#### Mustangs Take On Longhorns

In an effort to get back on the track of victory after their stunning loss to Happy last week, Bovina Mustangs take on Lazbuddie's Longhorns at 7:30 p.m. Friday in a district game which will be a highlight of homecoming activities.

Mustangs will go into the game with a district record of 1-1. For the season they are 5-2-1. Lazbuddie stands 0-1 in district, having lost to Vega, and is 2-5 for the year.



## Voters To Scan Lengthy Ballot Tuesday, Nov.6

By BILL ELLIS

Parmer County voters, like those throughout the state, will be confronted with a "frightening" ballot when they go to the polls Tuesday.

The ballot, which contains 29 races and 14 proposed amendments to the Texas constitution, is longer than most newspapers -measuring 22 inches in length.

In order that county voters may be more familiar with the candidates and their platforms, individual sketches of the candidates in each major contested race appear on the following pages, along with a discussion of the proposed amendments.

Republicans are providing opposition in 12 of the 20 state and district races. None of the Democratic nominees for county offices have opposition.

There are five columns on the ballot, listing the Independent, Democratic, Republican and Constitution parties in that order, and one column for writeins.

Only two candidates appear under the Constitution party. They are Jack Carswell, candidate for governor, and Joseph Rummler, for Comptroller of Public Accounts.

Voters are reminded that in races where there are two or more candidates, all names except the candidate for which they vote must be scratched out, or their votes will not be tabulated for that race.



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

The national fishery center and acquarium is for the purpose of saving an industry that could mean several billion dollars a year to our national products. It is an investment that will pay for itself and make the nation self-sufficient in obtaining an additional three billion tons of fish that will be needed by 1980.

And, while we're quoting editor Thompson, here's another interesting paragraph: "The New York Times says in a Washington dateline story that 46 conservative candidates for Congress are receiving assistance in one form or another from the Americans for Constitutional Action.



By William L. Lyles Deferred grazing of rangeland has produced an excellent growth of native grasses this year. The removal of livestock from these pastures last spring plus the summer rains allowed the vigorous growth to be made. There was also a good seed crop produced on these grasses. The growth which has been produced will allow a rancher to have a better inventory of his grazing for the winter

months ahead. Deferred grazing while heing one of the better "tools of conservation" will not do the complete job of range improvement. Most tools are specialized for specific jobs, so also is range deferment. Range deferment has several specific jobs, such as permitting the present grasses to gain in vigor, produce seed, and then allowing the seedlings to grow as replacements for the grass plants which die each year.

While ranching isn't the major type of agricultural enterprise in this country; those of you which do have considerable amounts of grassland should use this tool as one of the things which will help you produce more grass. 





## 14 Amendments Confront Voters

One of the most bewildering decisions facing Texas vo. each general election is passing or refusing amendments to the state constitution. Texas operates within a constitutional framework originally copied after that of the federal government, but the state's has been amended so many times in the past 100 years that it is a crazy-quilt collection of policies which seemingly become more difficult to interpret and live un-

In 1962, 14 proposed amendments face the voters of Texas, and if the electorate plans to vote intelligently on the merits of the propositions, it will probably take them longer to ferret out the facts in the referendum than to sift the chaff from the wheat in the case of the candidates.

The fourteen amendments have been published in Parmer County newspapers in their entirety. Here is a brief--very brief--description of them together with a recommendation which we make regarding their worthiness. This comment is

It is pointed out (and & nitted, if you please) that we have a natural reluctance to endorse any amendment to the state constitution. The reason is that the state constitution, unlike the federal's, requires only a simple majority of the people to become law. A two-thirds majority ratification is required for eny change in the U.S. constitution. Since most amendments in this state originate from groups with special problems, and interest is rarely statewide, it is traditional for voting to be light, and for the most part ill-informed. The general public is simply not interested enough to dig out the facts--which are sometimes pretty hard to find--concerning the amendments. Moreover, it is history that once amendments have been adopted, they are adopted permanently. That is, if the public makes an unwise choice, it is practically impossible to rescind this action in later years. Changes in the constitution have a way of becoming quite permanent, no matter whether they are sound or otherwise. That being the case, we have elected upon a course that could be described as cautious. We believe if an amendment is too broad, or too vague, it should be discarded for that reason alone, since it has such far-reaching consequences.

NO. 1 -- WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION, Would authorize all counties and other political subdivisions to provide insurance for all employees. Since 1948 counties have been able to provide workmen's compensation for their employees. The "other political subdivisions" is too general. It might conceivably include justice precincts, water districts, erosions districts, and so-on. Too vague and not needed.

NO. 2--NEEDY AGED, BLIND AND CHILDREN, Welfare costs are difficult to control and often are the seedbed of administrative mismanagement and abuse. Yet Americans have a Christian responsibility to care for this group, and here is a chance to do it at the state level instead of asking the federal bureaucrats to take over. The \$5 million increase is a modest request considering the problems bred by inflation in recent years.

NO. 3--HOSPITAL DISTRICTS. Castro, Parmer County's neighbor, is one of four counties this amendment is specifically drawn for. It would permit the state to create hospital districts the same dimension as the county boundaries. No objection to this; it is permissive legislation and would still have to be acted upon by the citizens who are residents of the county. A point, though; why does the whole state have to vote on this simple issue?

NO. 4 -- WATER FACILITIES. Would authorize the Water Development Board to acquire and develop storage facilities. This state office needs authority to carry out one of the state's most pressing needs. This is an important job for the future and should be permitted by the state's voters.

