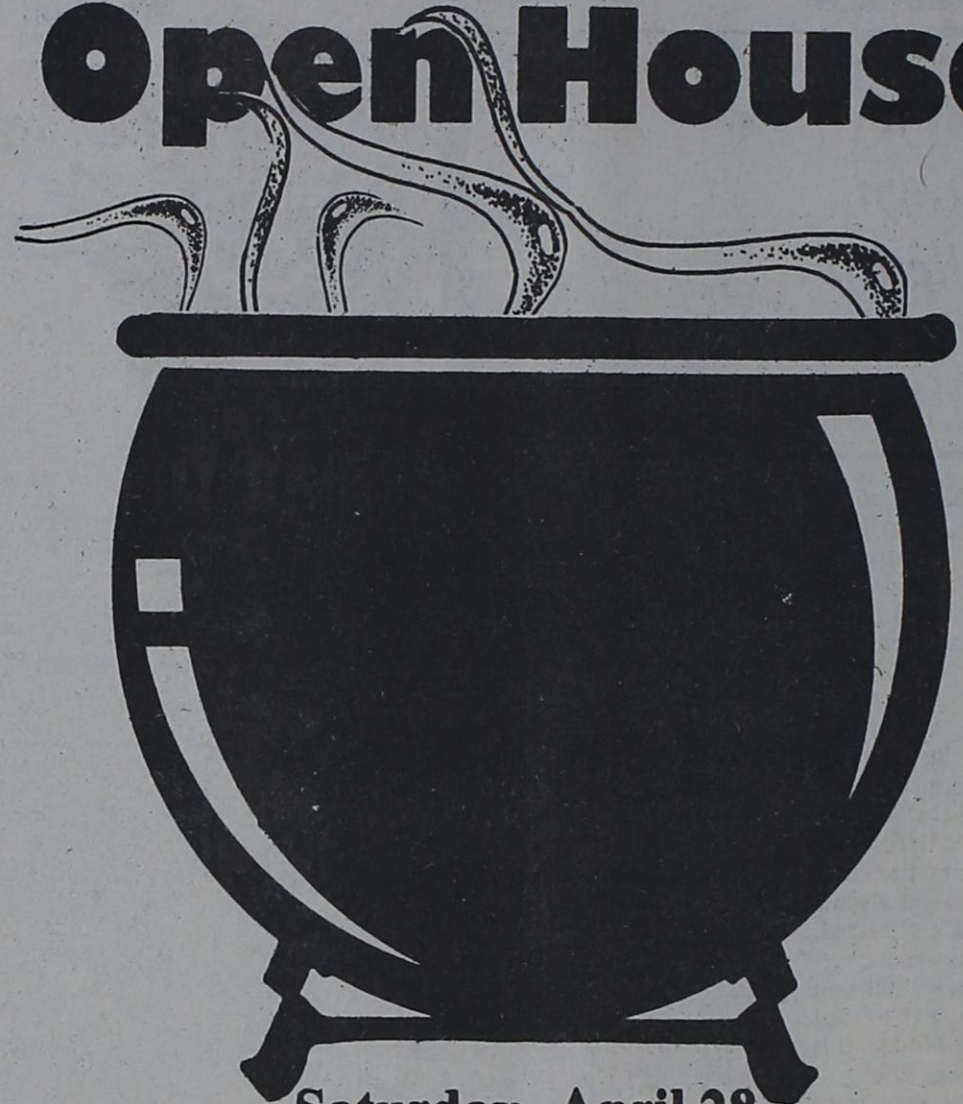
