Alvin Dille Elected Supt. of Kerrville Public Schools

At a special called meeting of the board of trustees of the Kerrville Independent School District last Thursday night Prof. Alvin Dille, now Supt. of Schools at Bishop, was elected as Superintendent of the Kerrville Public Schools for the next school term at a salary of \$1800 for the year. A full board of trustees was present and the vote was unanimous.

A reporter of the Advance called upon the President of the Board for verification of the above and he stated the report was correct. When asked if Prof. Bagwell's resignation had been acted upon before the action electing Prof. Dille, he stated it so appeared upon the school board minutes.

Prof. Dille was in charge of the Kerrville schools for three years up to last year and his record as a man and as a superintendent is too well known here to need any comment.

The school board is composed of W. A. Fawcett, President; T. C. Johnson, Secretary; A. W. Henke, Ally Beitel, Walter Peterson, Robt. Saenger and Frederick Nye.

No other teachers were elected at this meeting of the board.

Injunction Sought to Prevent Removal of Sap Depot

Herman Mosel, Henry Welge and the West Texas Supply Co. on behalf of themselves and other citizens filed suit Monday in our District Court against the Sap Railroad Co. to prevent the railroad company from removing the passenger depot to the proposed new location between Clay and Tchoupitoulas streets. The complainants own lots and storehouses and other buildings fronting the present freight and passenger depots, and allege that the Railroad Co. had designated its depot grounds, consisting of 17 acres, and accepted a deed to the same from Capt. Charles Schreiner in consideration of \$3,000 and the further consideration of the maintenance of the depot on the depot grounds; that there are ample facilities and room for the new depot on the new depot grounds, and that the proposed location is almost two blocks off the depot grounds and at a place inconvenient and inaccessible and in front of lumber offices and sheds and a switch track, and that there is no public street between Clay and Tchoupitoulas streets but the property is owned by the Beitel Lumber Co. except a strip of about 50 feet owned by the Railroad Co. It is claimed in the petition that to remove the depot off the depot grounds would depreciate the property of the petitioners which they acquired from or through Captain Schreiner, and that its location at the place proposed would be in manifest disregard of the law governing such matters and of the agreement of the railroad company as well as against the public interest, and the court is asked on a hearing of the facts to enjoin the company from locating the depot off the designated depot grounds. The petitioners also claim that a protest against such location signed by many citizens was ignored by the company and its superintendent.

Kerrville has had no passenger depot for a year and a half, except a makeshift adjoining the new freight depot, and it is hoped the controversy will soon be settled and a modern depot built. Judge J. R. Burnett, representing the complainants, states that a hearing can be had in the matter at a very early date if the Railroad Co. is ready as it is a matter that can be disposed of in vacation and does not have to await the regular term of court.

Will Boy Farmers be Given Trip to A. & M. College?

On Saturday, March 27, at Ingram the Kerr County Farmer's Institute will take up the report of the committee appointed at the last meeting to formulate plans by which about forty school boys with farming tendencies are to be given a trip to the A. & M. College some time this summer.

The plan is to have each public school in the county elect at least one boy and schools having over 100 pupils will select one for each 100, or the fraction thereof. The boys in company with some member of the Farmer's Institute will go in a body for one whole week's trip. At the College the boys will be shown every department of work being carried on and on their return will be expected to tell every one they meet who will listen, all they have seen and learned on the trip.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE.

The Dallas-Galveston News, the most influential and widely circulated combination of daily papers in the South, has come out squarely for equal suffrage. Following is a splendid comment upon the subject in an editorial in Saturday's Dallas News:

That was an interesting article which appeared recently in our news columns and told of the part taken by Mrs. Woods, wife of the Speaker of the House, in the compulsory education bill. Mrs. Woods, we are informed, has been convinced of the desirability of such legislation, and had urged her husband not only to remain in the Legislature, but to become a candidate for Speaker in order that he might be able to forward, to the extent of his earnestness and authority, the proposed measure.

