And so today the southland and the north Clasp hands with their blood-brothered east and west And in the mighty song their lips send forth



### OVER \$93,000,000,000 SPENT ON WORLD WAR

Washington .- The second Liberty loan of \$3,000,000,000 will be applied to the \$20,000,000,000 war bill of the United States to June 30, 1918. This vast total of American expenses, however, is only one-fifth of the cost of the war to:the other belligerent governments.

The actual cost to date, based on figures to the first of this year and the daily rate of expenditure since then, is \$93,814.-785,000. This includes Uncle Sam's \$2,000,000,000 Liberty loan. Great Britain has been the big-

gest spender, with \$22,939,375.-000 to her credit. This does not include Canada's \$645,700,000, nor the \$763,800,000 spent by Great Britain's other colonies. The other entente allies have

spent: France, \$15,114,000,000; Russia, \$12,868,000,000; Italy. \$5,911,000,000; Belgium, \$763.-000,000; Serbia, \$603,000,000, and Roumania, \$796,000,000.

The central allies have spent much less according to the figures available. Germany's expenditures are estimated at \$20,-333,000,000; Austria's, \$8,008,-



#### Powers of Leadership.

But it is guard duty in time of war that calls all a corporal's powers of leadership to the force. This is called exterior guard duty and consists of outposts during a halt and advance, flank or rear guards during an advance or retreat. It includes all that is commonly called patrolling. Bodies for this duty may be larger than a squad, and may be under the command of a sergeant or even a commissioned officer, if the duty is important enough; but here again the squad is the normal body to use and the squad leader the man put in charge if he is capable.

## WILL CAST MONSTER INGOT

#### Immense Lump of Steel Is to Be Turned Into New Type of Sixteen-Inch Naval Gun.

There has fust been cast at the Bethlehem steel works a monster ingot for the first of the 16-inch rifles that are to arm the great new battle cruisers of the United States navy, under construction at Camden. So far as known, writes a Bethlehem (Pa.) corespondent of the Philadelphia Record, the foremost ship of this class now afloat is the British cruiser Lion, with engines of 110,000 horse power. Her speed is a bit better than 40 miles an hour and she carries 14-inch guns. The American battle cruisers will have en gines of 200,000 horse power and each will be armed with four 16-inch rifles, which will shoot 20 miles. From present indications there will be six of them and Bethlehem has the order for all the guns, which will be the largest on any ships of this kind in any navy. The ingot required the contents of three open-hearth furnaces, being 15 feet 7 inches long, 100 inches in diameter and weighing 310,000 pounds. It will take several weeks to cool such an enormous mass of metal, after which it will be cut, bored and hollow forged on the great armor plate press Into a tube 80 feet long. It is proposed to finish these 16-Inch guns in record time in the new gun shop, which is wide enough to turn the tube around. with room to spare. Special lathes and other machinery had to be constructed to handle these guns, whose parts, such as jackets, rings and yokes are already being forged.



A distinct form of the military duty of a corporal is the guard duty. This may be in the nature of police duty. such as having charge of the men known as the military police, detailed to preserve order in towns near a camp. This work frequently requires a high degree of ability to size up a situation and act promptly.

More familiar in time of peace as well as time of war is what is known as interior guard duty used "in camp or garrison to preserve order, protect property and to enforce order, regulations." To the dutles of the corporal of the guard in this work the "Infantry Drill Regulations" devote five pages. quite the largest amount of space given to him in this all-important book. It is summed up in one short paragraph, however: . "It is the duty of the corporal of the guard to post and re-

Having discussed the military and what might be called the domestic responsibilities of the corporal, there remains a moré difficult, because more intangible, responsibility. It is not mentioned in the "Infantry Drill Regulations," but it is much in the minds of the people. This is his responsibillty for the moral tone of the American army. ## FOOD VALUE OF CORN SHOWN

Nutrition Investigation by Uncle Sam's Experts Discloses Large Part Played by Cereal.


Data obtained in the nutrition investigations of the United States agricultural department show that over 60 per cent of the food consumed by the people of the United States, on an avernge,'is of vegetable origin, and that about one-seventh of this, or, 8.7 per cent of the whole, is corn meal. Of the total protein consumed, animal as well as vegetable, corn meal supplies 10 per cent; of the total fat, 3.8 per cent; and of the total carbohydrates. 13.7 per cent.

Cornmeal compared with other foodstuffs of a similar nature is a lowpriced food material, and when used alone or with other equally low-priced food makes economical dishes. Of these dishes, which consist often of meal, salt and water only, each locality where- corn is used in large amounts seems to have worked out its own peculiar form.

#### Stars and Stripes on Tomb.

At the present hour Germany stands indicted as a criminal nation. It alone is responsible for the war and for the frightfulness of its character. It is guilty of deliberate crimes against humanity, premeditated outrages against civilization. When an individual runs amuck, stabbing and slashing at the passersby indiscriminately, we call the police and put him in an insane asylum or prison, and if he is responsible for his misdeeds society puts him to death. Shall men scruple to take action as drastic when it is a nation, a tremendously powerful nation, and not a weak individual? The safety of the world demands it. Peace, civiliz .- ! tion demand it.
