



It is said the breweries are raising a fund of nineteen millions of dollars to defeat nation-wide prohibition. Money defeated Statewide prohibition in Texas in 1911 and money elected Jim Ferguson, the champion of the liquor interests, and defeated submission last year. Old "booze" must go and will go when the people have a fair chance to express their will in the matter.

The legislature has a bill before it legalizing race track gambling, but it will hardly pass. The idea that gambling on horse racing is justifiable as a means to increase the breed of horses is absurd. Race horses are not of practical use to farmers or producers, and running horses under whip and spur is cruel, and any species of gambling is demoralizing to old and young. See what gambling and drink have done for Mexico. The moral and -religious sentiment of our people are opposed to gambling at fairs or elsewhere, and to running beer joints at any place where women and children are invited.






