while the carrying capacity and methods followed vary on different farms under observation, with good management an acre of pasture will support two cows or their equivalent in other live stock from four to six months each year, depending on the location of the project. It also appears that under favorable local conditions and proper care, the stock-carrying capacity of these pastures could be increased somewhat from year to year.

#### Profitable Pastures.

Farmers in the Salt Lake valley of Utah have found that irrigated pastures are profitable on land which is valued at \$200 an acre. A dairy farmer in the Snake River valley of Idaho reports that his irrigated pasture carries three cows per acre.

The value of such pasturage can be stated in terms of hay replacement. Two cows will consume approximately

The circular devotes considerable attention to selection of locations for pastures, preparation of the land, the importance of using fertile and productive soil, making provision for proper irrigation and proper preparation of seedbed. Under the subject of the seedbed, the author writes:

"The seedbed should be carefully prepared and made firm and smooth, so that a satisfactory stand can be secured. It is ordinarily better to provide plenty of moisture in the soil before seeding time than to seed in a dry soil and irrigate immediately afterwards. This is true particularly of heavy soil, on which a tough crust

Article Sells on Its Merits as to Flavor, Taste and Color -- Control Flavors and Odors.

Butter is used primarily to improve the palatability of foods for human consumption. It sells on its merits as to taste, flavor and color, though some are influenced by its texture. Color may be produced artificially in a way to please the most particular person and it therefore becomes of secondary importance to the producer ; it does not imply quality, but oftimes a rich color will compensate for a lack of other qualities. Flavors and odors in butter may be


controlled to a certain extent by care in feeding and handling cows. The volatile fats in milk are quick to absorb odors, either from feeds during the process of digestion and assimilation in the cow or from strong odors coming in contac, with the milk after it has been drawn. The latter may be obviated by keeping the stable and utensils sweet and clean, free from dust and all objectionable odors. When disinfectants are used about the stables care must be exercised to air the stables thoroughly, for the milk will absorb the odor of disinfectants in a remarkably brief time. The most effective plan is to disinfect as soon as the cows are turned out, then air the stables well for at least three or four



After Leaves Have Fallen Application of Fungicide Will Destroy Many Fungus Spores.


Too much emphasis cannot be laid on the importance of thorough fall spraying. GRADE OF AMERICAN BUTTER

Quality is Poor on Account of Poor Cream Used in Manufacture-

Foreign Make Is Better.

Imported butter does not reach our markets in as fresh condition as our own butter, consequently the majority of it sells as second-grade. In many cases it leaves the point of production as a first-class article, but is so long in transit that it deteriorates and arrives as second-grade butter. Unfortunately the majority of American-made butters are also second-grade. This is not because it cannot reach the market at once, but because it is made from a poor quality of cream. The American farmer is not producing as good quality of cream as his foreign brother.


HIGH GRADE BUTTER PRICES

Producers of First-Class Articles Are Realizing Nice Margin Over Inferior Product.

First-grade butter is still in big demand in this country and the producers of good butter are realizing a nice margin in price over the producers of second grade butter. Because of foreign competition with our secondgrade butter the difference in price between first-grade and second-grade is wide, 'Foreign competition has not materially increased the supply of first-grades, while the supply of seconds has been increased tremendously.
