Honest Elections

Corruption of the ballot and the wholesale illegal voting of illiterate Mexicans has received a terrible blow in the conviction of five prominent officers and citizens of Corpus Christi and three of whom received penitetiary sentences. The cases will be appealed, as it is claimed that the United States court has no jurisdiction to protect the ballot in State elections. It was shown in the trial that hundreds of Mexicans who were not citizens of the United States and could not read nor write, were voted for a certain ticket and received pay for thus degrading the ballot.

The breweries of Texas are receiving the attention of Attorney General Looney and his able assistants in the pending suit to forfeit their charters. Evidence taken shows that these corporations and distilleries and breweries outside of the State made large contributions to the anti prohibition fund and to pay poll taxes of ignorant and corrupt voters. The witnesses twist all they can, but the State's attorneys produce documentary evidence that cant be twisted.

It looks now that the days of vote buying and otherwise corrupting the ballot are numbered in Texas, and that the honest and moral forces will not longer be overcome by trickery and rascality. Everybody knows that the chief seat of this corruption is in the liquor traffic, and that honest elections and good government will give it its deathblow.
