A BIT OF RED CROSS HISTORY

We owe our Red Cross, as we have it today, to a little tract, 'Souvenir de Solferino' written by a Swiss, Henri Dunant. In this tract. Dunant pictures the horrors of Solferino, where thirty thousand French, Italian and Austrian wounded lay in agony while the campaign went on. Nurses there were none, and preparations for the tragedy were unknown. That was in 1859. This "Souvenir" made such an impression upon the rulers of Europe that a conference was held in Geneva in October 1863, to discuss methods to relieve the sick and wounded in war. The outcome of the conference was a Treaty signed by fourteen nations. It provided that each government extend its sanction, authority and protection to volunteer relief organizations in time of war; that the privileges of neutrality be extended by all belligerents to the ambulances, hospitals, doctors, nurses, and all persons attached to the medical relief corps of the army: and finally, that the Red Cross, now familiar to all, and respected by all but savages, should be the universal insignia of volunteers in care of the wounded. Our beloved Clara Barton, who was active in the relief of the wounded during, the Civil War, and who studied military relief with the Red Cross societies of Europe, bent all her efforts towards getting the United States to ratify the Geneva Treaty. 

Iced Cocoa.

Boil a half cupful of cocoa, threequarters of a cupful of sugar, and one cupful of water to make a rich sirup. Put this in a jar on ice and it is ready to serve at a moment's notice. Add a tablespoonful of the strup to a glass of cold milk.

Mint Jelly Sauce. Combine a cupful of current or any tart jelly, beaten with the juice of one orange and a half cupful of finely minced mint. Let stand in a cold place for an hour before using.

Strawberries Preserved Whole.

Crush two quarts of strawberries, using the small ones, and simmer Onion Sandwich .- Soak for an hour gently for twenty minutes, then strain, Allow a pound of sugar to a pint of fuice as soon as it is strained. Return to the stove and boil until thick skimming carefully when necessary. Fill bot glasses with hulled fine berthen put on the sterilized covers.

Pineapples and strawberries is a combination well liked. Cut the pineapple in dice and add twice as many strawberries. Fill the jars with this sugar to each pound of rhubarb. Cut mixture using the usual amount of

LAW REGULATING MOTOR VEHICLES

NEW LAW ENACTED BY THE THIRTY-FIFTH LEGISLATURE OPERATIVE ON JULY 1.

REGISTRATION FEES, ETC.

Law Is Clearly Set Forth So That Those Who Operate Motor-Driven Vehicles May Guard Against Violations, Etc.

Austin, Tex .- An act regulating the use and operation of vehicles upon the public highways of the State, passed by the Thirty-fifth legislature and becoming effective July 1, 1917, fol-

The department will furnish without charge, with transportation prepaid, to every person whose motor vehicle is registered as required by law, one seal of each size. The plates are made of steel with baked enamel, 5½ inches wide, length between 12 and 17 inches, 1/2 inch space between letters, letters eing 4 inches in height with 1/2-inch stroke. The number plates are to be the permanent numbers for the

The distinguishing seals to the number of 160,000 to be supplied by July 15. The seal will be of steel 41/2 inches in diameter. The Texas star and lettering will be in white with a vermillion red background for the first year. The background will be white next year and blue the year following, or the national colors for the next three years. The seals will have to be gotten annually to show that the current year's license has been paid. A glance at the color will show whether or not the car has paid its current tax each year. The design is the state seal, except that the star is encircled by lettering showing that it is a registered motor vehicle of Texas with year date.




Better Way to Keep Young Animals Than to Provide Pens in Which They Can Run Loose.

By C. C. HAYDEN, Ohio Experiment

There is no better way to keep alves or yearlings than to provide pens in which they can run loose in mall groups. Mangers and stanchions should be provided along one side of the pens, in which the calves can be fastened while eating.

The accompanying sketch shows simple yet convenient plan. The dinensions are 30 by 40 feet. A space 10 feet wide is taken across one end to be used as a feed room. The remainder is divided into four pens, two on either side, each 12 by 14 feet. A feed alley 5 feet wide runs through the manger with six stanchions to a

The stanchions as shown are two feet apart which is sufficient for even a yearling if fastened only while eat-

Should Be Given to Limit of Animal's Capacity-Soy Bean Hay Is Classed With Alfalfa.

