### New Food Regulations.

County Adminstrator A. B. Wiliamson has received the following new rules to take the place of former rules on use of flour:

Retailers are permitted to sell to onsumers a thirty days supply of flour, basing sales on allowance of six pounds per person per month, provided said six pounds is not in excess of 70 per cent of normal requirements of the consumer.

Retailers should as far as possible confine their sales to their regular customers, and must satisfy themseives to the number of persons supplied by the individual purchaser.

Housewives are requested to use their flour- for bread purposes only and in making biscuits or bread they should use as much substitutes as possible, and not to cook cakes and pastries at all as they are considered

#### Red Cross Column

(By Mrs. J. W. Burney)

The American Red Cross stands for America first, but not for America alone. It believes in helping soldiers, children and the helpless in France, in Belgium and in Rumania. It believes in the practical application of the Golden Rule. Also when the American Red Cross saves the life of a soldier in France and sends him back to the line to fight, it not only saves this man but saves a man from taking his place and the one who must ultimately take his place is an American soldier.

We are constantly hearing rumers

that the articles knittted by women for the Red Cross are sometimes sold. This emphatically is not true. No articles whatever, either knitted or otherwise, made by Red Cross Chapter, Branch, or Auxiliary, or to any supply, warehouse, are sold either to the soldiers or in shops. If any willful case of this sort should come to the attention of Headquarters the charter of the Red Cross Chapter or subsidiary sanctioning it would be immediately withdrawn with full publicity. Should it transpire that an actual instance of the above character occurred wherein an individual sold after their having been turned into the Red Cross, such action would be clearly in violation of the fundamental law covering the Red Cross, and steps would be taken to prosecute the offender. There is no the same type of articles as are produced by Red Cross workers and selling them for their own advantage, thus subjecting the Red Cross to unjust criticism. Should they use the name or emblem of the Red Cross in connection with such sales, however, they will be vigorously

### UNITED STATES TO TAKE DUTCH SHIPS

MORE THAN A HUNDRED VES-SELS WITH A TOTAL TONNAGE OF ONE MILLION INVOLVED.

### **AMERICANS WHIP HUNS**

Great Activity Is Noted at Various Points Along the Battle Lines in France-On the Other War Fronts.

Holland's reply to the American and British demand that a voluntary shipping agreement be put into effect de spite Germany's opposition, in default of which the Dutch vessels in American and British waters would be seized under the ancient law of angary, will be awaited before further action is taken by the United States govern-

Dispatches from The Hague Sunday indicated that the reply was en route. At any rate, the addition of 1,000,000 tons of shipping to the resources engaged in the fight for world freedom will not be delayed long.

The American flag will be raised over the 700,000 tons in American waters as soon as the transfer is made, and the vessels will be put into the food transport service. They will be armed to resist the attacks of Ger man submarines in the war zone, and trained American gun crews will man the guns.

A million tons of Dutch ships now held in ports the world over through las. Holland's fear of Germany's threat to sink them if they venture out will be brought into the service of the United States and Great Britain on March 18

Unless the Netherlands government braves the menace of Germany's pres sure and voluntarily accepts an agree ment under which the ships would be put in trade, the United States and Great Britain will take them over un der international law, availing them selves of a sovereign right which Ger many herself has hitherto exercised under the same authority.

From the American official point of view the action is one into which the afflied governments have been forced by the German duress of Holland which may now see her ships in trade again and can point out to Germany that they were taken through no wil of her own.

Coming at a time when the dire need of the allied cause is for ships this acquisition of a million tons is of tremendous importance.

Every arrangement has been made for the compensation of The Nether lands for the ships. They will be insured and armed and if any be lost they will be replaced.