But that was not the limit of Mrs. Woods' efforts, neither the most nor the best of her assistance. "I have made almost each thought of this measure a prayer for its passage," she is quoted as saying. In that phrase is much for the masculine mind to contemplate. Women on the average are not only more literate than men, but vastly more spiritually refined. When they come to fully participate in the public affairs of this State, and other States, they will bring to bear upon their decisions not only the promptitude of female intuition, but also the aspirations of trained minds and the instincts of reverent hearts. Can we doubt that the addition of an educated, alert and prayerful contingent to the electorate will promote humanity's best interests? Can we reasonably fear that such an addition to the country's voting strength will be disadvantageous to the country's welfare? It requires, we are persuaded, an unhealthy imagination to conceive any just cause for alarm in a proposition which looks so indubitably to the betterment of the ballot. To contend contrarily is but to give expression to a dogmatism founded in the very sort of prejudice which it is the privilege of enlightenment to dissipate.

In this connection it is quite allowable to speak of woman's participation in politics as a consummation finally ordained. The recent vote in the Texas Legislature showed so great a preponderance for woman suffrage that the requisite two-thirds was lacking by so little as to warrant the confident expectation that the necessary number will be found in the legislative body next to be elected. To many men this prospect is disquieting. Some of our ablest and best citizens can not view woman suffrage with friendly eyes. Their conservatism is embedded in countless centuries of masculine self-assurance, and they sincerely and gravely fear that "votes for women" means danger to the institutions which democracy has raised in America. But is democracy really democratic when it condemns half the mature population to political silence? Is political freedom true to name when it imprisons the political aspirations of the best educated and most moral sex? It is all very well to urge that woman should be content

with the more or less artificial pedestal upon which so-called masculine gallantry has set her. But it is impossible to keep a woman with brains in a mental attitude where it is her highest pleasure to pose for her rulers. And to put woman on such a plane is undoubtedly to pose her for the admiration of the multitude, a situation which she may sensibly despise because of its ridiculous purpose to deceive her into the sort of servitude which her intelligence resents and rejects. When man gave his consent for his daughters to attend school, to read and to think and to occupy their minds with affairs apart from house-wifery, he gave them, perhaps unconsciously, the desire for the ballot. And having given them the desire, after nature gave them the merit, he has no moral right to deny them it. If it were better to deny woman the right to vote it would be better also to deny her the right to cultivate her mind.

This is still doubted by the masculine minority. But the social evolution is not less sure than the physical, and to contend against woman suffrage today is as unavailing as contending against the survival of the fittest intellectually, moral and spiritually was unavailing from the first.

DISREGARDS DOCTRINE OF LOCAL SELF GOVERNMENT

Hon. Daniel D. Garrett in the National Congress, speaking upon the National Prohibition Amendment last December, said:

"Now, Mr. Speaker, in the few moments that I have left I wish to give a few reasons why I am against the liquor traffic. First, however, I want to put this proposition to every Member upon the floor of this House to-day: I want you to rise in your places and tell me one good thing that intoxicating liquor has ever done for mankind, and I will pause for a reply. Name it. Name just one thing that the saloons of this country ever did to make the world brighter and better.

Mr. Speaker, I am now and expect to remain unalterably opposed to the traffic in intoxicating liquors. I regard the saloon as the great enemy of the home, the church, the school and the state, and I believe it has no proper place in our civilization. I am opposed to it because of the misery, suffering and privation it has brought to the human race. Sirs, there is scarcely a home in all our land that has not felt, directly or indirectly, the cruel hand of this great destroyer of human happiness. It is no respecter of persons. It will enter the home of high or low and will destroy the first born and then scorn the lamentation of a kind father and devoted mother who ever mourn the loss of their loved one. It unfortunate victims fill our jails, penitentiaries, and asylums for the insane.

It enters the sanctity of the home and destroys the sacred relation of husband and wife, parent and child.

It causes the sins of the father to be visited upon his children even unto the third and fourth generations.

It disregards the laws of God and man.

It has repeatedly invaded local territory where the people by their solemn votes have declared its sale unlawful, thereby utterly disregarding the doctrine of local self-government.

It refuses to be regulated; therefore it must be destroyed."