NO. 5--HOSPITAL DISTRICTS. This amendment would permit the legislature to authorize creation of districts composed of all or part of one or more counties. It would save the need for the whole state to vote on every proposal, as in proposed amendment No. 3 already commented on. Pass it and move the red tape out of the ballot box.

NO. 6--RETIREMENT BENEFITS. The state already has a plan for retirement, disability, death benefits for employees. This is besides the Social Security program. The cost of this amendment to various political subdivisions has not even been

NO. 7--GOVERNMENT AFTER ENEMY ATTACK, Would authorize the legislature to fill public positions if the incumbents were unavailable due to an emergency attack. This is giving the legislature too much power. They don't need it as we already have laws which provide for filling offices when they become unexpectedly vacant, Besides, how do we know we could get the legislature in session in event of disaster? Since we have no control over what might happen in case of enemy attack, it would not be possible to prepare for any eventuality. Play it

NO. 8--PERMANENTLY AND TOTALLY DISABLED, Would increase by \$1 million the state's aid to totally and permanently disabled who are not feasible for rehabilitation. This proposed amendment ties in closely with proposition No. 2 and we support it for the same reasons. While there no doubt are some abuses in this program, as is always the case in any government-administered aid project, the amount asked is a pittance for a state like Texas, and there is no doubt that most of the money is going for needed, humanitarian purposes.

NO. 9 -- HOSPITAL DISTRICT, HOMES FOR AGED, Pertaining to permissive legislation to authorize creation of two hospital districts in Brazoria County, and a home for the aged in Titus County. Here is another case of where all the state's citizens are asked to vote on an entirely local issue. We think that if the residents of the counties mentioned wish to vote taxes upon themselves for the purposes explained, they should be allowed to do so. If the constitution provides they may not do this, then THAT is where we need the constitution amended, or re-amended, as the case may well be.

NO. 10--STATE EMPLOYEES AS CONSULTANTS, Would permit state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees with other agencies of the state or the federal government, provided there is no conflict of interest. This amendment would set a dangerous precedent. A person should be elected or appointed to an office to fill one specific job, no other. The amendment provides that under it employees might be reimbursed for their expenses while providing this consulting service. In time, this might be broadened to amount to being paid for two jobs instead of one.

NO. 11--SALE OF LANDS TO NON-VETERANS, Would permit the sale of lands held by the veterans land fund to persons other than veterans. Even though the amendment provides that the lands would first have to be offered to veterans we oppose this measure. Several years ago the veterans land program became one of the most mis-managed state projects ever undertaken. The program was originally designed to help veterans. There is no reason to broaden it to help others now.

NO. 12--TRAFFIC, LITTERING ON COASTAL BEACHES, Would authorize county or local governing agency where the beaches are located to regulate and control speed, parking, travel and littering on these beaches. We are far removed from the beaches of the Texas Gulf Coast, but it looks to us like this job is more properly within the province of the state, which is more likely to have uniform and effective laws governing such matters. We will vote against it.

NO. 13--DALLAS COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICTS, Would authorize Dallas County school districts to continue the levy of taxes and the sale of bonds without having elections following a change in boundaries. Why just Dallas County? If this change is desired and needed let it be for the state, not just one county. If this amendment passes it will further add to the confusion of state law by permitting another small pocket of "special law" for a special situation. Besides, the present requirements for re-authorization of taxes and bonds after any boundary change discourages school boards from making changes to which there may be considerable opposition in areas affected.

NO. 14--TRIAL DE NOVO. Authorize the legislature to provide for a new trial on all appeals to the courts from decisions of administrative and executive state agencies. It is curious that the the most important amendment of all--the one which would have the most far-reaching effects if passed -should be at the bottom of the long amendments list. Up to now in many cases persons have been unable to appeal executive decisions made by state officials and boards. Reference is often made to the state's regulatory commissions, and arbitrary and unwise decisions reached by these boards have been a genuine basis for complaint by many of Texas' citizens who have been "burned" when caught in the administrative machinery. It is frustrating for citizens to have no recourse in the courts from decisions made by bureaucratic agencies of the government. The opinions of the state officials often have the same effect as statutory law. However, if this amendment should be passed, it would throw wide the gates and in time could subject every decision made by every agency to trial in the courts. It could, conceivably, mean that every decision made by the Parmer County commissioners court, for example, can be challenged in the courtroom by anyone who takes offense. Such procedure would result in not government but chaos. Officials are elected, and they appoint assistants to carry out the desires of the people using the state and federal laws as guidelines. If a man is elected to do a job, we think he should be permitted to carry it out to the best of his ability, and his every action can not be subject to challenge in the courts by some crank. If the man can't or won't do the job right, then get rid of him--but while he has the job give him the authority to carry it out, We are AGAINST No. 14.

## Farm

Preliminary Census of Agri-culture figures for 1959 re-veal that 509,538 U. S. farms produce some cotton.

Cotton is grown in 19 states. These are Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Nevada, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Ten-nessee, Texas, and Virginia.

Cotton is grown on 35% of the farms in Texas-almost 81,000. South Carolina, however, has the highest percentage of farms producing cotton--58.1, followed by Missis-sippi with 56, Alabama with 55.2. Georgia with 40, Arkansas with 36.7, and Arizona with 35.1.

Texas also ranks first in cotton production, ginning more than 4.8 million bales of the 14.3 million ginned during the 1961-62 season.