"Roughage should be fed to the limit of the dairy cow's capacity," says Prof. C. C. Hayden of the Ohio experiment station. "Relatively, the roughages, like hay and corn and stover, are much cheaper than grains and hay is of unusually good quality. Roughage, of course, should not be fed exclusively, as such feeding might lead to compaction and death even in dry cows and heifers. Some grain is needed in every dairy ration."

This dairy specialist also declares: "Choice alfalfa hay at \$20 a ton is cheaper than bran at \$30. Our experiments show that soy bean hay is in the same class as alfalfa, and clover is third. With corn at \$1 a bushel, clover hay should be worth about \$20 a ton, or \$5 more than it is now quoted."

Timothy hay is recommended for milking cows only in small quantities to replace such grains as corn and hominy. Leguminous roughages have periments to timothy for cows in

Huge Receptacle Means Saving of From 8 to 10 Cents in Cost of Producing Butterfat.

Practical dairymen who are silo users say that the silo on the farm means a saving of from eight to ten cents a pound in the cost of producing butterfat. Beef feeders say that ensilage saves from \$1 to \$1.50 per hundred pounds in producing beef.



At the present time most of the calves on farms are born during the spring, but those who have tried the fall calving plan under suitable conditions, find it possibly more satisfactory. The fallborn calf fits in with pastures somewhat better than those born in the spring. His first summer is spent on the pasture and at the end of this period he goes into the dry lot for finishing. On the other hand, the springborn calf must be fed during the first winter and when the pastures are ready usually cannot be placed on them because he has reached the finishing period and should go into the dry lot. Again, the farmer who seils milk will derive greater profit when his cows freshen in the fall, since milk markets are better then than in

the spring. An additional advantage

is the fact that finishing calves in the fall and early winter interferes less milo, kafir, and similar grains, for inwith other farm work than in the stance, may be used in place of corn, spring and early summer. After weaning time the feeding and management of the calf depends largely upon the time of the year it is born and the age at which it is to be sold. Suggestive calendars for the management and feeding of both spring-born and fall-born calves are contained in Farmers' Bulletin 811. The rations provided for the calves in these calendars consist of corn, cottonseed meal, corn silage, clover hay, and oat straw, but other substances may be substituted for them. 

DISEASED HOOFS OF CATTLE

One Trouble Caused by Excessive Wet Weather Is Hard to Manage--Is Not Contagious.

Not all hoof disease in cattle is the "hoof-and-mouth disease," There is one form of hoof disease which is especially hard to manage, which is caused by excessively wet weather and cattle having to be almost continually in the mud. We had a case of this kind this spring, says a writer in an exchange. The inner parts of the hoofs become very sore and tender and will finally become rotten, if not cared for in time.

We had a veterinarian prescribe treatment. This was kept up for a time without apparent results for the better. Then being very busy at corn planting time, the treatment was neglected and the animal got so it would walk on the toes, the back part of the hoof was so tender. We again tried the treatment, but the animal got worse and worse until it was a walking skeleton and could no longer stand up, when we put it out of its misery and dug a hole for the remains. Proper thinning helps trees to produce marketable fruit each season; tends to avoid danger of alternating crops. Secures best selling and most profitable crops.

Care should be used by pickers not to break off the fruit buds for the following year. Never allow the orchard boxes filled with the fruit to stand in

Where possible, pick fruit during the coolest part of the day. . Picking at proper time is just as mportant as any other part of the

Fruit picked too early is usually unfit for food.

Fruit picked too late is usually too ripe for shipment.

Apples picked after heavy frost do not hold up well. Rain on fruit that is maturing in-

First Summer Application for Apples Should Be Made Just Before the Tree Blossoms.

If apple trees have San Jose scale, scurfy or oyster shell scale, spray while the trees are dormant with a commercial sulphur solution at the rate of one to eight gallons of water. The first summer spray for apples should be applied just before the trees blossom, at a time when buds are showing pink, but before they have opened. This spray should consist of time-sulphur at the rate of one to forty gallons of water, and to this mixture add arsenate of lead at the rate of two pounds to 50 gailons of water. These two materials should be mixed together, the lime-sulphur being a spray for apple, scab, codling moth and lead for the control of curculio.

The second summer spray should be made immediately at the fall of the bloom, that is, after the blossoms have

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
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
